In the death of Mr. Lesslie the Association has lost a warm friend and a liberal supporter. It is not to be wondered at that he

should feel such lively interest in the work, when we state that he was the only living link between the Y. M. C. A. of to-day and the Young Men's Society of over half a century ago. When about the year 1830, David Nasmith visited Toronto (then York) and organized the Young Men's Society (practically a Y. M. C. A.) Mr. Lesslie identified himself with the work, and continued his connection with the Society until its dissolution about the vear 1839. During that period he filled the offices, respectively, of Secretary and President. He became a member of the Toronto Y. M. C. A. early in its history, and to his liberality the Association was largely indebted for many comforts in the commodious rooms so long occupied on King Street (of which property he was the owner). BULLETIN was always welcomed by him. and its fund was materially aided by his contributions.

We have very pleasant and grateful recollections of the deceased, whom to know was to respect and love. He nowrests in peace, in the sure and certain: hope of a glorious resurrection.

Our prayer is, that Divine comfort may be the portion of the widow and bereaved friends.


