

LMOST everything that is new in candlesticks is a copy, directly or indirectly, of some old form, the hobby for old things having ed this particular branch of col-g with even more than the usual bably the oldest forms handed to us are those made without the cup in which the candle is usueld, and which is furnished instead a small spike upon which the canimpaled. Almost all of them (those seven-branched sticks-not the collect-ors!) are made to unscrew at the base, each two of the cups forming a branch which can be swing into a broad form and balanced about the central, immov-able one. Usualy, too, all the little cups unscrew, for the purpose of bet-ter cleaning; and most of them, although there are the inevitable exceptions, of course, are kept to the simplest of lines.

Column-candlesticks are among the most dignified styles of both old and new. Some of them have the square base, with the simple column rising out of it, while others copy the most elaborate forms of columns known.

Most of the old sets, composed of candlestick, snuffers and extinguishing cap, are broken—the snuffers being the most usual part to be lost, as its use went out so suddenly with the making of candles with self-consuming wicks.

Queer little shields were invented to make the carrying of candles—when they were the only form of light possible—through drafty halls, and to prevent too unpleasant flekering that the currents of air stirred up by your own movements about the room caused. Some of those shields were of metal, built out in a true shield shape at the movements about the room caused. Some of those shelds were of metal, built out in a true shield shape at the back of the candlestick, but the most satisfactory were those of glass, shaped something like modern lamp-chimneys, but engraved and made beautiful.

The newest things of all, though still copies, are those copies of the old sticks dug up in ruins—the copies executed and finished with apparently

the same green mould incorporated into them.

For smokers comes a tiny lamp, a modern fac-simile of those quaint little Pompelian lamps which every traveler brings home with him; but these modern versions are made to serve a purpose well in Reeping with the times. 

#### In the Laundry---Washing Flannels Practical Hints to Housewives by Marion Harland

ANY women of many minds" would be an appropriate legend to write above the secwrite above the section of this chapter which treats of the temperature of the water in which flannels are washed. Says one prime authority upon household economics: "Flannels and hold economics: "Flamels and household hosiery should be washed in tepid, soft water—never hot and never cold."

No less than five veteran housewives have written to me "ithin the last two months extolling the mer-its of cold water as a means of cleansing flannels and keeping them

soft. "Having once tried this method

"Having once tried this method of washing woolen goods, you will never be satisfied with any other," writes a grandmother who boasts that she is "not too old to learn."

In my own laundry, flannels have been washed in lukewarm water, squeezed, and not wrung out, shaken free of wet, dried quickly and ironed on the wrong side while damp. To be frank, I have not To be frank, I have damp found this method invariably sat-isfactory. The phrase "lukewarm water" leaves much to the discretion of each laundress. What would be several degrees above tepid to the mistress, feels cold to the toil-hardened hands of the maid. "Why not test the temperature with the thermometer?" cries our col-lege-bred women. There are many rules that look well in housewifely manuals which lapse into a dead-letter in the rush and routine of a work-a-day life.

#### AN INNOVATION

Return we to our flannels. One day last week I put a particularly pretty dressing sacque into the family wash. #### WITH COLORED CLOTHES

Wring out the salt-and-water, rinse in clear, cold water, and wash at once in tepid suds, unless, indeed, you use soap bark or bran water. This last is excellent for colored cotton and linens, which require starch. Boil two quarts of wheat bran in six quarts of water an hour, let it get cool and strain through cheesecloth, pressing hard to get all the mucilaginous matter. Add cold water if too thick. After rinsing the brine out of your col-ored ginghams, calicoes and lawns, wash them in this, using neither wash them in this, using neither soap nor starch. Always dry colored clothes in the shade and wrong side out. Neglect of this precaution brings many a dainty fabric to grief. When one recollects that the start of expose dampened cotton or woolen, silk or linen garments to the sun or air is a common bleaching process, one wonders to see delicate colors we would retain, if possible, subjected deliberately to these influences, for the want of a little common sense and ordinary care. 


The real outing suit, the one which is worn on the golf links and tennis court, is a very negligee costume in-deed, and it is designed for comfort, with style a secondary consideration.

#### GIVER AND RECEIVER

Both Equally Guilty in Matter of Insurance Rebating.

All Parties to the System Should Be Punished, the Opinion of Mr. Richter of the London Life-How Policyholders May Benefit - He Admits Some Loans Made to Company's Own Directors

London, June 29.-The Royal Commission on Insurance, opened here yes-terday. J. G. Richter of the London Life was on the stand all day. The London Life was established in 1874, with capital of \$1,000,000, of which \$250,000 is subscribed and \$50,000 paid up.

The late President Jeffrey controlled the majority of the stock, and both his sons are officers of the company.

Losans to Directors.

Mr. Richter admitted that the company had made loans to the vice-president, Dr. A. O. Jeffrey, and to a director, William Bowman. He explained to the commission that, although in this case there had oeen no loss, still the lending of funds to directors was capable of abuse. Mr. Tilley produced the loan book, which showed that the Jeffrey loan was on stock of the Ontario Loan and Debenstock of the Ontario Loan and Debe

Mr. Richter explained that the London did a large industrial business— about half the total—from which the company had reaped large profits after the third year. The minimum amount of insurance fixed by the province was \$20 on infants lives up to \$160 on a

\$20 on infants lives up to \$160 on a child of ten.

That Agreement

The settled form of insurance agreement, provided by the Officers' Association, was read by Mr. Tilley, and Mr. Richter elucidated the practice under it.

The agreement between the Metro-The agreement between the Metropolitan Life of New York and the London Life was read by Mr. Tilley. The first clause dealt with the limitation of agents. If an agent leaves elther company he could not become a member of the agency staff of the other in the same locality for one year. Mr. Tilley thought this was not fair to the agent, but witness explained that in "industrial" insurance this was necessary. He said that the agent built up an asset which he might enter to either comhich he might enter to either con

"You destroy the asset?" asked Mr Tilley.
"No! We think that it is our asset."

In reference to surrender values, Mr. Tilley asked, "Why should not full reserve be given to the policyholders. Witness said there were many reasons. It was the only way of getting back to the company the excess money spent to get the policy. That is the full surrender must be released to the company. 

In Italian Strike Riot in the Limestone City.

Two Officers of the Law Seriously Wounded-Dissatisfied Italian Nav vies Retaliate on Police Who Clubbed Them Into Submission - Man ought to Have Done Stabbing ed With Nine Others.

Kingson, June 29.—Two officers of the law yere seriously wounded with difference in the hands of Italians during a riot following a strike of 100 foreigners yesterday. The Italians chased the police, who had been sent by the authorities to quell the disturbance, and the mayor and police magis trate called out the regular troops.

The riot occurred at the outer depotation of the road yesterday morning they became dissatisfied with their wages. They have been getting \$1.40 per day, and want \$1.65. They board and sleep on old cars at the depot.

Yesterday morning the railway foreman ordered them to make up a train and proceed to Collins' Bay to work, and then trouble began. The strikers assembled on the station platform and raised a disturbance. on, June 29.—Two officers of

The rioters were gathered on the platform making all kinds of threats. The policemen ordered them off, and when they refused to obey drew their clubs and endeavored to put them off by force.

Thereupon the strikers drew knives and revolvers and started to attack the officers. Mr. McRae and Detective Harrott came to the assistance of the local police, and a fierce fight ensued. The officers of the law were not armed with revolvers, but fought manfully with their clubs and did great execution, knocking about a score of the strikers senseless. The latter succeeded in retailating, however, and the policemen were finally forced to beat retreat, pursued to their cab by the maddened foreigners.
