CORD OF MEN AND STEEL

Oyama Tightening It and Choking the Russians.

Bloody Fighting and Heavy Losses Which Will Be Greatly Increased When the Masses of Infantry Meet -Jap General Reports That the Japs Are Driving the Russians Before Them-Enemy's Casualties.

Tokio, March 6.-Field Marshal Oyama is continuing his great drives around both flanks of the Russian army. His front is now a huge bow, the base on the Shakhe River, the right arm reaching a point east of Fushun, and the left arm extending to a point west of Mukden. He is steadily tightening the great cord of men and steel. ening the great cord of men and stee Gen. Kuropatkin is striving desperately to check the Japanese advances, con testing the flank encroachments and testing the flank encroachments and hammering the Japanese centre. The Japanese are making heavy gains of ground west of the rallway and have captured great quantities of stores and other spoils. There has already, been bloody fighting and heavy losses, and this will be vastly increased when the masses of infanty weets.

masses of infantry meet.

Japs Drive Russians.

Reporting on March 4, Oyama says that the Japs are driving the Russians before them. He says the new line is fifteen miles southwest of Mukden. He fifteen miles southwest of Mukden. Hecontinues: "During a previous engagement the enemy's casualties were heavy. The spoils captured were great. No time to investigate. We captured large quantities of provisions at Wanchangpae and captured a clothing depot at Tahantai."

Estimates of Gen. Kuropatkin's force between Shakhe and Tie Pass, prepared here, give a total of slightly more than 400,000, composed of 335,000 infantry, 33,000 cavalry and 35,000 artillery, with 1,504 guns. This estimate does not include troops at Vladivostock and other carrisons, railway, guards and other carrisons, railway, guards and other garrisons, railway guards and other employes. The grand total east of Lake Bafkal is estimated at 700,000 men.

Gen. Kuropatkin says: "The Russians began an offensive movement against the enemy yesterday evening, occupying Salinpu and the neighboring villages to the south. This mevement was continued this morning. At the same time reinforcements arrived from Mukden.

Japa Lost Heavily.

"Twenty Japanese battalions repeatedly attacked the finak this morning in the region of Jansintun and Kandolfsan. All these attacks were repulsed, with great loss to the Japanese. The commander of the district, reports that there are masses of Japanese corpses in front of our positions.

Russian Winter Headquarters Now Threstened by Japs.

Mukden, March 5.—The rumble of earts in the streets of Mukden in drowned by the roat of battle, which is raging northwest, west and southwest of the city between Gen. A Queer Little Republica

Tavolara is said to be the smallest republic in the world: It is situated on the little island of the same name, some seven or eight miles south of Sardinia. Tavolara is about one mile in diameter, and inhabited at present by fifty-five people—men, women and children. In 1836 Kari Albert, then King of Sardinia, bestowed the supremacy over this little isle upon the Bartoleoni family, and for forty-six years "King" Paul I, reigned in peace in his domain. He died on May 30, 1882, and shortly before his demise called all his faithful subjects to his bedside and declared it to be his carnest wish that none of his relatives should succeed him as head of the Government in the island, and that he considered it for the best that the good people of Tavolara should govern themselves. After this last wish no candidate for the vacant -throne could be found among the family of the deceased, who were used to consider their "King's" wish law, and the little island was declared a republic. The constitution gives the elective franchise to both men and women. A president is elected to serve six years. None of the officers receive any compensation.



The Mayor presided. It will be reinembered that when it was first proposed to demolish these cottages, which were bought and presented to the trustees by Mr. Carnegie, their preservation was urged with great energy and strong feeling by Miss Marie torelli.

CURIOUS SUR NAMES.

Many Extraordinary and Grotosque Paironymics Borne by Respeciable Citizens of the United Kingdom.

However grotesque some of the names chosen by our novelists for their characters may be, says a writer in a London paper, it is safe to say that the most extravagant of them all can be matched in real life. French in Parliament. The use of the French language in the proceedings of the Legislature has, from the earliest days of the Farilamentary history of Canada, received the sanction of custom and law. At the first session of the Legislative Assembly of Lower Canada, in 192, it was resolved that no motion should be debated or put, to the Houses unless it was first read in English and French. It was also decided to have the journal and the bills printed in English and French. When the two Provinces of Upper and Lower Canada were united under one Parliament in 1841, it was provided by the dist section of the Act of Union that the journal and Legislative records should be in the English language, and though translations might, he made, no copy of them should be kept among the records or be deemed in any case to have the force of an original record. This law naturally created great dissatisfaction among the French-Canadians, and it was finally repealed by the Imperial Parliament, after an address to Queen Victoria had been passed by both Houses. The use of the French language in Parliament is provided for in the British North America Act, which is the written constitution of the Dominion. WOMAN OF THE NORTH

Lundquist's Wonderful Breaking All Women's Records for Travel.

The Dawsen News tells an interesting story of a courageous woman of the story of the story of the traft that ever made their way down the Yukon, arrived in Dawson on July 3, 1904 in charge of Mrs. H. C. Liandquist, woman skipper, master, ever and general director. The craft is a diminutive scow, carrying besides the master her little daughter, Elmira, and one men, Carl Swanson, as a crew. The party was bound for Rampart with the intention of sventually landing in Tahana.

Two cows, a call, three dogs and feed for the animals and supplies for the people aboard make up the freight. The entire outfit is undershood, and will be allowed to pass into American territory free of duty. "Captain" Lundquist has been spending the last several months in Skagway. During the summer she will sell milk at Rampart and Tanana, and in, the winter fatten her live stock for the butcher's block.

Mrs. Lundquist is one of the admirable, rugged specimens of womanhood of which old Scapdinavia and the sew north of this continent boast as a type that does deeds of outdoor herojsm and endurance as well as maintaining the accomplishments of life more strictly domestic.

Last winter Mrs. Lundquist broke all records of the world for travel single-handed and alone by a woman in the Arctic regions in the dead of winter. She nusshed from Rampart to Whitehorse every foot of the way with her own team, and oftentimes was out when it was 50, to 60 below zere, and it was declared by the miners that during some of the time she was on the trail the thermometer was down to 70 below. The total distance from Rampart to Whitehorse is 1,450 miles. Road houses can be made nightly over the greater part-Tanana stretch and on the Circle-Dawson stretch they were not always convenient at nightfall, and several times the traveler camped out alone, sleeping wrapped in her great Arctic dog robes, and with only the thin wall of a diminutive tent stretched between

of the sleigh.
On arriving at Whitehorse Mrs. I and quiet had lost twelve pounds from her weight at the start at Rampart, but was in excellent spirits and health, and could have turned back for another long jaunt. The run from Fairbenks to Dawson was made in twenty-six days, and from Dawson to Whitehorse in eleven days. The average daily distance covered was twenty-free miles. Opposed to Militarism.

Col. Sam Hughes, speaking on Imperial defences before the Empire Club in Toronto recently, declared that a partnership union between Great Britain and her colonies in the matter of co-operative defence, vitalized by purely democratic principles, would add untold strength to the Empire in minimizing her cost of defences and creating an indissoluble bond of sympathy. Each component part of the greater Britain would be interested in the other parts. Thousands of positions in the army, many and civil service would, be thrown open to young Canadians and a vast sphere of usefulness thus created for them. He heartfly endorsed Hon, S. H. Blake's demunciation of rampant militarism. A well-planned militia system for Canada was, however, the exact antithesis of this spirit. Mr Blake's opinion did not preclude Canada's having a defensive system of her own when he said Canada should bear no part in sustaining Great Britain's defence. No nation that had any commerce to defend or reputation to uphold should fail to contribute towards the support of a navy. Canada was the only nation that was not paying one dollar for the defence of her shipping and was hanging unabashed to the skirts of Great Britain. Opposed to Militarisa

A Millen Acres Beclaimed.

The chief work in reclamation by irrigation has been in the Lethbridge district, N.W.T., where the task of reclaiming a million acres of land to intensive agriculture has been undertaken and is already partially accomplished. Ten thousand contented settlers have been located on irrigable lands. The grain output for the season passes the million mark, the sugar business has been established with an output of three-equarters of a million pounds last year and three and a quarter million this year, and the country is being brought into the thrall of a decided and vigorous industrialism and commercial life. A new feature and a new significance in connection with agricultural lands have arisen with the advent of irrigation in Canada.

Hon. Justice McLaren, of the Court of Appeal, Makes Three Splendid Addresses

MURDER AT FORT WILLIAM. One Held Greek Workman While Com-



SPOKE PEACE MESSAGE

How President Roosevelt Utilized His Inauguration.

The United States Must Show by Deeds as Well as Words an Attitude of Friendship to the Weak and to, the Strong Nations of the Earth Alike-Brilliant Spectacles—The Inaugura tion Ball a Notable Success.

Washington, March 5. — Theodore Roosevelt of New York and Charles Warren Fairbanks of Indiana were on Saturday inaugurated respectively Pre-sident and Vice-President of the United

sident and Vice-President of the United States.

A few months ago they were elected with the greatest popular acclaim ever accorded candidates by the electorate of this Republic. Saturday the verdict of the American people, rendered on Nov. 8, was confirmed in the presence of such a throng as the national capital rarely has witnessed, and with a setting of brilliant pageantry. The inauguration of President Roosevelt was made a vestal ceremony in Washington. The city is a symphony in color. The decorations throughout the city are more elaborate and beautiful than on the occasion of any previous Presidential inauguration. Twice ag many flags have ben used this year as ever were before, and the splendor of the scheme adopted for the city's adornment never has been surpassed. has been surpassed.

At the Reviewing Stands.

At the Reviewing Stands.

The President's reviewing stand was directly in front of the White House. It was handsomely constructed and beautifully decorated with flags and laurel. That part of the stand occupied by President Roosevelt and his immediate party extended out over the sidewalk. The seats in the stand were occupied by the families and personal friends of the President and Vice-President, members of the Cabinet, the Diplomatic Cerps, members of the Senter at the Senter Justice and Associate Justices of the United States Supreme Court, Governors of States, prominent officers of the United States supreme Court, GV-erners of States, prominent officers of the army and navy, the chairman of the Republican National Committee, mem-bers of the Inaugural Committee, and the press.

Opposite the President's stand was enector the general public, seating

more than 6,000 people. Stands also were erected along each side of 'the Court of History, the seats rising fully 30 feet above the level of the procession; in front the State, war, Navy and the Treasury Buildings, the latter being for the accommodation of the department employes. Through this great amphitheatre the inaugural parade moved to the music of a hundred bands.

bands.
Wire ropes were stretched on both sides of the avenue, the entire length of the route of the parade, and the side streets leading into it were crowded with humanity early in the day. The crowd overflowed into the terraced stands and balconies filled every window and fringed the cornices of almost every building with eager faces.

wery building with eager faces. Women Faint.

Hundreds of women fainted in the press, and ambulances and emergency hospital corps were kept busy answering calls. Whichever way one turned he ran into an obstruction in the shape of a compact mass of people. Washington, so far as the ltinerary of the procession was concerned, was clogged, its flow of pedestrians absolutely choked and obstructed by living masses. With all the crush, however, it was a good-natured throne. It laughed when its toes were trod on, and chortled when it was kicked in the shins. Fights were few, and the police had an easy time of it so far as suppressing any outbursts of anger or displeasure was concerned. The bluecoats found their only labor in keeping the crowds back of the ropes.

At the Capitol.

The President and his escort started from the White House promptly at 10 o'clock and at 10.40 the President enrom the water flower president entered the capitel, where the 58th Congress was in the throes of dissolution
and bills were awaiting his approval.
In the Senate, shortly before noon,
the Diplomatic Corps, the Supreme
Court and the members of the House
of Representatives were announced.
Then Vice-President-elect Fairbanks
was announced. After him, President
Roosevelt, the President-elect, was announced, after which the oath of office
was, administered to Vice-President
Fairbanks by Senator Fare of Maine,
President pro tempore. Then the new
Vice-President administered the oath of
office to the Senators-elect, and with a
tap of his gavel the 58th Congress came
to a close.

Meantime the people left the galleries and went in procession to the east front of the capital, where the inauguration of President Roosevelt took place. When he appeared on the stand a mighty cheer burst from the great concourse. The cheering ceased as Chief Justice Fuller, his silvered hair falling over his silk and ermine robe, stepped upon the dats holding in his hand a Bible. Mr. Roosevelt stood opposite him and solemnly repeated the oath after the Chief Justice and then stooped and kissed the book, after which he delivered his mangural address.

What the President Said.

President Roosevelt, in the course of his inaugural address, said:

"Much has been given to as and much

will rightfully be expected from us. We have duties to others and duties to ourselves—and we can shirk neither. We have become a great nation, forced by the fact of its greatness into relations with the other nations of the earth, and we must behave as beseems a people with such responsibilities. Toward all other nations, large and small, our attitude must be one of cordial and sincere friendship. We must show not only in our words, but in our deeds, that we are earnestly desirous of securing their good-will by acting toward them in a spirit of just and generous recognition of all their rights.

But justice and generosity in a nation, as in an individual, count most when shown not by the weak but by the strong. While ever careful to refrain from wronging others, we must be no less insistent that we are not wronged ourselves.

"We wish peace, but we wish the

"We wish peace, but we wish the peace of justice, the peace of righteous-

ness. We wish it because we think it is right and not because we are afraid. "No weak nation that acts rightly and justly should ever have cause to fear us, and no strong power should ever be able to single us out as a subject for insolent aggression."

Bowe His Acknowledgments.

In a little while President Roosevelt was again on the avenue returning to the White House. His carriage was surrounded by Reugh Riders and his way was cleared by Squadren A. The President stood in the carriage much of the time, bowing right and left in acknowledgment of the gradious enthusiasm which his appearance aroused. He returned to the White House, and after a light luncheot, reviewed, surrounded by his family, his personal friends, his Cabinet and hundreds of distinguished visitors, the magnificent parade formed in his bonor.

The languaral Ball.

Hardly had the brilliant pageant, participated in by 30,000 paraders, come to an end when preparations for the closing function, the inaugural ball, were actively begun.

The parade had ended but a short time when the movement upon the Pension Building began. The vanguard of the guests, of whom at least 12.00 were finsily assembled, began arriving in every variety of vehicle and from every direction. The streets about the great building in which the ball was held were transformed into a babel of equipages, hurrying footmen, anxious attaches and gorgeously govned women.

The day which was drawing to a close had been ene of uninterrupted pleasure. The ceremonies were carried out with perfect precision and ease. The parade was the greatest spectacle Washington had seen since the grand review in .1855. It remained only for the inaugural ball to end a day of unbroken prepitiousness, and the ball, which continued till midnight, was the most successful ene ever held in the land.

Were Linceln's Ring.

Wore Lincein's Ring.
On his right hand, during the inaugural ceremonies, Fresident Roosevelt were a plain gold ring with an opal setting. It is eld and worn, but promises to remain priceless for centuries. It was the ring President Lincoln wore on the night he was shot, and was loaned the President by Secretary of State John Hay.

BANQUET TO MR. BORDEN.

Conservative Leader Carefully Avoids Any Controversial Subject in Mont-real-Joke on Sam Hughes.

Montreal, March 6.—R. L. Borden was banqueted at Club Lafontaine en Saturday evenins under the presidency of Ron. L. O. Taillon, some 256 of the leading French Conservatives of the city and district being present. People supposed that the Conservative leader would refer to the school question, but Mr. Borden ignored the matter, and had it not been for Hon. A. R. Angers, so one would have ever supposed that there was a crisis on at the seat of Government over the matter. Mr. Borden's address ignored political questions generally, but he called upon the party generally to get together and organize, even if they supposed that the next contest was five years remote. In referring to E. F. Clarke's death, Mr. Borden said that it would be a loss to the House of Commons, a loss to Ontario and a loss to the whole country.
