

Thousands Opening Flock To Moncton For Of Government Campaign

Two Great Theatres Packed to the Doors to Hear the Premier and Minister of Customs Discuss Political Issues of Campaign -- Overflow Meeting Necessary--Railroad Question Aply Handled by Hon. Dr. Baxter, Who Advocated Railway Unit in New Brunswick.

DISTINCTLY GOOD FEELING ATTENDED OPENING OF ANGLO-IRISH PEACE CONFERENCE

The Preliminaries Passed Off Successfully, Thus Paving Way for Harmonious Consideration of More Serious Aspects of Situation--Hopes for Permanent Peace Again Rising.

CALAMITY HOWLERS QUIETED BY HANDSOME SURPLUS SHOWN BY C. N. RAILWAYS

First Time Surplus Has Been Shown Since New Board of Management Began Effecting Economies--It is Received With Gratification in Business and Political Circles--Premier's Campaign.

Ottawa, Oct. 11.—Premier Meighen's Ontario campaign, which will open at Spencerville on October 12th, will be one of the most vigorous and spectacular efforts in the history of Canadian electioneering. In fact, Meighen says the Premier will cover the entire province, addressing no fewer than twenty-two meetings, eight of which will be held in the afternoon and fourteen in the evening. He will touch every important centre in the province, will take in rural points as well as the cities and give particular attention to the fighting ground where the Agrarian cause is strongest. The Ontario tour will be brought to a close with a mass meeting in the capital on November third. Mr. Meighen will then invade Quebec, holding one or perhaps two meetings at a point still to be decided after which he will leave for the West. His present plan is to proceed right through to the coast, to hold four or five meetings in British Columbia and then to swing back to the Prairie Provinces. He will address gatherings in Edmonton, Calgary, Saskatoon, Moose Jaw, and other western cities and return east in time to wind up his campaign in the heart of the fight in Ontario.

Premier's Campaign a Winner.
The Prime Minister's brilliant campaign is appealing to the imagination of the country, and messages of congratulation and encouragement are pouring in upon the Government headquarters here from every Province in the Dominion. Meanwhile a hard jolt has been given the calamity howlers who are trying to marshal unrest and temporary hard times against the Government by the announcement that August returns show a handsome surplus for the Canadian National Railways. It is the first time that a surplus has been shown since the new board of management began effecting economies and it has been received with extreme gratification both in business and political circles here. In addition Mr. Stewart the new Minister of Railways was able to announce tonight that the Grand Trunk, which for the time being, is under separate management, is also showing a splendid advance in its net revenues. In the eight months ending August 31st, the net revenue for operation was \$3,403,610 as compared with \$1,523,538 for the same period last year, while the net revenue for the month of August alone was \$1,910,994.59.

Boston, Oct. 11.—Mrs. Frances Stuart Murphy, former motion picture star, who played opposite Erich Caruso in his only film production, fell for Edward Rose, millionaire wool merchant, of Boston, because he had money and she loved good clothes, according to an alleged confession to Attorney Joseph Santusosano, who testified against her Tuesday in a divorce suit brought by her husband, Joseph A. Murphy. Santusosano is Murphy's attorney. The former film star told him of a trip to New York with Rose which lasted several days, according to lawyer-witness. Under cross-examination he said he felt no embarrassment in stepping from counsel table to witness stand. John Driscoll told of finding Rose in a negligee in Mrs. Murphy's bedroom. Mrs. Murphy was there, too, according to Driscoll, and "when she moved it was very revealing."
Attorneys for Rose have charged that Mrs. Murphy and husband conspired to obtain money from Rose by means of a suit against the millionaire wool man for alleged alienation of her affections.

Home Run Clout Won His Bride

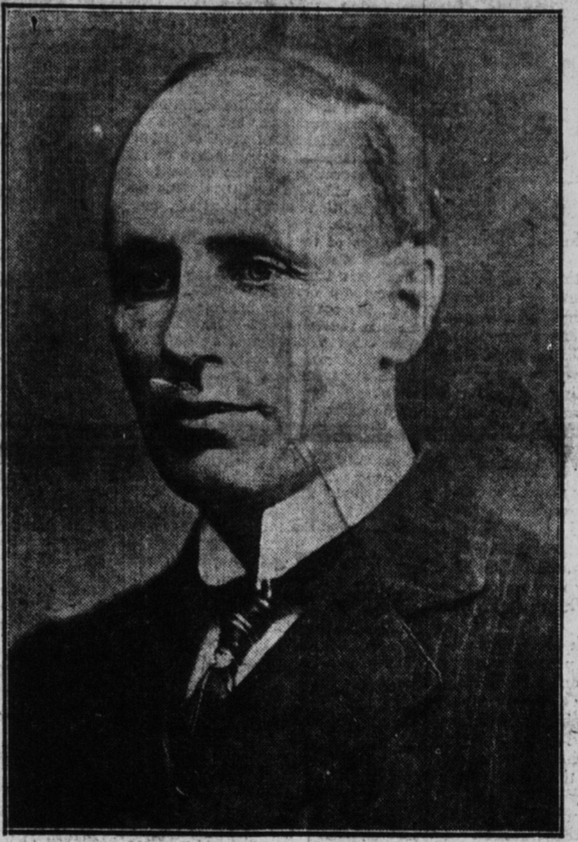
George Whitted, Right Fielder of Pirates, Reveals Inside of Little Romance.

Motion Picture Interests Are All Stirred Up

Intimation from Dist. Atty. Their Bohemia Life is to be Exposed Arouses Them.

San Francisco, Oct. 11.—Motion picture interests are so anxious for the exoneration of Roscoe Arbuckle, charged with manslaughter in connection with the death of Miss Virginia Rappo, picture actress, that Gavin McNabb, famous San Francisco attorney, has been retained by them to assist when he pleads in court Thursday, it was reported here Tuesday.
McNabb, according to report, is not of Arbuckle's counsel, but will be paid by other picture interests to defend them when District Attorney Brady, San Francisco, presents evidence which, it is reported, will attempt to expose studio life in Los Angeles.
With frequent reports coming out of Los Angeles regarding the Bohemia life of picture colonies which has been strengthened by Arbuckle's revelations and more recently by the death of Albert Stein, picture director, after a drinking bout, Brady, it is announced, is prepared to make sensational charges.
In this investigation Brady admitted Tuesday, he is being assisted by District Attorney Thomas L. Woolston, of Los Angeles. Names of many prominent film stars and picture managers and directors are expected to be brought into the testimony.
To combat this expected exposure, according to report, McNabb has been retained.

Moncton, N. B., Oct. 11.—Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, prime minister, and Hon. Dr. J. B. M. Baxter, minister of customs, received a rousing ovation in the opening of the Government campaign here this evening and were accorded a welcome that has never been equalled by any political gathering in this city. The Premier and Canada's Minister of Customs, in addition to Hon. F. B. McCurdy and Hon. Andre Fautoux, addressed gatherings at the Imperial and Empress theatres which packed the buildings to the doors. So dense were the crowds that it became necessary to hold an overflow gathering at the City Hall. Joint chairmen acted at the three meetings, with Col. F. B. Black and Azore Comeau presiding at the Empress theatre, Dr. O. B. Price, Moncton, and Senator Thomas Bourque, of Kent, at the Imperial, while C. Andrew Blakney and Albany Bourque were in charge at City Hall. Among the prominent citizens who occupied seats on the various platforms tonight were Hon. A. B. Melanson, Hon. P. G. Mahoney and Professor Webster of Shediac. Throughout the day people arrived in the city from a radius of twenty miles by motors and vehicles and some by train. Interest here was keen because of the expected statements of the Premier and Hon. Dr. Baxter in reference to the policy of the Government regarding the agitation for the establishment of a railway unit headquarters here for the Maritime Provinces and Quebec. To those who came here for that purpose the declarations of Hon. Dr. Baxter and the Premier evinced the greatest satisfaction.

Dr. Baxter Stir Audience
The first speaker at the Empress Theatre was the Hon. Dr. Baxter who marked his first appearance on a public platform since joining the Meighen Government by brilliant, masterly and vigorous speeches at the three meetings, and demonstrated him as being a tower of strength as New Brunswick's representative in the Dominion Government. In his opening remarks Hon. Dr. Baxter referred to the fine reception which had been accorded himself and other members of the Government while accompanying the Prime Minister in his tour of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island, and he considered from the large audiences who were present on all occasions that there was no doubt but that the people were alive to the real issue at stake. Since the elections had been announced, people were daily showing stronger faith in the Meighen Government. The Minister of Customs then proceeded to deal with Maritime issues which were occupying the minds of the people of the Province, especially of New Brunswick.
He strongly appealed for unity of the Maritime Provinces and the obliteration of any animosity which might exist and which might be detrimental to our interests, stating that he should present a united front. He declared himself as strongly in favor of a local centralization of railway units here and the development of our ports stating that by so doing it would increase the prestige of the Province of New Brunswick. Such a realization naturally involved transportation and the transportation in Eastern Canada would be of very little use if it were hampered seaward. "We must have proper transportation and the development of our ports," declared the speaker.
"In regard to railways," he continued, "we have in this country a very serious railway problem. The Dominion of Canada is having passed over to it the Grand Trunk Railway. We will then own approximately 22,000 miles of rails. While criticism appears from time to time in the hostile Press in regard to the past and possible future deficits, it must not be forgotten that the cause does not lie at the door of the Meighen or the Borden Government but it was the policy and actions of the Liberal party." Referring to the Liberal leader he stated that Mr. Mackenzie King criticizes and is always ready to find fault, but he never offers a solution for any of the difficulties.

London, Oct. 11.—"Distinctly good feeling" attended the opening meeting of Anglo-Irish peace conference, it was learned tonight from sources close to conferees. This indication that the conference preliminaries passed successfully, was generally accepted as paving the way for a harmonious consideration of the more serious aspects of the situation, and hopes for permanent peace are again rising. There was some amazement in official circles at Danonn De Valera's proclamation, which was considered slightly belligerent and altogether unnecessary. The Irish delegates offered reassurances, however, that no aggressive attitude was intended, saying that the statement was meant to placate Republican extremists.

Downing street presented a strange scene as the British delegates took their places at the cabinet table opposite Irish representatives, who only recently labeled them rebels and outlaws—one of them, Michael Collins, with a price of ten thousand pounds on his head.
Strictly speaking, no one presided at the conference, but Lloyd George, first spokesman, is understood formally to have stated the formula upon which it was called "with a view of ascertaining how associations of Ireland in the community of nations of the British Empire can be best reconciled to Irish National aspirations. Arthur Griffith, responding for Irish delegation, endorsed what British Premier had said.

In the Parish of Botsford the old councillors, W. J. Allen and T. M. Gould were elected by very narrow majorities.

Sent Up For Trial On Forgery Charge

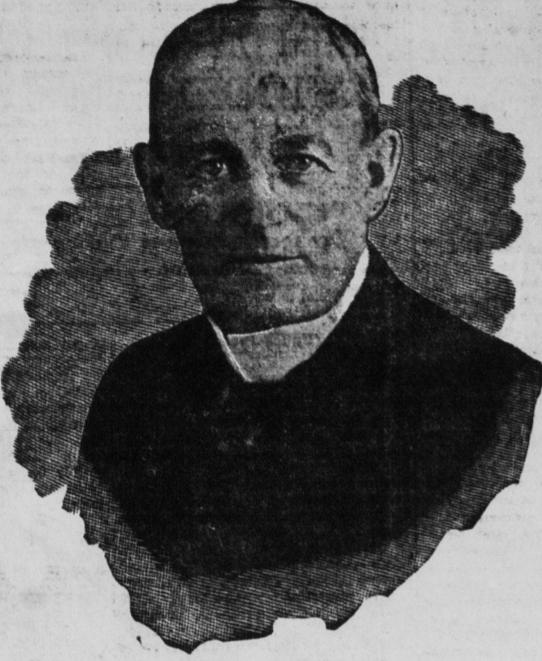
Fredericton Man in Trouble on Time Check Transactions.

 The Grand Trunk Pacific was not brought into being by the Conservative party, but was subsidized by the Laurier Government of which Mackenzie King was a member.
 Hon. Dr. Baxter pointed out that if the Government Railway was unprofitable in New Brunswick, how much more so was it in Northern Quebec and the Western country. In numerous places out West stations were constructed every ten miles, or so and the lack of buildings was quite perceptible. The Liberal Government could not have but appreciated at the time the railway was being subsidized it could not be profitably used for some years. Honorable Andrew Blair had denounced the railway policy of the Liberal Government but the Liberal Government disregarded his advice and the people of Canada as a result are paying the deficits.

Independent Board of Directors

It is essential that a Board of Directors be formed which would be independent of any political institution and operated solely on a business basis. When the Grand Trunk Railway came into financial difficulties the Government took it over and the people of Canada now own 22,000 miles of railway. The Minister of Customs declared that this system should have one central head with grand divisions, one of which will be in the Maritime Provinces, and it will be a greater management than ever existed in the past. He believed that this end of the railway should be managed by men who had made railroadings practically with their life's work and who were fully conversant with the Maritime Provinces, and in his opinion, this would be soon realized.

Difference in Railway Policies

There is a big difference in the railway policy of the Meighen Government and that of the Liberal. The latter really had two platforms. Mackenzie King advocated public ownership and operation, but his chief lieutenant, Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux, declared himself strongly in favor of passing the railways back to private companies. This country is committed by the Meighen Government to private ownership and public operation. What is the real policy of the Liberal Government? asked Hon. Dr. Baxter. This matter, he pointed out, was of the utmost importance to New Brunswick. There was no unity in the Liberal ranks in this respect. Dr. Baxter would be foolish to trust the King party in regard to the tariff or any other policy. He also referred to A. B. Copp, M. P., and advised his auditors to question him regarding the inconsistencies of the leaders of his party when he asked them for their support.

Benefits of Merchant Marine

The necessity for the building of the Canadian Merchant Marine was dwelt upon and the benefits in the way of the development of trade which would accrue to the Province of New Brunswick were convincingly dealt with. In connection with the tariff issue, Hon. Dr. Baxter was determined to have Free Trade and want cheaper transportation, and was prepared to patronize American railways rather than Canadian ones in an effort to get reduced rates.

They represented themselves as farmers but were actually grain growers. "That is not the reason that the Maritime Provinces entered the federation," he stated, "and when the Western grain-growers wished to receive special treatment greater benefits from and less taxes from the United States. This meant a loss of millions in exchange alone. The tariff policies of both positions are proposals to which both Liberals and Progressives are solemnly committed. Those subscribing to such a policy are determined opponents of any protective tariff system in this country, and their goal they are endeavoring to reach by whatever means they can possibly command."
 The Premier declared further that Mr. King's platform would increase the British preference by approximately 5 per cent. It would make free all instruments of production and all raw materials entering into all instruments of production and would permit the entry of all foodstuffs into this country duty free.
 "I am prepared to answer all and any charges which may be made against the Government at any time, and as I have placed the real facts before you I hope you will vote in the manner that will be for the good of Canada," concluded the Premier.

CIVIL WARFARE BROKE OUT IN CHINA TUESDAY

Hostilities Begun by Canton Gov't in Effort to Oust Peking Officials.

U. S. NEGOTIATORS WILL CONFER OVER ARMS CONFERENCE DATA PREPARED BY THEIR EXPERTS

Sentences Imposed in Queens Co.
Justice McKeown Metes Sentences Commensurate With the Crimes.
Gagetown, N. B., Oct. 10.—The judges of the Queens County Court have handed throughout the week, concluded on Saturday afternoon, with the imposition of sentences by His Honor Mr. Justice McKeown. These were heard with a master by quite a well-filled courtroom.

Considerable excitement was caused when William and Allan Taylor were sentenced, having been found guilty of killing a bull belonging to Sheriff Corey of Brunswick, and stealing carcass to sell. Players' Share Hits A New High Record
\$292,522.33 to be Divided Between Those Participating in the 1921 Series.
New York, Oct. 11.—(By Associated Press.)—The players participating in the 1921 world series will divide \$292,522.33, a new high record for the players' share. Under the rules play and umpires cease to share in the receipts after today's game, the first of the series. The increased capacity and higher admission charge account for the new high total. While today's attendance and receipts are slightly below those of Friday's game, the official figures are 36,768 paid admissions for a total of \$116,754. Of this amount the advisory board collected \$17,513.10; players, \$59,644.54, and the club owners \$39,696.36. The best previous figures for players' total share were those of 1919, series between Cincinnati and Chicago, when the players' pool amounted to \$260,348.66. While the best series has not as yet evolved winner and loser, the two local club players will divide \$219,301.66 on basis of approximately \$121,634.87 the team finally capturing the championship and \$87,766.89 to the Los Angeles and Pittsburgh players. The Cleveland and Pittsburgh players divide something like \$43,878.94, while the two St. Louis teams as third each possess a share will split \$29,263.65. The four umpires' remuneration will be provided from the advisory board fund upon a basis of a sum equal to earnings and one losing player's share combined and divided into four equal parts.
