MONTREAL SUBSCRIBES \$34,000,000 TO LOAN

Montreal, Nov. 1.-It was announced yesterday at the headquarters of the Montreal and Island Victory Loan cam-paign that with the subscriptions offi-cially announced and those that had in too late to be officially given out, the total for Montreal and Island had grown to something The total included several large subscriptions during the day, too late for classification in the official sta-

The totals officially announced for the day were \$4,666,250, which added to the previous official total of \$26,836,500. An official total of \$31,552,750, these official figures including only up to Thursday night. But during the day, it was stated, further subscriptions to the amount of \$2,500,000 had been received, bringing the real total up to over \$34.-000,000, these subscriptions to be an-nounced in due course.

MINE OPERATORS Imprisonment Only ARE AGREEABLE TO AN INQUIRY No Prospect of Fall in Prices

Would Welcome Investigation by Body Appointed by Wilson.

WILL KEEP MINES OPEN

But Believe Possibility of Their Being Worked Is Remote.

CLEVELAND, Oct. 31 .- The first step towards a possible arbitration of differences between soft coal operators and approximately half a million miners in the threatened coal strike, scheduled for midnight, was taken here today at a conference of the executive commitee of the central competitive coal fields by the adoption of a resolution velcoming an investigation of the strike by a tribunal which President Wilson may appoint. Following this the conference adjourned. In the resolution the operators re-affirmed acceptance of President Wil-son's proposal of October 24, and weiomed an investigation by a tribunal appointed by him with a view to an early settlement of the question at

Possibility of the mines being worked in the event that the strike takes place seems remote, according to some of the operators, who pointed out that some states required an examination of all mine workers, and that there might not be enough men to success-fully pass this examination.

Several newspapers are constant of the several new London, Nov. 1.—Elections will be held today for the town councils in the nally, but have not been held since 1912, owing to the war. The public generally takes lukewarm interest in these elections, but on this occasion two questions of outstanding interest are expected to induce greater polling activity. The first is the con-tinuous rise in local rates during and since the war, amounting in some poorer districts of London to as much as 12 shillings or a pound on the rental value of buildings. The second is the absence of housing accommodation.

Three parties are in the field—moderate, progressive and laborite. The laborites are waging an active cam-paign. They have 1,000 candidates for the 1,300 London seats. Their program demands measures to arrest profiteer-ing by extension of municipal trading in foodstuffs and coal, bringing public in foodstuffs and coal, bringing public services under municipal control, an effective housing scheme, and increased powers generally for borough councils. In common with the progressives they advocate taxation of local ground values as, a means for reducing rates. Another feature of the campaign is the great part taken by women, who have some 250 candidates in the field. By the reform act of 1918 ower eight By the reform act of 1918 over eight hundred thousand women are entitled to vote in the London area, and their to vote in the London area, and influence provokes lively interest.







THE COMMITTEE ON RE-ESTABLISHMENT SUBMITS ITS REPORT

Liberal Members Moved Quali-

CONCURRED IN REPORT

But Suggested That Contemplated Obligations Unjustified.

the full report of the committee tabled in the House of Commons tonight by Hon, J. A. Calder, chairman.

The general findings of the committee, including its decision not to grant further gratuities to returned soldiers under the Great War Veterans' Association, J. Harry Flynn or Margeson plan, have already been outlined in Canadian Press dispatches. The committee's estimate of the cost of recommendations made is as follows:

1. To provide gratuities to Canadians enlisted in Imperial units—\$9.000,000.

2. To provide refund of transportation expenses to dependents who returned to Canada prior to the armistice—\$1,000,000.
3. To provide for carrying out all other recommendations, including the handling of the unemployment problem during the coming winter—\$40,000,000.

The report is unanimous, but the Liberal members of the committee, in concurring in its recommendations, moved a qualifying resolution, which was not adopted, setting forth their opinion that some of the Government's existing and contemplated commitments were wholly unwarranted. The resolution was as follows:

"Subject to the opinion hereinafter expressed we concur in the recommendations of the committee believing that the evidence submitted by Sir

The report deals at length with the several suggestions made to the committee as to the different ways in which aid could be granted to returned soldiers. These included suggestions respecting life insurance and provision for housing; financial assistance in the form of loans or grants or industrial training, and to those whose university, professional, or technical education was interrupted by the war; to those desirous of establishing themselves in one-man businesses; to those who are in need of assistance to take care of existing liabilities and generally to those in need of assistance for other purposes.

The report states that the problems raised by these suggestions are such as to demand the fullest consideration by Parliament before any decision is hed and expresses the that the very large expenditure involved in carrying out all these proposals would be such as to render their approval by Parliament prohibitive.



Employer and Employee Question Must Be Tackled

"Industrial Unrest" was the subject dealt with in the address delivered by A. F. Sheldon in the Auditorium last evening, before a large assemblage of people, it being the third and last of his series of lectures given under the auspices of the Life Underwriters' Association and the London Advertising Club.

sociation and the London Advertising Club.

"The present is not a time for fooling," said Mr. Sheldon, "and the employer-employe question must be faced seriously and the problem tackled fearlessly. Before there can be a platform upon which the Government, capital and labor may stand with equality and with a perfect understanding between them, several important changes must be made by all of the parties. The labor unions should change some of their man-made laws so that they will conform to natural laws. Capitalists, as a whole, should revise or discard several of their standardized customs, and the government also should change a few of its laws.

ment also should change a few of its laws.

"I sincerely believe that the time is not far distant," continued the speaker, "when the government, or, in other words, organized society, intercedes between the employer class and the employe class and helps in the elimination of the misunderstandings which at present stand as a barrier between their co-operation. Of course, the two factions must realize first that selfishness cannot exist if a combine is formed, and that to serve self one must serve the other. Then, when that time comes, heaven will seem very much closer to the people of this continent."

Four Classes in United States

Four Classes in United States.

An analysis of employers in the United States, the speaker's native country, was made, and four main classes were defined, three of which, Mr. Sheldon stated, were autocrats. In the first class are included the employers who consider the men on their payrolls as mere "hired hands"—those who think of their men as they would of a ton of coal. "Men of that type," said the speaker, "are most certainly Bolsheviki breeders." The second class consists of those who endeavor to buy and produce morale among their employees by means of good wages and a continuous system of economic promotion, and in whose establishments the spirit of moral relationship between the executives and laborers is prohibited by the rule "Business is business." Employers in the third autocratic rating are the welfare workers, whose work for the good of their men is prompted by their heads and not by their hearts, and is the kind of work which they think will pay. But such principles are not consistent with the code of liberty, Mr. Sheldon said. Then then last class, which cannot be termed autocratic, included the democratic fraternalist, and fortunately that class is rapidly increasing in size. The employers in that class are the men who have big hearts, who wish to fulfill their duties and responsibilities and even now, they greatly outnumber the autocratic crowd.

"It is true that the employers and employees are working together more and more for the public, as time progresses, and that is good, because the one party cannot work efficiently for the public without the other. In the

Statistics submitted went to show that less than fifteen per cent of American workmen engaged in manufactures were now working under 50 hours a week, and it was claimed that if the eight-hour day were not also applied generally in the United States Canadian industry would be subjected to unfair competition.

Mixed Reports of Men Who Walked Out and Others Who Stayed.

A. F. OF L. PROTESTS

Predict Court Order Will Only Result in Raising New Issues.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Oct. 31 .- The big news in the coal strike situation today was the federal court's order forbidding the walkout. It was followed by a long line of developments and opened the door to wide possibilities.

The principal leaders in the miners union met the court's action with denunciation as a "violation of constitutonal rights;" declarations that it came too late to reach their men with a countermanding order, and with predictions that it would be disregarded

anyway.

During the night mixed reports were During the night mixed reports were coming in from the mining states of men who decided to remain at work and others who went on strike despite the court's restraining order. It is not possible to estimate what proportion of the 425,000 miners affected remained at work and what proportion walked out. The real test may not come until Monday. Saturday generally is a "dead" day in the mines.

Meanwhile organized labor leaders showed signs of taking up cudgels on a general issue over the right to strike.

President Gompers of the American Federation of Labor, with Vice-President Woll and Secretary Morrison, protested as a delegation to Attorney-General Palmer against the Government's action in issuing the injunction and predicted that it could "only result in creating new and more disturbing issues which may not be confined solely to the miners."

Heads of the great railway brotherhoods also conferred with the attorney-general, but disclaimed that they did more than offer their services to intervene. Attorney-General Palmer emphasized

OTTAWA, Oct. 31—According to a return tabled in Parliament today at the request of A. R. McMaster, hides to the value of \$2,761,397 have been exported from Canada since the placing of the embargo on the export of hides, while leather to the value of \$2.053,601 has been sent out of the Dominion. The report shows that export still takes place under license, and that no application for license has yet been refused.



The arguments advanced on third reading were of necessity largely a repetition of those already heard in the House. Mr. Fielding and other Opposition members again asserted that the wisest men in the country were divided on the question, and that the Government was not justified in putting the bill through the House without further investigation.

The minister's contentions were upheld by R. L. Richardson, Hume Cronyn and G. B. Nicholson, while Liberal speakers included D. D. McKenzie and T. Vien,





Now it was proposed to give a certain part of the stock a valuation of \$50,000,000, and submit \$180,000,000 worth of it to arbitration, where it would be given "heaven knows what value."

Boards of trade at Montreal and elsewhere were against this measure, and while they were not all the public, their opinion should be heard and respected. The House had not been given sufficent information as to the details of ters themselves seemed very hazy on this transaction, and even the minis-

Moved Amendment

Mr. Fielding therefore introduced an amendment which was to the effect that the bill be not now read a third time. The amendment set forth that the information before the House was insufficient; that there had been no inquiry into railway matters since 1917, when the Drayton-Acworth report was made, and that that report had said the enitre stock had practically no value. The amendment recommended that a commission be appointed to investigate the whole matter affected by the bill, and bring a report before the House as quickly as possible.

He thought pernaps this was the result of the new leadership. It was at least a statement of the policy of the Liberal party.






