I propose to amend the tariff on molasses by adding a larger percentage per gallon for each degree or fraction of a degree under 40°. I propose, instead of ½ of a cent per gallon, to add I cent per gallon for each degree bolow 50°. When it goes down to 30° or 25° the duty is nearly prohibitive. It is proposed to allow eleostearine to come in free of duty for the use of tanners for making their leather. Glove leathers, which are a special item by themselves, are admitted at 10 per cent., while leathers of similar kind but not used in the manufacture of gloves pay a duty of 15 per cent. In that list of glove leathers the name of lamb was left out, and to make the item consistent the word lamb has been inserted with the other indications. On the free list also will be placed tin waste; nitrate of soda, used for dying purposes, is to be put in the free list. It is proposed to place a duty on eggs of 5 cents per dozen. It is also proposed to take the power by the Governor in council of ordering that at any time when it is considered in the public interest to suspend the discriminative duty of 5 per cent. on their value on sugars imported into this country otherwise than by direct shipment. It is also proposed to add a resolution giving power to the Governor in council to suspend certain provisions of the customs acts insofar as they provide for the payment of duty or otherwise on sugars, molasses and tobacco, when imported into this country otherwise on sugars, molasses and tobacco shall be subject to certain duties.

At the Carnegie Steel Works in Homestead.

Rifles and Cannon Brought Into Requisition,

Pinkerton's Detectives Compelled to Surrender.

Eleven of the Workers and Nine Detectives Killed.

Some Twenty or Thirty Men on Each Side Badly Wounded.

Over 234 of the Detectives Lodged in Jail-Scenes of the Wildest Excitement-Graphic Summary of the Sanguinary Engagement.

PITTSBURG, Pa., July 6.—Capt. F. H. Hein, who had charge of the Pinkerton men at Homestead, was brought to the Homeopathic Hospital here with five companions, who were wounded. Among the fatally injured is J. W. Kline. Capt. Hein will recover. In an interview to-day Capt. Hein said: "I had charge of these men and they were picked up in Chicago and New York. They were a very fair lot of men. They number 300. I gave them strict orders not to shoot until they were fired upon. When we proceeded to land the whistle, blew, and immediately the strikers commenced to shoot. To protect ourselves we had to return the fire. Seven or eight of our men are hurt."

The barges were towed up the river by a tow boat, but long before the Finkerton men reached Homestead thousands of strikers had gathered on the banks of the river ready to give them a warm welcome. When the boats attempted to land the workmen broke through the fence surrounding the mill, and entrenching themselves behind piles of steel billets, prepared to resist the landing of the detectives. By 4 o'clock in the morning an effort was made to land the detectives, but the strikers met them and aftered battle was precipitated, both sides exchanging a heavy volley of shots. The detectives were all armed with Winchester rifles, but at the point where the attempt to land was made there was a steep embankment. They were compelled to go in single file, and were soon driven back to the boats by the steady fire from the shore.

THE NOISE OF THE RATTLE spread about the borough like wildfire, and thousands of men, women and children thronged to the river bank to witness the fight in progress. The Pinkerton men were determined to land, and they poured volley after volley into the ranks of the strikers, many of whom were stricken down by bullets, some of them being fatally injured and others killed cutright. 

The Homestead Revolt

Latest Particulars of the Lament able Occurrence.

The Situation Quieting Down and the Detectives Leave.

AFTER THE CONFLICT.

PITTSBURG, Pa., July 7.—The Pinkerton detectives from Homestead arrived in this city at 2.40 this morning. Twenty-seven of their number were wounded and were sent to the hospital. They all refuse to make any statement or to be interviwed. The Pinkertons were to be held in the Pennsylvania yards under a strong guard until they left, when they were to be removed to the county jail to await trial for murder. The course of Governor Pattison in declining to order the National Guard to Homestead until Sheriff McLeary had exhausted all means in his power to preserve order is generally commended. The prevailing opinion here is that had the militia been on the scene the bloodshed would have been much greater. The advent of the armed, and uniformed men of the State troops to guard the Carnegie works, and to act as protectors to the non-union men, would have excited the strikers to all possible resistance.

THE CARNEGIE PROPERTY UNINJURED. One of the most noticeable features of the trouble so far has been that not a dollar's worth of property of the company was destroyed by the strikers, and no attempt was made to do so.




