ALL CABINET MINISTERS

BUT ONE ARE RETURNED

In Dundas only one Labor Candidate and one Independent Liberal Elected—Sir Adam Beck has Majority of 1500 in London Riding-All Toronto Seats Won by Conservatives.

Toronto, June 29.—The elections for the legislature held throughout the province today resulted in the return of the Whitney government to power with a comparatively alightly decreased majority. In the last house the opposition mustered 18. In the new house the straight List near the straight List

Conservatives, 83; Liberals, 25; Labor, A Temperance, 1; Independent Liberals, 1; Total seats, 111.

The gains are not altogether easy to compute owing to the distribution, but counting new scats the Conservatives have made gains of 9 at Liberals 13.

Two constituencies may be said to be still in doubt, namely, North ruce and North Wentworth. Late reports were to the effect that the onservatives had a majority of four in the latter riding and that the liberals retained the former by a majority of seven.

All the ministers, with the exception of Hon. Dr. Reaume, minister of public works, were re-elected with large majorities. Dr. Reaume he ran in the new constituency of Windsor as an independent, havilled to capture the party convention, was defeated by J. C. Tolmio, iberal, by a majority of about 400.

Mr. Rowell, who was opposed by a strong candidate, R. E. Butler, a North Oxford, was returned, but with a decreased majority; his majority last election was 540.

In London, the unbeatable Sir Adam Beck received a majority of over 1,500, and in Hamilton, Alian Studholme again carried the Labor banner to victory by a majority of over 1,000

All the Toronto seats, increased by the Re-Distribution Bill, from eight to ten, were captured by the Conservatives.

In Centre Huron, W. Proudfoot, who made the charges in connection with government contracts against Mr. Hanna, which led to an inquiry, was returned by a slight majority.

Premier Whitney received the returns in his home. They were transmitted to his office in the Parliament Buildings and telephoned to the house by the Premier's private secretary. Sir James received an immense number of telegrams of congratulations. "A glorious victory" was all the comment Sir James made on the result.

Oklahoma had its beginning eighty years ago today, when Indian Territory was formed as a permanent home for the redskins. The Cherokees were removed to the future prosperous State in 1835, and were soon followed by the Choctaws, Creeks, Chickasaws and Seminoles. These constituted the five civilized tribes who laid the foundation for the prosperity of the Oklahoma of the future, and many of their descendants have become wealthy and influential citizens. The territory was included in the Louisiana purchase of 1803, but the Indians were the first permanent settlers. In addition to the "five civilized tribes," other Indians, including Sacs, Foxes, Comanches, Modocs, Nez-Perces, and smaller tribes, were given lands in the territory. In 1866 the Creeks ceded the western part of their territory, and the Seminoles all of theirs, to the United States, and these were incorporated with No Man's Land into the territory of Oklahoma a quarter of a century uso.
