All Quiet at Melilla. MADRID, Oct. 4 .- The Government decided to-night to dispatch to Melilla at once 3,000 troops and another gunboat. All officers and men absent from the Andalusian army on leave have been ordered to return to their regiments forth-with. Latest advices from Melilla report everything quiet.

To Quard the Alna. ROME, Oca. 4.-The Alpine troops, which are trained to defend the passes and mounare trained to defend the passes and moun-tain roads from Mentone to Mount Blanc against the invasion of a French army, have finished their fall maneuers, but they will not be demobolized. Moreover, two Alpine regiments will be taken from their uarters on the Austrian frontier to reinforce the troops in the Cottiau Alps.

Alarming Subsidence of Land. London, Oct. 4.-There has been an alarming subsidence of land under the village of Saltwood, near Sandgate, two miles from Folkstone, Kent, where the subsidence of 1892 took place. The ground has fallen several feet and it is feared the parish church will collapse; many houses have already been damaged by the landfall. Recommendations of the Campaign Committee Adopted.

An Important Series of Resolution Introduced.

Pertinent Remarks by Mr. S. H. Blake and Other Speakers—Personnel of the Executive Commissee.

TORONTO, Oct. 4. — Mayor Fleming presided at yesterday afternoon's session of the big union prohibition convention, representing all temperance organizations in Ontario, which was held in the Pavilion. The large building was almost filled upon the floor, with a sprinkling in the galleries. As the committees were not prepared to report, Rev. Dr. Sutherland was called upon to make an address. Dr. Sutherland said that there was an air of business about the convention, but if it meant business it would be the first time in his remembrance that temperance men meant business. He hat temperance men meant business. He never took much stock in the plebiscite take, but since a vote was to be taken, they hould roll up their sleeves and pile up suc big majority for it that it would be settled

a big majority for it that it would be settled for all time.

Rev. Mr. Frizzell said he was prepared to sink all personal sentiments on the question and roll up a big majority for the plebisoite. (Applause).

Mr. Crossley then sang "Throw Out the Life Lines."

Mr. John Cameron, of London, said that he believed in the plebisoite, and said that it would have an educating effect, if nothing else. It was only a revival of the old Roman system of all the citizens meeting and giving their views on the question at Roman system of all the citizens meeting and giving their views on the question at once. He explained how the licenses had been reduced in London by a plebiscite vote, taken at a municipal election, from 70 to 40. An appeal was there made to the moderate drinkers, as well as to temperance men. The platform in the plebiscite campaign should be made as wide as possible, and there should not be a dissenting voice. (Applause).

Harvey on the charge of embezzlement from the London branch of the Bank of British North America. Mr. Harvey was a prominent figure in the court room and listened as the true bills, as handed in by Foreman Peter Elson, were read. Elson, were read.

The court room was again crowded and the case of Orange against the township of Euphemia was continued. John Painter, James Boyne, E. J. Neely, John Byrne, James Brennan, Samuel E. Lockwood, Joseph Graham, Kirby Bilton, Wm. Armstrong, Wm. Grant, Frederick Sullivan, Thomas M. C. Switzer, Alfred Joyce, David Moran, John Armstrong, David Thomas and William Sullivan, all farmers of the locality, were examined in the interest of the defense. They had driven over the rut in question with different loads and none of them seemed to consider the place very dangerous. Patrick Folgy was the township pathmaster. He had filled up the hole in the early part of June with two loads of sand.



TEMPERANCE LEGISLATION IN ONTARIO.

The London Fress professes once more to be in the dark on the subject of temperance. It is, of course, opposed to ascortaining, by means of a popular vote, the opinion of the electors upon the question of whether or not a probibitory liquor law should be enacted for the country, and it now asks the ADVERTISER to "tell the people where is the temperance measure passed by the present Ontario Legislature." We presume out contemporary wants to know all about the Ontario License Law, the enactment of which, in the interests of its liquor friends, it strenuously opposed. The act was placed upon the statute book by the Government ncrease of population, there are not so many icensed places as in 1877.78 by 1,000. Locally we all know the progress that has

But this act did more to promote temerance. It absolutely limited the number of licenses that may be granted in any one municipality; in accordance with the best sentiments of the country, it took the control of licenses from the log-rollers in the municipal councils and conferred the management on independent boards of ommissioners appointed by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council, It authorized each municipal council by bylaw to still further limit the number of licenses to be granted. The same power was conferred on the commissioners. Each municipal council was authorized to prescribe conditions of obtaining a tavern license, in addition to those stipulated in the act. It authorized municipal councils to limit the number of shop licenses, to require the holder of a shop licenses. Governor-in-Council, It authorized each shop licenses, to require the holder of a shop license "to confine the business of his shop license exclusively to the keeping and selling of liquor," and to impose any other restrictions it saw fit, these regulations to be binding on the commissioners.

An amendment was made to the law in 1884 limiting the number of saloon licenses. Other changes introduced the principal of ocal option, empowering the majority of electors to forbid the granting of a new license or the renewal of an old one in any sub-division. The amendments further provided for the compulsory separation of the liquor traffic from other traffic in licensed shops after 1888. Authority was given justices of the peace and police magistrates to forbid holders of licenses from selling liquor to any habitual drunkard, and relatives were given the power to issue a similar prohibition. Licenses were for bidden on ferry boats.

In 1890 the law was improved by com to the Guelph Agricultural College, with pelling the applicant for a license to present a certificate signed by a majority of the voters in the sub-division before his application could be heard. The act further prohibits the sale of intoxicating liquors on vessels navigating the lakes and rivers of minors from 16 to 18, thus subjecting to s penalty those who sell liquor to persons under 18 years of age. It provides a penalty when liquor is sold to any person under 21 years of age, in respect of whom notice has been given prohibiting the licensed victualler to sell or supply liquor to him. The act also gives greater authority to search unlicensed premises and "dives," to seize liquor and arrest persons found on

THE OLD BELL OF ST. PETER'S Is Out of Tune and Harsh-A Faith ul

Servant Gone-A New Bell for the Cathedral. For years the old bell of St. Peter's has summoned the faithful to worship. It has called them to early mass at moin, to the Angelus at noon and to vespers in the dewy eve. It has been the heraid of the breaking day and the curiew of the setting sun.
Joyously has it pealed on saintly festivals
and solemnly toiled the requiem for the
dead. Many who have heard its sweet tones
are in the grave, and those of the present
have listened to its melodyfrom childhood
Early in the sixties it was placed in the
beliry of the old church on Richmond
street, and blessed by Father O'Brien, who
has since passed away. There for long It has been the herald of the break has since passed away. There for long years it peeped through the shutters of its dark watchtower and viewed, unseen, the vicissitudes of changeful time beneath. Its life was a lonely one, its monotony relieved only by an occasional visit from the saxton of Sir Oliver Mowat in 1876. At that time the system of control of the licenses, for which the Free Press has always expressed admiration, was in force. There were then 5,818 places licensed to sell liquor in the Province, and the municipal councils in many localities were controlled by the liquor vendors. In councils in many localities were controlled by the liquor vendors. In London, with a population of less than 20,000, we had from 100 to 150 dram shops and other places for the sale of intoxicants. The large majority of them were used to forward the political interests of Mr. Carling. LETTER CARRIERS ON BICYCLES.



But there is another important inquiry. That wealth should exist is plainly in accordance with the will of God, but in whose hands? Religion justifies the production of wealth; what has religion to say about its distribution? The religious man must seek to be a co-worker with God, not only in the production, but also in the distribution of wealth. Can we discover God's plan for this distribution? plan for this distribution?

TRESENT DISTRIBUTION.

It is pretty clear that the world has not as yet discovered God's plan. The existing distribution is far from being idesl. While tens of thousands are ricting in superfluity, hundreds of thousands are suffering for the lack of the necessaries of lile; some are even starving. That the suffering is often due to indolence and improvidence and vice—a natural penalty which ought not to be set aside—may be freely admitted, but when that is all taken account of there is a great deal of penury PRESENT DISTRIBUTION. account of there is a great deal of penury left which it is hard to justify in view of

let which it is hard to justify in view of the opulence everywhere visible.

What is the rule by which she wealth of the world is now distributed? Fundamentally, I think, it is the rule of the strongest. The rule has been greatly modified in the progress of civilization; a great many kinds of violence are now prohibited; in many ways the weak are protected by law against the encroachments of the strong; human rapacity is confined within certain metes and bounds; nevertheless, the wealth of the world is still, in the main, the prize of strength and skill. 




