Washington, April 11.—The Dominion Government officials claim that Secretary Blaine has fixed Oct. 12 as the date for the renewal of reciprocity negotiations in Washington. This is based on a dispatch by Sir Julian Pauncefote to Ottawa. How that statement is to be accepted will depend upon the understanding as to what the term "negotiation" means. If by that the Dominion officials mean that the Secretary of State has given to Sir Charles Tupper and his representatives any assurance that a reciprocity treaty can be negotiated on the basis proposed by Sir Charles Tupper the statement is erroneous.

The Secretary of State has not given the Canadian officials any assurance that a reciprocity treaty will be negotiated upon any such basis, or upon any basis. BARNUM'S FORTUNE.

Provisions of the Great Showman's Will.

Bridgeroft, Ct., April II.—The will of the late P. T. Barnum was read at Maranna immediately after the funeral in the presence of the family and representatives of the press. The wealth of the great show, man is estimated to amount to over \$5,000,000. The first will was written by Mr. Barnum in 1882, since which time eight codicils have been added at various times.

By a codicil dated July, 1890, he given is wife \$100,000 absolutely and \$40,000 annually. He bequeathed to the First Universalist Church of this city \$15,000 for providing preaching and other serviced recognized by the United States convention as in conformity to the faith of Universalism. He bequeathed to the First Universalism. He bequeathed Caroline C. Thompson, of New York, \$100,000. To Clinton H. Seely, his grandson, \$34,000. In the same codicil he states he has no male heir named Barnum, and provides that if Clinton H. Seely will change his name to Clinton Barnum Seely he will give him \$25,000 more. The contract between Barnum and Bailey shall be enforced and 3 per cent. of his share in the show is given to Clinton Barnum Seely, providing he will devote sufficient time in the interest of the show to carry it on successfully. If the sum reaches over \$10,000 a year the balance goes to the estate.



Let us follow our contemporary's order 1. Prohibition. Not till the millennium? Then the millennium cannot be far off, for the prohibition of the liquor traffic at all events in Canada is nearer than some imagine. Our contemporary may be correct n thinking no political party will ever indorse it. Yet any political party might do worse. The moral issue of "No Slavery" for a quarter-century gave power to the Republican party. But Prohibitionists are perfectly willing to attain their end through the good-will of members of both parties But beyond question they will "get there" somehow.

2. Obligatory Voting. Our contemporary's objection that a few electors might come to the polls and cast a blank ballot, or a spoiled ballot, is not terrifying. There is no way of preventing a blank or a spoiled ballot under the present system, either. The doctrine of Obligatory Voting-held

men like Principal Grant, Edward Blake and the late James Bethune-is not prima facie the doctrine of idiots. Advocates of Obligatory Voting can see no reasons making jury duty, or militia duty under certain circumstances, obligatory, that do not equally vindicate Obligatory Voting.

There are no fundamental differences in doctrine, while the differences even as to matters of polity grow smaller every day. But the differences between the various temporary divisions of Protestantism are dissolving every year and must shortly disappear altogether.

HOW TRADE RESTRICTION WORKS Col. 
