London, Feb. 7.—The announcement made by Austen Chamberlain, the chancellor of the exchequer, in his recent Birmingham speech, that Great Britain proposed to the United States the remission of the Allied debt came with much surprise to the British public, and created something of a sensation. While various economists in private life had been advocating such a cancellation, it was not known that the Government was formally considering the matter, and much dess that it had made overtures in that connection to the United States.

Thus far the press has not ventured much comment on the subject, but considerable space is being devoted to news dispatches from the United States, giving the United States' views on the proposals. It is recalled in this connection that when Lord Chalmers, the permanent secretary of the treasury, was appointed recently to pay a visit to the United States on an official commission, it was rumored he would make such overtures, but the report was not confirmed offi-

cially, and the British press discounted it as fantastic. It is definitely stated that the British suggestion to the United Sates Government to write off the obligations never was conveyed through the medium of the United States embassy, leaving the assumption that it must have been tendered by the British embassy at Wash-

WILL LONDON BUILD CIVIC OFFICES OR REAL CITY HALL?

Whether or not London is to have new municipal offices will be decided by the city council tonight. EXPECT DECREASE IN LIVING COSTS IN GREAT BRITAIN

London, Feb. 7.—A decrease in the cost of living in Great Britain is foreseen through the recent drop in grain quotations. Following the decline in Argentine wheat, home-grown grains declined sharply, and the provincial markets weakened. In Northampton and Canterbury wheat fell 15s the quarter, and barley 10s, and in Nottlingham wheat and barley dropped 10s.

These reductions are counted upon materially to assist in lowering the cost of living, the official figures for which are expected to show a fall of ten points for January.

GERMANS DENY ALLIED CHARGES OF EXTRAVAGANCE

Berlin, Feb. 7.—The German foreign office defended itself to day from the charges of extravagance made by Entente experts, after their examination of the German budget at the Brussels conference. It explained that the 1,200 per cent increase in the foreign office budget for 1920 over that of 1919, bringing the sum up to 295,000,000 marks, was due to the resumption of diplomatic relations with countries whose currency sumption of diplomatic relations with countries whose currency stood at a high rate of exchange, this vastly increasing the expenditure in marks for the embassles and consulate reopened there. Dr. W. J. Robinson of Ontario Hospital Gives Requested Information to Government.

The forestry section of the Ontario Department of Agriculture, has by request, been furnished by Dr. Robinson, superintendent of the Ontario Hospital, with a report of the tree-planting which has been carried out in the grounds of the institution for some years past.

A section of Scots' pines, now full of vigor, was planted in the year 1910. The trees were then only six inches high, but so rapid has been the growth that many of them are now from twelve to fifteen feet high. They were planted five feet apart, and their progress has been such that one can scarcely walk through the plantation.

For several years following white pine and cedar were planted, but the growth of these has not been so great, as in the first planting of the Scots' pines.



"The board decides to hand a matter over to a committee. This is done at a meeting of the board, then a day or two, generally several, elapse before the committee can get together. They may or may not reach a decision at this meeting, but at the best the business in hand has to wait for the balance of the month for the regular meeting of the board, with always the chance that some member of the board, possibly a member of the committee who is wearing a chip on his shoulder, throws a verbal wrench into the machinery, and another delay is the result.







The sections of the chain may go either up or down, or to the right, but not to the left. That is, start in the first column by drawing either three, four or five circles up or down, as you wish; then proceed to the right, then up or down again; then to the right, and so on until you reach the last column. The chain must end with either three, four or five circles in this column.

In determining the number of circles in each section count the last circle in one section as the first in the next. The figures in the corner circles, however, are to be counted but once when adding them up to get the totals of the odd and even figures.

You may start at any figure you wish in the extreme left-hand column. There must be one section running up or down in this column, as well as

While no solution of this problem has been worked out before its presentation in this paper, it is presumable that the differences which may be obtained through the various combinations will not be very great. Contestants, however, should try all the combinations they can to see what is the greatest difference they can obtain between the sum total of the odd figures and the sum total of the even, or vice-versa. Only the figures you put circles around are to be considered. The following illustration will furnish a general idea for drawing your chain of circles. The accompanying illustration explains what a chain of circles is. The first section, it will be noted, consists of four circles; the second, three; the third three, and so on. The total of the even numbers, viz., 46, 58, 92, etc., is 750, and the sum total of the odd numbers, viz., 69, 75, 83, etc., 892. The difference between these 36 72 94 28 60 (38) (72) 58 95 (25) totals is 142.

The outcry of the German press against the reparation terms is only natural. We would do the same. The determination of Germany's ability to pay is probably a matter for expert judgment, although such men received a heavy jar as the result of their war predictions. They declared that the conflict could only go so far, because there would not be enough money in the world to keep it going. It persisted for more than two years after their limit.

There are some facts which modify the German protests. Last year 14,000,000,000 marks were put into new German enterprises, which scarcely spells poverty or lack of resources. Germany leads the world in the number of savings bank accounts. Her industries were not destroyed, as were those of Northern France and Belgium. And she starts with an annual saving on account of her army and navy.


