An Unparalleled Scene.
GREAT RUSH FOR NORTH WEST LAND STOCK.
A PERFECT PANDEMONIUM IN A TORONTO STOCK-BROKER'S OFFICE.
(Toronto Globe, 29th ult.)
Yesterday at noon a scene was witnessed at the offices of Messrs. Pellatt & Osler rivaling those witnessed on "Change and similar places. The occasion was the opening of the stock books of the Qu'Appelle Land Company to the Public. For some hours before the hour set for the opening of the books persons eager to invest were in waiting, and long before 12 o'clock the front portion of Pellatt & Osler's office was crowded. Just as the hands of the clock pointed 12 the cry of "Time" was raised by the impatient throng. When the doors leading to the rear office were opened a rush was instantly made, and crash after crash was heard as the glass of the partitions was broken. By the jostling the crowd became so confused and so audibly. When the room in the rear was reached
A MAD CHARGE
was made at the desk where the clerks were in readiness to receive subscribers. All seemed to lose their senses simultaneously, and each endeavored to be first to register his name. The crowd jumped upon the chairs and counter and forced themselves behind and to the side and rear of those who strive, but in vain, to receive the names. The excited and angry throng, back and forth amid deafening shouts and cries. Those behind cried "Forward," and those in front, cried "Backward." The excitement was so great that the attempt to force their way forward was made, and the wood-work was wrenched and appeared each moment as if it would collapse. If any had happened on some one would certainly have been injured. Those in the rear now cried "Postpone, postpone." At length it was found necessary to call in a policeman, who, when he did arrive, was as powerless to control the madmen as a child. As each fortunate—or rather unfortunate—investor managed by the use of his elbows and muscle to get to the stock-book, others would seize him by the shoulders, arms and neck, until the shout would be raised
"YOU ARE CHOKING THE MAN!"
when those behind would for a moment, and for a moment only, give their victim an opportunity to breathe. If he again attempted to register his name he would—now perspiring at every pore—be seized and dragged away, every one clutching at the paper. Before long the paper was in a tolerably tattered condition. As the crowd had got right on the top of the desk, attempts were made to force their way down the desk, and in position long enough to enable a name to be written against the wall, but this was impossible. The crowd, however, did not give up. The time shouting, and the chairs, counters, desks, and framed pictures on the wall being last wrecked. It was not until the afternoon of the 29th that the excitement subsided. The assembly reluctantly withdrew, but not until they were all forced out by additional policemen, who had now arrived, and the clerks of the establishment. The amount of the names registered will amount to about \$100,000, each of the oval-shaped glass being worth from \$10 upwards. It was said that a number of the subscribers had been received before the hour advertised, and this is denied by Messrs. Pellatt & Osler. The excitement was so great that the names registered were not all taken. A meeting of the directors will be held before they are further informed of the result. The application for stock to the amount of \$500,000 were received during the past few days, although \$100,000 is the total amount of available stock.

ACCIDENT.—A sad accident happened on the morning of the 30th ult., by which one Albert Hardy met his death. Agriculture.

High Feed for Young Stock.

Our farmers in general have an immense deal to learn in the way of making the raising of stock for beef a paying branch of farm industry. Most probably they know more than they are able, or care to practice. In an article, "Don't use Sorbus," one reason is hinted at, why many farmers fail to raise good stock for beef—generally they use miserable scrub, instead of purely bred, males for breeding purposes. But, even when the sire is of good blood, his progeny will not grow into grand, heavy animals, unless they are carefully and consistently fed from their youth up. Very commonly, for the first three months, the calf is allowed just food enough to keep it in a fairly thrifty condition; then it is turned out to grass, and just begins to live until the beginning of winter it comes up to the barn with all its ribs showing through its hide. During the winter, it makes but poor growth, but in spring it picks up a little on the new grass. It continues to grow slowly until at three or four years it begins to be fattened for the market. Not many cattle, says a New England farmer, are sent to the butcher before that age, and if that is true of Maine and Massachusetts, we may say, that it is also true of New Brunswick. The calf ought to be well fed from its birth, and to secure rapid growth, the supply of food must be limited only by the digestive capacity of the animal. The high feeding of young animals is the secret of successful stock raising, says a practical New England breeder.

"Repeated experiments have shown that a young animal requires the least amount of food to produce a pound of flesh, and that all other conditions being the same, each pound of growth, after maturity, costs more than the pound just preceding it. The careful experiments of Mr. J. B. Lawes, of Rothamstead, England, proved that the cost of putting on live weight is in direct proportion to the age and size of the animal, and that a young animal will make a greater daily gain than a mature one and with less food. A calf which had been fed upon the milk of its dam, with a quart of meal and oats daily, weighed 385 pounds at the age of three months; its feed was then increased to two quarts of meal, and at six months old it weighed 565 pounds, having gained in three months 180 pounds, or over three pounds each day. At two years old, the same animal weighed 1615 pounds, having gained during the last six months of the time, 1050 pounds, or not quite one and one-half pounds daily. It will be seen, that in this case, the daily rate of increase was more than twice as much during the time it was from three to six months old, as it was from six months to two years, and during the next four months, gained 85 one-hundredths of a pound daily, or only a little more than half as much as in the six months before it was two years old, and only one-fourth as much as in the second three months of its existence. The importance of these facts as there is evident. If four times as much feed daily, can be put upon a calf, as upon the same animal at the age of four years, even if we admit that the cost of feeding is the same, it is plain that it costs four times as much per pound to produce a pound of beef by feeding four-year-olds, as it does by feeding calves. Will it not pay then to feed calves generously? The only limit should be their capacity to assimilate food. As far as possible we should seek to give the increase in weight, at the time when it costs the least to produce it."

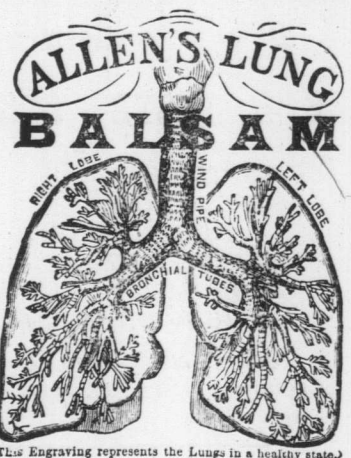
