#### J. W. ANNIS, M.A.

The Rev. J. W. Annis, M.A., was born in Darlington, Canada, July

21st, 1850, and died in London, Ontario, March 8th, 1895.

His father and mother were both devoted Methodists, and early trained their son in the lofty principles which guided and cheered their own happy life. At fifteen years of age Brother Annis was truly converted to God. This momentous event occurred at a camp-meeting held not far from his rural home. Simultaneously with his conversion came a deep conviction that God designed him for the Christian ministry. In view of the magnitude of the work and the gravity of the responsibility involved, the youthful convert sought to secure the best educational advantages available. In a few months after his conversion he, as a student, entered Victoria College at Cobourg, and prosecuted his studies with diligence and success until his graduation. Having become an alumnus of the University, he subsequently enjoyed the further distinction of becoming a regent of that institution. During his connection with Victoria College he won many honors and was always regarded as a distinguished student, and as one who, in the future, would rise to eminence. The expectations thus formed and expressed were fully realized in after years. He continued a student till the close of life, constantly increasing his stock of knowledge till life's work was ended.

In 1871 he was received on probation by the Toronto Conference, and successively labored on the Stouffville and Whitby circuits with great fidelity, acceptance and success. Among his subsequent fields of toil, honor, and usefulness, were Spadina Avenue, Scarboro', Allandale, Alliston, Picton, Barrie, St. Thomas, Chatham and Queen's Avenue, London, where the good fight of faith was finished, and the plumed warrior went "sweeping through the gates, washed in the blood of the

He left a widow, daughter of Mr. Thos. C. Watkins, for many years a

successful merchant in Hamilton.

Brother Annis was of an ardent nature, and probably he too severely taxed a not over-strong organism by unremitting study. His ideal of the Christian minister was a lofty one, and he was ambitious to attain to his own grand ideal. The pulpit was his throne and in a regal style he occupied it. He was no drone, nor was he content to live upon his past acquisitions. His readings and his thinkings, whether in theology, history, science or general literature, were pursued in relation to his pulpit work, and from these sources he brought forth gems to enrich his pulpit discourses. He was physically a failing man, though he saw it not. When he entered his last, and perhaps his most important field of toil, he was the last to perceive how near was the end of his life's work. He battled heroically against the advance of disease, satisfied that the suffering and weakness endured were but temporary and would soon be

succeeded by desired vigor. To this thought he tenaciously adhered till a short time prior to his death. He finally accepted the decision that others long and clearly recognized as unquestionable. He finally knew he was approaching his end and was not unprepared for the final issue. The words which frequently lingered on his pale and quivering lips, "Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace whose mind is stayed on thee," gave the satisfactory assurance of his abiding trust in Him who is "mighty to

save." "His end was peace."

As Queen's Avenue Church had been destroyed by fire not long before the death of Brother Annis, the authorities of St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church tendered that church, the last in which he ever spoke, for the funeral service. The President of the Conference, the Chairman of the London District, together with a large number of ministerial brethren of the city and elsewhere, attended the funeral. The spacious church was filled to its utmost capacity. The service in which the President, the Chairman, and others took part was a tender and solemn one. God was manifestly present. After the service the body was conveyed by train to Hamilton for interment, and "devout men carried him to his burial."

#### J. H. ANDREWS.

John Hutton Andrews was born in the township of Wolford, County of Grenville, Ont., on January 6th, 1822. His parents were Elkanah and Elizabeth, whose maiden name was Hutton. He had the great advantage of training in a Christian home, his father being for years a class-leader in connection with the Wesleyan Methodist Church. In the old Vandusen Chapel, in the year 1840, he was converted to God under the ministry of Rev. William Young. Soon he felt that he must preach the Gospel of the blessed God our Saviour, and was received on trial for the ministry of the Methodist Episcopal Church at White's Chapel, Sidney, in the year 1843. He was ordained deacon at North Port in 1845, and elder at Mallorytown in 1847 by Bishop Reynolds. The following circuits shared his ministerial labors: Matilda (twice), Bounechere, Elizabethtown, Bay of Quinte, Bedford, Elgin (twice), Winchester, Augusta (twice), Sydenham (twice), Cannifton, Camden, Selby and Shannonville. From 1848 to 1855 he located, that he might fittingly care for his aged father.

He was honored with the office of presiding elder on the Augusta District from 1861 to 1864, and of the Napanee District in 1868 and 1869, and ably performed the duties involved.

He superannuated in 1885, and soon after came west and settled in Caradoc township, about three miles from Strathroy. In July, 1891, he moved to the village of Lambeth, six miles from London, where he resided till the Master called him higher, on October 25th, 1894.

For fifty-one years he belonged to this ministry, and God greatly blessed his labors. He was regarded by all as a man of sterling moral worth, who not only felt and thought deeply, but who acted promptly and was felses in the expression of his views. As a minister of God he had a firm grasp of the truth and the faculty of deeply impressing his hearers with its great importance. No wonder that gracious revivals were the result of his abundant labors and that believers were greatly edified, for he not only toiled faithfully, but he lived the truth he taught, and waited upon

God in earnest, believing prayer for the down-shedding of the Holy Ghost.

In September, 1846, he was married to Miss Mary J. Wilson, of the township of Montague, who fell asleep in Jesus on September 8th, 1888. His family consisted of six sons and five daughters, of whom five sons and two daughters are now living. Two of the sons are railroad agents, one is a public school teacher, and two, George Washington and John Wilson, are ministers in connection with the London Conference. Bro. Andrews was a loving husband and father, and brought up his children in the nurture and admonition of the Lord.

During the years of his superannuation he was still a great help to the Methodist Church, for from the time that he came to reside within the bounds of the London Conference he had preached, on an average, about once per Sunday, his ministrations reaching most of the districts and thirty-nine of the circuits of the Conference, and his services were always highly appreciated. In private life, too, he was an example worthy of being closely followed, for it could readily be seen that he had been with Jesus and had imbibed His spirit. He was very regular and punctual in his attendance on the means of grace, including prayer and class meetings, and was ever ready to aid the pastor in any way possible. He preached his last sermon at Point Edward on September 9th, while on a visit to his son, Rev. John W., at Oorunna, and led his church class at Lambeth for the last time on the morning of October 14th; so that it may be truly said, "He ceased at once to work and live."

The immediate cause of his death was a congestive chill induced by catarrh of the stomach, from which he had suffered several months. Peacefully, at ten o'clock on the night of Thursday, October 25th, 1894, the spirit of John H. Andrews passed from earth's labor to heaven's rest.

On the following Saturday an appropriate funeral service was held in the Lambeth Methodist Church, over which Rev. J. R. Gundy, Chairman of the London District, presided, and short addresses were delivered by Revs. J. A. Ferguson, R. J. Garbutt, T. T. George and T. W. Blatchford, and then the remains were borne to the Strathroy cemetery and laid beside those of his devoted wife to await the resurrection morn.

#### R. A. HOWIE.

Robert A. Howie was born at Fort Erie, Welland Co., on the 10th day of May, 1827, and was converted to God in a revival service conducted by Rev. A. E. Griffith, on the Norwich Circuit, in the month of January, 1856, when he at once connected himself with the Methodist Episcopal Church, Norwich Circuit. He was united in marriage to Miss Mary E. Brett, on the 10th January, 1848, who is now called upon to mourn her loss. Four sons and two daughters, also, still survive him. Brother Howie entered the ministry of the Methodist Episcopal Church, in 1871. During his ministry in that Church he travelled the following circuits: Rainham, Nanticoke, Hartford, Norwich, Malahide, Vienna, Stanley and Raleigh. After the union with the Methodist Church, his charges were Harrow, Gesto, Wanstead and Merlin. On his last charge, his labors were very severe, and he was obliged, through failing health, to ask at the last Conference for superanuation. He then retired to the quiet of his home on the Cottam Circuit, to rest, as he hoped, for only one year,

was short and very severe.

His well-marked Christian confidence, his implicit trust in the power of our Lord Jesus Christ to conduct him safe into the rest that remaineth for the people of God, was most comforting to his dear loved ones, as also to the brethren in the ministry of the Church, who were privileged to visit

him in his affliction.

Brother Howie was a true and devoted servant of our Lord Jesus Christ, successful and greatly beloved in all his fields of labor. In manner he was so kind and gentle that he could soon win his way into the esteem and affection of all who became acquainted with him.

Brother Howie passed away, Sabbath morning, January 27th, and was buried in the Albuna graveyard, Ruthven Circuit, he having a dear child laid away there some time previous. The sermon was preached in the Albuna Church by his pastor, the Rev. W. H. Shaw, assisted by the Rev. John Henderson, Woodslee; E. Medd, Ruthven; C. W. Kennedy, Gesto, and A. E. Saunders, Downer's Grove, Illinois. The large concourse of sorrowing friends assembled on this occasion gave further evidence of the great respect in which our deceased brother was held.

#### J. F. FAIRCHILD.

John F. Fairchild was born at Athens, N.Y., on the Hudson River, June 18th, in the year 1826. He married Sarah A. Crane, of Berea, Ohio, in 1851. He received an exhorter's license at La Salle, in 1855, and was made a local preacher in 1856. He was engaged a few years in the lumber trade, but preached regularly every Sunday, first at Manchester, N.Y., then at La Salle, Tonawanda, Buckhorn and Grand Island. In the year 1859, he moved to Danville, Canada, where he continued in business, but preached at every opportunity. He entered the traveling connection in the Methodist Episcopal Church, in 1862. He was ordained deacon in 1865, and elder in 1867, by Bishop Philander Smith. Owing to failing health he superannuated at the last Conference, and located at Niagara Falls, where he regularly attended the Church when at home and in health, both the preaching and prayer-meeting services, where the people became very much attached to him.

About three weeks before his death he had a stroke of apoplexy. Heart troubles set in, and on Friday morning, May 31st, at 11.30 he peacefully passed on to his crown. Rev. R. Burns, pastor of the Methodist Church, Niagara Falls, visited him during his illness. His favorite chapters were John xiv. and xvii. and the 23rd Psalm which he wished to be read. He wanted the friends to sing, "Rock of Ages," "Jesus, Lover of my Soul," "Shall we Gather at the River." He was conscious to the last. He was faithful unto death. His end was peace.

He was a pure-spirited, holy man of God, fully consecrated to the work of soul-saving. He was laborious and eminently successful in revival services. He rests from his labors and his works do follow him.

It will be noted that we have this year the largest attendance, the largest graduating class, and the largest class for matriculation in the history of Victoria.

#### WESLEYAN THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE, MONTREAL.

To the Annual Conferences of the Methodist Church:

The undersigned respectfully submit the following brief report of the last year's work and of the present position of the Institution.

Number of students in Arts, McGill University, full course, 6 (others as Partial Students take more or less work in the University); in Divinity leading to the Licentiate's Degree, 21; for the degree of B.D.,

21; for the Conference Course, 20. Total enrolled, 68.

As to the personnel of the staff, Rev. W. I. Shaw, D.D., LL.D., has succeeded to the position of Principal, and lectures in Systematic Theology, Greek Testament and Church Polity. Rev. J. C. Antliff, M.A. (Edin), D.D., lectures in Apologetics, Hebrew and Homiletics; Rev. Professor Richardson, B.A., B.D., Registrar, in Greek and Latin, and Rev. Prof. Harris, M.A., Bursar, will lecture in Church History and English. Rev. Prof. Patton, B.D., is still pursuing a post-graduate course in Semitic Literature, in Heidelberg, Germany.

The College is prepared to afford students facilities for meeting the Conference Preliminary requirements either by matriculation, the squivalent of matriculation, or the special course for non-matriculants, also to

give them lectures in the new course for probationers or the three years' course leading to licentiate's standing, or the University course in Arts in McGill, or the higher course in Divinity leading to the degree of B.D.

The Endowment Fund is now \$70,000, current expenditure about \$6,500, total debt on current account (only liability) is \$3,000. The Boarding Department covers its need with the income of about \$4,000.

The effort of the Rev. Prof. Harris, M.A., Bursar, to further increase the Endowment Fund is being continued, and all its proceeds are sacredly placed in new investments. In the meantime the Institution is conducted with rigid economy in finances, and with regard to thoroughness and efficiency in educational work.

#### ALBERT COLLEGE, BELLEVILLE.

To the members of the London Conference of the Methodist Church.

DEAR BRETHREN,—The past ten years, under the blessing of God, have been years of wonderful prosperity in the history of Albert College. The enrolment has steadily increased from 125 to over 200. There has been an unbroken record of successes in every department of the college work.

Students have been prepared for the different grades of teachers' certificates and for junior and senior matriculation into the universities with a degree of success unsurpassed by any High School or Collegiate Institute in Ontario. In June, 1894, a class of six wrote on Senior Matriculation and all were successful, two of the number securing First Class Honors. This year 210 students have been enrolled; of this number twelve will write on Senior Matriculation. Arrangements have now been perfected with the University so that Albert College prepares students for the first year's work in Arts, with Honors in all departments.

The long college year, extending from September to the end of June, with the class-room grind which the students receive, enables the College to do this work with eminent success. The classes for Junior Matriculation, Primary, Junior and Senior Leaving examinations are usually well filled, and we are hopeful of success. Of eight candidates for teachers' certificates in 1894, six were successful. This is a very high percentage, and proves the college work to be well organized and thoroughly efficient. This class of students in attendance ought to be largely increased. In April last, twenty-nine wrote on the Conference preliminary examination. The College offers just the advantages which these young men require. Special classes are formed in the English and theological subjects to meet their requirements. It is expected that the recent legislation of the General Conference in raising the standard

The Department of Elocution, under the direction for the past ten years of Prof. Shepard, has won a high place in the estimation of the public on account of the prizes won year after year in Elocution by ex-students of Albert in attendance at Victoria and other universities.

The Department of Music has made very marked advancement under the direction of Prof. Dingle, a teacher of large and successful experience, who is also organist of Bridge Street Methodist Church. The department is now thoroughly equipped as a college of music, and the professor with his assistants can offer superior advantages in both instrumental and vocal music.

Miss Emma Clarke has had charge of the Department of Fine Art for the past seven years. Her pupils have won medals in provincial competition with other ladies' colleges, and have frequently received special recognition from the Ontario School of Art.

The Commercial Department will be greatly enlarged and improved during the ensuing year, so that the sons and daughters of our ministers and laymen can secure the highest advantages in book-keeping, shorthand,

typewriting, etc., with every moral safeguard.

We are profoundly thankful to God for the deep moral and religious influence that has pervaded the life of the College. Each year witnesses among the students a renewed zeal and improved methods of work in both the Y. P. C. A. and the missionary societies of the College. In seven years they have raised by their individual effort considerably over \$1,200 for missionary purposes. Their long-expected purpose, for which they have so earnestly labored, of sending Rev. F. J. Livingstone, now a Bachelor of Arts and a Doctor of Medicine, as their representative to

Africa, seems about to be realized.

Whilst we are pleased with the success that has attended the work of the College in the past, we are just now rejoicing in the wider sphere and even brighter future which opens up before the College. For some years the attendance has quite outgrown the capacities of the building. A few weeks ago Mr. H. A. Massey, of Toronto, offered \$10,000 to the College for new buildings, provided an additional \$10,000 could be secured. The city of Belleville has already subscribed nearly \$14,000, and it is hoped by a complete canvass of the city and by an appeal to influential friends of the College to still further increase the amount, so that from twenty-five to thirty thousand dollars will be expended during the present summer on improvements. A new and commodious building will be erected for class-rooms and chapel, costing over \$20,000. A gymnasium will be built and additional land will be secured. The present building will be fitted up with every modern convenience and devoted entirely to dormitories, so that the accommodation will be greatly increased.

It will thus be seen that this year will mark a distinct epoch in the history of the College. We shall hereafter be able to offer the highest and best advantages in Literary Courses, Music, Fine Art, Elocution and Commercial Science, associated with every convenience and comfort.

Our friends of the ministry and laity can best serve our interests and their own by sending to their own Church schools their sons and daughters, and by making our facilities known to all who may be interested therein.

We solicit your active co-operation in making the coming year one of increasing prosperity.

#### ALMA COLLEGE, ST. THOMAS.

To the London Conference of the Methodist Church.

Dear Fathers and Brethern,—The enrolment of students in Alma College this year has reached 150, representing, as in former years, all parts of Canada, and including 21 from the neighboring republic. The results of examinations under non-resident examiners and the Education Department of Ontario show faithful and successful work on the part of students and teachers. The health of the school has been excellent and the spiritual interests distinctly marked. All the voluntary religious services, such as prayer and class-meetings, Bible Classes, Y. W. C. Association and Missionary services, have shown deep religious interest, and about twenty students have professed conversion and united with various Christian churches.

The Graduating Class, if successful in their final examinations, will be as follows: M.E.L., 7; M.L.A., 1; Elocution, 7; Music, 6; Fine Art, 3; Commercial, 1; total of 25.

The College Relief Fund has now reached about \$20,000, about \$6,000 being added this year.

The Board of Management and College Council feel much encouraged that in this year of great financial stringency the attendance has reached so large a number, and that after payment of all expenditures on school account, of the heavy bill of interest and all costs of agency, etc., the year will show a substantial reduction in the debt.

We ask the brethren of this Conference to help us by their sympathy and prayers, and by their active co-operation in increasing the patronage of the school. We also respectfully ask you to appoint a Conference representative on our Board of Management and Trust.

We beg to thank the London Conference for sanctioning, as it has during the past two years, the appointment of our earnest, laborious, and successful agent, the Rev. J. P. Rice, who, in the midst of great difficulties, has prosecuted his work with signal success, and we respectfully ask the Conference to allow him to continue in the same work this year.

The large attendance of boarders, the gratifying health record, the character of the advanced educational work accomplished, the varied courses of study and the modern methods employed, are evidences that the cause of sound learning is faith-

fully championed in this institution.

Since the foundation of the College upwards of 2,000 pupils have received the benefits of a thorough training, which the Faculty have been careful to impart, no less in the primary than in the collegiate department.

The college curriculum embraces a full course in all the departments of English, Classics, Modern Languages, Mathematics, Natural Science, up to third year of university work; a full conservatory course in Music and Elocution; the full Art School course in Fine Art; a complete Commercial course, including Stenography, Typewriting and Telegraphy; also the most improved training in Physical Culture.

arary advantages ly superficial in their character. This year the College has prepared pupils for third, second, first-class C and first-class B certificates, junior and senior university matriculation, and first and second years in Toronto University.

For a long period the Directors have recognized the fact that the yearly increase in the attendance of pupils, the want of sufficient accommodation and equipment, and the steady advance made by the College to the formost rank among the ladies' colleges in this country, have rendered it essential, if the College is to maintain its splendid position, that a comprehensive plan of enlargement should be undertaken. Accordingly, after careful consideration, the Board have submitted to the shareholders, whe have ratified it, the proposition to erect a science and concert hall to the south of the main building, 130 x 50 feet, and three stories high. This addition will include a new science hall, a concert hall with new pipeorgan, a large, airy and attractive dining-hall, and a large number of first-class rooms for pupils in residence. There will also be erected a new three-story kitchen, provided with the most approved appliances, bath, etc. Complete steam-heating, electric-lighting, and best modern sanitary arrangements are to be provided, and no expense will be spared to secure ample provision for the home comforts and health of the pupils.

The estimated cost of the proposed enlargement and the sum necessary to discharge the present obligations of the Board amount to upwards of \$60,000, the greater part of which amount has already been secured. Many friends of the higher education of young women have manifested a practical interest in the undertaking, and the Board take pleasure in making special mention of the munificent gift of Hart A. Massey, Esq., whose interest in Christian education has been so generously exhibited by him on many occasions. In consideration of Mr. Massey's very liberal donation, the Board have designated the new hall "The Lilian Massey Hall," in honor of the donor's daughter. It is proposed to lay the corner-stone of the new structure on the 19th of June instant,

during the Commencement exercises.

This important addition to our present magnificent, palatial building, with its massive walls, turreted towers, spacious halls, magnificent drawing-rooms with their rich decorations, broad carved oak stairways, elegant stained glass windows, all combine to render the college buildings, when completed, the most perfect, the best equipped and the best adapted to their educational purposes in the country.

The Directors desire to tender to the members of the Conference their grateful thanks for the confidence and the hearty co-operation in the college work in the past, and cordially commend the College to the most favorable consideration and the continued patronage of the Church.

#### SUNDAY SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg to report as follows:

The number of schools in the Conference is 470, with 5,521 teachers and officers, 5,046 of these being members of the Church.

The number of scholars is 12,656 in the primary department, 18,029 in the intermediate, 13,939 in the adult, and 205 in the home department, making a total of 44,829 scholars, with an average attendance of 30,726. During the year 2,187 united with the Church, 11,274 were members of the Church, 2,953 scholars were learning catechism, and 10,546 took the total abstinence pledge.

There are 46,699 volumes in the libraries, 6,436 copies of Onward taken, 9,111 of Pleasant Hours, 6,133 of Happy Days, 6,441 of Sunbeam, 16,851 Berean Leaf and Quarterly, and 2,761 copies of Banner.

The amount raised by the schools for missions was \$2,607.48; for the Educational Society, \$67.96; for the Superannuation Fund, \$23.11; for Sunday, School Aid and Extension Fund, \$360.66; general Sunday School purposes, \$20,730.17—a total of \$23,789.38.

We regret to notice, however, from the letter of Dr. Withrow, that American publications are, to some extent, taking the place of our own Banner, the Leaf Cluster and Berean Leaf, and we strongly urge upon our people to be loyal to the fullest extent to the publications of our own Church.

The Committee also desire to make the following recommendations:

1. That we adopt, wherever possible, the home department in connec-

tion with the Sunday School work.

2. That in reference to Sunday School Conventions we urge upon

Districts to observe the Discipline (Section 308).

3. That were practicable, both normal and model classes be conducted

in connection with both Sunday Schools and Sunday School Conventions.

4. That Section 295 of the Discipline be observed when possible, which section is as follows: "In order that ministers may, from time to time, visit the Sabbath Schools on their circuits, it is recommended that an open meeting of the school be held for that purpose once a quarter, if necessary at the time of the regular preaching service."

5. That a floral or children's day be observed on either the last Sunday of May or the first Sunday of June, and in case it is impossible to have

one of the days named, that a day as near as possible be selected.

6. That a summary of the circuit schedules, as relating to Sunday School work, be incorporated in the published Minutes.

#### EPWORTH LEAGUE COMMITTEE.

Your Epworth League Committee beg to report as follows:

1. While there are yet about half the appointments of the Conference without any kind of young people's organization, we are pleased to be able to report that there are in the Conference the following societies, viz.: 93 Epworth Leagues, 154 Epworth Leagues of Christian Endeavor, 5 affiliated and 13 unaffiliated organizations, or a total of 265 senior societies, with 13,015 members, showing an increase of 63 societies and 2,414 members. There are also 29 Junior Leagues with a membership of 1,517.

2. There has been raised during the past year for all purposes

\$7,855.46, an increase of \$1,563.26.

3. It is gratifying to note the interest shown by our young people in our connexional funds, they having raised over \$75 for the Superannu-

ation Fund, and over \$500 for missions.

4. We would remind all our societies of the urgent need of largely augmented collections for the General Board, to assist in meeting the increased expense incurred in the appointment of a General Secretary of Sunday Schools and Epworth Leagues.

5. Your Committee would call attention to the fact, that the constitution for local leagues found in the Discipline is no longer simply a model, but now unalterable except by permission of the General Board.

6. We would urge upon all leagues the importance of securing, as honorary members, those of older years who are in sympathy with the young, and will form a bond of union between them and the older portion of the Church. We regret that there is no column provided in our new schedule for reporting such honorary members.

 Inasmuch as formation is better than reformation, we deem it of the greatest moment that, wherever possible, pastors see that Junior Leagues

are organized and faithfully worked.

8. Your Committee would strongly recommend the holding of an annual Epworth League day in every Church having a society.

9. While not underestimating the importance of other Conference anniversaries, we would respectfully request the Committee on Conference Arrangements, next year, to place the Sunday School and Epworth

League meeting on Thursday evening.

10. Attention is called to Discipline, page 165, which states that the collections for the General Epworth League Board are to be sent by the Treasurer of the League to the Financial Secretary of the District, and

by him to the Secretary of the Conference Epworth League Committee, who will pay it to the Treasurer of the Epworth League section of the Sunday School and Epworth League Board.

11. We would recommend that this report be read in every society.

We would recommend:

1. The faithful attendance upon the class-meeting, and the avoiding of monotony or dulness, and the use of variety in the leading of the classes, also the selection of proper persons as leaders.

2. That our ministers maintain a firm stand in the enforcement of the Discipline on the lines of the social evils of the day, such as horse-racing,

theatre-going, dancing and card-playing.

3. We would also recommend the judicious employment of evangelists who are members of our Church and responsible to it.

#### SABBATH OBSERVANCE COMMITTEE.

We note with pleasure the efforts being put forth by lovers of Sabbath observance to secure legislative enactments to stamp with disapprobation the many forms of desecration, and that popular sentiment is growing more strongly adverse to the running of trains, issuing of newspapers, operating of street cars, using our canal locks, etc., on the Lord's Day.

We regret that by family visiting, buying and selling milk, arranging for funerals, riding of bicycles, hiring of liveries, running of trains, the sacredness of the day is much infringed upon, and being that the Fourth Commandment is not only an expression of the divine will, but that its observance is conducive to man's physical, as well as his spiritual interest, we therefore recommend that frequent attention be called to the subject from the pulpit and in our Sabbath Schools; that parents and all our membership be careful not to sanction or practise anything that shall detract from its sanctity; and workingmen to use their organizations to prevent grasping and conscienceless corporations from filching from them their birthright, a seventh portion of their time for rest and worship.

#### MEMORIAL COMMITTEE.

1. First item of report was, on motion of Rev. J. R. Gundy, amended as follows: The matter of rearrangement of Districts as asked for by London District meeting was referred to the Stationing Committee to-prepare a draft of some proposed plan for consideration during the Conference year, and which may come before the Stationing Committee of next year.

2. The memorial from the same District in re Circuit Sunday School schedules: we would recommend the Conference to direct that the statistics of Circuit Sunday School and Epworth League schedules be printed in the Minutes.

3. Regarding the memorial from the same District, asking the Conference to order all circuit schedules to be made in duplicate, and a copy to be kept by Recording Stewards, we recommend that no action be

taken.

4. Your Committee has carefully considered the communication from the Secretary of the Prisoners' Aid Association, and would recommend (a) that this Conference put on record its approval of the efforts of this association to secure the erection of industrial homes for the destitute poor in every county of Ontario, and that we direct our Secretary to memorialize the councils of those counties within the bounds of this Conference where no such institutions exist, to take the matter into their consideration, viz., the counties of Essex, Kent, Lambton, Perth and Bruce. (b) That as the Dominion Government has made an appropriation of public money for the establishment of a reformatory for young men, this Conference would express its disapproval of the proposition to locate this institution at the village of Alexandria, and affirm its belief that the best interests of such an institution, as well as of the State, could be better served if it were located near some large town or city; and that the facts of this resolution be forwarded to the proper authorities at Ottawa.

5. We also advise the adoption by the Conference of the memorial from Exeter District, recommending the stewards of the various circuits and appointments to solicit from all members and adherents of their respective churches at the beginning of each Conference year the

amount that each will contribute for the minister's salary.

#### TEMPERANCE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee beg leave to submit the following:

The ceaseless struggle with "the sum of all villanies" during the year has changed the point of contact from agitation to the court of judicial decision. The question of jurisdiction for prohibitory legislation as to whether it is Provincial or Federal is to be settled by the highest court of the British Empire. The Supreme Court of Canada, by a majority of one, in a bench of five judges, decided that such legislation was ultra vires of Provincial Legislatures. The Premier of Ontario has initiated a legal process by which this verdict is to be sustained or reversed. This decision when secured is final.

We call the attention of the Conference to the failure of the Programme Committee this year to heed its instructions of placing the Conference temperance meeting on an evening when the laymen are present at the session. 'We do so with greater emphasis, because this is the fourth violation of a similar request.

We offer the following suggestions:

We deprecate the action of license commissioners in lengthening the hours of sale to barkeepers who affirm distinctly that the largest number of sales is made during that time for which they have been granted the right to sell. We would call special attention in this respect to the city of London.

5. We recommend a quarterly visit to each school by some interested person, during which an address on the subject would be given by the visitor, and suggest that such an occasion would be opportune to the

securing of signatures to the temperance pledge.

We would pay a tribute of gratitude to one of the whitest encampments of our times, the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, and offer our cordial support.

7. We endorse the efforts made by the W.C.T.U. in urging upon those who are responsible the teaching of temperance and kindred subjects

in our public schools.

8. We deprecate the cultivation of abnormal tastes which lay the foundation of appetites for strong drinks by the use of cider.

 We recommend our people to support only such candidates for Parliament as will publicly pledge themselves to do their utmost, regardless of fealty to party, for the immediate prohibition of the liquor traffic,

and to give all the other candidates their active opposition.

10. That this London Conference begs to call the attention of the Ontario Government to the fact that after the pledge of the Cabinet to grant all the prohibition in its power, its representatives in London, the license commissioners, have violated this pledge by lengthening the time of the sale of liquor from 10 to 11 p.m., and we humbly request the Government to remedy the evil thus created as speedily as possible.

11. We would respectfully draw the attention of directors of agricultural fairs to the practice of fakirs, proprietors of shooting galleries, games of chance, etc., giving to minors and others on their grounds cigars, etc.,

as a reward for success in contests in their several games.

## COMMITTEE ON SUSTENTATION FUND CONSTITUTION AND CONTINGENT FUND REGULATIONS.

We beg to submit the following report:

#### (A.) CONSTITUTION OF THE SUSTENTATION FUND.

#### I.-NAME

The name of the Fund shall be the Sustentation Fund of the London Conference of the Methodist Church.

#### II.—OBJECT.

The object of the Fund shall be to supplement the amount paid by any circuit for ministerial support where this amount is considered to be insufficient to meet the requirements of the minister for the current year, in accordance with Par. 408, Sec. 8 of the Discipline.

#### III.-INCOME.

The Fund shall be maintained by collections and contributions taken annually in the month of March at the morning, afternoon and evening public services in all our congregations on every circuit and mission throughout the Conference, and by bequests and donations; and each minister shall bring the matter fairly before his people and earnestly endeavor to secure for it their liberal support.

#### IV.—CLAIMANTS.

Any minister on a circuit whose income from all sources whatsoever is deemed insufficient to meet his requirements for the current year shall be entitled to make a claim upon this Fund; but only in special cases shall any claim be considered where such income exceeds for married ministers the sum of \$600 per annum, for single ordained ministers \$250, and for probationers \$200.

#### V.-MANAGEMENT.

1. The Fund shall be under the management of a committee composed of one minister and one layman from each district, elected by ballot by the annual District Meeting, and a ministerial secretary-treasurer elected by the Conference on the nomination of the committee.

2. This committee shall meet and consider the claims upon the Fund at such a time as will enable the secretary-treasurer to distribute to the several claimants the funds in hand during the sessions of the Conference.

No claim shall be considered by the committee that has not been recommended by the May District Meeting immediately preceding such distribution.

4. The Financial District Meeting shall each year inquire into the financial condition of each circuit reported as having paid less than \$600 the previous year, and, if deemed necessary, a special deputation shall be appointed to visit their Quarterly Board, so as, if possible, to develop a more liberal support to their minister.

All claims upon this Fund for special affliction must be accompanied by the recommendations of the Quarterly Official Board and the District Meeting, and also by the itemized and receipted bills for the same.

2. All claims upon this Fund for extraordinary services incurred in the services of the Church must likewise be accompanied by the recommendations of the Quarterly Official Board and the District Meeting.

Whereas, we believe that the system of education which produces and develops the highest type of citizenship should be adopted and maintained; therefore be it

Resolved,—That in the opinion of this Conference the present public school system of Manitoba should be preserved in its integrity, and we therefore most earnestly deprecate any interference of the Romish hierarchy in its attempts to establish a separate school system in Manitoba supported by public funds of the Province; and we hereby express our hearty sympathy with that Province in the establishment of one uniform standard of education for all classes of its citizens.

On motion of Rev. H. W. McTavish, the Conference letter-writers were instructed to telegraph the Manitoba Government, assuring them of the cordial support of the ministry and laity of this London Conference in their efforts to maintain one common system of education for the Province.

#### COURT OF APPEAL.

Resolved,—(a) That whereas, the General Conference in its session of 1894 did enact legislation by which the term of probation for the ministry was extended from four to five years, which legislation appears to be contrary to the basis of union and in violation of the rights of annual conferences as then provided, therefore this Conference hereby appeals to the Court of Appeal to set aside such legislation, or to so interpret it as not to be out of harmony with the said basis of union.

(b) That this Conference having learned that the General Superintendent has decided that in making transfers it is not necessary to call the presidents of conferences as a committee to decide on those cases of transfers in which they are interested, but that transfers may be made by correspondence, we as a Conference hereby appeal to the Court of Appeal to determine the meaning of the General Conference legislation on the Transfer Committee.

By resolution, Rev. J. R. Gundy was appointed prosecutor in both appeals.

## THE PASTORAL ADDRESS

## OF THE LONDON CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH TO THE CHURCHES UNDER THEIR CARE.

Dearly Beyoved,—Since 1884 the Annual Address which has been sent to you has been from the Annual Conference, composed of ministers and laymen; but by the decision of our last General Conference this address henceforth is to proceed from your ministers only. As such we address you in the name of the Lord, and esteem it a high privilege to be able in any measure to guide the flock of Christ, which He has called out from this world. Being joint partakers with you of the grace of life, we would have you with ourselves duly appreciate the high calling with which God has called us to the fellowship of His Son. To be of the number of the faithful and to be enrolled in the Church of God is a great honor, and imposes a great responsibility that we may walk worthily toward them that are without.

Our concern for you is that you may adorn the doctrine of God our Saviour in all things, and fulfil all His purposes concerning you. Only by realizing in your own hearts the fulness of the blessings of the

Gospel of Christ can this be attained.

Since our last annual assembling, the General Conference—the highest court of our Church—has held its regular quadrennial session. In its review of all our Church's work for the preceding four years, there is much presented to us for gratitude. All departments of our work show signs of healthy progress and no discordant elements. The changes which it has made in our discipline are comparatively few and small. To some of these we may refer because of their practical bearing on our church enterprises. The appointment of one of our ministers to look after Sunday School and Epworth League work will be of great interest to you, and must be of very far-reaching influence. By this we are showing that our Church is in harmony with the growing conviction that the greatest possible attention must be given to our children and young people, that they may be gathered into the fold of Christ, and trained in all that will prepare them for largest influence within our own Church.

Pursuant to the arrangements made, the Rev. A. C. Crews has already been appointed to that office. We believe he is eminently fitted for the work assigned him, and we bespeak for him your warmest encouragement

in the untried and difficult duties he must perform.

The reduction of the price of the Christian Guardian to \$1 per year, though a purely secular matter, is one you will hall with pleasure, and which has already resulted in largely increasing its circulation; but we

Christian l

are persuaded that this change ought to result in fifty thousand copies being distributed among our families, instead of the twenty-five thousand, supplies. We feel assured that this and our other periodical publications supply a literature equal to any available, and much better suited to the condition of our people than that which is sometimes procured. By their use all are in the way of acquiring and retaining an intelligent attachment to the Church of their choice, and a qualification for successful

work, such as all Christians should desire.

During the year our missionary work in Japan has been passing through trials, the effects of which we are not yet fully able to determine. Our prayer is that it may be preserved from harm and come forth with increasing prosperity. In the meantime it is matter for gratitude that no occasion exists for any doubt respecting the integrity of any concerned. We commend them and the missionary interests of the Church to your warmest sympathy and prayerful consideration. The Church cannot fulfil its divine mission among men if it fails in its duty in this respect. Large liberality and whole-souled consecration are pre-eminently the

duties of the hour.

It has been a source of very painful regret that four of our principal churches within the bounds of this Conference were destroyed by fire during the year, occasioning the loss of much valuable property, and very seriously interrupting the very extensive work of these churches. Whether these burnings were by crime or by accident, the same lesson is given to all our trust boards, of the duty of keeping all our church property well insured. The work of restoring or rebuilding in each of these cases has been made much easier by the relief which has come in this way. By the promptness and zeal with which these congregations have set to work to repair the loss we are very much gratified, and we pray that in the near future they may be placed in circumstances for doing the work which, in the providence of God, is assigned them, better than previous to their misfortunes.

In reviewing the work of the past year we have reason to be thankful to the Great Head of the Church for the measure of success which has attended the combined work of pastors and people. Our connexional funds, considering the stringency of the times, have been well sustained. giving assurance that when your ability is enlarged they will correspond-

ingly increase.

To the membership of the Church has been added a large number, giving a net increase, after all losses by death and otherwise, of 1,114; and yet as we look at our opportunities and consider the largeness of the divine promises, we are persuaded much greater progress ought to be reported.

As we look into the future with desire and hope for the extension of the Redeemer's kingdom, we are ready to repeat the inquiry made in ancient times, "Watchman, what of the night?" It would be unwise to ignore the fact that we live in perilous times. The integrity of the written Word is assailed in a manner to try men's souls. We entreat you never to fail in realizing His life-giving presence. Endurance of affliction, the performance of duty, the execution of work for the Master and the largest degree of success are made possible by this rich possession, the heritage of the Church. Without it we will be guilty of having the form while denying the power of godliness, and utterly unfit as well as unable to perform the work required at our hands. But it is possible on the other hand, as is manifest by the teaching and practice of some in other parts of our beloved Methodism, to so understand the office and work of the Spirit as to pervert the teachings of the Holy Scriptures and destroy human responsibility and intelligent godliness. The Holy Spirit destroys neither our obligation to use our reason nor the perpetual authority of the written Word. But while we recognize the fact of the perils which surround the Church. of God, we should not fail to see that we live in times of great advantage, also, for the maintenance and propagation of the Gospel. Many of theinstruments of human industry can be utilized by the Church for the more rapid performance of her work. Well-planned organizations exist for doing work for the Master on a scale scarcely dreamed of in former times. All classes of our membership can find suitable fields of usefutness to employ all their varied gifts and graces without the slightest hindrances and usually with the warmest encouragement. therefore to be true that all our people are genuine workers in the Lord's vineyard, and that they are always at it. Let all of your talents, whether coulon of natural endowment, of acquired culture, or of earthly possessions, be gladly consecrated to His service, and when the chief Shepherd shall appear ye shall receive a crown of righteousness which fadeth not away. We need to be awake not only to all our dangers and to all our privileges, but to the tendency of even our success. With our increasing numbers there comes also increasing tendency to that stateliness of order in our public services which may seem to some stiffness and formality. While we maintain a suitable reverence and decorum in all our religious services, let us be studious to retain that warmth and simplicity which in our earlier wa history had such a charm for the masses, and was a very powerful element of success. We ought to make it our business and our glory to keep our hold of the common people, and to fulfil to the utmost our original provi-We will do well to be careful that the places of our assembling shall breathe such a spirit that the lowliest and the worst will be constrained to come. By the good hand of our God upon us in the past, we have had assigned to us a place and facilities in this fair land, making our opportunities almost limitless. As we go forth to the work of another ecclesiastical year, some of you with new pastors and others of you with those well known, it becomes us all to remember that . the night cometh when no man can work. With your hearty and godly co-operation in all the work of the Church, we have hope and confidence

that greater harvests are yet in store. "Say not ye, There are yet four months, and then cometh harvest? behold, I say unto you, Lift up your eyes, and look on the fields; for they are white already to harvest. And he that reapeth receiveth wages, and gathereth fruit unto life eternal; that both he that soweth and he that reapeth may rejoice together."

We earnestly desire to come to you in the fulness of the blessings of the Gospel of Christ, and we believe you desire to receive those who may be sent to you as the messengers of Christ and stewards of the mysteries of God, and may He whose we are and whom we serve direct our way unto you, and cause our united efforts for the advance of His kingdom to abound unto His glory.
