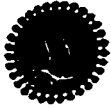

A Message was then received from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by Beverley H. Jouett, Esquire, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, requiring the immediate attendance of the House in the Council Chamber.

The House attended accordingly, when the Honorable William Black, acting President of the Legislative Council, said—

*“Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, and
Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,*

“I am commanded by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to inform you, that he doth not think it expedient to declare the causes for which he has summoned this General Assembly until there be a Speaker of the House of Assembly. It is therefore His Excellency’s pleasure that you, Gentlemen of the Assembly, do repair to the place where your Sittings are usually held, and there choose a fit person to be your Speaker, and that you present the person who shall be so chosen to His Excellency for his approbation.”

And the House being returned—

Mr. Partelow, a Member from the County of Saint John, addressing himself to the Clerk, said—

“MR. WETMORE,

“Having been commanded by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to elect a Speaker, I rise to address you, as Clerk, for the purpose of nominating the Honorable John Wesley Weldon to fill that important office.

“Possessing Conservative Principles and a thorough knowledge of the Constitution,—intimately acquainted with the forms and proceedings of Parliament,—and endowed with abilities of no ordinary character; I consider him admirably well qualified to hold the proud position of the first Commoner in New Brunswick, and I hope that a majority of this House will sustain me in that opinion:—

“I therefore move that he take the Chair.”

Mr. End, a Member from the County of Gloucester, then addressed the Clerk, and said:—

“That in seconding the motion of the Honorable Member for the County of Saint John, he should cheerfully respond to the sentiments expressed by that Gentleman in reference to Mr. Weldon:—His intimate knowledge of Parliamentary usages had become proverbial in the House, and his firmness upon every occasion, where the Constitutional

Constitutional Rights of the Loyal People of the Province required his support, could not have been overlooked by their Representatives:—In every stage of his political career he had shewn himself worthy of confidence.”

Mr. Hill, a Member for the County of Charlotte, then addressing himself to the Clerk, recommended to the House that Lemuel Allan Wilmot, Esquire, be elected to the office of Speaker; whereupon

Mr. Wilmot arose, and declined the honor of being put in nomination therefor.

The Honorable Mr. Weldon, being the only person placed in nomination, was then taken from his seat by Mr. Partelow and Mr. End, and conducted by them to the Chair; and when standing on the step, expressed himself as follows:—

“I beg the House to believe that I feel grateful for this mark of their confidence: To succeed a Gentleman who has so long and so ably filled the Chair is a task of no ordinary kind, and I may well distrust my own abilities; but if honesty of purpose—strict impartiality, and a due regard for the rights and privileges of this House, will secure to me the confidence of the Assembly, I shall endeavour to deserve it.”

Mr. Weldon then took the Chair.

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, requiring the immediate attendance of the House in the Council Chamber.

Accordingly Mr. Speaker elect, with the House, went up to the Council Chamber.

And being returned—

Mr. Speaker reported, that he addressed His Excellency to the effect following:—

“ May it please Your Excellency,

“The Assembly having received Your Excellency’s commands, returned to the place where they usually sit, and, in the exercise of their undoubted right, immediately proceeded to choose a Speaker:—They have elected me to that important office, and now present me to be approved of by Your Excellency.”

The Honorable Mr. Black then spoke as follows:—

“ MR. WELDON,

“I am commanded by His Excellency to assure you, that he is fully sensible of your zeal for the Public Service, and your sufficiency to execute the duties of the high office to which you have been elected by the House of Assembly, and that he doth the most readily approve of their choice, and allow and confirm you to be their Speaker.”

That he, Mr. Speaker, then further addressed His Excellency in the following words:—

“ May it please Your Excellency,

“Your Excellency having been pleased to confirm the choice which the House of Assembly have made in electing me as their Speaker, it now becomes my duty, on behalf of the Assembly, to demand that they have all their ancient and undoubted rights and privileges, especially freedom of speech,—freedom from arrest,—access to Your Excellency whenever the Public Service may require it, and that the most favorable construction be put upon all their proceedings:—On my own behalf, I have to intreat that any error of mine may not be imputed to the Assembly.”

To which the Honorable Mr. Black again replied:—

“ MR. SPEAKER,

“His Excellency hath the utmost confidence in the loyalty and attachment of this House of Assembly to Her Majesty’s Person and Government, and in the wisdom, temper and prudence, which will accompany all their proceedings; and he doth most readily and willingly grant and allow them all their privileges in as full and ample a manner as they have at any time heretofore been granted and allowed.

“With respect to yourself, Sir, though His Excellency is sensible that you do not stand in need of such an assurance, His Excellency will ever put the most favorable construction on your words and actions.”

Mr.

Mr. Partelow moved for leave to bring in a Bill to amend the Laws to provide for the greater safety of Passengers on board Steam Boats.

Leave granted.

Mr. Speaker then further reported, that when in attendance on His Excellency in the Council Chamber, His Excellency had been pleased to make a Speech to both Houses, and that he (Mr. Speaker) had, to prevent mistakes, procured a copy thereof, which he read to the House and is as followeth :—

“ Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,

“ Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

“ HAVING called you together at the earliest period that has been practicable since the termination of the Elections, which were unavoidably deferred to a late season of the year. I meet you with an impression that, as we are assembled to deliberate on the affairs of the Province, under circumstances of more than ordinary interest, you will be animated by that public spirit which is required to enable us to fulfil the expectations of the Country.

“ You will participate in the gratification which Her Majesty’s Subjects in general have felt in the recent and brilliant successes which have signalled the operations of Her Naval and Military Forces in the East, and which have offered so prominent an occasion for National gratitude and felicitation in the prospects which those successes have opened to British enterprise.

“ I congratulate you also on the ratification by Her Majesty of a Treaty with the United States, for the settlement of the Boundary between those States and the British Provinces; an event by which a protracted dispute, calculated to have disturbed the peace of both Countries, has been happily terminated, and which is likely to prove advantageous to Commerce.

“ The abundant Harvest of the last season with which Providence has blessed the labours of the people, as well in the United Kingdom as in these Colonies, has demanded the expression of our thankfulness. The relief it has afforded, under the depression to which the Country has been subject, has drawn attention to the Agricultural resources of the Province. I have taken advantage of this disposition, by encouraging the formation of extensive Settlements on the Crown Lands, under regulations calculated to prevent the evils attendant on the desultory occupation of them. I recommend to you that Legislative provision should be made to check the illegal occupation of the Crown Lands, and also of the Indian Reserves, and to secure the Revenue derivable from them.

“ A revision of the Election Laws will also become necessary in order to protect the Constitutional rights of the Freeholders, and for the security of the public peace at Elections, which are likely to be of more frequent occurrence under the Act of the last Session.

“ As the Laws for the support of the Parochial Schools in the Province will shortly expire, I have prosecuted such further enquiries into their condition as will be a guide to you in applying a remedy to the defects of the system. From its importance to the welfare of the rising generation, I recommend the subject to your early attention.

“ It is unnecessary that I should recapitulate to you the measures, which have appeared to me to be called for, to improve, on English principles, the Institutions of the Province, and which have so much engaged the attention of the Country: but there is one subject which it is incumbent on me at this time to recommend to your particular notice;—I allude to the timely adoption of such a system of Finance, as will be calculated to restore confidence in the integrity of the Province and retrieve the Public Credit.

“ Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

“ Since the close of the last Session my attention has been unremittingly given to the means of alleviating, so far as it has been practicable, the embarrassments arising from the failure of the Revenue, and the depreciation of the Provincial Credit. The Accounts for the last year, which have been fully audited, will be laid before you, from which you will observe that extraordinary means will be required to relieve the Public Creditor. In proposing to raise such moderate Duties as would not press unduly upon

upon Commerce, I anticipate that there will nevertheless be adequate means to provide with economy for the Public Service, and for those objects which in a new Country require the protection of the Legislature.

*“ Mr. President and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,
“ Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,*

“ Her Majesty’s Government having acquiesced in the proposal to ascertain the practicability of opening a Canal to connect the Gulf of Saint Lawrence with the Bay of Fundy, this Survey is now in progress, and another important work has been liberally undertaken by Her Majesty’s Government in the Survey of that Bay and its tributary Rivers. From these and other researches, of which Reports will be laid before you, I am led to anticipate that the great natural resources of the Province will engage attention in the United Kingdom. That it should prove an attractive region to those who, attached to the Constitution of their Country, would bring with them a knowledge of its Arts and Institutions, will, I am confident, be in accordance with your feelings; and I can desire no higher gratification than in fostering the growth of those principles which have raised the English Nation to her present pre-eminence and which, under Providence, will ensure the prosperity of succeeding generations.”

On motion of Mr. Allen,

Resolved, That a Standing Committee be appointed, to whom may be referred all matters which may hereafter arise, that may in any way be supposed to affect the Privileges of the House.

Ordered, That Mr. Allen, Mr. End, Mr. Hill, Mr. Fisher and Mr. Burns do compose the Committee.

On motion of Mr. Scoullar,

Ordered, That two hundred copies of His Excellency’s Speech be forthwith printed for the use of the Legislature.

On motion of Mr. Brown,

Resolved, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, in answer to His Speech at the opening of the Session.

Ordered, That Mr. Brown, Mr. Allen, Mr. Barberie, Mr. Wilmot and Mr. Hazen be a Committee to prepare the Address.

The Honorable Mr. Speaker informed the House, that the Clerk had communicated to him that he had nominated George Lee, Junior, Esquire, to the Office of Clerk Assistant of the Assembly; and the nomination being approved of by the House, Mr. Lee took his seat at the Clerk’s Table.

On motion of Mr. Allen,

Resolved, unanimously, That the Reverend John Mayne Stirling, A. M., be the Chaplain of this House.

On motion of Mr. Hazen,

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to revise the former Rules and Regulations for the House of Assembly of this Province, and to make further Rules and Regulations for the government thereof.

Ordered, That Mr. Hazen, Mr. Fisher, Mr. Hill, Mr. S. Earle and Mr. Perley be the Committee for that purpose.

On motion of Mr. Alexandre,

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to take into consideration all matters connected with the Fisheries, and report thereon to the House.

Ordered, That Mr. Alexandre, Mr. Boyd, Mr. Hanington, Mr. Payne, Mr. Burns and Mr. Stewart do compose the Committee.

On motion of Mr. Wilmot,

Resolved, That a Select Committee be appointed to take into consideration the subject of the Contingent expenses of the House, and that the Committee do submit their Report thereon to-morrow.

Ordered, That Mr. Wilmot, Mr. Hazen, Mr. Barberie, Mr. Hanington and Mr. Boyd be the Committee for that purpose.

On

On motion of Mr. Connell,

Ordered, That the Journals of this House be daily printed, or so soon as a copy thereof can be prepared by the Clerk, and that the Printer do furnish five hundred copies thereof for the use of the Legislature.

On motion of Mr. Fisher,

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed, consisting of a Member from each County, to take into consideration the state of all the Roads of Communication in the Province, and report the same to the House; and that they also report what sums it may be necessary to grant for repairing and improving as well the Great as Bye Roads.

Ordered, That Mr. Fisher, Mr. Connell, Mr. Scoullar, Mr. S. Earle, Mr. J. Earle, Mr. Brown, Mr. Partelow, Mr. Palmer, Mr. Wark, Mr. Rankin, Mr. Alexandre and Mr. Barberie do compose the Committee.

Mr. Partelow, by leave, presented a Petition from William H. Street, Esquire, a Candidate at the last Election holden for the City of Saint John for Members to represent them in this General Assembly, together with one hundred and forty others, Freeholders and Freemen of the said City; praying that an investigation may be had of the votes given at such Election for Lewis Burns, Esquire, one of the Members returned to represent the said City and those given for the said William H. Street, Esquire; and further, that the said Petitioners be heard before the House or a Committee thereof, touching the several allegations set forth in the said Petition; and he having read the same—

Ordered, That it be received and lie on the Table.

On motion of Mr. Wilmot,

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed, consisting of a Member from each County, to whom shall be referred all matters which may be brought before the House, in any way affecting the Agricultural Interests of the Province.

Ordered, That Mr. Wilmot, Mr. Perley, Mr. Barker, Mr. Smith, Mr. Thomson, Mr. Gilbert, Mr. Freeze, Mr. Wark; Mr. Williston, Mr. Alexandre, Mr. Barberie and Mr. Jordan do compose the Committee.

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

Ordered, That no Petition be received or Bill brought in after the twenty fifth day of February next, except by special leave of the House.

On motion of Mr. Brown,

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to take into consideration all matters relating to the Finances of the Province, and to report thereon to the House.

Ordered, That Mr. Brown, Mr. Wark, Mr. End, Mr. Fisher and Mr. Burns be the Committee for that purpose.

On motion of Mr. Jordan,

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to whom may be referred all Petitions for allowances to Teachers of Schools who have not received any part of the Provincial Grants.

Ordered, That Mr. Jordan, Mr. Boyd, Mr. Allen, Mr. Wark, Mr. Palmer and Mr. End do compose the Committee.

On motion of Mr. Boyd,

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to take under their consideration all matters relating to Light Houses within the Province, and to report thereon from time to time to the House.

Ordered, That Mr. Boyd, Mr. Rankin and Mr. Payne be the Committee for that purpose.

On motion of Mr. Payne,

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to examine and report to the House what Laws have expired, or are near expiring.

Ordered, That Mr. Payne, Mr. Fisher and Mr. End be the Committee for that purpose.

On motion of Mr. Taylor,

Resolved, That a Standing Committee be appointed to examine and report upon Public Accounts.

Ordered,

Ordered, That Mr. Partelow, Mr. Taylor, Mr. Scoullar, Mr. Rankin, Mr. Thomson, Mr. Botsford and Mr. Payne do compose the Committee.

On motion of Mr. Williston,

Resolved, That a Standing Committee be appointed, to whom shall be referred all matters which may in any way affect the Trade of the Province.

Ordered, That Mr. Williston, Mr. Taylor, Mr. Stewart, the Honorable Mr. Simonds, Mr. Alexandre and Mr. Burns do compose the Committee.

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

Ordered, That the House do on Friday next, being the 3d day of February, go into Committee of the whole, in consideration of the Speech from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor at the opening of the Session.

The House adjourned until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

Wednesday, 1st February, 1843.

Prayers.

Mr. Smith, by leave, presented a Petition from James Wallace, Lewis Trites, James Black, John Trenholm, and 460 others, inhabitants of the County of Westmorland, praying that the said County may be divided into two separate and distinct Counties; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received and lie on the Table.

Mr. Smith moved for leave to bring in a Bill to divide the County of Westmorland into two Counties, and to provide for the Government and Representation of the new County.

Leave granted.

Mr. Partelow, by leave, presented a Petition from Rachael Martin, a valuable Instructress of Youth, praying a Legislative Grant for her services in that capacity; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee of Supply.

Mr. Wark, by leave, presented a Petition from Edward Cavana, of the Parish of Carleton, in the County of Kent, praying compensation for having taught a School in that Parish for a period of twelve months ending in August, 1842, he not having received any compensation under the Act relating to Parish Schools; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee on School Petitions to report thereon.

The Honorable Mr. Simonds, by leave, presented a Petition from Thomas Hayward, praying to be remunerated for teaching a School in the Parish of Lancaster and County of Saint John, for a period of six months ending in December last; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee on School Petitions to report thereon.

The Honorable Mr. Simonds, also by leave, presented a Petition from Thomas M'Elroy, praying for a return of Duties on articles consumed by the Great Fire in the Parish of Portland and County of Saint John, on the 17th of August, 1841; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee of Trade to report thereon.

The Honorable Mr. Simonds, by command of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, laid before the House the following Documents, made up by the Provincial Treasurer, viz:—

Mr. Partelow, by leave, presented a Petition from John Walker, of the City of Saint John, praying to be reimbursed for Duties paid on Bricks imported for and used in the erection of a Building for the accommodation of the Customs Departments and other Public Offices at that place; which he read.

Mr. Wilmot, from the Committee appointed yesterday to take under consideration the subject of the Contingencies of the House, submitted a Report, embracing some of the matters referred to them, and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

"The Committee to whom were referred the subject of the Contingencies, have attended to that duty, and beg leave to Report:

"That their attention has been directed to the several ordinary items of "Postage," "Sleigh hire," and "Stationery."

"The gross amount of Postage Account against both Branches of the Legislature for 1841 was £449 6 8, of which the proportion of the Assembly was £326 16 8.

"The Account for 1842 against both Branches was £497 9s.; the proportion against the Assembly was £355 19 6.

"The Committee, after full consideration of this subject, beg leave to recommend that the following sums be allowed in lieu of Letter Postages for each County:—

"These sums will effect a saving on the last year of about £75 per cent. currency.

"Another important point now arises, for the first time, as to the Postages of the Journals.

"The Committee have had laid before them a letter from the Postmaster to the Clerk, telling him, for the information of the House, that in consequence of instructions received by him from the General Post Office in Halifax, the Journals of the Legislature will in future be charged with a postage of one penny per sheet.

"At this rate, allowing six sheets a day for each Member, the probable amount of Postage for Journals for the Assembly will exceed £70; and the Committee submit for the consideration of the House, whether this branch of Postage should be paid out of the Treasury, in addition to the allowance above mentioned. The Committee cannot refrain from expressing their dissatisfaction with the rates of Postage as now established, and with the irresponsible and independent character of the Post Office establishment, so far as regards any control of the Provincial Government.

"It is the opinion of a majority of the Committee, that one of the Sleighs should be dispensed with.

"The Committee are informed, that in consequence of instructions from some Members of the late House, Mr. Turner, one of the drivers, has recently procured a new Sleigh at a large expense; they therefore recommend that he should be continued at the rate of 20s. per diem, and that his public labours shall be exclusively confined to attendance on the House during the hours of business.

"The attention of the Committee has been called to the fact of a reduction of £15 having been made on Turner's allowance at the last Session, and they recommend that this sum be now given in consideration of the expense incurred by him in procuring a new Sleigh.

"With respect to the second Sleigh, the Committee are of opinion, that as the owner has been at considerable expense in providing for attendance on the House, a small allowance should be made, and they recommend the sum of £17 10s. for this purpose.

"As the Committee are of opinion that several items have hitherto been inserted in the Contingent Account which should be disposed of in Committee of Supply, they recommend that in future no sum be allowed for Contingencies until the account thereof be first laid before the House, and considered and approved of by a Committee of the whole, and that the account thereof, as allowed, should be printed in the Journals.

"The Committee will submit their observations on the subject of Stationery in a further Report.

Rules for the Government of the House of Assembly.

1. That Prayers be read every day, by the Chaplain of the House, at the first opening thereof.

2. No Member do come into the House, or move from one place to another, with his hat on.

3. While the House is sitting, and any Member is speaking, no Member shall be allowed to speak or whisper so as to interrupt him, unless it be to speak to order.

4. When any Member intends to speak, he must stand up and address the Speaker ; if more than one rises, the Speaker shall determine who is up first ; and the Member named by him may speak.

5. No Member shall stand while another is speaking.

6. When any subject is being debated, if any Member arises to speak to another subject, any Member may, but the Speaker should, call him to order.

7. When any Member or the Speaker speaks to order, the question of order must be decided previous to the subject under discussion being proceeded in.

8. When any question is called for, and a division demanded, the Members voting in the affirmative will rise.

9. When a motion is made and seconded, it must be determined by the question, unless it is withdrawn by the mover, or the previous question, or adjournment be moved and carried.

10. When a motion is made and seconded, the Member's name who made the motion must be inserted in the Journal.

11. After a question is propounded, no Member shall speak more than once to the matter, except the mover, who shall be allowed the general reply.

12. When a question is decided by vote, the number of both the affirmatives and negatives, and also the Members' names, shall be inserted in the Journal, if insisted upon by two or more Members.

13. That the Journal of the preceding day be always read before any other business is taken up.

14. That the Sergeant at Arms do not permit any person to come within the House while it is sitting, except the Officers attending.

15. That all persons who will question any return of Members to serve in General Assembly, do question the same within fourteen days, (including the day of meeting,) after the meeting of the House ; and so within fourteen days, (including the day of meeting,) or of making such return, after any new return shall be brought in.

16. That the House will not enter into any scrutiny of votes polled at any election of Members to serve in General Assembly, unless a scrutiny was duly demanded of the Sheriff.

17. That any Member presenting a Petition, shall, in his place, acquaint the House of the general purport of the Petition, and ask leave for it to be read, which must be seconded before it is read.

18. That the Speaker shall not take the Chair for the purpose of proceeding with the business of the House, except to receive the Usher of the Black Rod, a Message from the Legislative Council, or to enforce the attendance of Members, unless at least fourteen Members, including the Speaker, be present; but for the purpose aforementioned, any number of Members, including the Speaker, shall be deemed sufficient after the hour has arrived to which the House may be adjourned.

19. That if any Member obtain leave of the House to act as an Attorney or Counsel in any matter pending before the House, he shall not speak or vote as a Member upon such matter.

20. That every Member be heard in his place, touching any charge brought against him, or any matter respecting his election, return or privilege, or whenever his private interest is affected, but shall withdraw before the House proceed thereon.

21. That in case of any offensive matter occurring in debate, the same shall be immediately noted down in writing, and noticed in the House the same day, otherwise it shall not be afterwards considered by the House.

22. That all orders of the day which, by reason of any adjournment shall not have been proceeded upon, shall be considered only as postponed till the next day on which the House shall sit.

23. That no Member of the House shall, upon any pretence whatever, either go to the Legislative Council, or answer in writing, or appear by Counsel to answer any accusation there, upon the penalty of being committed to the Sergeant at Arms, or to Prison, during the pleasure of the House.

24. That no Bill of a private or local nature shall be received by the House, unless such Bill has been previously read at the Assizes, or Court of Nisi Prius, or at some General Sessions of the Peace for the County, or City and County, interested in such Bill, in the presence of the Grand Jury, and a certificate be indorsed thereon by the Clerk of such Court, that the same was so read, or unless such Bill has been previously published four times in some of the newspapers published in the County interested in such Bill; when no newspaper is published in such County, in some newspaper published in the nearest adjoining County, or in the Royal Gazette.

25. That no money hereafter be appropriated for Bye Roads in any Parish of this Province, in any year, unless it shall appear by the certificate of the Clerk of the Peace for the County in which such Parish is situated, to be filed with the Clerk of this House, that a return has been made in the same year by the Commissioners of Roads of such Parish, that the Statute Labour has been performed by the inhabitants of the Parish for which any money is intended to be granted, or that the delinquents have been prosecuted according to Law.

It being the time appointed by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to receive the House with their Address, in answer to His Excellency's Speech at the opening of the Session, the House waited upon His Excellency and presented the same, which is as follows:—

To His Excellency Lieutenant Colonel Sir WILLIAM MACBEAN GEORGE COLEBROOKE, Knight of the Hanoverian Guelphic Order, Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.

The Humble Address of the House of Assembly.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

WE, the Representatives of Her Majesty's Faithful and Loyal Subjects, the People of New Brunswick, thank Your Excellency for the Speech you have been pleased to deliver at the opening of the present Session.

Assembled to deliberate on the affairs of the Province, under circumstances of more than ordinary interest, we assure Your Excellency that we are animated by an earnest desire to advance the general welfare, and thus fulfil the expectations of the Country.

The recent brilliant successes which have signalized the operations of Her Majesty's Naval and Military Forces in the East are highly gratifying; offering as they do so prominent an occasion for National gratitude, and opening at this time prospects so favorable to British enterprise.

The Ratification of the Treaty with the United States of America, for the settlement of the Boundary between those States and the British Provinces, is satisfactory as having terminated a question of no ordinary perplexity; and we sincerely hope that the result may prove advantageous to the Commerce of the Country: yet we cannot but regret that, by the terms of that Treaty, a large and valuable portion of what was always considered the territory of New Brunswick has been yielded up to the United States, by which the resources of this Province and its Revenues will be greatly diminished.

The abundant Harvest with which a kind Providence has blessed the labours of the Husbandman, and the timely relief thereby afforded, at a period of extraordinary depression, call for our warmest expressions of thankfulness.

We duly appreciate Your Excellency's exertions in the formation of Settlements on the Wilderness Lands of the Crown, and we shall cheerfully attend to the adoption of such measures as may prevent the illegal occupation of the Crown Lands and Indian Reserves, and also secure the Revenue derivable therefrom.

It being within the peculiar province of the Assembly vigilantly to preserve the Constitutional rights of the Freeholders, we shall not fail to adopt such measures in regard to the Election Laws as, in our opinion, will be best calculated to protect those inestimable rights.

Duly impressed with the value and importance of Education; we shall give our
early

early attention to the subject of the Parochial Schools, and shall thankfully receive such information as Your Excellency may be pleased to communicate, and which can in any way assist us in remedying the defects of the present system.

The measures proposed by Your Excellency, as improvements on the Institutions of the Province, and which have already so much engaged the attention of the Country, shall be duly and carefully considered; and it is our earnest desire immediately to adopt such Financial measures as may restore confidence and establish the Public Credit on a secure and permanent basis.

Our thanks are due to Your Excellency for your unremitting endeavours to alleviate the embarrassments arising from the decrease of the Revenue and the consequent depreciation of the Provincial Credit, as well as for the promise to lay before us, fully audited, the accounts of the last year. We are gratified to learn that, notwithstanding those embarrassments, there will be adequate means to provide, with economy, for the Public Service and for other objects which, in a new Country, require the protection and encouragement of the Legislature.

We tender to Her Majesty's Government our grateful acknowledgements for having acquiesced in the proposal to ascertain the practicability of opening a Canal to connect the Gulf of Saint Lawrence with the Bay of Fundy, and for the great liberality exhibited in causing a Survey of that Bay and its tributary Rivers—a service from which the Country must derive the greatest advantages; and we confidently hope the anticipations of Your Excellency may be realised, and that, from these and other researches alluded to, the great natural resources of the Province may attract the attention of the United Kingdom, and that this Country may draw to its shores those who may bring with them a knowledge of the Arts and Institutions of the Parent State, the adoption of which, to such an extent as may be applicable to our position and the wants and wishes of the Province may call for, is strictly in accordance with our feelings; and we are fully satisfied that no higher gratification can be afforded Your Excellency, than in fostering the growth of those principles, so venerated by the people of this Province, which have raised the British Nation to her present pre-eminence, and which, under Providence, will ensure the prosperity of succeeding generations.

A Communication from the Deputy Postmaster General at Halifax, in reference to an Address of the House to His Excellency of the 4th March 1842, requiring certain information relative to the Post Office Department in the Province; as also Accounts shewing the Receipts and Expenditures of the Establishment in New Brunswick, for the year ending 5th January 1842.

The Communication from the Deputy Postmaster General being read at the Clerk's Table, is as follows:—

POST OFFICE.

General Post Office, Halifax, 16th April, 1842.

SIR.—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Letter of the 7th instant, accompanied by a Resolution of the House of Assembly of New Brunswick, and conveying to me a request from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, that I would furnish the information required by that branch of the Legislature.

In obedience to His Excellency's command, I herewith transmit sundry documents, in accordance with the Resolution to which I have alluded.

The only Papers sent free of charge through New Brunswick are those printed in Great Britain, and received by the Steam Packets from England.

Many of the Contracts with the Post Riders are of long standing, and the sums founded upon tenders; but in some instances, in order to obtain the services of faithful, active men, on the most important routes, the rule of tender has been departed from, as some persons offer their services on terms which would prevent their fulfilling their obligations to the Public. There are other circumstances which operate against the system of contracting by tenders; inebriety, carelessness, delays in the transmission of the Mails, robbery of the Mails, &c., which must be promptly visited upon offenders. They must be deprived of their situations, and other persons at once put in their places: the public service must be regularly carried on, but in making such removals, I would, however, observe, that no increase of the established salary takes place.

As

As respects the conveyance of the Mails with one, two or more horses, I beg to state, that I have never interfered: I merely bind the Couriers to travel certain distances within certain periods of time. I have never thought it the duty of the Post Office, in its Riding Department, to make arrangements for the accommodation of Travellers, although I am always glad when facilities are afforded to such persons by the Couriers. In the last Session of the Legislature of this Province, a Resolution was passed by the House of Assembly, praying His Excellency Lord Falkland to cause the establishment of a Line of Mail Coaches between Saint John and Truro, which would accommodate Passengers. His Excellency, in compliance with the request of the Assembly, commanded me to make such an arrangement. I have made the necessary contract, and the service will commence on the 6th July next, but in making the arrangement I have not exceeded the sum at present paid for the conveyance of the Mails between the places I have mentioned.

FINANCE.

EXTRACT OF A DESPATCH FROM LORD STANLEY TO SIR WILLIAM M. G. COLEBROOKE.

[No. 79.]

Downing Street, 29th June, 1842.

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Despatch and its enclosures of the 30th of April, No. 45, on the state of the Finances of the Province of New Brunswick.

Having adverted to your previous Despatches of the 10th of February last, and 21st of June, 1841, on this subject, I have to state that it appears that the debts and liabilities of the Province, at the termination of the past year, have exceeded the means which had been provided, or which were calculated upon for meeting the expenditure by a sum of more than £33,563 16 3, and as a portion of those means had not at that time become available, the provincial funds were then subject to a charge of interest at the rate of £4,100, per annum, after allowing for the interest stated to be payable to the Treasury on a portion of the assets.

The documents before me do not shew the purposes for which, nor the particular period at which this excess of expenditure has been incurred, nor does it appear how far any exigencies of the Colonial service may have rendered it unavoidable to contract it; but I must enjoin upon you to use every means in your power to keep the expenditure of the Province within the limits of the ways and means afforded by its Revenue, as well as to liquidate from the same source the debt which has been contracted.

In my opinion it is desirable that a vigorous effort should be made by the Provincial Government to reduce the expenditure below the level of the income, to discharge all the existing liabilities, and to employ the annual surplus, which would be the effect of these measures, in prosecuting the most useful Public Works.

EXTRACT FROM A DESPATCH OF THE RIGHT HONORABLE LORD STANLEY TO SIR WILLIAM COLEBROOKE.

Downing Street, 30th June, 1842.

However convenient may have been the practice of discussing separately each individual Resolution of the Assembly in regard to expenditure by the Council, I cannot but observe that, although it increases the control of that body over the general expenditure, it does not in any way give to the Executive the power which it is so desirable it should possess of restricting improvident or corrupt grants of money. * * * * *

At the time the compromise was made, for such it was, the Crown did possess this check by the union of Legislative and Executive Councils. The check was imperfect as compared with that which is given by British practice, because there is no single authority to whom is delegated the care of taking one broad and comprehensive view of the whole financial state of the Province, and proportioning before hand the annual expenditure to the probable Revenue, or on the other hand devising means for making the annual Revenue adequate to the annual necessary expenditure. I think the absence of such a system has led to much of the financial embarrassment which is now felt in the Province; and, without entering on the question of Municipal Bodies or District Taxation, it strikes me very forcibly that, if local objects are to be provided for, not by local taxation, but out of the general funds of the Province, there is an additional reason why recommendations of such expenditure should proceed from one, and that an impartial, authority alone.

ACT VACATING SEATS OF MEMBERS.

EXTRACT OF A DESPATCH FROM THE RIGHT HONORABLE LORD STANLEY TO SIR W. M. G. COLEBROOKE.

[No. 87.]

Downing Street, August 11, 1842.

The Act No. 1408, to vacate the seats of Members of the Assembly in certain cases, was passed, as I collect from your own Despatch, and from the Reports of the Attorney and Solicitor General of New Brunswick, for the purpose of bringing the Law of that Province into correspondence with the Law of England. To an enactment on this subject, fully carrying that principle into effect, Her Majesty's Government would entertain no objection.

* * * * *

I should have supposed that the words "Public Works," as employed in this Act were used as synonymous with the words "Government Works" had it not been that Government Works are mentioned immediately afterwards as the subject of an additional and distinct provision.

It appears also by the third clause, that, during the recess of the Assembly, the Speaker is to direct the issuing of Writs on vacancies of this kind ; that is, the Speaker must find and adjudicate on the fact that the vacancy has arisen. Here again is a material innovation on the Law of England. The Speaker of the House of Commons is invested with this power in the case of death vacancies, because in that case the fact to be found is one in which it is scarcely possible to suppose that a controversy could in any case arise, and because no question of Law can ever be involved in it. But the House reserves to itself the important constitutional privilege of adjudicating on all questions of vacancy by acceptance of office and Government contracts : and I am not aware of any reason to suppose that it was the deliberate purpose of the Assembly of New Brunswick to divest themselves of an authority, apparently so essential to the exercise of their important functions.

For these reasons I apprehend that Her Majesty's Government will best conform to the probable wishes of the House of Assembly themselves, by requesting that House to resume the consideration of this Act. If it is really the case that it does not accomplish the designs of its authors, they of will course be not merely willing but prompt to correct any errors into which the framers of the Law may have fallen. It is almost superfluous to say that Her Majesty's Government are at all times most reluctant to advise the disallowance by the Queen in Council of any Act passed by the Legislature of New Brunswick, and rather than resort to such a measure, we are content that, notwithstanding the objections I have pointed out, the Act should remain in force until it shall have been brought under the revision of the Provincial Legislature.

EXTRACT FROM THE OPINION OF THE LAW OFFICERS OF THE CROWN.

20th October, 1842.

As to the observations of Lord Stanley, we have to observe, that we think His Lordship is not aware that all Works in this Country, coming under the denomination of Public Works, are in fact carried on by monies granted by the Legislature from the Public Funds, and expended by Commissioners appointed for that purpose by the Executive, and therefore are, in strictness, Government Works, and are what was meant by the term Public Works, used in the Act ; and although the terms "Government Works" are also used in the Act as applying to works under that denomination, distinguished from what are termed Public Works, this we conceive was intended to apply to such Works as might be carried on in the Colony by Government, from funds not provided by the Provincial Legislature. At the same time, we think the Act is very loosely and indefinitely worded in this respect, and requires amendment.

As to the provision, giving to the Speaker the power of adjudicating in the recess on what Seats are vacated under the Act, and for issuing Writs for a new Election, without first bringing the subject under the consideration of the House, we quite agree with His Lordship in the observations he has made

made on this head; and this is a highly objectionable provision in the Act, and certainly calls for reconsideration by the Legislature, and we can see no objection to Your Excellency calling the particular attention of the Legislature to this or any other of the provisions of the Act, at their next meeting, when it will of course undergo a more deliberate consideration.

CANAL BETWEEN BAY OF FUNDY AND GULPH OF SAINT LAWRENCE.

SIR,—Having in pursuance of the intimation made to you in my Despatch, No. 17, of the 30th November, readily taken into consideration the mode of giving effect to the proposed Survey of the line of Canal between the Bay of Fundy and the Gulph of Saint Lawrence, I have now to inform you that at my request the Master General and Board of Ordnance have selected Captain Crawley of the Royal Engineers for this service; it being considered that an able Civil Engineer could only be obtained on such terms as would leave very little of the sum at your disposal applicable to the expenses of the Survey.

I transmit to you herewith the copy of a letter from the Inspector General of Fortifications to the Secretary to the Master General, suggesting that, exclusive of the travelling expenses which would, I presume, be defrayed by you at once, Captain Crawley's pay, subsistence and allowance, should be discharged by the Board of Ordnance, the Province reimbursing the Board the amount so expended. Having, on the faith that you possess ample authority and ample funds at your disposal, acquiesced in the above suggestion, I have only to instruct you to act upon the pecuniary arrangements proposed by the Inspector General.

SIR,—In returning the enclosed correspondence relative to the contemplated Survey for a Canal between the Bay of Fundy and the Gulph of the Saint Lawrence, I have, in consequence of the Master General's Order of the 28th ultimo, had communication with Captain Crawley, who is at present employed at Chatham, under an impression that he would be well qualified for the duty, and as he has expressed his wish to be named for the employment, I submit his name for the Master General's approval.

I infer this to be intended as a special duty not under the Ordnance, and therefore being a Colonial work and not of a Military character under the Commanding Engineer, the Officer, I presume, should be placed in communication with the Colonial Office, for the purpose of being sent to the Civil Governor of New Brunswick, in compliance with his letter of the 25th February last.

In respect to the pay that this Officer should receive during the time that he is employed on this duty, which it may be well previously to consider, it should not be less than if employed under the Ordnance, with the Command pay of his rank, vide margin,* exclusive of course of his travelling expenses, which cannot be now stated; and it would probably simplify the business, and be much more convenient to the Officer, if the Ordnance were to pay him in the first instance, and the amount reimbursed from the Colony or Colonial Office, the same as is done with the Officers lent to the Admiralty, &c.

I have to add that Captain Crawley, with the Master General's sanction, will be prepared to obey such orders as he may receive for his communication with the Colonial Office.

GREAT ROAD TO CANADA.

APPLICATION OF SURPLUS CIVIL LIST FUND TOWARDS, AND SURVEY OF, BY CAPTAIN CRAWLEY, R. E.

EXTRACT FROM THE DESPATCH OF THE SECRETARY OF STATE TO THE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR OF NEW BRUNSWICK.

Downing Street, 18th June, 1842.

Having, since my Despatch of the 16th instant, received from the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury an answer to the reference which I had made to them on the subject of the Address of the House of Assembly of New Brunswick; praying that Her Majesty would permit the surplus of the Civil List fund to be applied towards the completion of the Great Line of Road from Nova Scotia to Canada, and having offered the Queen my advice upon that subject, Her Majesty has commanded me to signify to you Her pleasure, that you acquaint the House of Assembly, in answer to their application, that any general appropriation from the Civil List fund would not be sanctioned, without specific information as to the amount of the surplus which will remain at the disposal of Her Majesty's Government, and as to the demand to which such surplus ought to be liable.

* * * * *
From the proceedings which I have taken for the purpose of securing the services of Captain
Crawley,

Crawley, you will at once understand that I concur with you in thinking that before any such advance as that which has been contemplated by the Address of the House of Assembly would be sanctioned, (supposing the funds to be forthcoming,) a previous competent survey of the whole line of Road, accompanied by a full estimate of the sums required for the completion of it, and a Report as to the state and sufficiency of the portions already executed, would be absolutely indispensable. But as funds are apparently not provided for this service, I have to suggest to you the propriety of calling the attention of the Provincial Legislature, at the earliest practicable period, to the expediency of making the necessary arrangements for that purpose.

SIR,—I am directed by the Postmaster General to state, that after a careful perusal of the Reports of the Commissioners of Enquiry into the Post Offices of British North America, His Lordship has come to the conclusion, that the period is now arrived at which it will be expedient to place in the hands of the officers administering the Government to Her Majesty's Provinces in that quarter, under certain limitations, the patronage hitherto exercised by yourself as Deputy Postmaster General under his Lordship's authority in (Canada, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward's Island,) and that having communicated with the Lords of the Treasury on the subject, their Lordships have concurred in the arrangement.

It is accordingly to be understood, for the future, that all first appointments, excepting the situations of Deputy Postmaster General, Accountant, and Surveyor's Clerks, should it be found necessary to appoint them, the privilege of nominating to which will still be retained by the Postmaster General, will be vested in the Governor or Lieutenant Governor of the Province; but that the promotions will still be made by you, subject, however, to the confirmation of the Postmaster General, to whom each case must be reported as it occurs.

With reference to the term "first appointments," it must be understood that under this head are classed the appointments of Clerks upon their first entrance into the service, all Postmasters and Way Office Keepers, as well as those of all Conductors, Guards, Messengers, Porters, Letter Carriers, Stampers, and Office Keepers; those of the Deputy Postmaster General, Accountant, and Surveyors, and their Clerks, if appointed hereafter, to which I have above alluded, being the only exceptions. Couriers, too, who are paid by fixed salaries, where the service is not put up to public competition, (as Mail contracts and Riding work contracts are in this Country,) are to be regarded in the same light.

The regulations to be observed with respect to promotion are founded upon the same principles as those in use in this Country, which are as follows:—

Each Department must be considered as a separate Establishment, whether it be the office of the Deputy Postmaster General, that of the Accountant, or of the Chief or other Post Office of the Province. A Clerk therefore in your own office, should not be removed into the Accountant's office, if a vacancy occurred there; but the vacancy in the office of the Accountant should remain at the disposal of the Governor, the appointment to be filled up being that of the junior, the other officers being promoted by you, if properly qualified for the situation.

If those next in succession are not properly qualified, the Deputy Postmaster General for the time being will be required to give in to the Governor or Lieutenant Governor the names of the two or three other parties in other Departments, who are properly qualified, when the vacancy will of necessity take place in that office from which the individual qualified has been promoted.

It must be also clearly understood, that the Deputy Postmaster General will not hereafter be entitled to promote a Postmaster from an inferior to a superior Postmastership.

When

When a vacancy occurs therefore in a Postmastership at any particular place, the Governor or Lieutenant Governor, as the case may be, will appoint a new Postmaster at that place where the particular vacancy has arisen; and should a person, already acting as a Postmaster, whether in the same or another Province, be appointed to the vacant office, the vacancy occasioned by such a proceeding will be filled up by the Governor or Lieutenant Governor of the Province, in which the vacancy occasioned by the recent appointment may exist.

As Clerks form a distinct class, if a vacancy arises amongst them, application must be made to the Governor for another Clerk as a successor, as the vacancy must not be filled up by the Deputy Postmaster General from the Stampers or Letter Carriers.

Stampers and Letter Carriers will be considered as forming a separate class, the Deputy Postmaster General therefore may promote Letter Carriers to the situations of Stampers; in such cases the vacancies to be filled up by the Provincial Authorities will be the situations of Letter Carriers.

To protect the Department, as far as possible, against the appointment of incompetent persons, a certificate must be given by the head of the office, at the expiration of three months, that the individual nominated is qualified to fill his situation; the term may however be extended to six months at the pleasure of the then Deputy Postmaster General.

A bond must also be required, upon the appointment of every person, whatever may be the situation, the amount of which, however, will be fixed by the Postmaster General in England, who will consult the Governor of the Province as to the sum which may be most consistent with the customs and feelings of the country.

To enable you to carry out these regulations, I herewith enclose copies of the forms used in this Department.

Form No. 1, to be filled up by the various Postmasters throughout (Canada, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward's Island,) upon the occurrence of a vacancy in the situations of the Clerks, Conductors, Messengers, Stampers, Letter Carriers, Foot Passengers, Couriers, Guards, &c. connected with their office, and which must be transmitted by them to you immediately the situation falls vacant.

Form No. 2, being a Report of the vacancies of Clerks, Letter Carriers, Runners, &c. as well in your own Department as throughout (Canada, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward's Island,) and which must be filled up by you weekly, and forwarded to the Governor or Lieutenant Governor.

Form No. 3, being a Report of the vacancies of all Postmasterships and Receiverships throughout (Canada, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward's Island,) to be dealt with in the same manner as the preceding form.

CRIMINAL LAWS.

EXTRACT OF A DESPATCH FROM LORD STANLEY TO SIR WM. COLEBROOKE.

[No. 96.]

Downing Street, 30th August, 1842.

I have had under my consideration five Acts passed by the Legislature of New Brunswick in the months of March and April last, and transmitted in your Despatch, No. 61, of the 14th of June last, entitled—

(No. 1421) "An Act to amend the Law relating to the punishment of offences:"

(No. 1422) "An Act to amend the Law relating to Burglary:"

(No. 1423) "An Act further to amend the Law relating to offences against the person:"

(No. 1424) "An Act to amend the Law relating to Robbery:" and

(No. 1425) "An Act to amend the Laws relating to burning or destroying Buildings and Ships."

The last four of these Acts have been framed with the intention of assimilating the Law in New Brunswick, on the subjects of them, to the recent amendments in the British Law made by the Acts 7 W. 1, and 1 Victoria, c. 85, 86, 87 and 89, with which they agree very closely. I observe however that where the British Statute has the punishment of transportation for life or imprisonment for not more than three years, the Colonial Act substitutes *imprisonment for life*, or not less than three years.

I do not find in the English Act any clause corresponding to the 10th of 1425, which provides that every punishment by this Act imposed on any person maliciously committing any offence, shall equally apply and be enforced, whether the offence be committed from malice conceived against the owner of the property in respect of which it shall be committed, or otherwise. The intention of this clause appears unexceptionable, but it is not very precisely worded. I apprehend it was intended that, if the offence be committed from malice conceived against any person, it shall be immaterial whether that person be the owner of the property or not; but as it is worded it would seem to imply that malice is not essential to the offence, which is at variance with both common justice and the letter of the foregoing enactments.

SIR,—I have the honor to return the enclosed extract from a Despatch of the Right Honorable Lord Stanley, under date of 30th August, 1842, transmitted to the Solicitor General and myself, in your note of September 22d, containing His Excellency's commands for a further report on the Acts in question.

As those Acts were prepared to be presented to the Legislature, under the particular direction of his Honor the Chief Justice, I considered it most advisable to communicate your letter with the extract from Lord Stanley's Despatch to him, and I have now the honor to enclose the observations which the Chief Justice has made relating to the same, which, I presume, will preclude the necessity of anything more from the Solicitor General or myself on that subject.

The British Statutes referred to by Lord Stanley, impose the punishment of transportation for life, or for a period not less than a specified number of years, generally fifteen, or imprisonment for not more than three years. The Provincial Acts under consideration drop altogether the punishment of transportation and substitute imprisonment; and, in analogy to the provision of the British Statutes in respect to transportation, it was thought expedient, with regard to the higher offences, to limit the discretion of the Court to a term of imprisonment below which there would be no power to reduce the punishment.

The 10th section of the Act No. 1425, also commented upon by Lord Stanley, is copied from an enactment in the Canadian Act, relating to the malicious injuries to property, passed in 1841, under the administration of the late Lord Sydenham, (4 & 5 Vic. cap. 26, sec. 25,) and it is conceived that the necessary construction of the clause would be to consider malice as an essential ingredient to the offence, but not to confine it to malice conceived against the owner of the property.

ACTS ON THE HIGH SEAS.

(Circular.)

Downing Street, 16th December, 1842.

SIR,—The attention of Her Majesty's Government has been recently called to various Laws enacted in the British Colonies, for the prevention, regulation or punishment of acts done on the High Seas or on the Seas within one league of the Colonies in which such Laws have originated. After consultation with the Queen's Advocate and the Attorney and Solicitor General, Her Majesty's Government have adopted the following conclusions on the subject.

When the operation of a Colonial Act is confined to a range, not exceeding one league from the shore, and relates to matters of local interests, the regulation of which by local enactment is indispensable to the welfare of the Colony, no objection will be made to such an Act, on the ground that the local range and extent of its operation exceeds the limits of the jurisdiction of the local Legislature; examples of such Acts are those relating to Pilotage, to Quarantine, to Custom Duties, and to Fisheries.

But if a Colonial enactment be made to take effect on the High Seas, at a distance exceeding three miles from the shores of the Colony, that is, if it shall propose to regulate, to prevent or punish any acts done on shipboard beyond those limits, such enactments will be null and void. In what manner acts of that kind may be disposed of by Her Majesty is a question on which no one inflexible rule can be laid down; but it may be stated as a general rule, that the Queen will in no case be advised to confirm or sanction any such enactments.

I have thought it necessary to impart this information to you, that in the enactment of Laws in the Colony, under your government, your authority or influence may be used to prevent the infringement of the general principles to which I have adverted.

SIR,—In compliance with an order from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, I enclose copies of certain instructions relating to the charges on Newspapers, Journals, Pamphlets, &c.. sent by Mail to any part of the Provinces, and have also to inform you that such charges have been in practice for many years, by order of the Deputy Post Master General. Copy of a Communication from the Honorable Thomas Baillie, Surveyor General, in reference to the state of the Crown Lands in the Province, accompanied by Abstracts shewing the estimated state of Lands occupied by Squatters and others.

These Documents being read at the Clerk's Table, are as follow:—

Crown Land Office, 5th January, 1843.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

I consider it my duty to bring under Your Excellency's notice the present state of the Crown Lands in this Province.

The number of persons, now holding Lands, for which they have paid one or more instalments, amount to about (600) six hundred. The quantity of Land possessed by these people, and locked up from other purchasers, is little short of one hundred thousand acres, (100,000 acres) and the sum due to Government is about £12,000.

Many of those purchasers not resident on the Land are, I have no doubt, well able to pay one or more instalments, but so long as no measures are adopted to collect the sums due, so long will they remain careless of the matter, retaining the Land until some fortuitous circumstances shall render them valuable and available for speculation in opposition to the Crown sales. Many of the Purchasers, on the other hand, are, I believe, actually settled on and improving the Lands, and would, if urged, be able to pay an instalment in the course of some months. Others again have, I have reason to believe, left the land or the Province, and have given up all idea of completing the purchases by the payment of the remaining instalments; and some, if called upon either to complete their purchases or resign the land, forfeiting the payments made, would gladly avail themselves of the latter alternative.

Another class of persons who will require some action of Your Excellency are those who, for some years past, have addressed the Lieutenant Governor in Council, and who agreeably to the regulations were called upon to deposit one pound on presenting the Petition at this Office. The number of these persons, who have still left their money in deposit, amounts to no less than 1590 or thereabouts, and little doubt can be entertained that they are in possession of the Lands so applied for, which, taking the

the average at 100 acres each, will present an aggregate of 159,000 acres thus illegally held by these people.

Another class of trespassers are those who, without having deposited any money, have taken possession of Crown Lands, and are now actually settled upon the same. The number of those persons may, at the lowest calculation, be estimated at 1600, which, allowing 100 acres (and I believe many of them claim much more) will give the aggregate of 160,000 acres illegally occupied.

Taking, therefore, the value of these Lands thus held as it were in defiance of Government, as they are in breach of every regulation which has been made, and estimating their value only at 3s. per acre, the sum of which the Crown is deprived is somewhat startling, and will be perceived better by reference to the enclosed Table. But allowing that each person shall only be allowed to hold 50 acres, and dividing the two latter sums by two, a large sum appears, which could with proper management be made more or less available to the Province.

That some expense may be incurred, and some difficulty experienced in carrying out any measures which may be thought necessary to reduce this evil and convert it into a benefit, not only to the Province, but to the parties themselves, must of course be expected; but whether delay will not increase the evil till the hands of the Law will scarcely be strong enough to deal with it, must also be considered and weighed on the other hand.

And having thus brought the subject before Your Excellency, I consider that I have performed the duty required of me, and I shall be ready to obey whatever instructions I may receive from Your Excellency on this most important subject.

MINING COMPANIES WESTMORLAND AND GLOUCESTER.

(Copy.)

[No. 70.]

Downing Street, 6th June, 1842.

SIR,—Among the series of Acts passed by the Legislature of New Brunswick, during their Session of 1841, was one (No. 1372) for incorporating the Westmorland Mining Company.

This Act incorporates a Company for the working of Mines, with a proposed capital of only £25,000, in 1000 shares of £25 each, of which only 25 per cent. is required to be paid up within three years of the passing of the Act.

According to the present practice of Legislation in this Country, and the course of proceedings adopted by Her Majesty's Government, the privilege of incorporation would not be granted to this Company either by Act of Parliament or by Charter, inasmuch as neither the purpose of the Company nor the amount of capital required is such as to render a large association of persons necessary for carrying it into effect.

I am not, however, prepared to state, that, in the Province of New Brunswick, which is but thinly peopled and has but a limited supply of capital, the rule should be acted upon so strictly as in this Country. But in the Act now under consideration, I perceive the absence of all regulations for the management of the affairs of the incorporation, and of all provisions enabling its creditors to have a remedy against the individual Shareholders, to the extent of the capital subscribed for, but not paid up.

These omissions, however, have so little relation to the general interests of the public, that it has not been thought necessary on their account to withhold the Royal Assent from this Act, but on the contrary, Her Majesty to confirm it, leaving it to the Provincial Legislature to lay down some general rules, either by way of enactment or as standing orders, applicable to Acts incorporating Trading and other Companies.

I enclose an order, passed by Her Majesty in Council on the 3d instant, leaving the Act in question to its operation, as also the Atlantic Assurance Company, Act No. 1373.

EXTRACT OF A DESPATCH FROM LORD STANLEY TO SIR WM. COLEBROOKE.

[No. 95.]

Downing Street, 27th August, 1842.

I have had under my consideration the Act (No. 1388) of the Legislature of New Brunswick, transmitted in your Despatch, No. 57, of the 27th May last, entitled “ An Act relating to the Mines and Minerals in the County of Gloucester.”

The operation of this Act being suspended for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure, you advise that it should be confirmed, because it is desirable to encourage persons employing capital in the development of the natural resources of the Province. Fully acceding to the accuracy of that general opinion, I yet cannot but regard, as open to serious doubt, the applicability of it to the present case.

The object of this Act is to set aside, in favor of Mr. Wm. Stevens, one of the most important provisions of the Provincial Statute, 8 Geo. 4th, cap. 1, sec. 5, for the support of the Civil Government of New Brunswick. By that section it is provided that any grant, lease or assurance of any description of Crown property, unless made upon sale or rent to the highest bidder at a Public Auction,

shall be utterly void and of no effect. It is obviously of great importance to adhere with the utmost possible strictness to this enactment. No exception should be admitted unless the most conclusive grounds can be alleged in support of it. In the present case it therefore remains to enquire what are the grounds on which the proposed exception proceeds.

Stevens bought the right of exploring for five years an entire County in New Brunswick, in order that he might discover the measures best suited for his mining operations. Those operations were then to be carried on for a period of fifty years; but the five years of exploration having nearly terminated, and Stevens having been disappointed as to the result of his experiments in different places, petitioned the Legislature to prevent the right of exploring and mining in any part of that County from being again put up to auction. His apprehension was, that, in the event of any such auction taking place, he would be out-bid by other projectors. To this application the local Legislature have assented, and have passed the present Act, by which the original term of the exclusive right of exploration has been enlarged from five years to ten.

It appears to me difficult, if not impossible, to distinguish the case of Wm. Stevens from that of any other person, who, having purchased the Territorial Rights of the Crown at auction, may have been disappointed in the hopes with which they made such purchases. He miscalculated the benefit to be derived from his contract; but if in his case such a miscalculation entitles him to an indemnity at the public expense, on what principle could a similar indulgence be refused to any other purchaser who had engaged in an unsuccessful speculation. The hopes of the buyers, whether well or ill founded, would thus virtually be made the measure of their claims, and no contract could be considered as final until it had been first ascertained, whether the expectations of the purchaser had been fulfilled or not.

Further, it must be remembered, that the exclusive privilege of exploration was sold for five years; and it may reasonably be concluded, that the shortness of the term deterred and prevented an effective competition which might have been raised at the auction, could it have been then foreseen that this comparatively short term would afterwards be doubled by an Act of the Legislature. Consequently the Public Treasury would, by the present Act, be deprived of the advantage of a real and fair competition for the property in question.

With regard to the advantage of promoting the application of capital to mining in New Brunswick, the following dilemma would seem inevitable: Either there are, or are not, persons ready to compete with Stevens at a new auction for the sale of this privilege. If there are such persons, the advantage in question will be secured as fully by adhering to the existing law, as by making the proposed gratuitous donation to him. If there are not such persons, then by adhering to the existing law, he will sustain no prejudice, and a public principle of great importance will be maintained inviolate.

To these objections to this Act your Despatch furnishes no answer; and of course I cannot but attach so much weight to the authority of the local Legislature in favor of the measure, as to distrust any conclusions of my own when opposed to it. But so considerable would appear the weight of the difficulties which I have stated, that I have thought it right to postpone submitting any advice to the Queen, as to the manner in which this Act should be disposed of, until I shall be in possession of your answer to this Despatch.

Fredericton, N. B. 30th September, 1842.

MY LORD,—In pursuance of the instructions contained in your Lordship's Despatch, No. 95, dated August 27th, I communicated it to the Executive Council at a late meeting of the Board, and having taken it into consideration, I have the honor to report the result of their opinions and my own on the subject.

The great difficulty experienced in regard to the various Bills of a local nature, which have received the support of the Council and Assembly, have been the passing of them on the direct application of the parties to the Assembly, and on information exclusively of a private nature, the Government not possessing the means of pursuing such enquiries, as would have enabled it to form an accurate judgment of the case. Where lands were applied for, they were laid out by making the boundaries generally, and described with reference to their situation, and the timber growing on them; and latterly leases of the coal measures have been disposed of, but the search of metals did not till lately attract much attention.

A Geological Survey of the Province was undertaken by Dr. Gesner in 1838, under annual grants of the Assembly, which were discontinued in the last Session; and as he had not examined the northern District of the Province, I directed him, during his recent exploration of the Restigouche River, censorily to examine the Mines of the County of Gloucester, and his report, of which I enclose a copy, is the first authentic information I have attained on the subject.

The Act relating to Mines and Minerals in the County of Gloucester was passed, under the representations made by Mr. Stevens of the necessary expenses he had fruitlessly incurred, during the five years in which he held the exclusive privilege of mining in that District; and although it was not likely that he would have been exposed to competition at a public sale of the privilege, he seems to have considered that the passing of a local Act would enable him to raise the capital required in his future operations, with greater facility than he could otherwise do.

As the Act under which he now enjoys these privileges will have expired before the one now under consideration could come into operation, the Executive Council concur with me in thinking, under all the circumstances of the case, that it would not now be desirable to renew it. From the report of Dr. Gesner, I am led to form a high opinion of the mineral wealth of the District, which I hope in the next year may be fully explored, and if it should be found advisable to offer the same privileges

privileges at public sale, or subject it to limitations, Mr. Stevens will doubtless be able to purchase them on terms that would be fair and reasonable. In the mean time, he has secured the exclusive privilege of working the Manganese Mine, which he has successfully opened.

To Dr. Gesner the Province is already indebted for drawing attention to the value of its Coal fields, and its quarries of Granite and Lime Stone; and if the Assembly should appreciate the advantage of completing his Geological Survey of the Province, it may not be necessary to depend on individual speculators for discovering the resources of the Province; and the privilege of working Metallic Mines, as well as those of Coal, will be readily purchased by them, when their existence has been ascertained.

Leases of the privilege of mining within the limits of four square miles has been sold in the southern Coal Districts.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

I beg leave to submit the following remarks on the Mines of Gloucester, in compliance with Your Excellency's instructions.

About five years ago the Gloucester Mining Association obtained from the Provincial Government a Lease of all such Mines and Minerals as they could discover and work, during the term of five years, in the County of Gloucester, which County has since been divided and now forms the Counties of Gloucester and Restigouche. The Lease extends to the term of fifty years; five years were allowed for discovery and the opening of the Mines.

The five years allowed for exploration have nearly expired. During that time the Association has spent much labour and money in searching for Copper Ore at the mouth of the Big Nipisiguet River, and in boring for Coal eighteen miles below Bathurst, at a place called the Capes.

In both of these enterprises the Corporation has been unsuccessful, notwithstanding the great perseverance of their agent, Mr. William Stevens.

In searching for a lode of Copper on the Tettagouche River, an Ore of Manganese was discovered two years ago. As this Ore is of a superior quality and will probably be found abundant, the attention of the Association has been directed to it, and while a further search for Copper is still going on, the Mine of Manganese has been opened and is now worked.

This Mine is situated eight miles from Bathurst, on the east bank of the Tettagouche River, where the Ore is obtained by striking levels into the side of a cliff one hundred and fifty feet high. At this spot there is a fall in the River of twenty five feet, and the water has been ingeniously turned to propel powerful machinery, which is now used in breaking and cleaning the Manganese.

A considerable quantity of Ore has been sent to England, where the price is from ten to twelve pounds Sterling per ton. About a hundred tons are now ready to be shipped.

Copper and Lead Ores have also been found in different parts of the Counties of Restigouche and Gloucester, but at present neither of these Ores are worked.

The outlay of the Association has been made in searching for Copper, by striking levels, boring for Coal, making a Road to the Tettagouche Mine, eight miles, and in erecting machinery for cleaning the Ore and other mining purposes at the Falls.

The Association also sent out Mr. Henwood, an excellent Geologist, to examine a part of the District.

I am of the opinion that the Association has expended fifteen thousand pounds in mining and other operations, for which they have as yet received but a very small return. Their enterprise is deserving the highest credit, and they have already greatly contributed to the improvement of this part of the Country.

The County of Gloucester is evidently one of the best mining Districts in the Province. The Granite and Older Slates are here in contact, and the principle rocky Deposits resemble those of Cornwall, in England. Copper, Lead, Manganese, Iron and Coal have already been found, and it is probable that future discoveries will be made which will be generally advantageous to the Province.

RELIEF TO SEAMEN BY BRITISH CONSULS AT HAVANA AND PORTLAND.

SIR,—I transmit herewith the copy of a Letter from the Assistant Secretary of the Treasury, with its enclosures, relative to the expenses incurred by Her Majesty's Consuls at the Havana, and at Portland, in the United States, for the relief of distressed Seamen belonging to Vessels owned in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

As Her Majesty's Government are of opinion, that the expense of affording succour to destitute Colonial Seamen should not be charged on the funds of this Kingdom, but should be defrayed from the revenue of the Colony to which these Vessels may respectively belong; I have to instruct you, if there be no means of enforcing re-payment from the owners, to apply to the Provincial Legislature for a grant to cover the amount expended in the relief of the men belonging to the Queen, of Saint John, New Brunswick.

SIR,—A letter having been addressed to me by the Secretary of the Admiralty on the 23d of April last, relative to the expenses incurred by Her Majesty's Consul at Havana, on account of the Crew of the “ London Packet” of Halifax, I am commanded by the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury to transmit to you a copy thereof, of its enclosures, of the minute thereon, and of a reply from Viscount Canning to the communication directed by that minute to be addressed to him.

I have further to transmit to you a copy of a subsequent letter from the Secretary to the Admiralty, relative to the expenses incurred by Her Majesty's Consul at Portland, in the United States, in relieving the crews of the *Globe*, of Halifax, and of the *Queen*, of Saint John, New Brunswick, as well as of a specification of the charges referred to in this last mentioned letter, which has been obtained from the Lords of the Admiralty; and I am to request that you will submit these documents to Lord Stanley, and move his Lordship to apply to the Governments of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, to repay the expenses incurred on account of the Crews of vessels appertaining to those Colonies, as suggested in Viscount Canning's letter of the 24th ultimo.

I am at the same time desired to request you will point out to Lord Stanley that their Lordships can discover nothing, which could warrant the proceeding of Lord Falkland in drawing the Bill upon the Consul at Havana, dated 30th April, 1841, which is referred to in the enclosures to Sir John Barrow's letter of the 23d of April, 1842; and had Her Majesty's Consul at Havana declined to accept that Bill, their Lordships conceive that Lord Falkland would have been held personally liable for the charges usually attending the non-payment and return of a Bill.

Statement explanatory of the payments for the travelling expenses of British Subjects, forming the 4th Article of the Account Current.

The *London Packet*, Captain Harvey, having been shipwrecked on the opposite side of this Island, I received the Crew on their arrival at the Havana, on board Her Majesty's ship *Romney*. The expense of the journey of the Crew across the Island was originally paid by Captain Harvey, and was not refunded by me at the time; neither was the passage of the Crew from hence to Halifax, on

on board the Blue Rose, of Halifax, paid by me at the time. But Lord Falkland, the Governor of Nova Scotia, having paid this last item, and drawn on me for the amount, I thought myself bound to honor his Lordship's draft for the £44, which forms the Voucher, No. 27.

In like manner Captain Harvey, on his return to this Island, applied to me to refund him the \$60 he had paid for the travelling expenses of the Crew of the London Packet from Batabano to Havana, and I should be glad to know whether it is my duty to do so.

The item, No. 2, \$13,4 is for refreshments for the Crew of the London Packet on their arrival at Havana, for the portage of their effects from the Rail Road, by which they arrived, to the wharf, and for boat hire from the wharf to the Romney.

The succeeding items are for payments arising out of the imprisonment at Matanzas, of James Armstrong, the Mate of the "Stephen Binney," of Halifax, Weddeford, Master, then at Matanzas, where there is no resident British Consul.

Having received a letter from the consignee, Mr. Burham, an American Merchant at Matanzas, announcing that Armstrong was to be left behind in prison at my disposal, I thought it my duty to proceed there in person to inquire into the circumstances, and having ascertained that there was no good reason for Armstrong's imprisonment, I procured his liberation. But Weddeford having persisted in refusing to receive his Mate on board the "Stephen Binney," I brought him back with me to the Havana, and placed him on board the Romney, until an opportunity for his removal should present itself. The item, No. 3, is for my own travelling expenses in going to Matanzas and in bringing Armstrong back, for the particulars of which, including various petty outlays, it was not possible to obtain vouchers. But for the item, No. 4, the passage money of James Armstrong from hence to Halifax, a receipt will be found in the voucher, No. 28.

It appears to me however that the greater part of the items, included in the present statement, may possibly be recoverable from the owners of the vessel in question; the expense in the one case having been occasioned by the shipwreck of the London Packet, which was probably insured, and in the other by the misconduct of Captain Weddeford, who has in consequence, I am informed, been removed from the command.

SIR,—In reply to your letter of the 18th instant, I am directed by the Earl of Aberdeen to state to you, for the information of the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, that, in His Lordship's opinion, the charges incurred by Her Majesty's Consul at Havana, for the crew of the London Packet, of Halifax, and for his own expenses in proceeding to Matanzas, should not be paid from the Parliamentary grant of Consular contingencies.

The relief granted by British Consuls to British Seamen, is given under printed instructions from the Admiralty, which instructions, in the opinion of Lord Aberdeen, are sufficiently clear and imperative to require Consuls to relieve British Seamen, whether natives of the United Kingdom, or of British Colonies; and if, as now appears to be the case, the Admiralty desires that British Consuls shall not charge to the Admiralty the amount of relief granted to British Seamen belonging to Her Majesty's Colonies, instructions should be sent to Her Majesty's Consuls not to relieve such Seamen; but until the Admiralty request, that such instructions may be given to Consuls, it is clear that Consuls should be allowed to charge such relief to the Lords of the Admiralty.

Lord Aberdeen is however of opinion that the amount should be recovered from the Colony.

SIR,—Her Majesty's Government having had under their consideration the representations on the subject of the projected alterations of the Import Duties both in the United Kingdom and in the Colonies from the Legislature of New Brunswick, as well as from various bodies interested in the Trade of the Province, which accompanied your Despatches of the numbers and dates in the margin.

I now proceed to explain to you, for the information of the parties interested, the conclusion to which Her Majesty's Ministers have come, in reference to those representations.

Her Majesty's Government cannot but regret the unfavorable apprehensions which are entertained by the Petitioners as to the probable effect of these measures, and in which to some extent you appear to participate; but they trust that a closer examination of the changes which are proposed will lead to a more favorable estimate of their probable results, and although I do not feel called upon, on the part of the Government, to enter into a detailed and argumentative exposition of the subject, I am nevertheless induced to hope that the general observations, which I propose to make, may be found useful in removing erroneous impressions and allaying exaggerated fears.

The contemplated changes in the Imperial and Colonial Tariffs appear to affect New Brunswick in three, and only three important particulars, viz.: The Trade in Wood with the West Indies; the Trade in Fish with the West Indies; and the Trade in Wood with the United Kingdom. With respect to the Trade in Wood with the West Indies, I admit that possibly some falling off may take place in the export of Shingles, Staves and Headings to the West Indies, but these appear to form a very inconsiderable portion of the New Brunswick Wood Trade, as appears from the following Table:

The remainder of the Wood Exports from New Brunswick, as derived from information which I have, no reason to doubt, is not likely to be affected by the competition of the United States, who are themselves obliged to resort to New Brunswick and Canada for this commodity, and who, from the gradual diminution of their own Timber, will become more and more dependent upon the British North American Provinces for their supplies.

With respect to the Trade in Fish with the West Indies, although Her Majesty's Government have with a view to satisfy the just claims of the West Indian population, recommended the substitution of a duty upon Fish in lieu of the present prohibition, yet, in fixing that rate of duty, regard has been had to the protection and encouragement of the British North American Fisheries, as well on account of their importance as a nursery for Seamen, as also because of the monopoly hitherto enjoyed by British North American Colonists, an abrupt transition from which, into an unprotected competition, might lead to much individual loss and inconvenience.

In estimating, however, the comparative facilities of the United States and New Brunswick, for carrying on Fisheries, I do not believe any thing either in reference to the proximity of the Fishing grounds, the cost of building or fitting out Ships, the ordinary rate of wages, or the aptitude of the people for this species of employment, which would lead to the supposition that the United States have any superior advantages over New Brunswick, or that the proposed protection of 15 per cent. is not amply sufficient, or that there are any other circumstances which would call for a larger increase of protection to the British North American Fishermen than is accorded to other branches of the industry of those Colonies.

I am aware that, in the United States and France, high duties are imposed upon the produce of the Fisheries of this country, and that the system of bounties is still kept up with a view to the support of their own Fisheries.

Her Majesty's Government, however, conceive that those high duties must be deemed to be an admission on the part of the countries imposing them, that they are themselves apprehensive of the competition of the British Fishermen in their own markets; and it has been stated by parties who have urged upon the Government the adoption of a higher rate of protection to the British Fisheries, that such apprehensions are actually entertained. If there be any ground for such apprehensions, there can be little cause for the petitioners to fear lest Foreign Fish would, to any serious extent, compete with British Fish in the West India Markets, protected as it will be by the proposed duty, and, notwithstanding the privilege in the nature of a bounty or protection proposed to be continued to the British Fisheries, of importing, duty free, the principal articles required for their employment.

With

With respect to the Wood Trade with the United Kingdom, I perceive that whilst the petitioners have dwelt upon those portions of the proposed changes which they conceive to be unfavorable to the Colony, namely, the diminution of the difference between the duties imposed upon Baltic and British North American Timber, they have omitted to notice the reduction amounting very nearly to abolition of the duty upon Colonial Timber, which will necessarily give increased facilities to the importation of this article into this Country, and, by admitting of a reduction of price in respect of the reduced duty, will tend to increase the consumption, and thus cause a reaction upon the price favorable to the importer, and keep up or increase the employment for the shipping engaged in this branch of commerce.

The advantage of this will be more especially felt in that class of Wood which is more peculiarly the produce of British North America—the Yellow Deal; and which, in fact, meets with no very effective competition from the Baltic Timber, in consequence of being applied to different purposes, for which the Yellow Pine of New Brunswick is preferred, both from its superior fitness and its lower price to the consumer.

Her Majesty's Government considers also that the addition of 2s. per 50 cubic feet on Foreign Deals, to the duty of 36s. as at first proposed, and the five per cent. additional duty to which Timber will be liable, and which, although inappreciable upon the Colonial Duty, amounts to 1s. 6d. per 50 cubic feet upon Foreign Timber, should not be lost sight of in the endeavour to form a just estimate of the Tariff proposed to Parliament.

If the Petitioners give due weight to these considerations, Her Majesty's Government trust that they will eventually be of opinion, that whilst the alterations in the Timber Duties will be found of very great advantage to the consumer in this Country, the Timber Trade of New Brunswick will, so far from declining, be placed in a more sound condition, and with greater prospects of increase than under the existing Tariff.

It is moreover not immaterial to observe, that whilst the Forests of the British North American Provinces are as yet unexhausted, and to a great extent untouched, the great demand which has for a series of years existed for the Fir Timber of the Forests on the Continent of Europe, particularly of Poland, has led to a material diminution of the supplies to be obtained in the immediate vicinity of the great navigable rivers; and that consequently, it is becoming gradually necessary to derive them from the most distant points, thereby increasing the cost of bringing them to the point of shipment, and thus tending to create an additional demand for the cheaper article imported from British America.

With these views and anticipations, Her Majesty's Government cannot participate in the fears expressed by the Petitioners in reference to the apprehended loss of value in Wharfs, Mills, and other similar establishments in the Colony—the want of employment of their labouring population,—the decline of the Maritime Commerce, or the injury to the general welfare of the Colony.

Her Majesty's Government are disposed to believe, that these apprehensions are founded upon estimates of the probable prices of Timber, drawn from the prices of that article at the present moment, which are unusually low, in consequence of the depression of the Timber Trade, owing to general causes; and they venture to hope, that the proposed opening of the British Ports to Foreign and Colonial produce generally, at much lower duties than heretofore, will materially tend to revive all branches of Manufacturing and Commercial industry, and that the Timber Trade will not only participate in that revival itself, but derive collateral advantages from it, both as respects price and demand.

I would, in conclusion, remark, that the measures contemplated for the encouragement of various articles of the agricultural produce of the British Colonies, if passed into a Law, may be expected, at no distant time, to become of increasing importance and value to the growing population of New Brunswick, whose industry cannot permanently continue to be so exclusively applied to the business of lumbering as at the present moment.

REGULATION OF THE TRADE OF THE BRITISH POSSESSIONS ABROAD.

I also enclose, for your information, the copy of a Despatch which I have addressed to the Governor of Canada, explaining the policy by which Her Majesty's Government has been governed, in recommending to Parliament the adoption of the important changes in the Laws affecting the Trade of the Colonies, which are sanctioned by this Act.

SIR, I transmit you herewith an Act of Parliament, 5 and 6 Victoria, c. 49, which received the assent of the Crown on the 16th ultimo, entitled "An Act to amend the Laws for the regulation of the Trade of the British Possessions abroad," and I have to request that you will take the first opportunity of communicating copies of this Act to the Provincial Legislature of Canada.

Her Majesty's Government having undertaken soon after their accession to office, the revision of the Laws by which the commerce of the United Kingdom is governed, felt it to be their duty to consider with equal care, the regulations bearing upon the trade of the Colonies; and having it in view, the experience which has now been obtained of the Legislation, promoted by the late Mr. Huskisson, and some of his successors in office, and being satisfied with its results, their object has been to give fuller effect to the spirit in which that Legislation was conceived. They have applied themselves therefore to remove restrictions upon Colonial industry, to bring the provisions of the Imperial Law more and more into accordance with the spirit of the Declaratory Act of 1778, and to afford new practical recognitions of the principle of equality and impartiality, in the dealings of the Imperial Legislature with the Colonial Possessions of the Crown. The Act now sent to you is the fruit of these endeavours, and I trust that the Legislature and the Inhabitants of Canada will find in it enactments calculated to be of essential advantage to their commerce, and to afford them relief as consumers of imported goods.

I do not propose to recapitulate the substance of the Act in all its provisions, but I wish to call your attention, in the first place, to the repeal of the Duties under the Acts 4 Geo. 3, c. 15, 6 Geo. 3, c. 52, 14 Geo. 3, c. 88, on Pimento, Molasses, Wines and Spirits, respectively.

I trust that in the repeal of these Duties the Legislature will perceive and appreciate the desire of Her Majesty's Government to maintain the principle of the Declaratory Act already alluded to, and to confine the enactments of the Imperial Legislature, even as respects the imposition of Import Duties, within the narrowed limits which are compatible with the due regulation of the Commercial Interests of the Empire at large. I am desirous also to bring under your notice a comparison of the Table of Prohibitions, Duties and Exemptions in the 4th and 7th Sections, with those of the Possessions' Act applying to the like articles.

You will observe that the ad valorem Duties on Foreign Glass and Silk manufactures are reduced from 20 and 30 per cent. respectively, to 15 per cent; those on Foreign Linen, Leather, and Paper manufactures, and on Clocks and Watches, from 30 to 7 per cent; those on Foreign Cotton manufactures, Tobacco and Soap, from 20 to 7 per cent; and those on unenumerated articles, from 15 to 4 per cent; whilst salt Fish of foreign taking or curing, instead of being prohibited, is admitted at a duty of 2s. per cwt. Foreign Oil, Blubber, Fins and Skins, also prohibited under the previous Act, are admitted on a duty of 15 per cent. ad valorem; Cocoa that was charged 5s. per cwt. is admitted at 1s. per cwt., and the prohibitions and restrictions which were applied to the importation of Tea, otherwise than from the United Kingdom or from British Possessions, or under certain specified conditions, are exchanged for a duty of 1d. per pound.

Her Majesty's Government are sensible that objections may be raised in Canada and New Brunswick to the provisions of this Act, in reference to the important article of Foreign Lumber as tending to injure them in supplying the West Indies with one of their staple exports. Her Majesty's Government earnestly trust that such may not be the unfavorable result of the recent Legislation. Having regard to the fact that the United States are themselves compelled to resort largely to the British Provinces for a supply of wood, it is not hazarding too much to state that the exemption of Foreign Lumber does not appear likely to injure the British North American Trade in this article with the West Indies.

The duty of 5s. per barrel upon Foreign Wheat Flour, and 12s. per cwt. on Foreign salted or cured Meat, which were imposed by the Possessions' Act, were attended by this peculiarity, that they did not extend to Canada, where Wheat Flour and Salted Provisions were altogether exempt from duty. The object of granting this exemption to Canada was to draw this species of produce from the North Western States of the Union down the River Saint Lawrence to the Atlantic. But these articles being imported into Canada, not for her own consumption, but for re-exportation to the West Indian and other Colonial Markets, the effect was, to give Canada the benefit of a transit Trade at the expense of those Colonies. These duties are now reduced to 2s. per barrel in the case of Wheat Flour, and to 3s. per cwt. in the case of Meat, and to correct the unfair operation of the Law which I have described, the reduced duties are extended to Canada, equally with other Colonies, whilst at the same time, in the new measures for the regulation of the Trade of the United Kingdom, important advantages have been given to the Salted Provisions of Canada in the markets at home, which it is hoped will fully counterbalance any supposed disadvantages arising from the other change.

Her Majesty's Government desire to observe, that under the 37th and 38th clauses of the British Possessions' Act, 3 and 4 Will. 4th, cap. 59, which are unrepealed by the Act of this Session, any articles may be entered at any frontier Port of Canada, without payment of Duty, and may be delivered to be passed on to one of the Warehousing Ports, under Bond for the due arrival and warehousing of such Goods at such Port. The existing exemptions would relieve parties from the observance of these Regulations, and from any charges attending their fulfilment in respect to the articles to which they apply. Her Majesty's Government, however, question whether those exemptions ought not to be extended to other articles besides Flour and Salt Meat, and they think that if the Saint Lawrence is really to compete with Erie Canal, the freedom which it offers should extend

to all articles embraced by the export trade of the Agricultural States of the West, and not merely to a selection from any of them.

If therefore it should appear of more importance to the inhabitants of Canada to retain or to receive and extend the power of transmitting the produce of the United States, without the restrictions of the Bond now required, down the Saint Lawrence, than to enjoy the privilege of exporting their own produce to other British Colonies, with such advantage as the differential duties imposed under the new Act may afford them. Her Majesty's Government have no desire to place the commerce of Canada, by Imperial Legislation, under restrictions, further than as they are required by a due regard to the equal rights of the inhabitants of the other possessions of the Crown; and therefore they would readily consider the expediency of proposing to Parliament to remove the duties now laid on the introduction of Flour, Salted Meat, and any other article of Agricultural produce into Canada; at the same time, however, placing the same articles, when exported from Canada to other Colonies, upon the footing with respect to duty, of foreign produce at the Custom Houses of those Colonies, and requiring proof of their Canadian origin as a condition of their privileged admission into the country.

Her Majesty's Government are most willing, independently of the suggestion which has been just made, to entertain any plan for giving further facilities to the transit of the produce of the United States by way of the Saint Lawrence, in case it should be considered that a system of branding Packages, or any other mode, would be more simple and satisfactory for the purposes of commerce, than a compliance with the provisions of the present Law. It is necessary that I should here advert, on the part of Her Majesty's Government, to the state of the duties on the importation of refined Sugar into Canada, as they will stand under the new Law, and the Act passed by the Provincial Legislature in its last Session for consolidating the duties on Customs.

This latter Act imposes a duty of 2d. per pound on all refined Sugar imported into the Province, the effect of which will be to absorb altogether the impost laid by the Possessions' Act of the 3d and 4th Will. 4th, upon foreign refined Sugar, and to place it upon an equal footing with Sugar refined in England.

The present Law imposes a duty of 10 per cent. ad valorem, which would probably be rated at ½d. per pound on Sugar refined in Bond in England, when exported to the Colonies, and a duty of 20 per cent. ad valorem, on all foreign refined Sugar, and these duties are to be charged over and above any duty which may be leviable on the article by Colonial Act, irrespective of its origin.

The effect, therefore, of the enactment will be to give to the English refiner in Bond, a bona fide advantage in the Canadian Market of ½d. per pound over his foreign competitor, by the mode of addition to the Colonial duty, which would probably raise it to the amount of 2½d. and 3d. per pound, in the two cases respectively.

Under these circumstances it appears to Her Majesty's Government to be a question for the Provincial Legislature to consider, whether these duties may not be greater than it may be desirable to place on the article, and, if that should be their view, they may probably be disposed to reduce the Colonial duty on all refined Sugar from 2d. to a smaller sum.

Her Majesty's Government further wish that the attention of the Legislature should be directed, at its approaching meeting, to the Law respecting the importation of Tea, as they are under the impression that it will be found advisable, with a view to the prevention of contraband trade, to make a reduction of the duty of 3d. per pound now payable under the Provincial Act.

An additional duty of 1d. upon Teas, not imported from China into the United Kingdom, is chargeable under the new Law; but Her Majesty's Government are apprehensive that a charge so high as 1d. per pound, upon an article so portable, will prevent the advantage, which, among others, it is hoped to realize by the change now proposed, in putting a stop to the illicit introduction of Tea along the Canadian frontier from the United States.

From a general review of the provisions of the Act which I am considering, it will be seen that the attention of Her Majesty's Government and Parliament has been directed, not only to the relaxation of restrictions, but also to the removal of such indulgences and exemptions in favor of some Colonies, as rendered the Law unjust in its bearings upon others.

But whilst Her Majesty's Government have been anxious to correct every thing that was unequal in the operation of the Law, and to do what in them lay to relieve the Colonist from burthensome imposts, they are aware that consideration, apart from any obligations imposed by Act of Parliament, may make it in some instances impossible for the Colonies to profit by the relief proposed for them. In particular Colonies, the Revenue derived from some of the duties imposed by the Possessions' Act, or from duties of similar amount otherwise imposed, may be indispensable as ways and means for carrying on the public service. The degree to which the Colonial Revenues may or may not be affected by the changes of the Imperial Law, in particular cases, must be matter of much uncertainty until determined by experience, and it may be requisite in some instances to provide beforehand for a contingent deficiency, and perhaps to impose by local Acts, a part, or even the whole of the duties now repealed: but if this should be necessary, the abolition of the duties repealed by the present Act, and the substitution of the simple Tariff which it establishes, will enable the Colonial Legislature to frame a scale of Colonial import duties of a convenient character, and will relieve the commerce of the Colony from the inconvenience which necessarily resulted to importers, from the complex provisions and doubtful construction of the previous imperial Acts. I have therefore to request that you will invite the attention of the Legislature of Canada to the fiscal bearings of the present Act, and acquaint them that in thus confining the operation of the Imperial Law to a narrower range, and enlarging the sphere of Colonial Legislation in matters of commerce, Her Majesty's Government are

assured

assured that the local authorities will bring to that Legislature a judgment at once enlightened by local knowledge, and guided by a just sense of what is due to public credit, and to the maintenance of a proper provision for the wants of the public service. In inviting the attention of the Colonial Legislature to this important subject, you will bring under their especial notice the principle involved in the 10th Section of the present Act, by which you will observe that the duties thereby imposed are differential duties in favor of the produce and manufactures of the United Kingdom and its Possessions, and that while the Colonial Legislature are left at liberty to fix, subject to Her Majesty's approval, such rates of duty upon all imports as they may think necessary for purposes of Revenue, the effect of the section, above referred to, is to maintain discriminating duties in all cases, at least equal to the duties imposed by this Act.

With a view to give time to the local Legislature to make any arrangements which shall appear to them to be expedient, previously to the commencement of the new Act, its operation is postponed by the 1st Section, so far as the British Possessions in North America are concerned, to the 5th July, 1843.

SIR—I transmit to you herewith, the copy of a Letter which I have received from Sir R. A. Ferguson, covering a memorial addressed to myself by Messrs. James Corscaden and Company, claiming the return of £45 10s which the Captain of the "Creole" was obliged to pay in Saint John New Brunswick, as double Head Money on his Passengers, in consequence of his papers from the Custom House at Londonderry having been irregularly made out, as it appears from the accompanying copy of a report from the Colonial Land and Emigration Commissioners, to whom I had referred these papers, that there was no intention on the part of the owners of this vessel of committing a fraud on the Revenue.

I have to desire that you will take the necessary steps for repaying to them the sum demanded, should you consider them justly entitled to it.

That your Petitioner sailed with his vessel, the Creole, from Londonderry, on the 7th day of May, and arrived in the Harbour of Saint John the 12th day of June, 1842, having on board—161 adults—22 under 14—21 under 7—7 under 1—Passengers in all,* who were shipped with the sanction of Her Majesty's Government, a Certificate of which was signed by the Collector of Her Majesty's Customs at Londonderry, with permission for one of the Clerks to fill up the blank which required a description of the various Passengers on board.

That your Petitioner accompanied the said Clerk on board, to examine if the list of Passengers was correct.

That in consequence of there not being any Ink on board at the time, the necessary Certificate was filled up with Pencil, and that in consequence thereof, the Provincial Treasurer could not consider the said Certificate as an official document, and exacted from your Petitioner double the amount usually taken for Head Money on Passengers arriving at the Port of Saint John; said additional Head Money amounted to the sum of forty five pounds ten shillings; and inasmuch as your Petitioner will have to accompany this Petition with a correct Certificate of the sanction of Her Majesty's Government for conveying the said Passengers, and being conscious of no intention to do wrong or evade the Laws of the Realm, your Petitioner humbly prays your Excellency and your Honors will take the premises into consideration, and cause the said sum of forty five pounds ten shillings to be refunded to your Petitioner; and as in duty bound will ever pray.

SIR,—With reference to your letter of the 25th August, transmitting to us a memorial from Messrs. Corscuden, and directing us to enquire into the statements which it contained, we have the honor to state for Lord Stanley's information, that we have delayed our report, because our Agent at Londonderry was unable till within a few days past to make the necessary enquiries into the case, in consequence of the absence of the chief officer of Customs from that Port.

In the memorials of the owner and master of the Creole, a vessel which sailed from Londonderry to New Brunswick in the month of May last, it is stated that after the Collector of Customs had signed the list of Passengers, and certified that they were proceeding under the sanction of Her Majesty's Government, a description of the Passengers was added to the same list, and was inserted in pencil;—That this insertion in pencil was considered by the Colonial Authorities to have vitiated the certificate, and that consequently double head money was charged upon the Passengers, as authorized by the local Act, in cases where Emigrants had not left this Country with the sanction of the Government. The prayer of the memorial addressed by the owners of the vessel to Lord Stanley, is, that one half of the head money amounting to £45 10s., may be restored to them, as no fraud was intended.

From the report of our Agent, at Londonderry, we find that the Collector of Customs was ignorant of any insertion in pencil having been made in the certified list of Passengers by this vessel. Some irregularity has certainly therefore been committed in this respect, at the same time it appears that the number of Passengers on board when the vessel cleared, was short of the number allowed by Law, and that no more are stated in the memorial to have landed at Saint John than embarked at Londonderry. This latter fact we are enabled to corroborate by the ship returns from the Government Agent at New Brunswick, who further reports that the vessel arrived in good condition, and that no complaints respecting her had been made. Upon a consideration of the case the Collector of Customs has expressed his opinion that there was no intention of fraud on the part of the owner. In this view we concur, and as we believe that the expression of the Passengers being shipped under the sanction of Her Majesty's Government is intended to convey no other meaning than that the provisions of the Passengers Act have been complied with, and that there was no intention on the part of the chief officer of Customs to withhold his sanction, we think it would be right that the portion of head money which had been exacted at Saint John from the master, upon the supposition that that sanction had not been obtained, should be repaid. At the same time, as it will have to be repaid by the Province of New Brunswick, and was levied by order of the Authorities there, who have made no report to this Country on the subject, we would venture to suggest that it would be right to transmit the case as it at present stands, to the Lieutenant Governor, for his consideration, and in order that he may take the necessary steps for repaying to the parties the sum demanded, should he concur in thinking them justly entitled to it. We accordingly return the memorial of the owners, and a copy of the report from the Government Emigration Agent at Londonderry.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 21st instant, enclosing a copy of a Petition to the Right Honorable Lord Stanley from the owners of the Barque Creole, and conveying to me His Excellency's directions to report thereon.

In compliance therewith, I have the honor to state that the Barque Creole, James Clarke, Master, reported at my office, from Londonderry, on the 15th June last, with 164 adult passengers, 22 under fourteen years of age, and 21 under seven years, equal to 182 full passengers, on which I demanded and received from the said James Clarke, the extra passenger duty of 5s. per head, in conformity to the opinion of Her Majesty's Attorney and Solicitor General, given on a former occasion, viz:—That in case the Master of a Passenger Vessel did not produce from the office of Her Majesty's Customs at the Port of clearance, a certificate that he had the sanction of Her Majesty's Government to bring passengers, the extra duty of five shillings each was to be demanded for every passenger on board. There was a certificate of this nature written in pencil, and as the Master stated, by a young man from the Custom House, on board his vessel, when under weigh; the certificate bears the signature of Thos. Shepherd, Collector, written in ink. I did not at the time, (and I am of the same opinion still,) consider that a document such as is above described, was sufficient to relieve me from the liability to a surcharge of the extra passenger duty; it certainly was not official, even admitting the Master's statement of it, and there was nothing to shew that it had not been rubbed out and re-written on the voyage.

"The same documents shew a decrease of the Revenue of last year as compared with the Revenue of the preceding year, amounting to £61,719 17 6.

"From

"From the Crown Land Office Returns, it appears that there are claims against individuals for Land and Timber, amounting to £48,666 3 3, exclusive of transactions where instalments have been forfeited, and the Lands reinvested in the Crown.

"The heavy public liabilities at present existing, have arisen during a protracted period of Commercial embarrassment, from the unprecedented decrease of the Revenue, and from the inability of individuals to pay their debts due to the Province.

"The balance now due for Public services, and for which the Province is paying interest at six per cent. appears to be £80,841 8 6;—and for the purpose of relieving individuals to whom money is due, many of them being at present in a suffering condition, your Committee would respectfully recommend that a Loan be negotiated in England for £80,000, Sterling, and that a Bill for such purpose be passed by the Legislature, securing a portion of the Revenue for the half yearly payment of the interest, and the gradual redemption of the principal.

"Your Committee are of opinion that a Loan, guaranteed by the Province, could be obtained at four per cent. interest, which would, in addition to the payment of debts due to individuals, be a saving of £1,600 per annum.

REINSTATEMENT OF THE HONORABLE THOMAS BAILLIE IN OFFICE OF SURVEYOR GENERAL.

EXTRACT OF A DESPATCH FROM LORD STANLEY.

[No. 101.]

Downing Street, 24th September, 1842.

Three years have nearly elapsed since Mr. Baillie tendered to Sir John Harvey the conditional resignation of his Office. His terms were that he (Mr. Baillie.) should obtain a retired allowance, to be assigned to him by Her Majesty's Government, who were to determine what was the amount of the allowance to which he was entitled. On these terms Sir John Harvey accepted the resignation, and Mr. Baillie's successor was appointed provisionally; that is, he received the Office, subject to Mr. Baillie's right to be reinstated in it, in the event of the non-fulfilment of the conditions already mentioned.

Now, in point of fact, the condition on which Mr. Baillie's resignation was thus tendered and accepted has never been fulfilled.

Concluding as I do from the whole of this very voluminous correspondence, that Mr. Baillie's final retirement from Office would be welcome to the House of Assembly, and that if he should retire

on a Pension of £600 per annum, the arrangement would involve no increased charge to the Provincial Revenue; I should be happy to learn, that, with the concurrence of the House of Assembly, you had been able to effect such an arrangement.

But I do not think it just that, pending the deliberations of the House on the question, still less in the event of their unfavorable reception of it, Mr. Baillie should continue out of Office. We have no right to exact from him the prolonged forfeiture of his interest, when we are unable to fulfil the conditions subject to which his resignation of it was made and accepted. Your proper course of proceeding therefore will be, immediately on the receipt of this Despatch, to propose to Mr. Baillie to reinstate him in the Office of Surveyor General of New Brunswick, at the salary at which he last held that place, subject to the condition of his finally resigning it, if the Assembly shall authorise Her Majesty's Government to grant him a retired allowance for his life, of not less than £600 per annum.

If Mr. Baillie shall consent to accept his Office on these terms, you will immediately re-appoint him to it.

EXCHANGE OF LAND IN FREDERICTON WITH ORDNANCE DEPARTMENT.

Fredericton, 23d May, 1842.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

I have the honor to return the enclosed papers on the subject of the contemplated exchange of two Plots of Ordnance Ground in Fredericton, for other Land in that place laying between the Barracks and the River Saint John, with a part of Carleton Street, referred to me by Your Excellency for an opinion, whether the same cannot be effected “under the provisions of the Act of the General Assembly authorizing the Crown to reinvest itself of Lands owned by individuals when required for Military purposes, on making compensation for the same,” and I have to state that the provision of that Act does not in any way reach this case. The Land required by Government is not the property of any individual. It is ground reserved by the Grant from the Crown for the public use of the Town of Fredericton, and embraces two public Streets, which cannot be stopped up, except authorized by some Legislative enactment.

The propositions for the projected exchange, (if I am rightly informed) originated in the first instance in the suggestion of a number of the inhabitants of Fredericton, upon which it was referred for the sanction of the Board of Ordnance in England, and being approved of, a Bill was prepared and laid before the General Assembly to carry the arrangement into effect, but it failed in consequence of a Petition against it from certain influential individuals in Fredericton who were adverse to the measure.

But I am inclined to believe should it be again brought forward in the General Assembly at their next meeting, and recommended as an Executive measure, it would pass for the purpose.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge your letter of the 16th instant, relative to certain Town Lots applied for by the Mechanics' Institute, and claimed on behalf of the Ordnance Department, and I am directed by the Lieutenant Governor to inform you, that the permission temporarily given to the Institute to occupy the allotment was intended to obviate compliance with an application for permission to erect a Building on the vacant ground situate between the Barracks and the River, which would have proved inconvenient to the Military.

That as there is a desire to have the question as regards these Lots settled, and an objection to converting them into a Fuel Yard in the centre of the Town, and a strong objection to closing up Carleton street, which could only be effected by an Act of the Legislature, which would be opposed by the inhabitants, the Lieutenant Governor in Council is disposed to offer to the acceptance of the Ordnance Department such portions of the ungranted lands as it is competent for the Government to grant without an Act, namely, the ground between the Military reserve and the River, keeping open the Streets and the Landings, the Board of Ordnance relinquishing its claim to these six lots and the detached Hospital lot. I am also directed to transmit to you the enclosed sketch taken from the original Map of the Town, attached to the grant, and to inform you that orders have been given that the temporary fence put up on the six lots by the Members of the Mechanics' Institute should be removed.

SIR,—I have been prevented from acknowledging your letter of the 25th October last, on the subject of the proposed exchange of lots in Fredericton, by the necessity of bringing the matter again under the consideration of the Executive Council, an opportunity for doing which did not occur until the 2d instant; and I am now instructed to repeat the proposal contained in my former letter, namely, that the Council will agree to transfer the land lying in front of the Military Blocks, reserving the Streets established by Law, in exchange for the six lots in Block No. 3, and the Hospital lot, if agreed to by the Board of Ordnance; but beyond this, the Executive Government have no power to negotiate without an Act of Assembly.

I transmit to you a sketch, shewing all the land in question, with the reserved Streets and Public Landings, together with a copy of a memorandum from the Surveyor General, and an extract from the original Grant of the Town. By this Grant, which was passed prior to the occupation of any ground

ground in the Town by the Military, excepting the two blocks expressly reserved for their use, you will observe that those blocks are limited as delineated on the plan to three chains in width, but for what particular reason I am unable to state.

The fence put up round the six lots, has, since the date of your letter, been removed.

EXTRACT FROM THE LETTER OF COLONEL CALDER TO MR. READE.

With regard to the exchange of the six plots of ground referred to in this letter, with that on which the old Hospital stood, for other ground between the Barracks and the River, together with the part of Carleton Street which now divides the Barrack ground into two parts, as proposed in the memorial of the inhabitants transmitted to the Colonial Secretary of State by Sir John Harvey, I can, with respect to Carleton Street, assure Your Excellency, the communication with the River, in case of fire, will not be interrupted. The entrance to the Barrack Yard would be from Queen Street and another Gate opposite in the fence next the River, which the Officer Commanding would direct to be opened whenever it was necessary.

But as I am not prepared to say to what extent the Master General and Board may be pleased to limit the quantity of ground to be ceded to them by the inhabitants, I beg to suggest that the parties interested be required to transmit to me, through His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, a proposition on the subject, which I shall forward through the proper channel for consideration.

SIR,—In doing myself the honor of acknowledging your letter of 19th ultimo, (received on the 29th) relative to certain Town Lots in Fredericton, which "have been held by the Ordnance Department since the first settlement of the Province," as stated in the Petition of the Freeholders and others, inhabitants of Fredericton, to His Excellency Major General Sir John Harvey, K. C. B. in April, 1838, and lately applied for the Mechanics' Institute, I have to express my regret that other pressing duties prevented my going into the correspondence which has at different times taken place between the Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick, on behalf of the inhabitants of Fredericton, the Secretaries of State for the Colonies, and the Master General and the Board of Ordnance, relative to the exchange of Lots 41 to 46 in Block 3, for other ground belonging to the Town, lying between the Barracks and the River Saint John, which I considered necessary before I could with propriety forward for the consideration of the Master General and Board, the proposition of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in Council contained in your letter.

By this correspondence I find that as far back as the year 1826, the proposition of exchange was entertained, and an application to that effect made by Sir Howard Douglas, and that in January, 1827, the Master General and Board of Ordnance "directed that the ground be not given up, unless a further space of ground be given to the Ordnance in exchange for the Lots 41 and 46, than that between the Barracks and the River, the Barrack ground being so confined as not to admit of the Buildings which may be required for Military or Civil purposes, and for which the Lots proposed to be surrendered are particularly eligible."

It was again brought before the Master General and Board in September, 1828, and in November following the Board "assented to the exchange, provided the Ordnance property should run uninterruptedly to the River."

In 1829 a proposition was made to give up the part of Carleton Street which divides the Barracks, for the site of the old Hospital.

In 1838 Sir John Harvey forwarded to the Colonial Secretary of State "a Petition from the Freeholders and others, inhabitants of Fredericton," (signed by upwards of 200 householders and others, principal inhabitants of Fredericton,) "praying that the six Town Lots and the site of the old Hospital might be given up for the improvement and embellishment of the Town, in exchange for the ground lying between the Barrack Blocks and the River, with the water privileges thereto belonging;" or, if their application should fail, stating "their willingness to pay a fair equivalent in money for the said Lands;" which Petition was submitted by Lord Glenelg to the Master General and Board, with a recommendation "that Sir John Harvey's proposition should be acceded to, if not inconsistent with

with the public service;" to which exchange, the Master General and Board, under date the 23d January, 1839, apprize Lord Glenelg "that they assent on the condition that the tenure of the whole Barrack ground be unreservedly made in fee to the Ordnance, and that the Grant includes the Street which intersects the present Barrack Lots, as well as those to be granted, and on the understanding also, that no expense whatever shall fall upon the Ordnance Department in consequence of this arrangement, (as it does not originate with the Master General and Board,) beyond the cost of the fence to enclose the Land to be retained by it."

In April following, "a numerous meeting of the inhabitants of Fredericton, duly and legally called by the High Sheriff, upon written application of sundry Freeholders," took place, "to take into consideration the propriety of their assenting to the applying for an Act of the General Assembly, authorizing the Board of Ordnance to enclose the whole of the land in front of the present Barracks, extending from the Landing Place at the end of Regent Street to the Landing at Phoenix Square, including the part of Carleton Street that now lies between the Barracks; upon condition, &c., according to the terms proposed by the Board of Ordnance in their Despatch of 23d January, 1839."

"The High Sheriff being called to the Chair, and Mr. Baillie having offered his services as Secretary, the Petition, &c. being read, it was Resolved that the proposition from the Honorable the Board of Ordnance be acceded to, upon the terms and conditions therein contained, agreeably to the Plan before the Meeting."

"That a Committee be appointed to prepare a Bill embodying the terms and conditions of the proposed exchange, &c. and also, that Mr. Wilmot, Mr. Fisher and Mr. Gregory, be a Committee to prepare the Bill for the purpose of carrying the above Resolutions into effect."

I have thus recited for the information of His Excellency Sir William Colebrooke, the substance of the several proceedings in the matter to which I have access, and from them I do not apprehend the Master General and Board will change the opinion they so often came to, and adopt the suggestion contained in your letter, which they formerly rejected. I will, however, thank you to mark on the Extract from the Grant Plan of the Town of Fredericton you sent me, and which I enclose for the purpose, the specific grounds referred to in your letter.

I perfectly coincide in the decision made by the Master General and Board, and which I may add was also the opinion of Sir Howard Douglas, relative to Carleton Street—it would throw the whole Barrack ground into one uninterrupted enclosure, which is desirable in a Military Establishment for discipline, and also render it more eligible, if the disposition of such Buildings as it may become necessary to erect for Military or Civil purposes, while the inhabitants will be insured "an easy and unobstructive access to the River Saint John both in Summer and Winter," through the enclosure in case of fire.

In making this communication on a subject which I conceive to be of mutual importance to the Inhabitants of Fredericton and the Military stationed there, (and which I should be happy in being the means of bringing to a satisfactory conclusion,) may I presume to enquire if there be any thing connected with the original Grant to shew why the Blocks "reserved for Barracks and other Military uses," were limited to three chains in depth, while all the other Blocks are five, although there was nearly sufficient space between Queen's Street and the Bank of the River to make them of the same width, and which would have given them originally the space now offered by the Town to the Board of Ordnance; if not, may it not with some appearance of truth be surmised that they were confined in depth, in order to leave the latter for the use of the Town in consequence of the Crown at that period also occupying by Barracks, Block 7;—if so, when the Government of New Brunswick disposed of the latter otherwise in 1811, it should at the same time have provided ample accommodation for the Military Establishment deemed necessary to be kept at Fredericton.

With reference to the last paragraph of your letter, I beg to state that it has been reported under date the first instant, that the fence put up on the six Lots by certain inhabitants of Fredericton had not been removed.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge your letter of the 8th instant, with its accompanying paper; the sketch I herewith return for further explanation and amendment, it being necessary to have the proposition of the Lieutenant Governor and Council fully and decidedly shewn on this document, before it is forwarded to the Inspector General of Fortifications for the consideration of the Master General and Board of Ordnance.

1. On examination of the sketch, you will find the letters C. C. E., if intended for reference, it should be given; if not, they should be removed from the drawing.
2. As none of the sketches which accompanied the propositions, formerly brought under the consideration of the Authorities at Home on the same subject, shew a street between the Barrack blocks and the River, and as that street is not marked on the original plan of Fredericton, it will save a question from Home if the broken lines intended to mark it on the sketch be removed.
3. The discrepancy between this sketch and those formerly sent Home, which I have marked in pencil at the north and east landing places, should be corrected.
4. The ground proposed to be given up to the Ordnance, and said to be "shaded yellow," is requested to be shewn distinctly in that colour.

5. Permit me to add, that if any landing places are to be retained in front of the Military blocks, the proposition of the Council quoted in your letter does not allude to their reservation.

I beg to thank you for the copy of the Surveyor General's memorandum you were good enough to send me, on which it is unnecessary to make any further remark than as a certain number of years undisturbed possession gives a right of property to a private individual, it may be presumed the same right must be extended to the Crown; hence I do not see how the Surveyor General can make the occupation he refers to, which has existed since the first settlement of the Province, encroachments.

I shall transmit the proposition of the Executive Council by the first packet, after receiving the annexed plan, but cannot hold out any hope of a favorable answer, it being virtually the same as was submitted to the Master General and Board, by Lord Glenelg, on the 5th June, 1838, and which was agreed to on the 23d January, 1839, upon condition that "the grant includes the street which intersects the present Barrack lots," and with relation to which the Secretary of State for the Colonies signified to the Board in April last, "that a report has been received from the Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick, by which it appears that the exchange alluded to cannot be effected without the consent of the local Legislature, but that the Lieutenant Governor proposed to recommend the subject for their consideration in the next Session," in consequence of which, the Board directed the enclosure of the six lots for a fuel yard to be postponed.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter dated 29th ult. transmitting a corrected plan of the ground at Fredericton proposed to be given up to the Ordnance, for the six Town Lots, and the old Hospital Lot; the portions on which shaded yellow you state "comprise all that the Governor and Council have power to exchange without an Act of Assembly."

In reply, I beg you will acquaint His Excellency, that I must respectfully decline forwarding this proposition to the Inspector General of Fortifications for the consideration of the Master General and Board, the ground it offers in exchange being considerably less than that they declined accepting in 1827, and from the correspondence which has taken place on the subject between 1826 and 1839, I do not see how I can take upon myself the responsibility of forwarding any proposition, short of that contained in the Petition of the Inhabitants forwarded through the Lieutenant Governor, and submitted by Lord Glenelg for the favorable consideration of the Master General and Board in 1838, and acceded to by them on certain conditions on the 23d January, 1839, under the impression that "the question had been minutely gone into by the several authorities at New Brunswick," and its being an exchange not sought by them.

With respect to the extract of the Act of Assembly establishing the Public Landing (19th March, 1827,) and the copy of the Record of the Street called Campbell Street, (13th January, 1831,) which you have attached to the corrected plan, permit me to observe, that if they are hindrances to carrying into effect an exchange that would be extremely advantageous to Fredericton and its inhabitants, it was ill timed (if the Petitioners were sincere in their application) to have them passed, pending the negotiation with the Ordnance: the former, after the Board's decision of January, 1827, must have been known; the latter, five years subsequent to the first proposition for an exchange being made by the inhabitants, who have themselves only to blame in having caused these additional obstacles to the accomplishment of their wishes, though by their proceedings in 1838 and 1839, it would seem they did not consider them of any consequence.

"The Lieutenant Governor lays before the House, copies of three Reports from the Emigration Agents at Saint John and Fredericton, for the year 1842.

The Reports communicated by the aforesaid Message, being read at the Clerk's Table, are as follow:—

EMIGRATION.

Government Emigrant Office,

Saint John, New Brunswick, 2d January, 1843.

SIR,—I have the honor to acquaint you, for the information of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, that the number of Emigrant arrivals in the Province during 1842, is eight thousand three hundred and twenty nine, exclusive of desultory inofficial migrations through Prince Edward's Island, Nova Scotia, and the United States, as per accompanying return. A gratifying feature manifested itself in this immigration, in the general state of health in which they arrived, there being fewer cases of sickness or casualties amongst them than I ever witnessed, in proportion to numbers; the details of which were duly transmitted in the prescribed returns; many proceeded immediately into the interior to join their friends, with a view of permanently settling there.

Since the report which I had the honor of submitting to the Lieutenant Governor on the 10th July last, nothing has yet occurred in the general affairs of the Country to induce more flattering prospects of demand (for a time at least) for immigrant labourers: when however, the reaction in business at Home shall have realized steps of permanent improvement, (now so auspiciously begun,) then, and not till then, will its beneficial effects be sensibly felt amongst all industrial classes here; for we cannot conceal from ourselves that such has been the extent of exhaustion in the monetary and other resources of the many, that it must be a work of some time to redeem their condition. In the present state of depression and distress here, the debt of thankfulness, of immigration and humanity, is due to His Excellency Sir William Colebrooke, for it is to his timely intervention with the Right Honorable the Colonial Secretary of State, that an accumulating torrent of Emigration was stayed at Home. Had they reached this Province, it could only have been to augment the body of misfortune now heavily pressing on the community. These expressions are, you will perceive, Sir, inapplicable to another class of Immigrants, whom it is most desirable to have in the Country—I mean a rural population, composed of solvent yeomanry and small farmers, with sufficient means to make permanent settlements.

The rates of wages and prices of provisions for the past quarter, are indicated in the Quarterly Abstract, for the Provincial Secretary's Office. It is a source of deep regret that there is no Board of Works to employ Immigrants.

SIR,—In obedience to the commands formerly received, I transmitted to the Provincial Secretary's Office the Abstract Account of Immigration here for 1842, for the information of the Right Honorable the Colonial Secretary of State; and I have now the further honor to submit to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, a communication recently made to the Commissioners for the Colonial Land and Emigration, being extended but collateral observations to the remarks in the forwarded printed official category. A gratifying feature in the Emigration of last year was the comparatively healthy state, in proportion to numbers, in which the parties arrived here, which is in a great degree attributable to the salutary measures of the Colonial and Emigration Departments. The intervention of Sir William Colebrooke with Lord Stanley, to check the Fall Emigration, was most timely and beneficial. Had they arrived in the bodies apprehended here, they could only have formed accumulations of misfortune now lying so heavily on this community.

Since the Report which I had the honor to submit on the 16th July last, nothing has occurred in the general aspect of affairs in the Province, to warrant me in holding out any more flattering prospects (for a time at least) of demand for Emigrant labor.

Whenever the reaction in business at Home shall have attained such valid advances in improvement, as will indicate stability, then, and not till then, can the beneficial effects be felt among the Immigrants and others here. For it cannot be concealed from ourselves, and the fact ought not to be withheld from the knowledge of those interested abroad, that such has been the extent of exhaustion in the monetary and other resources of the many here, that it must be a work of time to establish anything like a permanent redemption in their condition and circumstances, or to enable their industry and enterprise to benefit from the abundant natural capabilities of the Province, or the advantages it affords. Much solicitude as His Excellency has evinced to meliorate the condition of Immigrants, it is deeply to be regretted, that the necessary and effectual sinew—a solvent exchequer—is wanting, to enable the Executive to initiate and extend Works of public utility, wherein a systematic course of employment for Immigrants might be established. Although rates of wages are inserted in the Abstract, I regret to say, that they, in most cases, must be considered but nominal, as only a very small number of mechanics, artizans or laborers can be employed, and that too intermittently. The prices of provisions have, however, been also very low, owing alike to the abundant harvest, clemency of fall weather, and scarcity of money. Those low prices tended essentially to alleviate the distresses of the Immigrants here. I look forward with no small degree of confidence to receiving, in future, beneficial action and co-operation, on behalf of the Immigrants, from our recently established Highland Society; and I am enabled to acquaint the Lieutenant Governor that the best feeling manifests itself amongst the Members of the Agricultural Society here, towards the humble Settlers; and that on the limited funds admitting, it is intended to reward the deserving and industrious by donations of suitable seeds, to enable them to prosecute their labors with advantage.

The Associate System of Settlement, organized by Sir Wm. Colebrooke, must eventually be of much advantage to Immigrant Settlers in the country. The original avocations of the parties constituting the Associations, and their practical experience and knowledge of the work in the woods, guided by their general intelligence, render them good examples and able School Masters in the Bush, to subsequent Settlements in the neighbourhood.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

In making a Report for the past year as Emigrant Agent at Fredericton, I beg leave to call Your Excellency's attention to the Provincial Statute, page 587-8, under which the funds that may be obtained from Emigrants arriving in the Province are directed to be applied, and under which I am satisfied a sum is collected sufficient, if properly expended, to meet its object, which is, the relieving destitute and distressed Passengers and Emigrants, and in assisting them to reach their places of destination within the Province.

But unfortunately the Act further provides, that "sums so received shall be applied from time to time by grants of the Legislature," and as that Body does not meet till the season has passed away when Passenger Ships arrive, and as the Lieutenant Governor for the time being has no authority to apportion any part of the sums so obtained, to assist Emigrants in distress, or aid them on their arrival in the Country, the result is, they are thrown upon the community as paupers, to be provided for by the Commissioners of the Poor, who subsequently apply to the Legislature for remuneration, where their claims are frequently reduced; hence a stigma is attached to persons thus unfortunately situated, which attaches to them and their families in after life.

I know an instance myself where the descendants of a person who came to Halifax, Nova Scotia, several years since, in a very humble situation in life, have, by their prudence and integrity, raised themselves to seats in the Councils of that and another colony; and yet under the system pursued in this Province, had he obtained some trifling assistance, which probably he would afterwards have repaid must have been doled out to him by the Commissioners of the Poor, and would not have been forgotten by those malignant persons with whom every Community abounds.

There is also some little allowance to be made for the feelings and habits of those poor people, who leave the country of their nativity to seek in a strange land another home. For instance, the Irish,—and I believe the remark applies to the Scotch and English Emigrants,—never having been accustomed to eating Indian Meal, they dislike it; in fact in some instances they cannot eat it, although it is a wholesome and excellent description of food, without experiencing ill effects; but Oat Meal they will gladly take; yet in every instance that has come under my observation, the Commissioners of the Poor give Indian Meal, and those who endeavour to obtain Oat Meal are considered as improperly fastidious. To remedy the difficulty that arises from the interference of the Commissioners, and to relieve them from a disagreeable duty, as also to secure an economical and proper expenditure of the Emigrant Fund, I would suggest that it should be placed at the disposal of the Lieutenant Governor, to be applied for the relief and assistance of Emigrants, under His Excellency's immediate directions, by persons who act as Emigrant Agents, or others who may perform that duty, where numbers of Emigrants annually arrive—a detailed account to be rendered to the Legislature at the close of each year.

There is another proceeding attending the passage of Emigrants that materially affects their comfort, during such passage, and their circumstances on their subsequent arrival in the Colony, to which I beg leave to call Your Excellency's attention, for the purpose of bringing it under the notice of Her Majesty's Government.

The Emigrants on leaving Great Britain, generally provide for themselves and families, as they conceive, a sufficient supply of food, to last during the entire passage; but owing to the prevalence of adverse winds, and I fear, in some instances, the cupidity of the masters of the vessels, the passages are protracted to an unusual length; and the poor people, having consumed their provisions, are at the mercy of these men, who sell supplies to them, as I have understood repeatedly from Emigrants who have come to my office in a destitute condition, at an exorbitant rate; so that when the voyage is ended, individuals with families who, when they embark, had funds that would have materially assisted them on their arrival in the Province, are reduced to abject poverty, and have been compelled to dispose of their clothing to support nature, on their being landed after the termination of their voyage.

This would be obviated were the masters of vessels taking passengers compelled to have at least two months supply of provisions, for both passengers and crew, and that a fixed price should be prescribed for adults and children, and the articles constituting a ration, and their quality and quantity also defined by some competent authority at the place of departure.

This may seem at first sight to inflict a hardship upon the owners and masters of vessels, but the price of a ration might be so fixed, as to repay them for their outlay; and when it is recollected that the conveyance of passengers is a mere business transaction, and that credulous and ignorant people are continually imposed upon by the cupidity of persons in command of Emigrant Ships, it will be found to be a course consistent with justice as well as humanity.

With reference to the description of Immigrants that should resort to this Province, I would beg leave to remark, that in the absence of any great undertaking, a sufficient influx of the laboring class will find their way better, through the representations of interested persons, or owing to the recommendations of their friends and acquaintances, and as many as can well become annually merged in the population of the Province.

There is, however, a class of Settlers wanting in this Province, and to whom it offers probably as great inducement as can be found elsewhere, and that is, persons of limited means, say possessing from

£300 to £500. Owing to the great loss that attends Lumbering pursuits, there are a number of farms throughout the Province, which have become mortgaged to the Merchants, who have advanced supplies and money to pay for their licences, and which would be disposed of at a cheap rate, if purchasers with means, could be found; and there are large quantities of cleared land throughout the Province, which are entirely neglected, that might, at a comparatively trifling expense, become cultivated and fertile tracts of country.

Were persons so situated therefore to emigrate to this Province, in bodies including among their number a due proportion of Artisans,—such as Smiths, Carpenters, Shoemakers, Tailors, Masons, &c. with a Schoolmaster, and perhaps a Clergyman, not only would their condition be permanently improved, but the Country would be better settled, by a description of persons being infused among the population, who would possess superior information and attainments, and they would form for themselves very happy communities.

The settlement of the Boundary Question will open up a fine territory for the reception of Emigrants, and I look upon it as an object of importance, that an English or Scotch population should inhabit the upper part of the County of Carleton, between the River Saint John and the Grand Falls, as they would be divested of those animosities and prejudices, which might have a tendency to disturb that tranquillity, which it is so desirable should be established and cultivated, between the people of these Provinces and the neighbouring State of Maine.

There are considerable quantities of cleared land between Woodstock and the Arestook, particularly within the first 15 or 20 miles above the former place, that are only partially cultivated, where Settlements could be made; and there are also large tracts of wilderness lands beyond that, owned by absentees, and belonging to the Crown, which should no longer be locked up. There are at present held by absentees or other persons, to whom grants have been made, between the Meduxnikik, which empties into the Saint John, at Woodstock, and the Grand Falls, 23,000 acres, and the vacant or ungranted land, in that quarter, comprises about 25,000 acres more. The soil, as far as I am acquainted with it, and from the best information I can obtain, is of a superior quality, and the climate is remarkably fine.

There is also abundance of good land in the vicinity of the projected road to the Bend of Petitcodiac, between the North River and New Canaan, amounting to 10,000 acres, including the Albert Settlement, which has been surveyed, where a new Settlement could be advantageously formed; but whether setting down in villages, or dispersed on separate farms, where the country has been partially cleared, or penetrating into the wilderness of the Province, it is essential that parties arriving here, depend mainly on the labor of their own hands, and understand something of Agriculture; when such is the case, after having procured land, or purchased farms, paid for their stock, and each head of a family having retained, say, from £100 to £150, they would have sufficient to support themselves and families till the crops of the first and second years would meet their requirements; and if the subsequent life of each individual should be marked by industry and prudence, it would be of constantly increasing comfort and independence.

There is a fine tract of land, commencing about ten miles from Fredericton, called the Rushagonis Settlement, which, owing to the lumbering pursuits of the inhabitants of that part of the Province, has been much neglected; it extends from the Maryland Settlement towards the Oromocto River. The Land, generally speaking, is good, and the situation is delightful. I should say that forty or fifty families might set down in that direction, in great comfort and at a moderate distance from the seat of Government. On the South West Miramichi River there is abundance of fine land, and, I believe, a number of farms that might be bought at a very cheap rate, owing to the losses sustained by lumbering. The distance from Fredericton to where the Road strikes the Miramichi River at Boistown is between 30 and 40 miles.

With reference to the Emigrants who came to Fredericton from Saint John and other parts of the Province in considerable numbers during the early part of the Summer, they were chiefly of the laboring class, many with helpless families, most of whom had parted with what trifling means they possessed, before leaving the vessels in which they came passengers, or by the sale of articles of clothing in Saint John, and were consequently in destitute circumstances. I gave these people such advice as my knowledge of the country enabled me to afford, and passed them on to different parts of the Province.

In some few instances, when nothing else could be done, I sent them back to Saint John in the Steamer, incurring thereby an expense of some three or four pounds, which, I hope, will meet with Your Excellency's approbation. Those of them who were apt and calculated to make themselves useful, however, have, with few exceptions, succeeded in obtaining employment. With a slight exception, (there being probably ten or a dozen English people, among whom were two Shipwrights, whom I forwarded up the River in December,) the Immigrants who came to me were all Irish; and there is this difficulty about this description of persons, that they will often apply for, and receive aid, when they are in possession of sufficient funds of their own; and it is almost impossible to determine between cases of real poverty and affected want. The Scotch seldom or never beg, and I do not recollect an instance of a person of that nation applying for charitable relief, under ordinary circumstances. On their arrival they generally penetrate into the country and procure employment; but the Irish will hang about Towns while a farthing remains in their pockets, and then when necessity compels them to resort to the country, will demand wages far beyond what they can earn, or farmers can afford to give. I feel much gratified, however, in stating, that the Irish Immigrants who have arrived

out, during the last two years in particular, were remarkable for sobriety; and I never saw an instance of inebriety, either among those who applied at my office or in the street.

Whatever may be the determination of Her Majesty's Government with reference to Emigration, I cannot conclude this Report without remarking, that this Province seems hitherto to have been singularly unfortunate in this particular. Possessing abundance of land of the finest quality, intersected by numerous Rivers of considerable extent, many of which abound with Salmon and other Fish, with a salubrious climate, at no great distance from the Mother Country, which may be reached in a fortnight, it affords every inducement to a person desirous of emigrating and possessing property, who, with moderate means, can live here in independence.

Those who can command funds to support them, during the first year of their residence, are sure to succeed; and there are numerous instances where persons without any means whatever beyond their own labor and industry, have cleared away the wilderness around their dwellings, and have converted it into profitable and fertile farms, who are now living in the enjoyment of every comfort which the bulk of a community can anywhere obtain.

A Bill to provide for the repair of Streets and Highways in Fredericton.

Resolved, That the Bill do pass.

Ordered, That Mr. Fisher take the said Bill to the Council and desire their concurrence thereto.

Read a third time as engrossed,

A Bill to provide for the greater safety of Passengers on board Steam Boats.

Resolved, That the Bill do pass.

Ordered, That Mr. Jordan take the said Bill to the Council and desire their concurrence thereto.

Read a third time as engrossed,

A Bill to repeal an Act, intituled "An Act relating to the Market in Fredericton," and to make other provisions relating thereto.

Resolved, That the Bill do pass.

Ordered, That Mr. Taylor take the said Bill to the Council and desire their concurrence thereto.

Read a third time as engrossed,

A Bill to exempt the Members of the Fire Engine Company in the Parish of Woodstock, in the County of Carleton, from certain Parochial and County Duties.

Resolved, That the Bill do pass.

Ordered, That Mr. Taylor also take this Bill to the Council and desire their concurrence thereto.

Read a third time as engrossed,

A Bill to abolish Imprisonment for Debt for sums under Five Pounds.

When Mr. Fisher moved the following amendment, as a Fourth Section to the Bill, to be added thereto by way of Ryder, viz:—

"IV. And be it enacted, That this Act shall not come into operation, or be in force, until the first day of August in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty three."

This amendment having had three several readings, and the question being severally taken thereon, it was agreed to by the House. The

"It will be observed, with reference to the amounts paid as above to Messrs. Grant and Wilkinson, (£315) that by Account No. 1, both these Officers received their full annual Salaries for services in the Crown Land Department, amounting to £440.

"That Jacob Allan has received his Salary in full to the amount of £250, independently of the above amount of £133 14 10; and that the amount advanced Doctor Gesner, £75, must have been connected with a Topographical and Geological Survey, not authorized by the Legislature, and not for any Survey of vacant Crown Lands.

"The Committee have also to observe, that besides the Indoor Expenses for Officers and Clerks in the Crown Land Department, amounting to £1,435, as particularised in Account No. 1, £426 18 10 have been expended in Stationery, Printing and other expenses of that Department for the past year, making in all £1,861 18 10.

"No. 3. Is a 'Schedule of Warrants drawn on the Casual Revenue for Postage and other Contingencies, 'to be refunded.'"

"This Account is of a new character; amounts to £930 0 7, and includes £517 4s. 10d. for His Excellency's Postage; £238 18 2 for the Provincial Secretary's Postage; £18 15 1 Adjutant General's Postage; £2 18 9 Emigrant Agent's Postage.

"One item of £105 in this Account, 'paid to the Provincial Secretary for Stationery and Fuel for the past year,' appears to the Committee of a most objectionable character; the more especially as the same claim was rejected by the Assembly during the last Session of the Legislature.

"Such an expenditure should receive the marked disapprobation of the Assembly.

"The Committee cannot understand the term 'to be refunded,' at the head of this Account. They know not what source is alluded to whence the amount is to be refunded, unless from the Treasury, by a Legislative Grant; which would be taking from one pocket to put into the other.

"The Committee will not stop to enquire into the correctness of the several items charged in this Account, but at once unanimously condemn the practice of thus drawing the Public money, by Warrant, without the previous sanction of the Legislature.

"No. 4. Is the Account of the Civil List, as also of the distribution of the Surplus for the same period.

"The gross amount to debit on account of Civil List, is £12,852 18s., leaving a Surplus for the year of £1,647 2s.

“The sums here allowed to the Auditor, together with the charge for ‘Contingencies of Office,’ in Account No. 2, with the fixed Salary, makes in all for that Office during the past year, £752 0 1; a sum far more than is necessary for the efficient performance of all the duties of that Office during the same period.

“The amount of £200 charged in this Account as paid to Hon. J. S. Saunders, ‘for services while acting Surveyor General,’ appears to the Committee to be in addition to the regular Salary of that Officer during his tenure of Office.

“The Committee cannot find any justification for such an allowance, in the face of the reiterated opinions and recommendations of the House of Assembly as to the Salary of the successor to the Hon. T. Baillie.

“In conclusion, the Committee cannot forbear expressing in strong terms, their great surprise, that while the general circumstances of the Province, during a season of unparalleled depression, called loudly for the strictest economy in every Department of the Public Service, a system of expenditure, which may be truly designated as extravagant, has been pursued by the Executive Department.

“The Civil List Act, in express terms, authorizes the ‘Lieutenant Governor, by and with the advice of the Executive Council, to expend such sum of money as they may from time to time deem necessary and requisite for the *prudent management, protection and collection of the said Revenue;*’ and the Committee are therefore of opinion, that all monies expended, under this authority, should be strictly confined within the construction of the Act, which has not been the case with respect to many of the items above enumerated.

“While the Assembly, in the discharge of their unusually important duties, should endeavour to carry a wholesome and prudent retrenchment into every Department of the Public Service under their immediate controul, the Committee hope that the opinions of the House, as to the management of the Crown Land Department, may have such an influence upon the Executive, as to secure an immediate retrenchment to the fullest extent, consistent with the efficient and satisfactory discharge of the Public duties connected therewith.

Mr. Taylor, by leave, presented a Petition from Christopher C. Bradbury, praying to be relieved from Prosecutions instituted at the Suit of the Crown for the recovery of a balance due from him on account of certain purchases of Crown Lands; which he read.

Frink, of the Parish of Saint Stephen, in the County of Charlotte, setting forth, that in the year 1835, he had purchased a large tract of land from the Crown, and paid the first instalment thereon, and praying that he may receive consideration either in money or land, equal to the amount so paid on the purchase; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received and referred to the same Committee to report thereon.

Mr. Brown, by leave, presented a Petition from Josephus Moore, of the Parish of Saint David, in the County of Charlotte, setting forth, that in the year 1835, he had made purchase of a large tract of land from the Crown, and paid part of the purchase money thereon, and that on failing to pay the remaining part thereof, the amount paid became forfeited, and praying that he may receive consideration for the sum so paid, in land or otherwise; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received and referred to the same Committee to report thereon.

Mr. Rankin, by leave, presented a Petition from Michael Samuel, of Chatham, in the County of Northumberland, praying for a return of Duties paid on Tea imported into the Province by the way of Prince Edward Island, during the past year; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee of Trade to report thereon.

Mr. Scoullar, by leave, presented a Petition from Bryan M'Quade, praying for a free grant of land in consideration of his services and expenses incurred in exploring land for a new settlement; which he read.

And upon the question, that the said Petition be received and lie on the Table, it was decided in the negative.

Mr. Jordan, by leave, presented a Petition from William Folyard, praying compensation for teaching a School in the Parish of Saint John, in the County of Saint John, for a period of one year and four months ending on the 1st day of January last; which he read.

Ordered, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee on School Petitions to report thereon.

Mr. Connell, by leave, presented a Petition from Catharine M'Donald, of Woodstock, in the County of Carleton, Widow of Hugh M'Donald, an old Soldier of the Revolutionary War, praying that the allowance under the Act may be granted to her for the year 1840; which he read.

To which an amendment was moved—To expunge the whole of the foregoing Resolution, after the words "opinion of this Committee," and substitute the following:

“That in the present state of the Finances of this Province, a retiring pension to any Public Officer in the Province cannot be justified on principles of sound policy or justice.”

An amendment was then proposed to the said amendment—To expunge the whole thereof, as well as the original Resolution, and substitute the following:—

“Whereas it appears that the resignation of the Honorable Thomas Baillie of the office of Surveyor General was upon the condition, assented to by the then Administrator of the Government, that he should receive a retired allowance from the Civil List Fund; And whereas, by the reduced salary of the successor in the office of Surveyor General, such retired allowance would not increase the sums charged on the said Fund;

“Resolved, That it is the opinion of this Committee, that whilst the House should condemn the principle of granting retired allowances to Public Officers in the prime of life, yet, for the single purpose of settling this vexed subject, the retired allowance, pledged to Mr. Baillie, by Sir John Harvey, should be made to him out of the Civil List Fund; such allowance to form no precedent in any other case.”

The question was then taken upon the amendment first proposed, and it was also decided in the negative.

And the question being then put upon the original Resolution, it was likewise decided in the negative.

The following Resolution was then moved:—

“Resolved, As the opinion of this Committee, that they can see nothing in the case of the Honorable Thomas Baillie, which would justify them in recommending to Her Majesty’s Government to grant him a retired allowance for his life.”

And upon the question being taken upon this Resolution, it was carried in the affirmative.

The Committee then proceeding in the further consideration of the matter submitted to them, the following Resolution was moved:—

“Resolved, As the opinion of this Committee, That the re-appointment of the Honorable Thomas Baillie to the office of Surveyor General is not consistent with a right and satisfactory administration of that Department.”

ACT VACATING SEATES OF MEMBERS.

EXTRACT OF A DESPATCH FROM LORD STANLEY RELATIVE TO THE ACT TO VACATE THE SEATS OF MEMBERS OF THE ASSEMBLY IN CERTAIN CASES.

Downing Street, 11th August, 1842.

We are entirely prepared to admit the propriety of seats in the Assembly being vacated, for the same reasons which would vacate seats in the House of Commons. There is therefore no difference
of

of opinion as to the objection in view; but it seems very doubtful whether the framers of this law have accurately expressed the intentions of the Legislature.

The Act vacates the seat of any Member of the House of Assembly, who shall accept the office of Executive Councillor; but the office of Executive Councillor is not a place of profit or emolument. It is analagous to the office of a Privy Councillor, or rather of a member of the Cabinet Council, in this Country, and the acceptance of a place in the Privy Council, or the Cabinet, does not vacate a seat in the House of Commons. This act, as actually drawn, would therefore seem to establish a principle of great importance, as well as novelty—the principle, namely—that the Crown may not select its own confidential Advisers from amongst the Representatives of the people, unless the persons, so chosen, shall be willing to hazard a new election. How far it is wise to erect such a barrier between the Executive Government and the popular branch of the Legislature, would seem to be a question well meriting serious consideration.

CRIMINAL PROSECUTIONS.

Fredericton, 13th February, 1843.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

I have the honor to transmit to Your Excellency my Account against the Province for costs in Criminal Prosecutions for the year 1842 in those Counties in the Province, for which Your Excellency was pleased specially to appoint me as the prosecuting officer, in accordance with the recommendation of the Judges; and also in such cases in Saint John as I was called on to conduct. Your Excellency will perceive that my Account is accompanied by a bill of the costs in each case, taxed by the presiding Judge. The whole amount, as Your Excellency will perceive, to the sum of £107 2s. 8d., which, I presume, Your Excellency will submit to the House of Assembly, with a recommendation of a grant to cover the amount, unless Your Excellency has any other means of providing for the payment thereof.

I beg also to call Your Excellency's attention to the services I performed, previous to the commencement of the Session of 1842, under Your Excellency's express direction, in drafting, revising, and fair copying, four very long and special Bills to be submitted to the House, and for which Your Excellency desired me to make a proper charge, and to send it to you; this I did not do at the time, and had the House have granted me last year the usual annual grant of £50, I should not have made any charge; but as that grant was withheld, I now think it but right to make the charge, and as the House allowed Messieurs Kinnear and End, £30 for drawing a Bankrupt Law, which was not longer or more special than one of the four Bills I drew, I presume £50 for the four will not be considered an unreasonable charge, as Your Excellency is well aware of the trouble I had in the matter.

KING'S COLLEGE.

EXTRACT OF A DESPATCH FROM LORD JOHN RUSSELL.

16th May, 1841.

It is a principle of undoubted validity, that a grant of Franchises by the Crown is irrevocable and unalterable by a further exercise of the Royal Authority, unless the power of revocation and change be embodied and reserved in the original grant, or unless the grantees make a voluntary surrender of their Franchises.

As the existing Charter contains no such power of revocation or amendment, and as that instrument has not been surrendered, I consider that the first and proper step is a surrender of the Charter, as I originally proposed. I have, therefore, now to instruct you to invite the Corporation to take this course, since I find, from the proceedings of the Council, that they consider themselves not legally competent to act in the matter.

You will be pleased, however, to bear in mind, when the new Charter is in course of preparation, that it has been considered desirable that Members of the College, who dissent from the Church of England, should be exempted from compulsory attendance on Divine Service, according to our forms. The College Council have already agreed to that exemption, and I apprehend, though the clause is omitted in the Bill drawn by the House of Assembly, that neither the Assembly nor the Legislative Council would be opposed to such a measure of relief.

I am aware of no objection to the proposed extension in the Members of the Council of the College to fifteen.

SIR,—I have received your Despatch, No. 70, of the 29th of October, with its enclosures, on the subject of the proposed alteration in the Charter of King's College.

Having referred this Despatch for the opinion of Her Majesty's legal advisers, I have received a Report from those Officers, which states, that it is not necessary that the present Charter of the College should be surrendered as a preliminary to the granting of an amended Charter, and that the course which they would recommend is, to grant a new Charter to the College, containing the proposed modifications of the existing Charter.

I enclose herewith a copy of the opinion of Her Majesty's Law Officers, for the information of the College. You will be pleased to call on the College to prepare the draft of such a Charter as they would wish to receive, which draft should then be revised by the Provincial Attorney and Solicitor General, and by yourself, with the assistance of the Executive Council. When that draft shall have been finally approved by you, under the advice of your Council, it should be remitted to me, and I will give instructions for the preparation of the necessary instrument for completing this object.

I have to add, that some person should be authorized, on the part of the Corporation, to defray the expense of passing this instrument under the Great Seal.

MY LORD,—On the 11th of December last we received a letter from Mr. Stephen, wherein he was pleased to state, that the Council of the University of King's College, at Fredericton, in the Province of New Brunswick, are desirous of obtaining a modification of the Charter from the Crown, under which it is incorporated, with a view to render the Institution more acceptable to the Inhabitants, and thereby to increase its usefulness.

That Her Majesty's Government are willing to consent to the modification; and as a preliminary to granting an amended Charter, require the surrender of that now held by the College. Doubts, however, are entertained by Her Majesty's Law Officers in the Province, as to the competency of the Corporation to make such surrender, and also as to the mode in which the change can be lawfully effected.

Mr. Stephen further stated, he had been directed by your Lordship, to transmit to us a copy of the College Charter, together with a copy of the opinion delivered by the Attorney and Solicitor General of New Brunswick, and he requested that we would take the subject into our consideration, and report to your Lordship our opinion, whether it is competent to the Corporation of the College to surrender their present Charter, and accept a new one; and if not, in what manner the desired alteration in the constitution of the College can be lawfully effected.

In obedience to your Lordship's commands, we have perused the papers mentioned in Mr. Stephen's letter, and have fully considered the whole matter referred to us; and we have now the honor to report to your Lordship, that we do not think it necessary, in order to effect the intended alteration in the construction of the College, that its present Charter should be surrendered, as a preliminary to the granting of an amended Charter, and we think there are objections to such a course. We would recommend that a new Charter should be granted to the College, containing the proposed modifications of the existing Charter; and this new Charter, if accepted by the College, will become the governing one of the Corporation. We think that this new Charter should recite the grant of the former; and that the Crown, considering it for the advantage of the Institution, has thought fit to grant another Charter to the College; and the Charter should then set out all the regulations which it may be deemed expedient to provide for the government of the Institution.

POSTAGE OF JOURNALS.

(Copy.)

General Post Office, Halifax, 13th February, 1843.

SIR,—I have to acknowledge the receipt of your Letter of the 1st instant, stating you had deemed it advisable to fix on the sum of forty pounds for sending the Journals of the Assembly through the Post during the Session, an arrangement which you trusted would meet with my approbation; but after the repeated communications you have received from me, respecting the transmission of printed sheets, I did not think you would have taken such a step.

If a Post Master, conducting one of the largest offices in the Province, is to pay so little attention to his instructions, as to consider he is at liberty, on his own responsibility, to enter into any arrangements of this description, it will be impossible to introduce system or regularity in the proceedings of the Department.

All matter sent through the Post Office in these Provinces, is legally liable to full Postage; but the Deputy Post Master General has for many years been permitted to pass under his franking privilege, newspapers and other printed sheets. The amount which was fixed upon to be received by him for the exercise of this privilege, has been more than once brought under the consideration of the Post Master General of England, and has received his Lordship's sanction. I can therefore allow no departure from this established charge on all printed sheets sent under his privilege; and I desire the arrangement made by you, may be immediately put an end to; and I have further to point out, that, should you, on any future occasion, disobey your instructions in a similar manner, I shall remove you from the service.

GOVERNMENT HOUSE.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

I beg leave to report to Your Excellency, that, in consequence of the other Commissioners for Government House having declined acting, that last Spring I took upon myself the responsibility of proceeding with such repairs and improvements as I considered absolutely necessary for the comfort of Your Excellency and family; and as the whole was done under my own personal superintendence, I can say, that every attention was paid to economy; and I herewith furnish bills of particulars, amounting to £207 11 1; being the total expenditure for the year 1842, which I trust, will prove satisfactory; and I would beg to remark, that the greater part paid for labourers wages was expended in endeavouring to procure water in the stable yard, and which, I am sorry to say, proved unsuccessful. But in consequence of the whole premises being so poorly supplied with water, and Your Excellency thereby put to much extra expense and inconvenience at particular seasons of the year, I would therefore beg to recommend that a further attempt be made next season, by boring through the clay, where I have every reason to believe, water would be found.

Having thoroughly examined the circular buildings connected with the stables, I find them in such a dilapidated state, that I considered it imprudent to undertake to repair them, (they having been erected some forty or fifty years since) and I would therefore beg to recommend that new buildings be erected, and herewith furnish a sketch of the proposed erections, with an estimate of the probable expense, amounting to two hundred and twenty five pounds. Likewise the fence fronting on the road, from the main gate to the lower corner, is in such a decayed state, that I consider it past repair, and would recommend that a new fence be erected so soon as the season will admit; the expense of which would be about seventy five pounds, (including painting). Likewise I would recommend that the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds be allowed for contingencies for the year 1843, for such as repairing garden and other fences, and ice houses, glazing and painting, new stove pipes, boring for water, &c. &c.; the whole of this amount not to be expended unless absolutely necessary, and if not all expended, the balance to be carried to credit of next year's account.

And if not out of place, I would beg to recommend that provision be made for the above erections and repairs, (or any part that may be concluded upon,) and that regular specifications be prepared by the Commissioner, and that the same (so far as respects the new fence and buildings particularly,) be put up at public competition, by receiving tenders for the same; and I am of opinion that the expense would not exceed one half that it would cost if done under the system formerly pursued; likewise a great reduction could be made in wages and materials for repairs, if the payment was made promptly and in money.

I would beg to add, that in consequence of the tin upon the roof of Government House having become quite corroded, I am of opinion that a great saving would be effected by covering it with two coats of paint, which would not exceed sixty pounds, (if done by Contract and for prompt payment); the only doubt that can exist is, that the paint might blister, being laid upon tin, but I do not apprehend much difficulty if put on while the weather is cool and the first coat allowed to get perfectly hard before the second is laid on.

Likewise, I herewith forward Messrs. James Taylor and Company's Account, amounting to £29 8 11 for Mr. Harding's Account, omitted in 1841, and the discount on Warrant for that years expenditure.

CUSTOM HOUSE AT SAINT JOHN.

Custom House, Saint John, N. B., 12th January, 1843.

SIR,—I have the honor to state, that, under the authority of an Order from the Commissioners of Customs, No. 134, dated 16th September last, this Office was removed on the 1st December last into the Building erected by Mr. John Walker for a Custom House, Treasury Offices, and Bonding Warehouses, and I am directed by the Honorable Board to pursue the proper course for obtaining an allowance of the rent (before agreed upon, viz. two hundred pounds per annum) from the Colonial Legislature. I have therefore to request that you will submit the subject for the consideration of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor.

I have to observe that the Imperial Duties levied under Acts passed prior to 18 Geo. 3, c. 12, amounting at the Port of Saint John and its Out-Bays upon an average of over £1000 per annum for the last five years, are repealed by the Act 5 and 6 Vic. c. 49, and will cease to be collected after the 5th July next, which Duties were not paid-over to this Province.

I enclose herewith an Account of the Duties referred to for the last five years.

In pursuance of Your Excellency's directions, contained in a communication this day received from the Honorable Mr. Secretary Odell, I have the honor to report, that it is impossible for me to furnish all the information required by the terms of the Address of the Assembly, as I have no means of ascertaining from any documents in my office or under my control, the number of suits which are settled before entry; nor can I furnish any information in regard to suits entered and not proceeded with, many of which are settled without my knowledge or any taxation of costs, and many may be yet pending. SIR,—The House of Assembly of this Colony having adopted the first Report of a Special Committee on the subject of the Post Office Department generally, and particularly in reference to the increased rates of Postage now exacted on Letters, Newspapers and other Documents transmitted by Post between the British North American Colonies, I am directed by the House to forward to you a copy of their Report, and to request that you will be pleased to lay the same before the House of Assembly of New Brunswick, in hopes that the Assembly of New Brunswick will co-operate with the Representatives of this Province, in soliciting from Her Majesty's Imperial Government a revision of the Laws or Regulations under which the present Postage rates on Letters and Newspapers are exacted throughout the British North American Colonies, with a view of assimilating them, as far as practicable, to those now in force in the United Kingdom, or of placing the internal Post Communication, by a uniform system, under the control of the local Legislatures.

SIR,—In conformity with a Despatch lately received from the Provincial Secretary's Office, to which I replied on the 23d instant, I now beg leave to submit for Your Excellency's consideration the amount of a small claim, with interest, for certain expenses incurred by me, upwards of two years since, (in the case of the Mutineers of the schooner Margaretville, sent to New Brunswick for trial in the month of March, 1841,) amounting, as per vouchers herewith transmitted, to the sum of \$89 66-100 or £22 8 4½ Halifax currency.

The Documents referred to in my Despatch to Lord Palmerston of the 25th May, 1841, which it appears have not been received by Her Majesty's Attorney General, were forwarded in duplicate to Saint John, as will appear from the letters, copies of which marked B. are herewith enclosed.

In further elucidation of this transaction, I transmit besides, marked C. the copy of a voucher, supplied by Mr. Kinnear, Queen's Counsel, to the master of the vessel on board of which I shipped the alleged Mutineers to New Brunswick.

MY LORD,—The British schooner *Margaretville*, of Saint John, New Brunswick, Charles Johnson, Master, bound from the Island of Jamaica to this Port. put into Norfolk in distress on the 23d January last, with the loss of an anchor and cable, and her Crew in a state of mutiny.

The mutineers, three in number, were, (at the joint solicitation of Mr. Consul Gray, and the Master of the schooner,) removed for safe custody on board of the United States Revenue Cutter "*Van Buren*," the Captain of the Cutter having not only consented to receive them, but to furnish from his own crew a sufficient number of hands to enable Captain Johnson to proceed from Norfolk to this Port with his vessel.

The "*Van Buren*" arrived from Norfolk on the 1st of February, on which day I became apprized of the circumstances above mentioned, through an official note addressed to me by the Collector of the Customs, who had the kindness, at my request, to let the accused individuals remain on board the Cutter until such time as I should be able to decide how they were to be disposed of.

On the 3d of February, the *Margaretville* arrived here, and Captain Johnson put me in possession of the affidavits and other documents which were prepared at Norfolk in support of his charge against the men.

As they could not be tried for the alleged offence in the United States Courts, and as I could not suffer them to go at large, under an accusation of so grave a character, supported under oath, I lost no time in submitting the case to Mr. Fox, for his consideration and advice.

Mr. Fox did not consider it a case in which he could officially interfere, nevertheless he very promptly obtained a private instruction from the Secretary of the Treasury to the Collector of the Customs here, which enabled me to keep the men in duress until their departure from hence for Saint John on the 13th of March, on which occasion I forwarded to Her Majesty's Attorney General for that Province a statement of the case, together with all the documents in support thereof.

The expenses already incurred by me in this matter amount to seventy eight dollars and twenty six cents, and I have not as yet been able to obtain from the United States Customs any statement of what may be due for the mens subsistence on board of the Revenue Cutter during a period of six weeks. As I cannot include the above charge in my account with the Lords of the Admiralty, I request your Lordship will have the goodness to intimate your approval of the same, in order that the amount may be charged in my contingent account with the Treasury for the current year.

SIR,—The Earl of Aberdeen having referred to the consideration of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, your Despatch No. 10, reporting your proceedings in the case of certain mutinous Seamen of the British Colonial Vessel "Margaretville," and requesting that the expenses amounting to 78 dollars 26 cents, (about £——,) which you incurred on that occasion, may be reimbursed to you, I am directed by his Lordship to state to you that the following is an extract from the Admiralty Report: "My Lords are of opinion, that as Mr. Fox had declined to interfere in the matter, it would have been but prudent on the part of the Consul, before he interfered, to have required security from the Master of the Vessel, or the Consignees of the Cargo, for the payment of the expenses to be incurred."

"My Lords are also of opinion, that under the circumstances stated in the papers, the Consul at Baltimore should, through the Government of New Brunswick, to which Colony the 'Margaretville' belongs, call upon the Owners of that Vessel to refund these expenses, which ought not to fall upon the Government at home."

You will consider the opinion thus expressed by the Lords of the Admiralty as the guide for your proceedings in the present, as well as on future occasions.

Salter, of the City of Saint John, Merchants, praying a return of Duties on Flour imported from Nova Scotia—£26 5s.—and for drawback on one hogshead of Sugar exported to Digby—£1 19 2; the Committee recommend that the Duties on the Flour imported from Nova Scotia be refunded, and that this part of their claim be referred to the Committee of Supply: the grounds for claim for drawback on the Sugar exported to Digby being incomplete, for reasons stated in the affidavit, they beg leave to refer the same to the decision of the House.

“Also, Petition of S. Wiggins, Merchant, Saint John, praying a return of double Head Money—£15 15s.—paid on Passengers brought to Saint John from Liverpool, in the ship Samuel; the Petitioner has an equitable claim for this amount, and the Committee recommend that the same be referred to the Committee of Supply.

“Also, the Petition of S. Wiggins and Son, praying to be allowed the drawback on 264 gallons Claret Wine exported in the barque Pearl, and landed at Saint Thomas; the amount prayed for is £26 8s. The Petition is accompanied with the requisite proof of exportation, &c. and the certificate of two British Merchants who witnessed the landing of 110 cases of Claret Wine at Saint Thomas on 30th September, 1842. The claim of the Petitioners appears to be equitable, and they recommend that it be referred to the Committee of Supply.

“Also, Petition of William Crane and Joseph Allison, Merchants, Sackville, praying return of Duty—£9 10 9—paid on Teas imported from London, via Halifax, by mistake of their Agents. It appears that the Tea was actually shipped in London for Halifax, and transhipped to Saint John, where the Duties are certified to have been paid; the Committee therefore recommend that the same be referred to the Committee of Supply.

“Also, the Petition of Daniel C. Perkins, of the City of Saint John, Merchant, praying a return of Parliamentary Duties—£14 9 5—and Provincial Duties—£5 1s.—on articles consumed at the Great Fire in Saint John in November, 1841. The proofs of payment of the above Duties are annexed, and the affidavit of the Petitioner to the amount of loss. As no proof has been furnished that the goods were not insured, the Committee beg to refer this claim to the consideration of the House.

“Also, Petition of Thomas Leavitt and Company, of Saint John, Merchants, praying a return of part of the Duties paid on Tea imported by them; it appears that this Tea was imported from Halifax, and reported for Duty at the rate of 3s. per pound; the claim is made upon the ground that it should have been reported at 1s. 8d. per pound, the difference of duty would be £7 7 9; under all the circumstances of the case, the Committee are of opinion that the Petitioners are not entitled to the return prayed for.

“Also,

“ Also, Petition of John Miller, Deputy Treasurer at Bathurst, praying that the emolument of his Deputation may be increased. The Committee are satisfied that the emoluments of this office have become greatly diminished; the amount for the past year being only £32 5 6; they therefore strongly recommend that the sum of £25 be granted to him in the Committee of Supply.

“ Also, the Petition of Thomas Moses, Deputy Treasurer, West Isles, praying an additional allowance may be made to him for his services for the past year. The House at its last Session having resolved that no further grant be made to this officer, the Committee cannot recommend the prayer of this Petition.

“ Also, Petition of William Livingstone, praying return of double Head Money—£19 6 8—paid in 1840. As there is nothing before the Committee to satisfy them that the Petitioner is the person entitled to make this application, they cannot recommend it to the favorable consideration of the House.

“ Also, Petition of John Kerr and Company, of the City of Saint John, Merchants, praying a return of Duty on Tobacco consumed by fire in Saint John, in November, 1841. It appears the Petitioners bonded 6,895lbs. Tobacco, and paid Duties on 2,298lbs. and that the remainder was destroyed, the Duty on which, amounting to £19 3 1, they pray may be returned. A Certificate of the amount of Duty paid is annexed to the Petition, but there is no affidavit or other proof of the destruction of the 4,597lbs.; and therefore the Committee are of opinion, that until this proof is produced, with a Certificate from the Treasurer, and also proof of no insurance having been effected, they ought not to receive the redress prayed for.

“ Also, Petition of Alexander Wright and Company, of Salisbury, County of Westmorland, praying a return of Duties on 30 barrels of Flour, imported by them from Nova Scotia, during the past year, 1842. The case of these Petitioners is precisely the same as that of G. and J. Salter, of the City of Saint John, before reported on and the Committee are of opinion, that the claim £8 15, should be sustained, and recommend that it be referred to the Committee of Supply.

“ Also, Petition of Michael Samuel, of Chatham, in the County of Northumberland, praying a return of Duty on 10 chests of Tea imported into the Province, via Prince Edward Island. This Tea was shipped from London in the Diadem, bound for Miramichi, via Prince Edward Island, and was transhipped from the Diadem on board the schooner Defiance, for Miramichi, where it was landed, and the Duty of 10 per cent. ad valorem on £82 10s. paid, equal to £8 5s. The Committee are of opinion, that the Petitioner has an equitable claim for a return of this Duty, and recommend that it be referred to the Committee of Supply.

“ Also, the Petition of James Kirk, of the City of Saint John, Merchant, praying a return of Duty at 2s. 2d. per gallon on 168 gallons of Rum destroyed in the Great Fire in that City in November, 1841; claim £18 4. The requisite proof of payment of the Duty, and the loss, as stated, are produced, and the Committee therefore recommend this claim to be referred to the Committee of Supply.

“ Also, Petition of William Fruing and Company, of Shippegan, in the County of Gloucester, praying a return of Provincial Duty on certain articles imported by them expressly for, and used in prosecuting, the Deep Sea Fisheries; these Duties amount to £7 17 6. The Parliamentary Duties on the above articles were refunded to the Petitioners by order of the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, and there can be no doubt, upon the requisite proof of the Provincial Duty being produced, that the Petitioners are entitled to the return prayed for. The Committee recommend that this Petition be referred to the Committee of Supply.

“ And the Petition of L. DeWolf Spurr, of Saint John, Merchant, praying return of Duties paid or secured by him on Tea imported from Macao, via Halifax. The return prayed for is £93 19s. By the Revenue Laws of this Province, the Tea, so imported, is liable to a Duty of 10 per cent. ad valorem, and the Petitioner assumes that it could not have been the intention of the Legislature to impose a Duty on Tea thus imported. The requisite proof is produced; but the Committee do not feel warranted in making any recommendation in this matter, and beg respectfully to refer the case, upon its merits, to the Committee of Supply.

“ They have also had under their consideration the Petition of John Kerr, Parks and Hegan, W. G. Lawton, and 48 others, Merchants, of the City of Saint John, praying

praying that no increased Duty may be laid on British Goods imported into this Province, and that the Duties now levied on Foreign Manufactures, may not be reduced.

"The Committee, conceiving that the interests of this Province will be best promoted by affording every encouragement to its Trade with the Mother Country, and believing that any additional Duty imposed on British Manufactures would tend materially to injure that Trade, recommend that the prayer of the Petitioners be complied with,—that no additional Duties be imposed on British Manufactures, and that the Duties on Foreign Manufactures be not reduced.

"They have also had under their consideration the Petition of William Scovil, Noah Disbrow, Charles Ward, Henry Gilbert, George Bond and 289 others: Also, the Petition of John Clarke, Junior, Hugh Carruthers and 14 others, Bakers: Also, the Petition of Camber, Wood and Company, Harris and Allen, Thomas Barlow and Company, and Smith and Jones, Iron Founders: Also, the Petition of John Britain, William M'Leod and 250 others, praying for protection upon all articles of Domestic Manufactures: Also, the Petition of William Scovil, of the City of Saint John, praying that no Duty may be imposed on Plate Iron imported from Great Britain, and that an additional Duty may be imposed on Cut Nails.

"The Committee fully admit the propriety of protecting every article of Domestic Manufacture, and recommend this subject to the early consideration of the House; and they further beg leave humbly to suggest, in order to have their merits fully discussed, that these several Petitions be referred to the Committee of Ways and Means.

"They have also considered the Petition of John Walker, praying an Act may pass restricting the use of other Warehouses than the building erected by him for the purpose of Warehousing Goods subject to Duty under the Provincial Revenue Law. The Committee are of opinion, that Mr. Walker's enterprise, in constructing, at a large cost, the building in question, and suited only in his arrangements for a Public Warehouse and Offices, are most favorable to afford Mr. Walker every remuneration which the nature of the case admits of; but cannot recommend the adoption of the prayer of Mr. Walker's Petition, inasmuch as it would be an act of injustice to enact any Law compelling other parties having Fire Proof Warehouses of their own, affording safe means of Warehousing Goods for Duty under the Provincial Act, to pay Storage in that of Mr. Walker.

"All which is respectfully submitted.

The House went into Committee of the whole on the reconsideration of a Bill to amend the Laws now in force relating to Trespasses.

Mr. Barker in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that the Committee having the Bill again before them, had made a further amendment thereto, and then agreed to the said Bill.

Resolved, That there be granted to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, the sum of £——to compensate the Reverend Michael Egan, Catholic Missionary, Miramichi, for services rendered to the sick and distressed Indians in the County of Northumberland.

That an amendment was proposed thereto—To expunge the whole thereof, after the word "*Resolved*," and substitute as follows:—

“New Brunswick.

“Message to the House of Assembly, 15th March, 1843.

“W. M. G. COLEBROOKE, Lt. Governor.

“The Lieutenant Governor communicates to the House the Report of the Officer appointed to Survey a Line for a Canal to unite the Bay of Fundy with the Gulph of Saint Lawrence, which work has been executed at the joint expense of this Province, of Canada and of Prince Edward Island.

“W. M. G. C.”

The Report communicated by the foregoing Message, is as follows :—

CANAL BETWEEN THE BAY OF FUNDY AND THE SAINT LAWRENCE.

To His Excellency Sir William M. G. Colebrooke, K. H., &c. &c. &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

1. In obedience to Your Excellency's commands, I proceeded, as soon after my arrival in this Province, in July last, as I could make my arrangements, to the County of Westmorland, to examine the several lines proposed for the route for a Canal to unite the waters of the Bay of Fundy with those of the Gulph of Saint Lawrence, and have the honor to report the result of those examinations.

2. It is unnecessary for me to dwell upon the importance of an undertaking which seems in this Province to be generally admitted. The duty of the Engineer is to ascertain the practicability of the scheme, and having done so, to determine the best line, and frame an estimate of the expense.

3. The object of a Canal, to unite the waters above mentioned, is evidently to enable coasting, or other vessels to pass from Port to Port, without the risk and delay incurred in navigating the Gulph of Saint Lawrence, and making almost the entire circuit of Nova Scotia. The dimensions of the Canal must be determined by the object it is intended to effect.

4. An inspection of the Charts of Bay Verte and Shediac Harbours, surveyed by Captain Bayfield, R. N., copies of which have been kindly furnished me by Captain Owen, R. N., will shew, that from the shoalness of the waters, it will be necessary to carry a Canal a considerable distance into the Sea, to ensure 10 feet water at the Neap Flood Tides. This would be a tedious and an expensive operation, particularly when the whole distance is always under water, as is the case in Shediac Harbour, and of course the deeper the Canal is made, the farther it must be carried into the Sea. This consideration limits me to what should be the minimum size for a Canal which would in any degree answer the end proposed, namely, 45 feet at bottom and 85 feet on the water surface, for the width, with a depth of 10 feet water in the Canal. One of larger dimensions would be preferable, if circumstance were favorable, but it is upon the above data I ground any calculations it may be necessary to make in the course of this Report. With these dimensions, Vessels drawing 9 feet of water, would pass through the Canal and over the Lock Sills, and the width is not too great to admit of two Vessels passing each other, especially Steam Vessels of the ordinary construction, whose Paddle Boxes occupy much room.

5. The first line I examined was from the confluence of the An Lac and Tantamar Rivers, at the head of Cumberland Basin, to the Tignish River falling into Bay Verte. I proceeded along the
Tantamar

Tantamar and Jolie Cour Marshes to the source of the Au Lac River, thence to the Swamp the source of the Missiguash River. I examined the ground on this spot particularly, and found the whole to be a floating Morass, the surface composed of mosses and aquatic plants, the matted roots of which alone afford an insecure footing. Finding no firm bottom at depths varying from 6 to 12 feet, I considered that it might be less difficult and less expensive to cut through a more elevated tract of country, provided a sufficient supply of water could be obtained on the summit level, than to carry the embankments of a Canal through these Bogs, the shortest distance through which is one mile. I therefore kept along the low ground by the side, and to the head of the Portage Lake, the water level of which I found to be 4 feet 9 inches above the point of commencement, thence crossing the Bay Verte Road at the Portage Bridge, proceeded nearly along water courses, until I re-crossed the Bay Verte Road, directing my course to the Tignish River, and visiting in my route every stream that could possibly be made at all available for the supply of water for a Canal. (This route is shewn by a red line on Plan No. 1.)

6. I examined the nature and capacity of the several streams, particularly those which run into the head of the Portage Lake, and find that they originate in small swamps, that to whatever degree they may be filled during the freshets, they are in the Summer months so very inconsiderable, that they do not furnish a sufficiency of water for working the several small Saw Mills upon them. I consider from these circumstances that dependence cannot be placed upon them for the supply of water required for a Canal of the dimensions stated in paragraph No. 4. Nor am I aware of any other water available for the purpose on this line; the waters of the Portage Lake, even if sufficient, cannot be raised to the height required.

7. The same deficiency of water will hold good, if the route taken by Mr. Hall in 1825, were followed, a route, I believe, to be the most level, and offering, with the exception of the Bogs, few impediments.

8. This deficiency might be got rid of, or greatly simplified, by admitting the tidal waters of the Bay of Fundy, as proposed by Mr. Telford in his Report on Mr. Hall's survey of 1825, wherein he suggests making the Spring Tides the summit level, if they were limpid and clear; but they are very turbid, and inadmissible from the quantity of earthy matter held in solution by them, of which a great deposit takes place, even in moving water, and which would, in the still waters of a Canal, accumulate to such an extent, as soon to impede the working of the machinery of the Locks, and cause frequent interruptions to the navigation, for the purpose of cleansing the Canal; a measure fraught with inconvenience and considerable expense.

9. The Locks for such a work should not be less than 150 feet between the gates, and 40 feet wide; the quantity of water required to fill such a Lock, and which would be expended every time a Vessel was passed through, is 60,000 cubic feet, or 374,296 gallons.

10. The levels taken by me being merely trials, and not necessary to elucidate my Report upon this route, I have judged it better not to exhibit them on paper, as they might possibly mislead and create an erroneous opinion as to the general level of the country.

11. On the left or North side of the road from Sackville to Bay Verte, separated from the Jolie Cour Marsh by a ridge of land, are several small Lakes, and it has been suggested that they might be made available for the supply of water. I ran a level from the Jolie Cour Marsh to one of them, and found the water 2 feet 8 inches *lower* than the Marsh. These Lakes are of course influenced by the Spring freshets, but the outlet, by which the superfluous water finds its way to the sea, does not indicate that any great body of water passes through at any time, and they are on too low a level to supply the head water for a Canal.

12. The second line which came under examination was from Shediac Harbour to the Bay of Fundy, commencing at the high water mark, Neap Flood Tide, at the Bridge across the Scadouk River, and terminating at Dorchester Island, the distance being 25½ miles.

13. I proceeded one mile and a half up the Scadouk River, and then turned up a very small Creek, or rather Brook, called Underwoods, which appeared to be the most eligible route by which a Canal could be brought into connection with the Scadouk. I proceeded in a Southwesterly direction, following nearly the course taken by Mr. Minnette in 1823, towards the marshy meadows and Cariboo Plain through which the Scadouk takes a very winding course towards Shediac Harbour; crossing the River and low lands which form a kind of Basin, being surrounded on all sides by rising ground, I continued my course on the Memramcook River, passing in my way the sources of the Indian Stream which falls into the Memramcook nearly one mile above the point where I crossed that River. Turning more Southerly, I followed the course of the Memramcook nearly all the way to where it debouches into the Bay of Fundy at Dorchester Island. My course is shewn by a red line on Plan No. 2.

14. I have shewn in Section the ground traversed between the Scadouk and Memramcook Rivers, sufficient, I hope, to elucidate the remarks I have to offer upon this route in reference to its adaptation for the line of a Canal. The Section shews the most elevated tract of country between Shediac Harbour and the Bay of Fundy.

15. It will be seen at one view that, to carry a Canal by this route, it is necessary that there should be an ample supply of water upon this summit level, and that it must be looked for in the low ground or Basin through which the Scadouk flows.

16. There appear to be two probable methods of creating this desideratum. The first is to Dam up the Scadouk River where it enters the gorge, through which it flows on leaving the Cariboo Plain, as at O, Plan No. 2, and thus raise the waters to such a height as to fill the Canal and Locks terminating

terminating the summit level. The second is to convert the water so raised by the Dam at O, into a Reservoir only, and not for purposes of navigation.

17. With reference to the first of these methods, admitting that the Spring Freshets would fill the Canal to the extent required, in the first instance, the next point for consideration is, will the Scadouk River, uninfluenced by the Freshets, maintain this supply during the Summer months? for it is evident, that unless a full supply is constantly kept up, so as to ensure the depth of 9 feet over the Lock Sills, Vessels of the description for which this depth is calculated, could not pass.

18. The Current of the Scadouk River across the low ground, in the Summer months, is scarcely perceptible, the width of the River is 33 feet, the depth averages 3 feet. Such dimensions, with so small a velocity, would afford a very insufficient accumulation of water, when not under the influence of the Freshets, and even of this accumulation, the whole would not be available, because an allowance must be made for unavoidable leakage, and also for the effects of evaporation, which latter would be very considerable from so extensive a surface of water under the influence of the powerful Summer sun of this country. I cannot consider it safe to depend on so inadequate a supply for keeping up the necessary demand for a large Canal.

19. With reference to the second method of acquiring head water for a Canal, it must be borne in mind that a Reservoir should always be subject to two conditions: First, it ought in itself to be sufficiently low to collect flood waters from an ample surface of country; and Secondly, so high as to enable the whole of the water in it, being drawn into the summit level of the Canal.

20. The position of the Scadouk River is such as not to comply with the first of the two conditions stated, because there is not elevation of land sufficient to afford an ample surface from which to collect flood waters under ordinary circumstances; it is only under the extraordinary cases of freshets that reliance could be placed for an adequate supply. These influences are not of long continuance, and vary in quantity according to the quantity of snow that may fall during the Winter, and the extent of the rains which usually occur at the breaking up of that season. The questions, therefore, that naturally arise, are—Can a sufficient quantity of water be collected during the freshets to furnish the requisite supply for the working season? and—Can that supply be made available?

21. An accurate survey and sections taken of the ground surrounding the Reservoir proposed, can alone determine the extent to which the waters might be raised, in answer to the first question; and the second question can only be answered by ascertaining if the relative positions of the Canal and Reservoir are in accordance with the second condition stated in paragraph 19, or can be made so. To make them comply effectually with the condition, viz. that the Reservoir shall be so high that the whole of the water may be drawn into the summit level of the Canal, it will be necessary to find a route so much lower than the Marsh which would form the bottom of the Reservoir, that these Marshes shall be on a level, or rather above the surface water of the Canal.

22. The only probability of obtaining such a result appears to be, to endeavor to find a route which will admit of carrying the Canal so much below the point O, as to render the whole of the water in the Reservoir available; judging, however, from the appearance of the surrounding country, I do not think such a route can be obtained without an enormous quantity of excavation, and at the expense of lengthening the Canal several miles. An exploration might be made with this view, should it meet Your Excellency's wishes, but I am by no means sanguine in my expectations of any favorable result.

23. The practicability of forming a Canal on this route hinges entirely on the possibility of obtaining an adequate supply of water on the summit level. However advantageous other parts of the line may prove, either in respect to the supply of water, or general level of the ground, they can not be made use of until the summit level be perfected. It may appear therefore almost superfluous to discuss their merits now, but as it may be satisfactory to Your Excellency to be put in possession of such facts regarding them as I may be able to produce, I proceed to state, that the Memramcook River, from the place where I crossed it, to the Mill, shewn on Plan No. 2, is a succession of Rapids, very shallow, being in many places not more than one foot deep, the bottom sand stone rock, which forms the substratum of nearly the whole ground over which I passed. At the Mill the Dam might be raised considerably higher than it is at present; by raising it, however, a great deal of fine alluvial land would be overflowed and destroyed. The tide flows to the Mill, below which the River winds through low and almost level marshes to Dorchester Island.

24. The great winding of the River renders it very exceptionable for the purpose of navigation, and any measures to straighten it would tend to increase the already very rapid tide. It would be preferable to cut the Canal the whole way, or nearly so, from the Mill to Dorchester Island, to making use of the River; but as it is not advisable to admit the tidal waters of the Bay of Fundy, for reasons before stated, such a measure would very much increase the demand for fresh water to maintain so great a length of Canal.

25. Independent of the deficiency of water on this route, there would necessarily be a great amount of Lockage, and a distance of nearly half a mile to carry the Canal into Shediac Harbour to insure a proper depth of water, both of which would add very materially to the expense.

26. The Chart of Shediac Harbour shews the soundings in feet at low water. The ordinary flood tides are from $1\frac{1}{2}$ to $2\frac{1}{2}$ feet, the Spring tides rise 4 feet. It is a singular fact that in Shediac Harbour the tide ebbs to the ordinary low water mark once only in 24 hours.

27. The third and last route examined by me, was from Shediac Harbour to the Bend of the Petit-codiac-River, $15\frac{1}{2}$ miles. Having previously passed over the ground between these two points, I at once perceived that the only dependance to be placed for water on the summit level, was in the Mill

Pond shown in Plan No. 3. Under these circumstances, it was scarcely worth the trouble of minute examination, nevertheless in justice to the public, I directed my course towards the Mill Pond, and thence continued it until I debouched on Babineau's Marsh, two miles below the settlement called the Bend. I selected this Marsh because it appeared favorable to the formation of a Basin to hold vessels waiting for an exit into the Petitcodiac River.

28. The ground passed over, shewn by a red line on Plan No. 3, is considerably more elevated than that of either of the other routes, and I found that the Mill Pond is 119 feet 4-8 inches higher than the neap flood tide in Shediac Harbour, and 113 feet 6-6 inches above the corresponding tide in the Petitcodiac River. I think it probable that a more level course than that I adopted might be found between the two points, but not without passing over an elevation equal to that which the Mill Pond possesses; but in the absence of a more liberal supply of head water than could be afforded by the Mill Pond, it is scarcely advisable to expend time and money in the search.

29. It will require an inspection only of the Plan No. 3 and accompanying section, to shew the impracticability of carrying a Canal by this route, but admitting a more level line might be found to the Mill Pond, and even that a Canal might be formed, whose surface water would be 20 feet lower than that of the Mill Pond, it would require 19 Locks of 10 feet lift each, to pass over the elevation, which, with a regulating Lock at each end, would make 21 Locks necessary; the expense of each of which would not be reckoned at less than £10,000. The cost of Lockage alone would therefore amount to £210,000.

30. I may observe that the access to a Canal on this route would be attended with considerable difficulty and expense; on one side is the very shoal water in Shediac Harbor, to overcome which, would require the Canal to be carried nearly a mile into the sea, a work which could not be executed without resorting to the use of expensive Coffor Dams, or of the Diving Bell; on the other hand are 18 miles of the Petitcodiac River by no means of easy navigation, although I am informed that Vessels in the hands of skilful Pilots rarely meet with an accident.

31. It is only in a case when the requisite supply of water, and other favourable circumstances, render the practicability of carrying such a project, as has been suggested, successfully into operation, that the entering upon the undertaking, which must necessarily involve great expense, is justifiable; I cannot consider it so in the present instance. If I am in error, I have erred on the side of caution, and much as I shall regret that my opinion may overthrow what has been long a favorite project in this Province, I consider from what I have observed upon the examination of the several routes, that the deficiency of head water renders the construction of a Canal of the ordinary description impracticable.

32. The most natural position for a Channel of communication, between the Bay of Fundy and the Gulf of St. Lawrence, is evidently from the head of Cumberland Basin to Bay Verte, and since it is not advisable to attempt to construct a Canal of the ordinary description, for the reasons above stated, it may be worth while to consider what would be the effect of cutting a Channel from water to water, leaving it to the waters themselves to complete the communication to render it navigable. The level of the neap flood tide at Tignish River is 9 feet $\frac{1}{2}$ inch lower than the corresponding tide in the Tantamar River; at flood tide in the latter the water would flow into Bay Verte, and so soon as the tide ebbed below the corresponding tide in Tignish River, which it would do because it ebbs so much more in Cumberland Basin than in Bay Verte, the waters of the latter would flow into the former, and would, on account of the great ebb in the Bay of Fundy, continue to flow much longer than it would the other way. The prevailing water therefore flowing through the Channel would be the clear water of the Gulf of St. Lawrence, and would counteract any ill effects that might arise from the muddy waters of the Bay of Fundy. The subject would however be much more advantageously considered when Captain Owen, R. N., has completed the tidal observations contemplated by him in the course of his Survey of the Bay of Fundy. In the mean time, should it meet your Excellency's wishes, I might, in the ensuing summer, make a further examination of the ground between the two waters, so as to ascertain the best line on which such a Channel might be formed, with a view to the least amount of excavation, and the most advantageous points of connection with the Bay of Fundy and Gulf of St. Lawrence.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

1. In reference to the concluding Paragraph of my Report on the Survey of a Line for a Canal to unite the Bay of Fundy with the Gulph of Saint Lawrence, I have the honor to offer the following observations on the practicability of cutting a Chunnel across the Isthmus connecting New Brunswick with Nova Scotia.

2. The object in view is, to cut a Channel of moderate dimensions from Bay Verte to Cumberland Basin, and to permit the action of the waters thus united, to form a Channel sufficient for the purposes of navigation.

3. The Tidal observations which are about to be made by Captain Owen, R. N., I am given to understand, will not be completed in less than one year from the time of commencing them. In
absence

absence of the result of these observations, I cannot give any accurate account of the difference of level of the Tides, so as to determine the fall from one point to the other, in order to judge if the current will be sufficient force to effect the desired object; but admitting the fall to be sufficient, it may be well to consider the effect such an opening would have on the Tantamar or adjoining Marshes.

4. Every Spring Tide would, if not restrained by the Dykes, flood the Marshes, which are the most valuable parts of the Farms in that neighbourhood. On opening a Channel as proposed, it will be highly important that the safety of these Marshes shall not be compromised; to prevent this will be a matter of considerable difficulty.

5. The soft soil of which the Marshes are composed, would offer so little resistance to a current of water, that it would be difficult to set limits to the width of the Channel. Dykes placed at any reasonable distance apart, between which the Channel should be formed, would be liable to be undermined and thrown down by the action of the water on the Banks, a circumstance of frequent occurrence to the present Dykes, and from which cause the Tantamar River is continually and perceptibly altering its course; and as the depth of the Channel would gradually extend to upwards of forty feet, it would be extremely difficult to secure the Banks by Piles.

6. That part of the excavation towards Bay Verte would be through Sand Stone Rock, which would yield very little to the action of the water; it would be highly probable that the rocky Channel would become, in process of time, a dangerous rapid; and at the junction of the Rock with the Marsh Land, the water, instead of continuing to flow with a gradual slope towards Cumberland Basin, would, on leaving the rocky part, scoop out the soft soil, and form a fall.

7. It may be observed, that the communication would be for some time interrupted between New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, as no Bridge could be placed across the Channel until the ultimate width of it was determined.

8. These circumstances, deduced from theory, appear to me to render it doubtful after all if a Channel, as proposed, would be easily navigable. At all events, so much uncertainty appears to exist, that the project would be extremely hazardous. With this view of the case, your Excellency may probably agree with me, that it is not desirable to prosecute the inquiry farther.

leaving the amount for both services, £117 7 6, for which two Warrants have issued, £75 on one occasion, and the balance, £42 7 6, on the 4th January last. In the first Account, Mr. Gesner has charged 20s. per day for his services on four successive Sundays, which of course is, on the face of it, inadmissible; and it is a matter of surprise that such a charge should have escaped the Auditor's notice.

"No. 3. Is a copy of the Instructions furnished Dr. Gesner by His Excellency, before proceeding on the explorations, as follow:—

(Copy.)

The following are the heads of instructions which I request you will be so good as to give to Doctor Gesner, on the deputation he has received:—

That he will proceed to the Great Falls, and along the North Bank of the upper Saint John, and cross over to the head waters of the Restigouche, noting the description of the country, and the Timber on it. That he will descend the Restigouche, examining the nature of the Lands in the valley, and the facilities of settlement on the Lands; and, in favorable situations, laying out such Tracts for Townships on the right Bank, as may be well calculated for the formation of Settlements, of which Surveys can be made. The Boundaries to be marked out and divided into 50 acre allotments, if the Land is clear, otherwise the subdivision of the Land may be reserved, but a particular description of each locality to be given. Any favorable situations on the left or Canadian side to be noted.

The depth of the River at this Season to be ascertained, and the obstructions, and where it becomes navigable. The description of vessels and their draft of water, that can navigate it while the River is open.

The quality of the Timber on the Banks of the River and its Tributaries.

The Fisheries to be reported on, and how far the Laws for their protection are observed or evaded.

It is not probable that Doctor Gesner will have an opportunity in the present season of exploring the Tributaries, but if the season should admit of the continuance of his exploration, he can devote the remainder of it to an examination of the Northern Coast of the Nipissiquit falling into the sea at Bathurst; making a report of his observations, and noting the situations where Settlements may be formed, and furnishing diagrams of the Townships he may lay out.

It will be desirable that he should give his attention to the state of the boundary between this Province and Canada, and offer any suggestion that may occur to him respecting it.

It would be advisable to furnish him with a sketch, shewing the old Line of Boundary under the Proclamation of 1767, or the Quebec Act of 1774; also, the boundary of the Province, which is understood to have been at one time defined, so as to include both Banks of the Restigouche and both shores of the Bay.

Dr. Gesner will direct his attention to the Geological features and Mineral resources of the Districts that he will traverse, in the prosecution of the exploratory survey on which he is about to proceed.

"Your Committee conceive such an application of the public money to be highly objectionable, the House having, at the last Session, by a large majority, refused any appropriation for the further prosecution of such a service.

"No. 4. Is a Petition from Dr. Gesner to His Excellency, praying for payment of 68 days services at 20s. per day, for exploring the Grand, Restigouche, and Tobique Rivers. This Petition is sworn to, and is accompanied by two notes addressed to His Excellency by the late Surveyor General, one dated 4th January last, and the other without date, recommending the claim to be allowed. An order in Council accordingly passed for this amount, and a Warrant issued and was paid on the 4th February following. It will thus be seen, that instead of 20s. per day, Dr. Gesner has actually received 40s. per day for his services in making these explorations—a sum which he certainly never could have contemplated to charge when he rendered his Accounts, otherwise he would have included this additional claim before they were submitted to the Auditor for his Report. Why the Executive Government sustained this last application, your Committee cannot comprehend, as the order in Council of the 4th January last was expressly for the payment of the balance of £42 7 6 claimed to be due for performing the same service.

PAYMENT OF EXECUTIVE COUNCIL.

(Extract.)

Downing Street, July 7, 1838.

SIR,—I have received your Despatch of the 7th June, marked private, requesting my authority for recommending to the Provincial Legislature the grant out of any surplus of the Civil List of New Brunswick, of a salary of Fifty Pounds per annum to each of the Members of your Executive Council who

who serve on the Committee of the Board formed for the purpose of superintending the Crown Land Department.

I see no ground for withholding my consent to your making this proposition to the Legislature.

SIR,—I have received your Despatch No. 22, of the 3d April, in which with reference to Lord Glenelg's Despatch No. 105, of the 7th July you report, that after consulting with your Council, you came to the opinion that it was unnecessary to submit to the Legislature the proposition for paying the Travelling and other expenses of the Members of the Executive Council, and that you had therefore directed the payment to them, at the rate of one guinea a day, out of the gross proceeds of the Casual and Territorial Revenue.

It does not appear to me that there is any ground for objecting to this charge, either as unreasonable in principle, or as excessive in amount;—but from your statement it would seem that the gross income of the Land Fund is charged with the payment of the remuneration of the Executive Councillors, not merely in respect of their services as administrators of that Revenue, but in respect of their services generally, as Members of the Executive Council. If this be the case, it is not easy to justify the payment as a whole, because, though the Land Fund must bear its own charges, it is not liable to bear any of the general charges of the Executive Government. Although the amount of the misappropriation, if such it be, is very inconsiderable, yet the principle is the same, and it may be apprehended that the Assembly will take their stand on that principle. The proper course will be, that you should state the case fully to the Attorney and Solicitor General of the Province, continuing these payments if they shall declare them legal, and reducing them to any extent which they shall declare to be required by the Law.

INFORMATION RELATIVE TO EXPENDITURE OF CASUAL REVENUE.

In reference to the Report of the Select Committee of the House of Assembly on the several Accounts and Documents relating to the Receipt and Expenditure of the Queen's Casual Revenue, we beg to make the following observations:—

In the year 1840 the expenses of the Indoor Establishment of the Crown Land and Surveyor General's Office were found to exceed Sixteen hundred pounds per annum, exclusive of contingencies, and a reduction was in consequence resolved upon and carried into effect; the principal Clerk or Deputy received a year's salary in advance, on being discontinued, and three junior Clerks a quarter's salary each, in advance. The expenses of the Establishment for that year were—

Mr. Grant's salary for the period he was engaged with Captain Crawley in Westmorland, was continued only until the expenses of the Canal survey could be ascertained, and the amount being £49 8 6, for 82 days absence, will be refunded from the Canal Fund to the Casual Revenue; the travelling expenses of that gentleman have been already charged to the Canal Fund: The sum of £94 5 7 may also be deducted for Mr. Wilkinson's salary:—For the whole period during which he was employed in performing surveys in the late Disputed Territory, and in compiling data connected with the North West Boundary, and the Boundary between Canada and New Brunswick, for the information of the British and Provincial Governments, on account of which services the advance of £95 was made to him from the Casual Revenue, and for which advance, together with the full amount of his salary derived from the Surveyor General's Office during the period in which he was engaged in the survey, &c. he has given credit in the Account rendered by him for this service, as follows:—

The Accounts of Mr. Jacob Allan, the Seizing Officer stationed at Indian Town, for Clerk hire and other expenses of his office, have been paid periodically for the last three years. In 1840 he received £108 5 5, for expenses to the first of July of that year; in 1841 he received £78 15 7, expenses to the first July of that year; and in the year 1842 he received £133 14 10, for expenses from the 1st of July, 1841, to the 30th of September, 1842, being the principal business periods of two seasons' inspections, and being in about the same proportion as the payments made in the two previous years.

The advances of £75 made to Doctor Gesner towards surveying the Tobique River and Valley was in no wise connected with a Geological Survey of the Province, (not authorized by the Legislature,) but was advanced to him as a Deputy of the Surveyor General's Department; and when the service, on account of which this advance had been made, was completed, the account was rendered in the usual manner, and certified by the Surveyor General, according to the existing regulations, and when audited, and the wages for himself and assistants were found to conform to the usual rates, the balance of his account, amounting to £42 7 6, was paid to him,—the advance of £75 being first deducted. Doctor Gesner having, however, subsequently shewn, that in consequence of the distance which he had to travel, the expensive, laborious and difficult nature of the services which he had performed, were not compensated by the above allowance, that sum having been barely sufficient to repay his outlay; and it appearing that these services had been executed in the most satisfactory and efficient manner, the further sum of £68 was subsequently allowed to him as a compensation for his personal services. The additional payment of £75 to this Gentleman, appears to have been an advance made to him on account of exploring, surveying and locating the "Mechanics' Settlement," the detailed account for which services he has not yet furnished;—the same has, however, been called for by the Auditor.

The charge of £517 4 10 for the Lieutenant Governor's postage comprises the postage for the five quarters, ending December, 1841, nearly two quarters of which were incurred prior to Sir William Colebrooke's arrival in the Province, and after his arrival it continued for a length of time to be burthened with heavy charges for the postage of packages of Journals, &c. from the Sister Provinces. On becoming acquainted with this circumstance after receiving the account from the Postmaster since the close of the Session of 1842, His Excellency discontinued receiving such packages, thus materially reducing the charges of that branch of the Public Expenditure, as will appear by reference to page 133, Journals of 1843, where the Lieutenant Governor's postage for the last quarter of 1842, amounted only to the sum of £50 12 1. He also made these onerous and vexatious charges the subject of a remonstrance to the Governor General, and although from a Despatch recently received from the Chief Secretary's Office, Kingston, no immediate refund of them can be expected, still there are reasonable grounds for anticipating that this may ultimately be done.

It will moreover be found on looking into the postage accounts, that the charge for official correspondence in 1841, when compared with the expenditure of former years, is not excessive; when it is borne in mind that Sir John Harvey charged half his postage accounts to the Military Chest, a fund over which the present Lieutenant Governor has no controul. The postages were always charged as contingencies. In the Session of 1842, the sum of £450 was voted for the "contingencies" of 1841, but the expenditure of this sum has already been anticipated, as there was a balance due on that account when Sir William Colebrooke assumed the Government of the Province in April, 1841, and he was obliged to make the necessary advances to the amount of £450 during the year, from his own private funds; and when the amount of the postage account to December, 1841, was communicated to the House in the Session of 1842, after the Committee of Supply had closed, it was intimated by the Speaker's letter, that the Assembly would not object to grant a considerable increase at the following Session to meet the deficiency, and that in the meantime, any sums required might be taken from the gross proceeds of the Crown Revenues, until the same could be replaced by the Assembly.

With respect to the charge of £105 for the Printing, Stationery, &c. for the Secretary's Office, the Committee find that the expenses thus incurred were regularly paid by order of the Governor and Council from the year 1787 until the year 1836 inclusive, a period of fifty years; subsequent to which time the sum of £105 settled by the House of Assembly upon an average of three years has been paid by Legislative Grants until the last year, when the appropriation of 1841, after being twice agreed to, was after a number of Members had left the House, ordered to be expunged, and the pledge of the House to provide for these expenses left unredeemed.

The objection taken by the Committee of the House does not appear to be the defraying of these expenses, but to the mode of payment, and upon this point your Committee would remark, that from the expense thus incurred, a portion of the Casual Revenue, amounting to about four hundred pounds per annum, is collected, and as the administration of this Revenue is by the Civil List Act expressly vested in the Governor and Council, who are thereby authorized to expend such sums from the gross proceeds,

proceeds, as they may deem necessary and requisite for the prudent management, collection and protection thereof, and who are thus made the judges of what sums are necessary and requisite to be expended, your Committee are of opinion that the Governor and Council are justified in making the payment, as they have done, out of the gross proceeds, the House having failed to fulfil their pledge, and as without these expenses being incurred, the collection of the sum above specified could not be made.

It may be further remarked that the fact of the House of Assembly having pledged itself to provide for these expenses annually from the Province Chest, does not in any degree annul the right of the Executive to defray the same whenever the House may neglect or refuse to fulfil that pledge; which view of the case appears indeed to have been entertained even by Members of the Assembly themselves, it having been proposed at the last Session that the amount should be paid out of the Civil List Fund; a resolution to which effect stands now recorded in their Journals, (4th of March, 1842,) though lost, as it would appear, from there being a majority present favorable to the grant which was then for the second time agreed to.

It should also be remembered that the payment in question was made, not prospectively for services to be performed, but to defray expenses actually incurred, and the principle of which was sanctioned not only by a precedent of fifty years practice, but also fully recognized by the decision of the Legislature when the average amount was settled in 1839, and it was made not from money in the Province Treasury, but from funds which being in the custody and under the control of the Executive Government, did not require the previous sanction of the Legislature:—This charge is not however made in the account of the Casual Revenue, but in the Schedule of Warrants drawn as contingencies, to be refunded in whatever manner should be finally approved, either by grant of the House as heretofore, or by grant to the Governor, as contingencies, or by deductions from the gross proceeds of the Casual Revenue.

The allowance to the Attorney General for stationery was ordered in Council for the last three years as a contingency, and as a reasonable charge, he being so often called upon for official reports and opinions, for which he receives no particular pay or compensation.

In reference to the expenses of the Auditor's Office, the Committee have to observe, that the Resolution of the House of Assembly of the 1st April, 1842, (Journals Page 290,) and Address to the Lieutenant Governor, expressly contemplated that the Auditor should make up the arrearages of Road Accounts due by the numerous Supervisors and Commissioners, and balances due from all other parties to whom the expenditure of Public monies had been intrusted, extending over a series of years: The satisfactory performance of this service in time to admit of the communication of the Audited Accounts to the Legislature, necessarily required a minute and laborious inspection of the Provincial Journals and Acts for several years past; a thorough inspection of all accounts connected with the expenditure of Public monies for a like period; the preparation of numerous lengthy detailed abstracts and reports, and a voluminous correspondence, all which being in addition to the usual routine duty of the office of Audit, must have occasioned much additional labor, responsibility and expense; and taking all those circumstances into consideration, the Committee are of opinion that the sum of £752, which comprises all the charges connected with that department for the period of thirteen months (the term over which the charge extends) is not by any means an extravagant outlay, it being at the rate of less than £700 per annum; and it would also appear to be fully borne out by Lord Glenelg's Despatch of the 5th September, 1836, (Assembly Journals of 1837, page 202,) and by the Report of the Committee of the Legislative Council of the 27th February, 1837, made in accordance with the said Despatch, and adopted by the Council, wherein the sum of £850 per annum was recommended for the contemplated establishment for the Office of Audit, (vide Council Journals of 1837, pages 162 and 167.)

As regards the salary of the late Surveyor General, the Honorable John S. Saunders, the Committee have to observe that the sum of £800 per annum, was the lowest rate fixed by Sir John Harvey, provisionally for Mr. Saunders' salary as Surveyor General, taking into consideration the portion of the duty of Commissioner of Crown Lands, which devolved upon him; and Sir John, in a Despatch to Lord John Russell of the 7th of April, 1841, after having consulted with those Members of the Executive Council, who had Seats in the Assembly, stated it as his conviction that this rate or even £900 of annual salary would be cheerfully acquiesced in by the House of Assembly, and that in advancing money to Mr. Saunders on account, he had taken care not to exceed the lower of the rates to which he had adverted; and Lord John Russell, in a Despatch of the 11th of May, 1841, to Sir William Colebrooke, states that he should be glad if Sir William would take into consideration Sir John Harvey's Despatch, communicating his opinion in regard to the amount of salary to be assigned to Mr. Saunders; and the Committee are of opinion that Sir William in sanctioning the payment of the lowest rate named in the Despatch (£800 per annum,) for only a portion of the time during which Mr. Saunders filled the office of Surveyor General, viz. till the period of Sir John Harvey's departure, has not even fully carried out the views suggested by Sir John and sanctioned by Lord John Russell, as those documents evidently contemplate the payment of not less than £800 per annum to Mr. Saunders, for his full term of office as Surveyor General. The Committee observe that from the 18th of July, 1841, from which period Mr. Baillie's reinstatement in office by order of Lord John Russell took effect, until he took charge of it personally, he received £600 a year, being one moiety of his fixed salary, and Mr. Saunders received no more than the other moiety, as will appear by the following statement:—

With respect to the duties performed by Mr. Wilkinson and Dr. Gesner, your Committee remark that they were highly important in their results, but as parts of those duties were intrusted to them under confidential instructions respecting the American and Canadian Boundaries, they cannot at present consistently with the Public interests be brought forward, yet they abundantly attest the zeal and intelligence with which they have been conducted, and the influence which they are calculated to have upon the interests of the Province, in comparison with which the sums expended are of very trivial consideration.

In conclusion, the Committee have to remark, that whilst they consider it highly necessary that the Executive should set an example of economy, and exercise a wholesome and prudent supervision over every Department of the Public service under their control, they cannot but confidently anticipate that the House of Assembly, on a review of the items constituting these expenditures, will perceive that they are in general lower than the expenditures of previous years for the like services, and as low as was consistent with a due regard to the Public interests.

MY DEAR SIR,—I herewith return the enclosed Accounts. The amount of Postages in the Department so far exceed the expectations of the Members of the Assembly, that they are not at all surprised at the sums expended by the Executive for contingent expenses.

The contingent grant for the past year, £450, and for the present year, £400 only, will not be sufficient to meet all the demands upon these grants, and the Assembly will not object at the next Session, to grant a considerable increase to meet these large demands; in the meantime, any sum required may be taken from the gross proceeds of the Casual Revenue, until the same may be replaced by the Assembly.

SIR,—From the very heavy charges which has been incurred for postage on public papers received from the British Provinces, the Lieutenant Governor has directed me to suggest to you whether there may not be some less expensive channel through which to transmit them than that offered by the regular Post Office. On a recent occasion a package containing the Laws passed during the last Session of the Canadian Legislature, was charged above £27, while more recently two thin volumes of similar contents from Halifax, were rated at more than £7. The Lieutenant Governor is not aware on what terms such documents may be received in Canada, or what other means of transmission may be open to you, but until some arrangement, similar to that which prevails in England, be made in reference to such papers, he has been anxious that you be made acquainted with the circumstance, in the hope that some less costly mode of conveyance may present itself.

EXTRACT OF A LETTER FROM A. READE, ESQUIRE, TO MR. PAGE.

Fredericton, 13th September, 1842.

Under the present arrangements of the Post Office in this Province, great irregularities are occasionally occurring, and are the cause of much complaint, as also the want of facilities in the transmission of letters by the Steam Boats running between Fredericton and Saint John; and the Lieutenant Governor thinks it of much consequence, that some arrangement should be made for the conveyance of Mails by these Vessels, and that it would be unjust to prevent the transmission of correspondence by them if the Post Office does not facilitate it.

The heavy charges on the interchange of official printed papers and volumes between these Provinces, demands immediate attention. The Assembly have complained of these charges, which the Lieutenant Governor would suggest, ought to be reduced to the rates for Parliamentary papers, and until the Act of Parliament can be altered, the present charges remitted, as in Nova Scotia.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 13th instant, and in reply to state for the information of the Lieutenant Governor, that the transmission of printed papers is not confined to the channel of the Post Office, but they may be legally sent as parcels in any manner the senders may think proper.

Any printed papers sent through the Post Office of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, in closed covers, are liable to full postage as letters, but under a privilege of long standing, pamphlets in covers open at the ends, are allowed to pass within these Provinces at a reduced charge of one penny a sheet, the same being the perquisite of the Deputy Post Master General. This charge must, however, be prepaid by the sender, or the packet will be rated with full letter postage.

MY LORD,—In complying with the wishes of Mr. J. S. Saunders, the Acting Surveyor General of this Province, by transmitting to your Lordship a letter which he has placed in my hands for that purpose, it is proper that I should inform your Lordship that I have had a full communication with those Members of the Executive Council, who have Seats in the Assembly, upon the subject of the rate of salary to be assigned to the office of Surveyor General, from which I am enabled to express to your Lordship my confident belief that the House of Assembly will not be induced to concur in a higher rate of salary than that received by the Chief Justice being hereafter granted to any officer of the Government in this Province, except the Lieutenant Governor. With regard to the particular office in question, having myself suggested that £600 currency per annum as the salary of the Surveyor General, with the addition of half that sum in consideration of that part of the duty of Commissioner of Crown Lands, consisting principally in the sale of lands, and which continues to attach to the office of Surveyor General, might together constitute a sufficient remuneration without being liable to be regarded as excessive.—In this suggestion of £900 currency the majority of the Members whom I consulted appeared to acquiesce, but the others expressing, as I am inclined to believe, the feeling of the Assembly on the subject, intimated doubts as to that body willingly assenting to a higher rate than £800 currency. Having thus narrowed the question to the difference of £800 and £900, I leave it in your Lordship's hands, merely observing that I am convinced the House of Assembly will cheerfully agree to which ever of these two sums your Lordship may be pleased to assign to the office. It may be proper to add, that in advancing money to Mr. Saunders on account, I have taken care not to exceed the lower of the rates to which I have adverted.

"Whereas it appears by the Return of the Expenditure of the Casual and Territorial Revenue for the past year, sent down to this House by Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, that several charges have been made on the gross proceeds of that Revenue, not sanctioned by the "Act for the support of the Civil Government in this Province;" and whereas it is expedient for this Committee to express its opinion on the authority of the Executive in the premises, and to require for the future the strictest economy in the disbursements, legally borne on the gross proceeds of that Revenue; therefore

"*Resolved*, As the opinion of this Committee, That no expenditure not absolutely required for the prudent and economical management, protection and collection of the said Revenue, is, under the above mentioned Act, legally chargeable to the gross proceeds of the same; and further

SIR,—In transmitting to Your Excellency an extract of an Address which has been presented to me by the General Assembly of this Island, relative to a provision for the maintenance of a Light House proposed to be established on the S. W. Coast of Newfoundland, and in soliciting Your Excellency's

Excellency's support of the measure with the Legislature of Canada, I would beg to invite your attention to the fact (fully established by a comparison of the losses by Shipwreck during any given period) that though it is intended that the locality of the Light should be fixed upon the territory of this Colony, yet the advantages expected to be derived from it must necessarily be enjoyed principally by the Trade of the Colonies situated westward of Newfoundland, and more especially by that home-ward bound from the Bay of Chaleur and Gulf of Saint Lawrence.

Canada may therefore be justly said to have a far more direct personal interest in the establishment of this proposed National Beacon, not only than this Island, but than any of the other Colonies of British North America. On these grounds, I venture to invite and to anticipate Your Excellency's support of the proposition which it is the object of this communication to bring under your notice.

The calculations which have been made of the probable expense of maintaining the proposed Light (one of such great importance, and situated in so remote and isolated a location) based upon those of similar existing establishments in this Island, would lead to the conclusion that it cannot safely be assumed at less than £600 per annum. Of the relative proportions which ought fairly to be contributed by the several Colonies concerned, their respective Legislatures will be the best judges; but I trust I may be pardoned for suggesting, that if three fourths of the whole expense be contributed by Canada and the Lower Provinces, including Prince Edward's Island, Newfoundland will willingly charge herself with the remainder.

The communication addressed to me by the Chamber of Commerce of this City, (of which I enclose a copy) will enable Your Excellency to judge of the advantages which Cape Pine possesses over Cape Race, as the site of the proposed Light House.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

The House of Assembly beg leave to acquaint Your Excellency, that from a copy of a Despatch sent down to this House by Your Excellency, dated Treasury Chambers, 11th May, 1841, they learn that the Elder Brethren of the Trinity House having signified their opinion that the measure of lighting the Southeastern part of Newfoundland would be effectually accomplished by the erection of a Light House on Cape Pine, on the Southeasternmost extremity of that land, and of one also upon Saint Pierre; and likewise, that all vessels bound to or from ports or places situate between Saint John's, Newfoundland, and Cape Cod, in the United States, including the River Saint Lawrence, would be benefitted by the establishment of Light Houses in the above mentioned situations; and further, that my Lords advertent to the measures adopted in regard to the construction of Light Houses under very analogous circumstances on the Coast of Nova Scotia, are prepared to recommend to Parliament such grant as may be requisite for defraying the expense of constructing a Light House on Cape Pine, subject to the condition that provision shall be made by the Legislature of Newfoundland, either separately or with aid from the other North American Provinces interested in the establishment of the Light House, for the further maintenance of the Light; and said Despatch, after alluding to a report to be made by the Commanding Royal Engineer on this station, as to the most eligible arrangements for constructing the Light House, continues, my Lords would further suggest to Lord John Russell that it will be advisable to call for a similar report from the Governor of Newfoundland, or from any local authorities, under whose directions the construction or management of other Light Houses on the Coast of the Island has been placed.

The House of Assembly feeling the great importance, not alone to the trade of this Island, but to that of Great Britain and Ireland, the neighbouring Colonies and the United States, of the erection of a Light House on Cape Pine, and in order to enable the Secretary of State for the Colonies to carry out the very liberal suggestion of the Lords of the Treasury, now pledge themselves, that in the event of such Light House being erected, they will pass an Act providing a sufficient sum of money to meet the maintenance of said Light.

The House of Assembly request that your Excellency will be pleased to put yourself into communication with the Government authorities of such of the neighbouring Provinces and the United States, whose vessels may be benefitted by such Light, in order to induce their supplying their just proportion towards the annual maintenance of such Light.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

The Chamber of Commerce having been encouraged by Your Excellency to express an opinion on the most advantageous point to place a Light House on the Southern Shores of this Island, have, after mature deliberation, come to the conclusion, that Cape Pine is by far the more eligible situation, possessing these advantages over Cape Race:—In the first place, Cape Pine is the more Southern point of the

the two, it is very much the higher land, and can therefore be seen over Cape Race; while a Light House on Cape Race would be completely masked by Cape Pine to vessels coming from the westward: Secondly, Cape Pine is surrounded with Rocks and Shoals, and therefore more perilous of approach than Cape Race, which is a bold shore, free from such dangers; and thirdly, the rapid current constantly setting past Cape Pine into St. Mary's Bay, deceives vessels by carrying them to the Northward of their reckoning and causing many to be lost in the vicinity of St. Shots, which is but a few miles to the Northward of Cape Pine.

If the Chamber were to give an opinion founded on the interests of Newfoundland alone, they might perhaps be induced to consider the claims of Cape Race equal if not superior to those of Cape Pine, but considering them with a view to the commerce of Great Britain and her North American Colonies generally, they can have no hesitation in deciding in favor of Cape Pine; and the experience of past years has shewn that ten vessels have been lost in the neighbourhood of Cape Pine to one nearer Cape Race; thus proving the necessity of guarding British shipping against those dangers which more particularly threaten them when approaching Cape Pine. A bell at the Light House, to be used in foggy weather, or, if not attended with too great an expense, the occasional firing of a gun would be of great service.

3d. *Resolved*, As the opinion of this Committee, That the two amounts of £105 and £90 16 6 paid for the Provincial Secretary's Stationery and Fuel, for the years 1841 and 1842, have been improperly drawn upon the gross proceeds of the Casual Revenue; and further, Resolved, that the payment of the first mentioned sum of £105 cannot be viewed by the House otherwise than as a most extraordinary proceeding, the House having refused to provide for the same at its last Session, and such refusal was well known to the Government.

Upon the question for sustaining this amendment, the Committee divided—

YEAS, 14.

NAYS, 10.

And it was carried in the affirmative.

4th. *Resolved*, As the opinion of this Committee, That the sum of £30 3 1, for the Adjutant General's Postage, is not properly chargeable on the gross proceeds of the Casual Revenue, the office of Adjutant General not being in any way connected with the Sales and Leases of Crown Lands, Woods, Mines and Royalties.

5th. *Resolved*, As the opinion of this Committee, That the House should express its dissatisfaction with the payment of the sum of £200 to the Honorable John S. Saunders, in addition to the salary of £600 per annum for his services as Surveyor General, out of the Surplus of the Civil List Fund; the salary being an ample remuneration for the efficient performance of the duties of the office, and adequate to secure the services of an officer of the greatest talents and most active business habits in the Province; which sum of £600 was fixed upon provisionally, as appears by the Message of Sir John Harvey to the House of Assembly of the date of the 4th March, 1841.

6th. *Resolved*, As the opinion of this Committee, That the charge of £17 16 3, for the Emigrant Agent's expenses of Office and Contingencies; as also the charge of £6 8s. for an express to Saint John, are not chargeable upon the gross proceeds of the Casual Revenue.

7th. *Resolved*, As the opinion of this Committee, That the sum of £500 currency, per annum, as reported by the Select Committee on Salaries at the last Session of the General Assembly, is fully adequate to provide for efficiently Auditing all Public Accounts of the Province, whether Casual, Territorial or General, and that the House should express its disapprobation of the expenditure of any greater sum for that purpose, out of any funds whatever.

8th. *Resolved*, As the opinion of this Committee, That the sum of £10, allowed to the Honorable the Attorney General, for Stationery, out of the gross proceeds of the Casual Revenue, in addition to the Salary of that Officer, should be discontinued.

And the Chairman then further reported, that he was directed to ask leave to sit again.

The Resolutions as reported by the Committee, being then handed in at the Clerk's Table, were there again read.

Ordered, That the Report be accepted, the Resolutions as concurred in by the Committee adopted by the House, and leave to sit again granted.

On motion of Mr. Wilmot,

Whereas the Assembly, during several years past, have endeavoured, without success, to effect certain reasonable modifications in the Charter of King's College; and whereas those modifications, as contained in the Bill which has been rejected by the Legislative Council, during the present Session, have been loudly and repeatedly called for by numerous Petitions from nearly every County in the Province, while no Petition has ever been presented against those modifications; and whereas it is in vain to expect that amount of public benefit from the Institution which its munificent endowment from the Provincial Revenue should ensure; therefore

Resolved. That this House have learned with much regret and disappointment that a majority of the Legislative Council have rejected the said Bill during the present Session; and further

Resolved. That this House should persevere in their endeavours to amend the said Charter by Legislative enactment, and not resort to an Address to the Throne for a new Charter; and that this House will steadfastly adhere to the principle, that all the Educational Establishments of the Province, which are endowed from the Colonial Revenues, whether Incorporated by Royal Charter or otherwise, should be at all times subject to the supervision of the Local Legislature.

Mr. Boyd, from the Committee appointed on the 31st day of January last, to take under consideration all matters relating to Light Houses, submitted their Report; and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

"The

“ The Committee to whom were referred the various matters connected with the Light Houses within the Province, Report :

“ That they have had before them the Report and Accounts of Expenditure by the Commissioners for the Bay of Fundy Light Houses, with the Provincial Auditor's Report thereon ; and they find that the expenses on the several Establishments under the charge of the Commissioners residing at Saint John, viz. Partridge Island, Beacon, Quaco, Cape Enrage, Gannet Rock, and Point Lepreaux Lights, to stand thus :—

“ Repairs, Supplies, &c. for the year 1842, £851 10 2 ; Commission thereon, £42 11s. 6d. ; Salaries for the Keepers of the different Light Houses, £700 ; towards the support of the Light House on Brier Island, £100 ; and Cape Sable Seal Island, in Nova Scotia, £152 5 2 ;—making the total amount of expenditure and payments for the past year, ending 31st December, 1842, £1846 6 10 ;—which is accompanied with the necessary vouchers.

“ The Commissioners have not given credit for £9 7 6, noted in the Committee's Report last year, as having been charged for Office Rent. This charge, on inquiry, proves to be for the occupation of a Room in the Commercial Bank Building, adjoining the Commissioners' Office, where the spare Lamps, Glass, Wicks and Stores generally are safely kept, and under the immediate eye of the Commissioners ; the charge appears moderate and equitable, and should be paid. They credit £40 11s. due the Province on last year's Accounts ; and funds drawn from the Province Treasury, £1,850 ; also for Oil sold, £45 1 10 ;—leaving a balance due the Province on 31st December last, of £89 6s.

“ Your Committee recommend that an appropriation of £107 8 6 be made to the Commissioners of Light Houses residing at Saint John, to enable them to compensate the Superintendent of Bay of Fundy Light Houses for his services to the end of the year 1842 ; they also remark that the highest credit is due to the Commissioners and Superintendent for the economical and efficient manner in which those Establishments have been conducted for the past year, as also the accurate and methodical manner in which the Accounts have been kept and made up.

“ Also the Report and Accounts of the Commissioners of Saint Andrews, Campo Bello, and Machias Seal Island Light Houses, by which it appears that the expenditure for the year ending 31st December last, for supplies, alterations and repairs, was £404 11 7 ; Commissions on the same, £20 4 6½ ; and for Keepers' Salaries, £290 ;—making the whole expenditure, £714 16 1½. All of those Accounts are correctly stated, attested to, and regularly vouched. They credit funds drawn from the Province Treasury, amounting to £717 19 6 ;—leaving a balance due the Province of £2 1 2½, after deducting a balance of £1 2 2 due the Commissioners in 1841.

“ The Commissioners report that extensive repairs have been made by them during the last year, at that most important Light House Station on Machias Seal Island, being damage sustained from the gale in February, 1842 ; and that the proximity of this Establishment to a dangerous navigation, where shipwrecks often occur, have induced them to place a supply of Provisions on the Island, in case of need ; also to erect a Tank for the reception of rain water, for the use of the Keeper and unfortunate individuals who may meet with such casualty.

“ Your Committee duly appreciate the services of the Light House Commissioners of Machias Seal Island, Gannet Rock, &c. for their considerate attention in adopting means for the relief and support of shipwrecked seamen, and feel satisfied that the constructing Water Tanks will cause a large saving to the Province, by preventing the necessity of sending water to those establishments at great expense ; and in compliance with their Report, recommend the immediate erection of a Fog Bell, to be worked by machinery, by which means much property and many valuable lives may be saved. They also report that various improvements and repairs have been made at Head Harbour and Indian Point Lights, with a substitution of durable and effective Lanthorns and Burners. Much attention appears to have been given by the Commissioners to the several branches of their duty. The small salary of only forty pounds allowed the Keeper of the latter Light, will not, in the opinion of your Committee, admit of any reduction.

“ The Committee have had before them the Report and Accounts of the Commissioners

missioners of Light Houses who reside at Miramichi, by which it appears that the expenditure for the year ending 31st December last, for outlays in Oil, Plate Glass, Wicks and improvements, &c. was £75 19 9 and Keeper's salary and Fuel, £95; they also charge Commission £8 11s.; but in accordance with the Report adopted by the House last Session, the sum of £4 Commission, charged on the Keeper's salary, will have to be deducted, thereby leaving the total amount expended by them £175 10 9. The foregoing Accounts are properly vouched, and highly satisfactory, and the Light House at Point Escuminac, is reported by Captain Owen to be in an efficient state, and recommend that an appropriation be made for the above mentioned sum.

"They have had under consideration a letter addressed to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor by the Commissioners at Saint John, dated the 18th May, 1842, submitting an estimate for the constructing a Stone Wall of Granite around the Light House at Gannet Rock; they cannot recommend so considerable an outlay at present, except under unavoidable circumstances, although they recommend the construction thereof eventually. The said Commissioners have also intimated that a reduction might be made in the rate of Tonnage Duty collected for the support of Light Houses, to the extent of 25 per cent. They have also had under consideration a Petition from a number of Shipowners and others, praying a reduction on Light House and Hospital dues.

"Your Committee remark, that however desirable it may be at all times to lessen the charges on Shipping, yet in view of the casualties that may arise, and improvements annually required, as well as that already noticed for Gannet Rock, they cannot recommend to the House any alteration of the Law at present, as the excess of income over the expenditure only averages on the last four years about £140 annually, but trust that an improved state of Trade will warrant a reduction at the next Session of the Legislature.

The Document communicated by the foregoing Message, being read at the Clerk's Table, is as follows:—

FURTHER INFORMATION RELATIVE TO EXPENDITURE OF CASUAL REVENUE.

The Committee of the Executive Council to whom was referred the Report of the Select Committee of the House of Assembly, on the several Accounts and Documents relating to the Receipt and Expenditure of the Queen's Casual Revenue, have to make the following supplementary observations:—

The Committee were labouring under a misapprehension when they stated that the charge of £517 4s. 10d. for the Lieutenant Governor's Postage was for the five quarters ending December, 1841, and that nearly two quarters of it were incurred prior to Sir William Colebrooke's arrival in the Province. The real facts are, that the charge comprises the Postage for upwards of six quarters, commencing on the 1st of April, 1841, and terminating on the 5th of October, 1842; and the two first quarters of this period, amounting to £142 0 6, of which £7 9 3 was incurred by Sir John Harvey, was paid by Sir William Colebrooke from his own private funds, in the year 1841, and was refunded him in April, 1842, by Warrant, No. 396, on the Casual Revenue.

At A Section I, insert the words “for the purpose of erecting, building and maintaining a Boom across the Arestook River, below the Falls in the said River, to secure the Timber, Logs and other Lumber floating down the same.”

At B insert a new Section as follows, and alter the number of the remaining Section:—

“VI. Provided always and be it enacted, That unless a good and sufficient Boom be actually erected as contemplated by the provisions of this Act, and a Certificate of the said erection signed and verified on oath by the Directors or Managers of the said Corporation, which oath any Justice of the Peace may administer, shall be filed in the Office of the Secretary of the Province, before the expiration of two years after the passing of this Act, the operation of this Act shall cease, and the existence of the said Corporation be terminated at the expiration of the said two years.”

And the question being put thereon—

Resolved, That the House do concur therein.

Ordered, That Mr. Perley do return the Bill with the amendment to the Council and acquaint them therewith.

That the House proceed to the Order of the Day, adjourned by operation of the Twenty Second Rule of the House, to go into Committee of the whole in further consideration of Supplies to be granted for the Public Service,—

To Doctor G. P. Peters, Surgeon to the Vaccine Institution, Central Board, Saint John, the sum of £15 for his services for the year 1842.

To the Justices of the Peace of the City and County of Saint John, in aid of individual subscription towards the support of the Roman Catholic School established in the said City, and now in most efficient operation, the sum of £150.

To the Governor and Trustees of the Madras School, the sum of £400 for the year 1843, towards the support of that Institution.

To the Clerk of the Crown in the Supreme Court, the sum of £100 for his services for the year 1842.

To the Trustees of the Wesleyan Academy at Sackville, the sum of £200 towards the support of that Institution.

To His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Administrator of the Government for time being, the sum of £50 for a Missionary for the Melicite Tribe of Indians, stationed at Fredericton, for the year 1843.

And the Chairman further reported, that he was directed to ask leave to sit again.

Ordered, That the Report be accepted, the Resolutions engrossed, and leave to sit again granted.

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

Ordered, That the House do to-morrow go into Committee of the whole on a Bill imposing Duties for raising a Revenue.

On like motion of Mr. Partelow,

Ordered, That the House do on Thursday next the 23d instant, go into Committee of the whole in further consideration of Supplies to be granted for the Public Service.

Mr. End, from the Select Committee appointed on the 3d day of February last, to take into consideration the subject of the illegal occupation of Crown Lands and Indian Reserves, submitted a first Report upon the matters referred to them; and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

“The Committee to whom was referred that part of His Excellency's Speech which relates to the illegal occupation of Crown Lands and Indian Reserves, having attended to that duty, make their first Report:

“That the extensive reservations of Lands heretofore made for the use of the Indians have not by any means realized the humane intentions of Government towards that unfortunate race.

“That seeing that those Reserves have been to a great extent unoccupied by the Indians, although in many cases well adapted for Agricultural purposes, and affording eligible Mill seats, your Committee are not surprised to find that Settlers have in several instances entered upon portions of them and made improvements thereon;—Some of those entries have been made with the full concurrence of the Indians, and some, your Committee have no doubt, have taken place either absolutely without their permission or under permissions unfairly obtained—Your Committee do not consider it expedient to discriminate on this point, and are unanimous in the opinion that the claims of all actual Settlers who have made improvements on those Lands ought to be regarded, inasmuch as by these means, not only has the settlement of the Country been accelerated, but the Indians themselves have had the advantages of neighbourhoods whose progressive improvement should powerfully stimulate the efforts of any class of human beings, accessible to the effects of good example.

“Your Committee are of opinion, that the period has arrived, when steps should be taken to throw open limited portions of those Reserves for legal Settlement and occupation, and to place the residue under judicious management, in order that tracts which hitherto have been in many cases barriers to the extension of thriving Settlements, and in others, the resort of lawless depredators, may become sources of revenue, available alike for the encouragement of the industrious and relief of the infirm of the Indian Population, as well as the seats of thriving Agricultural Settlements, and with a view to the attainment of those desirable objects, they recommend, that all the Indian Reserves be surveyed under the superintendence of the Indian Commissioners for the Counties in which they are respectively appointed; that such portions as it may be desirable from their natural advantages, and the expressed wishes of the Indians to appropriate for Indian Villages, be reserved to a sufficient extent in each case to afford ample space for Village, Pasture, and Wood Lots; and that the residue be laid off into lots, generally of from 50 to 100 acres each, and in such manner as may be best suited to the formation of Settlements, regard being had to the occupancy of actual settlers as much as possible on the same lots, whenever it can be done without materially injuring the whole.

“That the Indian Commissioners then proceed to value the improvements made by actual settlers on the different lots, and report such valuation to the Executive Government, recommending what lots they may think it advisable to offer for sale, and the price at which such lots should be offered, and also what lots they may think it advisable

advisable to lease, with the estimated annual rent;—the lots for lease to be confined principally to Meadow lots.

“That the Executive Government be requested to order that such lots be offered for sale at the upset price recommended, and under the condition of immediate actual settlement by the respective purchasers; that no person be allowed to become the purchaser of more than two hundred acres, that he be required to pay the purchase money to the Receiver General in five instalments, the first or one fifth on the day of sale, and the residue in four equal yearly payments with interest, and that the purchaser of another persons improvements be required to pay in addition the estimated value of those improvements within thirty days after the day of sale, or produce a certificate from the previous occupant that he has been satisfied for his improvements. A Ticket of Location to issue to the purchaser on payment of the first instalment and valuation of the improvements (if an improved lot) and a Grant to issue on payment of the last instalment, provided the purchaser or his family be actually residing on the land, or have a Mill or Mills in actual operation thereon. The Ticket not to authorize the settler to cut Timber or Lumber on the land without the special permission of the Executive Government.

“That the Meadow lots be leased annually at Auction at some Public place in the County by the Commissioners, the years rent to be paid them by the purchaser on the day of sale, and to be remitted by them to the Receiver General with an account of sales.

“That all monies received for the sale or lease of Indian Lands, be paid over quarterly to the Province Treasurer, and bear interest at the rate of six per cent. per annum, and a separate and distinct account of such monies be kept by him, under the title of ‘Indian Fund Account,’ and that all appropriations made to or for the benefit of the Indians, be charged to the said Fund; such appropriation to specify the County for which they are made, and the quarterly payments to the Treasurer to be accompanied by an Account, shewing the Counties from which the monies were received, in order that the appropriations may be regulated thereby.

“That the Indian Village locations be laid off into Town, Pasture and Wood Lots, the Town Plat to comprize Church and School Lots, and a Town Common, and that any Indian expressing a desire to have a separate allotment, be furnished with a Location Ticket, (not transferable) of the Town, Pasture and Wood Lot selected by him; the same to be conditioned for his building and residing a portion of each year upon his Town Lot, and improving his Pasture Lot, and a prospect to be held out to him of his becoming at a future day the possessor of his location in fee simple, provided he continued to reside thereon, and the location to be null and void if he abandoned the Lands for a full year, or assigned away his right to it.

“That a sum equal to the interest arising from the Indian Fund, and the rents received, be appropriated annually to the Commissioners of the respective Counties from which the Fund was raised, in trust, for the benefit of the Indians; the same to be expended in relieving the aged and infirm, in encouraging the establishment of Schools, in purchasing Seed and approved Agricultural Implements, in promoting Agricultural pursuits by premiums and otherwise, and in such other measures for the benefit and improvement of the Indians as the Commissioners shall deem expedient, and as the funds at their disposal will enable them to carry into effect; and that they be authorized to hold out inducements to a limited number of efficient and steady Mechanics to settle in each Village, and take young Indians as apprentices; such Mechanics to be entitled to a free grant of a Town, Pasture and Wood Lot.

“Your Committee have confined their recommendation of the leasing of the Indian Lots chiefly to Meadow Lands, under the conviction that the leasing system, if extended to Farm Lots, will occasion trouble and expense in the collection of the rents, the more so, as prudent and thrifty Settlers seldom are induced to occupy Leased Lands, even under the most favorable circumstances, but prefer penetrating into the forests and cutting out freeholds with their axes from the wilderness, leaving those of less energy, industry and determination to remain in the clearances as tenants, a description of persons not likely to serve as examples to the Indians, or to render their surplus lands productive.

“ Pending the arrangements thus suggested, your Committee recommend a continuation of the usual grants in aid of the Indians.

SIR,—Her Majesty's Government have had under consideration an Act passed by the Legislature of New Brunswick, with a suspending clause, on the 31st March, 1842, to incorporate the Grand Falls Company.

As this Act affects the navigation of the River Saint John, with reference to Timber and Lumber, and confers upon the Company to which it relates, the right of charging Tolls and of detaining and charging salvage in certain cases, it has been thought necessary to consult the Queen's Advocate, as to whether it is consistent with the stipulations in the recent Treaty with the United States of America, which relate to the navigation of the Saint John.

In the mean time, however, as the Act was passed previous to that Treaty being entered into, it is desirable to ascertain whether the Provincial Legislature entertain the same opinion as they did before the Treaty was signed.

You will therefore have the goodness to lay this communication before the Legislative Council and Assembly, and report to me whether, under the present circumstances, they wish this Act to receive the confirmation of Her Majesty in Council.

"That from the testimony adduced before the Committee, and after mature consideration of the same, it appears there were great tumults, disturbances and intimidation, and unjustifiable interference with the free access of voters to the Poll at the late Election of Members to serve in General Assembly for the said County of Northumberland, to the great interruption of the proceedings, and in violation of the freedom of Election; and that the said tumults, disturbances, intimidation and unjustifiable interruption appear to have proceeded from the friends, supporters and partisans

partizans of the said John T. Williston, Esquire, the sitting Member;—the Committee therefore do declare and determine the Election of the said John T. Williston to be null and void, and his seat vacant.

“ The Committee also report that the riotous proceedings, intimidation to persons, and destruction of property in Chatham, during the said Election, are to be greatly deprecated—call for an expression of their strongest regret and disapprobation—are highly disreputable to the County, and destructive of the peace, good order and security of the people.

“ And further, that the charge of bribery and corruption attempted to be proved by the sitting Member in the course of the proceedings against the said John Ambrose Street, Esquire, is altogether groundless.

“ The Committee are also of opinion, that time should be given to allay the excitement at present existing in the County of Northumberland, before a new Writ should issue for the election of a Member in place of the said John T. Williston, Esquire.

“ And the Committee further report, that the opposition to the said Petition is not frivolous or vexatious.

The Return furnished gives the number of Summary Suits on which Judgments have been obtained, with the amount of debt and costs on each. The number of Summary Judgments in Hilary Term, 1841, was 144; in Trinity Term, 139; in Michaelmas, 182;—in Hilary, 1842, 215; in Trinity, 233; in Michaelmas, 170. The gross amount of the costs on the whole appears to be £4,836 12 5. While your Committee regret to behold this evidence of the enormous amount of litigation, yet, in the absence of more information on the subject, they are not at present prepared to submit a remedy, but trust that the subject will be resumed at an early day in the next Session of the General Assembly.

"The relief granted by British Consuls to British Seamen, is authorized by instructions from the Admiralty, and apply to British Seamen generally. A distinction is now attempted to be established between British Seamen, and Seamen, the Crews of British Colonial Ships; this is a distinction which your Committee cannot recognize, inasmuch as the Crews of Vessels registered in the Colonies, are by no means composed of natives of the Colonies, nor are the Crews of Vessels registered in the United Kingdom altogether composed of natives of the British Isles. Your Committee understand the relief afforded to British Seamen to be a National Boon intended for all who sail under the National Flag, and contribute to its glory, and therefore properly extendible to the Crews of all British Ships, whether Colonial or otherwise.

“The Committee to whom was referred that part of the Speech of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, respecting the illegal occupation of Crown Lands and Indian Reserves, make their final Report:

“The unauthorized occupation of Crown Lands is a subject of considerable embarrassment, and one to which it is extremely difficult to apply any general measure. It cannot be denied, that a great number of acres of valuable Crown Lands have been settled upon, improved, and are still occupied by persons well able to pay the small price set upon wild lands in this Colony; against such persons, your Committee are of opinion, that coercive measures might not unreasonably be adopted. It is equally true, however, that many worthy persons have been compelled by necessity to seek a living on vacant lots of land, whose unremitting labor, industry and perseverance, have scarcely procured a bare subsistence for themselves and their families, who, nevertheless, are still persevering, and against whom the adoption of coercive measures would be unwise and cruel.

“Your Committee cannot recommend that any Crown Prosecutions should be instituted, as the Law now stands, the enormous expense being altogether disproportioned to the object to be attained. They report a Bill, which, should it become a Law, will, in their opinion, afford a cheap and summary remedy against illegal occupants of Crown Lands. They rely, however, upon the wisdom of Government, that the discretionary power unavoidably given by this Bill, will be used with mercy as well as justice; and that while the provisions of the Bill shall be most strictly applied to those who are able to purchase, and yet contumaciously refuse to do so, the industrious poor Squatter, who evinces a willingness to comply with the regulations for granting lands, may

may be put upon the most favorable footing of an applicant for immediate settlement.

The Resolutions of Appropriation, dated the 25th day of March instant.

Mr. Hanington, from the Committee appointed on the first day of February last, to take under consideration the subject of applications for relief afforded to Sick and Distressed Emigrants, submitted their Report; and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

“The Select Committee to whom were referred the several Petitions praying to be reimbursed expenses incurred in support of Sick and Distressed Emigrant Poor during the year 1842, have had before them the following Petitions, and beg leave to Report:

“The Petition of the Justices of the Peace for the City and County of Saint John, for expenses incurred by the Overseers of the Poor of that City, amounting to £1227 1s. 10d. exclusive of charges for the Medical attendant, and the Overseer of the Poor, Mr. Matthews, as Superintendent.

These Accounts are particularly made up, with a list of the names, ages, places of nativity, and circumstance of disability—of the Poor relieved,—and is attested to. The rate of Board is charged at 3s. per week, and the other charges are very reasonable. There is also a list of Emigrants and Transient Poor relieved from the Parish funds, comprising 1466 individuals, for which no charge is made in this Account. The Committee recommend provision to be made for this Account, together with an allowance of £50 for Medical attendance, and £75 for Mr. Matthews, the Superintendent.

“The Petition of the Justices of the Peace for the City and County of Saint John, for expenses incurred by the Overseers of the Poor in the Parish of Portland, amounting to £151 4s. exclusive of a charge to the Medical attendant. This Account is fully made up and attested to. The rate of Board charged is 3s. 6d. per week; the other charges are reasonable. The Committee recommend to be paid £146 4s., including Medical attendance.

“The Petition of the Overseers of the Poor of the Parish of Saint George, in the County of Charlotte, for expenses incurred by them, amounting to £37 11 4, including £8 3 4 for Medical attendance on one Emigrant. The rate of Board is not stated, nor is the Account sworn to. The Committee cannot recommend payment of the above Account.

“The Petition of the Commissioners of the Alms House and Overseers of the Poor for the Parish of Saint Andrews, in the County of Charlotte, for expenses incurred by them, amounting to £635 12 10, including £71 6 2 charged for Medical attendance and

and Medicine, and £50 to the Overseers of the Poor for their services. The rate of Board is 5s. per week. Of the charge of £55 12s. for Clothing, there is no detailed Account. A list of persons relieved accompanies the Petition, and the period in which relief is afforded is stated. The Account is sworn to by the Alms House Keeper. The Committee recommend to be paid the sum of £440 16 6, including Medical attendance and Superintendence.

“A Petition from the Commissioners of the Alms House and Overseers of the Poor of the Parish of Saint Andrews, for relief afforded Emigrant Poor who have resided in the Alms House more than one year prior to this application, amounting to £86 4 3, the rate of Board is charged at 5s. per week, and a list of persons relieved accompanies the Account, which is attested to. The Committee cannot recommend this Account.

“The Petition of the Overseers of the Poor of the Parish of Saint Stephen, in the County of Charlotte, for expenses incurred by them, amounting to £139 12 7 including £9 16s. for Medical attendance; the rate of Board charged is 5s. per week; and an affidavit accompanies the Account. The Committee recommend the sum of £81 15, including Medical attendance, to be paid.

“The Petition of the Justices of the Peace of the County of Northumberland, for expenses incurred by them, amounting to £134 6 4, including a charge of 10s. per diem to the Keeper or Superintendent, amounting to £33 10s. This Account is fully stated, and accompanied by an affidavit; a considerable portion of the expense appears to have been incurred in consequence of Emigrants suffering with Typhus Fever. The Committee deducting £16 15s. for charges of Superintendent, recommend the sum of £117 11 4 to be paid.

“The Petition of the Overseers of the Poor of the Parish of Chatham, in the County of Northumberland, for expenses incurred by them, amounting to £103 4 6. No Account accompanies the Petition.

“The Petition of the Overseers of the Poor of the Parish of Dalhousie, in the County of Restigouche, for expenses incurred, amounting to £13 4s. By the Account relief appears to have been afforded to about 25 individuals; the Account is not sworn to, but is certified by the Clerk of the Peace to have been approved of by the Sessions. The Committee recommend £8 15s. to be paid.

“The Petition of the Commissioners of the Alms House in the County of York, for expenses incurred by them, amounting to £133 11 2½, including £5 allowed to the Keeper for his attendance; the Account is particularly stated, the rate of Board charged is 6s. 6d. per week; a list of persons relieved accompanies the Account, and the period in which relief was afforded; the Account is sworn to by the Keeper of the Alms House. The Committee recommend that £100 be granted, including the claim of Dr. Woodforde, as per his Petition.

A Message from the Legislative Council.

Mr. Dibblee, Master in Chancery, informed the House that the Council had agreed to The Bill to establish sundry regulations for the future disposal of Timber and other Lumber cut on Crown Lands,

Without making any amendment thereto.

Mr. Wilmot, from the Committee appointed on the 16th day of March instant, to take into consideration a Petition from Edward W. Miller, Esquire, which was presented

presented to the House at the last Session, praying to be remunerated for certain Public Services performed by him, submitted their Report; and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

“The Select Committee, to whom was referred the Petition of Edward W. Miller, Esquire, Sheriff of the County of York, with the several Accounts and documents connected therewith, have attended to that duty, and beg leave to submit the following Report:

“No. 1. Is Mr. Miller's Account for various services performed by him in the execution of various Processes issued out of the Court of Exchequer in this Province from 1817 to 1840, amounting to £437 9 4.

“Of this amount, £94 15 11 is charged for very important services rendered by the Petitioner, relative to the reserved Indian Lands in the County of Carleton; and as the services should be provided for, your Committee are of opinion, that they constitute a fair charge against the proceeds of those reserves, and they hope the Executive will make provision therefor from that service.

“Of the Account under consideration, the further sum of £164 15s. is made up for services rendered in the protection of the Disputed Territory. The charges are reasonable, and the Committee are of opinion, they constitute a fair claim on the fund arising from that Territory, and they hope that provision will be made therefor out of that fund.

“With respect to the balance of this Account, £177 18 5, the Committee are of opinion, that an investigation should be made by the Executive Government into the services and items charged; and that it should be ascertained whether any proportion of those charges has been collected by the present or late Attorney General, and if so, that for the amount so collected, the present and the Representatives of the late Attorney General should be called upon to account; and that for any balance not collected, the Petitioner has a fair claim upon the Revenues of the Country.

“No. 2. Is an Account for services rendered by the Petitioner during a period of 24 years in summoning Jurors for the Supreme Court at Fredericton, amounting to £682 10s.

“The Committee are of opinion, that so far as those services were confined to the business of the Provincial Court, they should be defrayed out of the Provincial Funds; but to the extent to which the services were rendered for the business of the County of York, the charges should be made upon the County Treasury.

“No. 3. Is an Account for Fees on granting Certificates to Applicants for cutting Timber on Crown Lands in 1819 and 1820, amounting to £187.

“These Fees were directed to be allowed by the then Executive Government; but though neglected in some quarter, the amount has not been paid; the Committee therefore cannot now recommend its payment.

“No. 4. Is an Account for services performed and expenses incurred by the Petitioner in discharge of his duty as Seizing Officer in the years 1819 and 1820; the Committee are of opinion, that the Province derived considerable benefit from the service; but they refer the propriety of making any provision therefor, to the consideration of the House.

“No. 5. Is the Account Current, setting forth the several Accounts already remarked upon, and crediting the sum of £264 19 1, as received at various times from Fines collected, and proceeds of a lot of Timber sold, and shewing a balance of £1,156 0 3.

“The Committee feel it due to the Petitioner to state, that the great delay which has taken place in the adjustment of these Accounts is not attributable to the Petitioner. Frequent applications have been made to the Executive by the Petitioner during the several Administrations of General Smyth, Sir Howard Douglas, Sir Archibald Campbell and Sir John Harvey, and in every instance his claims have been recognized as just and reasonable; and the Committee trust that the Petitioner will be enabled to obtain the amount of his several claims from the several quarters from which he is entitled to receive them.

Mr. Allen, from the Committee appointed on the 4th day of February last, to take under consideration a Petition from Thomas E. Perley, praying relief in consequence of losses sustained by reason of the purchase of a Tract of Crown Land, and to which Committee were referred various other Petitions of a similar prayer, submitted their Report; and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

“The Committee to whom it was referred to examine and Report upon the several Petitions of Thomas E. Perley, William Todd, Junior, Christopher C. Bradbury, Schuyler P. Frink and Josephus Moore, praying for relief in the purchase of certain Crown Lands; having had the same under their consideration, beg to submit the following Report:

“Numerous

“ Numerous tracts of Land, varying in extent from 500 to 20,000 acres each, were sold between January, 1833, and December, 1837, on a number of which Balances are still due: in some cases Judgments have been obtained against the Purchasers, and Extents issued; in some, actions are still pending, and in many instances proceedings have not yet been instituted. The relinquishment of the claims of the Province for the purchase money due on those purchases will involve the relinquishment of a large sum which appears due, and which, if available, would be of material service in the present embarrassed state of the Finances; but your Committee are of opinion, that a large portion of these claims can never be recovered; that such portions as may ultimately be realized will be the cause of much distress, not only to the original purchasers, but to many others who have in the course of business become the purchasers of Real Estate from them, not knowing, and not having the means of knowing, that Crown Bonds were hanging over them. The various prosecutions which will take place, if payment be insisted upon, will occasion heavy Law expenses, which the Province will in some cases be obliged to pay, and which will in many others swallow up the receipts, thus ruining individuals without benefiting the Country.

“ With this view of the case, and also taking into consideration that the purchases were made during a time of great excitement; and that large payments have been made upon them, your Committee recommend, that purchasers of tracts of Land exceeding 500 acres, since the 1st January, 1833, who have only paid a portion of their purchase money, be allowed to have Land at the price of their original purchases to the extent of their several payments; the same to be laid off at their expense, under the direction of the Surveyor General, in such manner as to give them no more than a fair proportion of frontage and other advantages, and under the following conditions, viz:—

“ Each purchaser must furnish an attested statement of the quantity of Timber or Lumber cut upon the Land by or for him, or with his sanction or knowledge since the date of his purchase, and pay Stumpage at the usual rates on a quantity proportioned to the quantity of Land resumed by the Government; and he must likewise pay all legal costs and all expenses consequent upon the re-investment of the Land in the Crown, in cases where actions have been commenced or where the Land has been granted.

“ Your Committee also recommend a deduction of twenty per cent. from the prices at which the said Lands were originally sold, without interest; and that it be left to the option of the Petitioners respectively, either to take Land as above, or to pay up arrearages which may be due after making the above deduction; and also, all Timber Duties, if any, which may have been paid by Petitioners since their respective purchases, and that one and two years be allowed to make such payments, without interest.

“ From information obtained by your Committee, they have good reason for believing that the interests of the Crown will not be compromised by the substance of this Report being adopted by the Provincial Government.

“ The Committee also Report, they have had under consideration the Petition of Thomas Smith, and recommend that a grant, without further charge, pass to the said Smith, of eighty acres of Land, in King's County, being parcel of 200 acres applied for by him about the year 1835, and towards the purchase money and survey of which the said Smith has paid £12 12 6; the residue of the said 200 acres, and the best part thereof, has been granted to one Lawrence Cullingham.

“ The Committee also further Report, that they have had under consideration the Petition of A. S. Carman, praying relief from sundry Prosecutions instituted against him by Her Majesty's Attorney General. They recommend that Mr. Carman be relieved from the whole of said actions, upon the payment of Duty on 1819 tons of Timber, at 2s., amounting to £181 18s., together with the costs already incurred.

Mr. Wilmot, from the Committee appointed on the 31st day of January last, to take under consideration all matters in any way affecting the Agricultural interests of the Province, submitted their Report; and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

“The Select Committee to whom were referred all matters affecting the Agricultural interests of the Province, Report:

“The Committee have had before them Reports from several Societies, and by right give precedence to that of the Charlotte County Society, being their Twenty Third Annual Report. Among other observations in this interesting document, it is said—“The bounty on Lime has induced Members to try it as a manure, and wherever it has been applied on Land sufficiently drained, the benefit has been obvious, and in several instances the yield of crop, particularly of Wheat, has been extraordinary; and the Board feel warranted in remarking that in the immediate vicinity of the Town, one acre thus treated produced 50 bushels of good Wheat, weighing 59lbs. per bushel, a yield it is presumed seldom exceeded in any Country. The utmost care and judgment however must be exercised in the application of this expensive article as a manure, and it must not be lost sight of that thorough draining is indispensable.”

“The Report of this Society is accompanied by an Account shewing a balance in hand of £167 10s., exclusive of the Legislative Grant for the past year.

“The Report of the Charlotte Society proves that activity and enterprise prevail among its Members. Among other things it is remarked in this Report—“Your Committee congratulate the Society on the generally fine crops which, under the blessing of Divine Providence, have been harvested during the present season, and are believed to equal, if not exceed, those of any former year. Although the Wheat in some sections of the County has been partially cut off by the weevil, and injured by the rust, yet from the quantity sown being much larger than usual, the crop may be regarded as an average one. Oats and Buckwheat are abundant, and Potatoes promise a rich return. The highest encouragement is thus afforded for continued industry and perseverance.”

“The sum of £40 was appropriated by this Society during the past year for premiums on Stock, Produce, and on Agricultural Implements, and other Domestic Manufactures.

“The Report of the Northumberland Society says—“The quantity of Wheat raised in the County during the past season was at least twice as great as that produced in any preceding year. The Oat crop also was abundant, and the quality good; and from the superior description of Mills lately erected, the quality both of Flour and Oatmeal produced in Miramichi, has been quite equal to any thing imported either from Canada or Britain. The return of Potatoes last year was very abundant, and amply sufficient to supply the wants of the County. The Committee feel warranted in saying that a marked impulse has been given to Agricultural pursuits in this section of the Province by the operations of this Society, and they humbly hope that the Legislature will continue and even increase that patronage to it and kindred institutions, which may enable them further to promote the great ends they have in view, and that the day may come when New Brunswick may be enabled to raise provisions sufficient to supply the wants of its population;—then, and not till then, can we expect the Colony to attain any thing like substantial prosperity and independence.”

“The Sunbury Society have submitted a Report, which indicates an increasing interest in that County.

“The Report says that—“The Black Sea Wheat is reported to be free from rust, and from the weevil so much complained of in these parts. The crops throughout the Country are reported to be more than an average, excepting the Hay, which is generally allowed to be less on the upland.”

“This Report also contains the following judicious observations:—“Much remains still to be effected in removing prejudice and producing reform. There are still allotments of Land containing 500 acres each, which have been settled or occupied from 50 to 70 years, which have not yet 30 acres cultivated, although in the centre of the Province, and bounded on the beautiful River Saint John, within ten miles of Fredericton. Thousands of acres of valuable alluvial in this County are still unreclaimed, and there are many acres of old worn out meadow land which has been annually mown in the summer and pastured in the fall for more than 50 years, without ever

ever having been ploughed in that time, and which, although naturally of a superior soil, now produces but a light crop; and we still see the barn-yard drained across the highway into the River, to the great annoyance of the Traveller and loss to the owner."

"We have also before us the Report of the Kent Society, which is in a prosperous condition. This Report says—"Preparations were made last Spring throughout the County, to bring a much larger quantity of ground under cultivation than in any previous year, and in most instances the expectations of the Farmers have been fully realized."

"The best Wheat exhibited at the last Show weighed 70 pounds per bushel, Barley 56 pounds, and Oats 48 pounds; which prove the capabilities of this County for growing the different kinds of grain.

"The York County Society has continued its operation with success during the year. This Society imported during the past Summer from England, 9 Rams of the Dishley and Leicestershire breeds; and these fine animals have been distributed among the different Parishes for the use of Members of Society only. With due care in rearing and feeding the produce, incalculable benefits will soon be derived from this importation. The sum of £46 was appropriated by this Society during the past year in premiums.

"The Committee regret that they have not received a Report from the Gloucester Society, of whose operations they have had a very favorable account. They have seen a letter from the Agent of this Society in Scotland, from which they make the following extract respecting manures:—"With one cwt. Guana, six bushels fine crushed bones, and 15 cart-loads common manure, applied to the Scots acre, I have got a very fine crop of Swedish Turnips, much superior to the old system of Farm-yard manure being applied alone. I find from experience that green crops, indeed all sorts of crops, are much superior where different sorts of manure are applied at the same time. From those few experiments tried, the application of such manures as Guana, Sulphate of Ammonia, Nitrate of Soda, &c. &c. &c., to the blade of the plant instead of the root, appears to act as a charm. Those manures, if they may go under that term, must be applied when there is plenty of moisture upon the plant; if applied in any weather they have not the same effect. It appears from our Chemical authors that the blades of plants are the great medium of inhaling those gases which give nourishment, more so than the roots. We expect to get much information from our humbled neighbours, the Chinese, on this subject; that people being in the habit of manuring their crops after they are grown to a certain extent."

"From the general commercial embarrassment prevailing throughout the Province, and the number of Traders, Mechanics' and Town Labourers consequently thrown out of their ordinary employment, an increased disposition to cultivate the soil has shewn itself throughout the Province, and from the extensive preparations which were made during the last Autumn for the agricultural operations of the ensuing season, the Committee have every reason to hope, that, under the blessing of Providence, the most beneficial results will be experienced during the present year.

"The Committee would recommend to the several Societies to expend such sums as may be drawn by them from the Treasury during this year in the importation of improved breeds of Stock.

"From the information before the Committee, they are unanimously of opinion, that the usual appropriation should be made in support of Agricultural Societies at a reduction of 25 per cent.

"The Committee are however of opinion, that a Resolution should be adopted by the House, declaring that no Warrant should issue in future for any sum under the conditional appropriation of the Assembly, until an Account Current of the Society, for whom the application may be made, for the then past year, attested by the Treasurer, is first laid before the Executive.

Mr. Wilmot, from the Committee appointed on the 7th day of March last, to take under consideration various documents which were communicated to the House on the 14th day of February by Message, relative to an exchange of Lands in Fredericton with the Ordnance Department; and to which Committee was referred a Petition from Joseph Gaynor and others, upon the same subject,—submitted their Report; and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

“The Select Committee to whom were referred the Message of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor of the 14th February last, on the subject of the proposed exchange of Lands in the Town of Fredericton with the Ordnance Department, with the several documents accompanying the same, having attended to the duty imposed upon them, beg leave to Report:

“The subject of the Lands in question has caused frequent agitations among the inhabitants of Fredericton, and it is to be regretted that an amicable arrangement has not yet been made.

“The Committee having examined the Petition of Joseph Gaynor and 152 others, Freeholders and Inhabitants of Fredericton, against the proposed exchange, unless to a limited extent, are strongly impressed with the allegations therein set forth.

“It appears that the Ordnance Department lays claim to six Town Lots in the centre of the Town, and to part of a Block between Queen Street and the River, and bounded on Westmorland Street, which have not been used for several years for any Military purposes whatsoever; and so far as your Committee have learned, these Lands are not required for Ordnance purposes, and as the title still remains in the Crown, and the Lands are much required for the use and improvement of the Town, the Committee hope that the Lots above specified will be secured for the Town; and in consideration of the Ordnance Department relinquishing their claim thereto, the Committee would recommend that a Grant be passed from the Crown to the Department of the two Blocks comprising the grounds at present occupied by the Barracks, Hospital, Parade Grounds and Fuel Yard, extending the same up to the West Line of Campbell Street.

“The Committee are well advised that the old Sheds on the Crown Block and part of the Fuel Yard, to the extent of seventy feet and upwards, are upon the Public Land, and that these incumbrances have lately been presented by a Grand Jury of the County of York as a nuisance.

“The

“The large proportion of Lands above proposed to be granted to the Ordnance in the heart of the Town, and the present determination of the inhabitants not to consent under any consideration to the closing up of that part of Carleton Street which divides the Barrack Yard, will, we hope, induce the Ordnance to come to an equitable arrangement.

“The Committee regret that the claims of the Ordnance Department to Lands, which since 1825 have not been used for any Military purposes, and to which the most elaborate and ingenious arguments have failed, in your Committee’s opinion, to shew a legal title, should have so materially obstructed the improvement of the Town.

Mr. Fisher, from the Committee appointed on the 7th day of March last, to take under consideration the various documents which were communicated on the 14th day of February, by command of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, under an Address of the House, relative to a Grant of Land to Captain H. H. Carmichael, for his Military services, submitted their Report; and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk’s Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

“The Committee to whom was referred the Message of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with the several Petitions of Captain Carmichael, praying a free grant of Land, accompanied by sundry other documents connected therewith, having attended to that duty, Report:

“That in January, 1841, Captain Carmichael, then Paymaster on full pay and in actual service of Her Majesty’s 36th Regiment of Foot, (with which Regiment that gentleman is still serving, as your Committee believe, in Ireland,) petitioned the then Lieutenant Governor, Sir John Harvey, setting forth ‘that in the year 1818, he became entitled, under the then existing regulations, to a grant of wilderness land, as a reduced officer of the late 104th Regiment—that a location was accordingly made to him of 800 acres on the River Saint John, described as lots Nos. 94 to 100 inclusive, in the Parish of Perth, County of Carleton—that he never took possession of the said allotment, and prayed that he might be permitted to relinquish all claim thereto, and obtain a grant of the same quantity of Land in such situation as he might thereafter point out.’—This Petition is on file in the Crown Land Office, and by an indorsement thereon, it appears, that by the return of Deputy Surveyor Morehouse, in 1817, the Lands therein mentioned had been surveyed for the Petitioner, that no Patent had issued, and that they remained still vacant and ungranted. It further appears, that in Council on the 2nd day of January, 1841, it was ‘ordered, that on the Petitioner making a selection, and preferring a Petition, his case should be favorably considered.’

“This order, your Committee are of opinion, was neither authorized by the existing Law, nor justified by the facts of the case. If the lapse of twenty four years was not considered sufficient to extinguish the Petitioner’s claim to the Land in question, as a private individual; and if, although an officer serving with his Regiment, on full pay, he was deemed entitled to a boon, expressly limited to retired officers only, those Lands and those only should have been granted to him.—It further appears, that in January,

1843,

1843, the Petitioner, availing himself of the favorable consideration held out to him by the above Order in Council, signified by a Petition signed by 'W. H. Kepple, Esquire, Agent for H. H. Carmichael,' (but whose authority as such does not appear) that he had made a selection of nine lots of Land in the Allandale Settlement, in the County of York. This Petition was approved of in Council on the 20th of January, 1843, the following Order having been then made:—'In Committee of Council, 25th January, 1843. H. H. Carmichael prays that he may receive a grant of 800 acres of Land in Allandale, for his Military services: Recommended on payment of expenses incurred for Survey;—and your Committee have ascertained that the Patent is actually in progress.

"Viewing the Petitioner's claim in the most favorable light, it should have been strictly confined to the original allotment. But while your Committee might approve of any legal measure by which this Colony could secure the actual settlement of retired Military Officers, they cannot avoid coming to the unanimous conclusion, that the Council must have resolved upon this case without due consideration, and in the hurry of business, approved of a measure unsustained by Law, which cannot result in the actual settlement of the Country, but will rather obstruct its progress, by adding to the number of unimproving proprietors.

"Under these circumstances, your Committee recommend that an humble Address should be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to rescind the Order for issuing the grant in question.

Resolved, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency will appoint one or more Commissioner or Commissioners to superintend and manage the said Asylum, and that His Excellency will advance by Warrant or Warrants on the Treasury, such sum or sums of money as the said Commissioner or Commissioners may from time to time require during the present year for the support of the said Institution, not exceeding in all £750; the first advance to be drawn for, upon an estimate for the three first months expenditure being laid before His Excellency in detail, at the expiration of which, full and detailed Accounts to be furnished His Excellency upon oath, with Vouchers of such expenditure, together with an estimate for the second quarter,—at the expiration of which, and also of the third quarter, similar Accounts to be furnished with Vouchers.

M'Kee and others, from the City of Saint John, and vicinity, praying to be relieved from the operations of an Act of the General Assembly, which prohibits any person or persons from taking Fish with drift nets in the Harbour of Saint John, or within two miles around Partridge Island, at the entrance of the said Harbour, your Committee beg to report, that although they are anxious to extend relief in the premises, yet in view of the several Laws now in force, as also several Petitions praying protection to the Fisheries, they cannot recommend any alteration in the said Law the present year.

“The Committee to whom was referred the Petition of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Saint John, praying the interposition of the Legislature to enable them to obtain a Loan to pay off the liabilities, in consequence of being called upon for payment by many of the Bond holders and Corporation Creditors; having had under their consideration the same, together with a Schedule of Real Property and Income of the said Corporation, and other important documents accompanying the same, beg leave to offer the following Report:

“Your Committee feel satisfied that the Corporation are in possession of extensive and valuable Real Property which must be greatly augmenting in value, as also of chartered rights, which may be expected to increase annually on an extension of Trade, induced by the local position of the Harbour of Saint John being accessible to Shipping at all seasons of the year.

“However willing your Committee may be to accede to the prayer of the Petitioners, yet the depressed state of our Provincial Finances will not justify the same.

“Your Committee therefore cannot recommend that the prayer of the Petition be complied with, but feel confident that, with the amended Charter, and reduced rate of Salaries

Salaries to Civic Officers, the Petitioners will be enabled to effect a Loan on easy terms, by securing the same on Corporation property.

“All which is respectfully submitted.

Mr. J. Earle, from the Committee appointed to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with an Address of the House of the 7th day of April instant, relative to the employment of the Dredging Machine in improving the navigation of the River Saint John or its Tributaries, reported, that they had attended thereto, and that His Excellency was pleased to say, the wishes of the House should be complied with.

Mr. Hill, from the Committee appointed to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with an Address of the House of the 8th day of April instant, praying that His Excellency would be pleased to cause measures to be taken for the recovery of the Interest on the Loan of £3,250 to the City of Saint John, reported, that they had attended thereto, and that His Excellency was pleased to say, the wishes of the House should be complied with.

The Address to Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen, upon the subject of the Post Office Establishment in this Province, was read as engrossed, and is as follows:—

“To the Queen’s Most Excellent Majesty.

“The Humble and Dutiful Address of the House of Assembly of the Province of New Brunswick.

“MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,

“We, the Representatives of Your Majesty’s loyal Subjects, the People of New Brunswick, in General Assembly convened, beg leave to approach Your Majesty with assurances of our unabated attachment to Your Majesty’s Person and Government.

“The object of this our earnest Address is to draw the attention of Your Majesty’s Government to the necessity which exists of a reform in Your Majesty’s Post Office Department in this Province; as we have abundant reason to represent the taxes and rates now imposed and exacted by that Department, as of a most grievous, burdensome and vexatious character; and although we had reason to hope, from the appointment of the late Post Office Commission in Canada, that we should be relieved by the establishment of a more tolerable and equitable system, yet, we regret to say, that in this our hope, we have not only been disappointed, but we have recently been obliged to submit to additional burdens imposed with an utter disregard to the circumstances and interests of the Country.

“The rates at present exacted in the Colony are regulated under the provisions of the Statute 9 Anne, c. 10; the antiquity of which sufficiently shews the inapplicability of its enactments, as to rates of Postage in this Province, at the present time.

“But while we have such abundant cause to complain of the enormous rates of Letter Postage charged in the Province, we have still greater reason to remonstrate against the imposition and unjust exaction levied upon printed Newspapers, which obliges the Publishers to pay in advance one penny on each paper, or 2s. 6d. currency per annum for a Weekly Paper; and if this payment is not made or secured in advance, the papers are not transmitted, or are charged at the office of delivery with full Letter Postage. The same course is also pursued with regard to the Printed Votes of the Legislature; and we respectfully represent these exactions as a direct tax on the diffusion of knowledge, which is looked upon as odious, when it is generally known that the amount forms no part of Your Majesty’s Post Office Revenue, but constitutes a perquisite of the Head of the Department in this Province.

“The effect of such rates has been and will continue to be a constant and increasing evasion of the Laws regulating the Post Office, in which all classes of Your Majesty’s Subjects participate, by carrying Letters and Papers, which would in most cases, under a reduced scale, be forwarded by Your Majesty’s Mails.

"Prior to the year 1842, the Laws and Journals of the North American Colonial Legislatures were annually exchanged by Mail free of Postage; but during the past year, by the directions of the Agent from the General Post Office in London, such an enormous amount of Postage was imposed, that the Public Officers to whom such Papers were addressed, were compelled to refuse the payment, and the Legislature of the Province, has been deprived, during the present Session, of the usual Legislative information from the neighbouring Colonies.

"On reference to the Act passed in the third and fourth years of Your Majesty's Reign, we observe in the 49th Section, that 'the Postmaster General, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, may allow Colonial Newspapers to pass by Post between places within any of Her Majesty's Colonies, or by Packet Boat, or private Ship, from one Colony to another Colony, whether through the United Kingdom or not * * * free of Postage, or subject to such rates of Postage, and under all such regulations and restrictions as the Postmaster General, with such consent as aforesaid may think fit.'

"Assuming that the rate of one penny per sheet has been imposed on Newspapers and Printed Journals under the authority of this Act, we exceedingly regret that such alternative has been adopted by the Postmaster General, as subjects the people of this Province to this most unwise and impolitic tax.

"In no Colony of Your Majesty's Empire has so much been done, in proportion to the Revenues, towards the improvement of the Post Roads, as in this Province; and we humbly and respectfully urge upon Your Majesty's gracious consideration, that in consequence of those improvements, Your Majesty's Mails are now carried from place to place throughout the Province with greater facility and regularity, and at a much less expense than formerly, in proportion to the number and extent of the Mails, whereby a large annual saving is effected in the Revenue of the Department.

"Under all these important considerations, we humbly pray Your Majesty to take this subject into Your Majesty's most gracious consideration; and we confidently trust that such alterations will be made in the enactments regulating Your Majesty's Post Office in the Colony as will abolish all rates of Postage on Newspapers and Printed Journals of the Legislature, and establish an uniform rate, not exceeding three pence currency, on all single Letters and small Packets sent from one place to another within this Province.

"And as in duty bound will ever pray."

On motion of Mr. Wilmot,

Resolved, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to transmit this Address with regard to the Post Office Establishment, to the Right Honorable Lord Stanley, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, to be laid at the Foot of the Throne.

Ordered, That Mr. Wilmot, Mr. Hazen and Mr. Partelow be a Committee to wait upon His Excellency with the Address.

The Address to Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen, upon the subject of a reduction in the charges upon the Province for the support of the Civil Government, was read as engrossed, and is as follows:—

"To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

"The Humble Address of the House of Assembly of New Brunswick.

"MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,

"We, Your Majesty's faithful and loyal Subjects, the Representatives of the People of New Brunswick, humbly beg leave to offer our renewed assurances of devoted attachment to Your Majesty's Person and Government.

"After a protracted negotiation between Your Majesty's revered Uncle, the late King William the Fourth, and former Houses of Assembly, relative to the surrender of all the Casual and Territorial Revenues in the Province in return for a Civil List, an Act passed in the fifth year of the Reign of His said Majesty, which was made perpetual in the second year of Your Majesty's Reign, intituled 'An Act for the support of the Civil Government of the Province,' granting to the Crown the sum of £14,500
currency,

currency, per annum, for ten years, and assigning to the Legislature of the Province the nett proceeds of the Hereditary, Territorial and Casual Revenues of the Crown.

“That at the time the arrangement relating to the Civil List was effected, the Government of this Province exercised jurisdiction over the whole of (what was then called) ‘Disputed Territory;’ and so clear and unimpeachable did the title of Great Britain appear, that Your Majesty’s Subjects on this Continent entertained a firm conviction, that no part of it would ever be ceded to the Government of the United States. By the Treaty of Washington, a conventional boundary has been established, by which Your Majesty relinquished Your title to a great and by far the most valuable portion of that Territory.

“Notwithstanding the regret deeply felt by the inhabitants of New Brunswick at such cession, which also included a Settlement of British Subjects, they did not complain of an arrangement which the general interests of the Empire appeared to require.

“The Assembly humbly assume, though it is the duty of a loyal people cheerfully to surrender their local interests to the great and paramount concerns of the Empire, that the acknowledged magnanimity of Your Majesty’s Government will never allow arrangements of National importance to press heavily upon any of Your Majesty’s Subjects, however remote their situation or inconsiderable their number.

“The portion of the ‘Disputed Territory’ (so called) retained by New Brunswick, comprises a tract of country of very little value for Agricultural or Lumbering purposes, with the exception of a narrow strip of land lying on the Saint John, forming the site of the Madawaska Settlement. It is of little value in a National or in a Provincial point of view, beyond the preservation of the Mail route to Canada; while the tract of country assigned to the United States, consists mostly of land of a superior quality, and was accounted the most productive and valuable in the Province or in the neighbouring States. It abounds with Timber of the first quality; the soil is also admirably adapted for immediate and successful settlement, and is universally admitted to be at least equal, if not superior, to any District of land of the same extent yet ungranted in the Province.

“That so large a part of the sources of the Casual and Territorial Revenue having been cut off, the Assembly humbly submit to Your Majesty the propriety and justice of reducing the amount agreed to be annually paid to Your Majesty to provide for the Civil Government of the Province.

“In humbly supplicating Your Majesty to assent to such reduction, the Assembly have no desire to relieve their Constituents from the payment of any part of the necessary expense of the Administration of the Provincial Government; protected in Trade and Commerce by the fostering care of the Parent State, they will cheerfully provide for the efficient administration of their Local Government.

“That the sum of £11,761 will amply provide for the Salaries of all the Officers chargeable upon the Civil List, upon a scale commensurate with the duties of their respective offices and the resources of the Province, and will, in all probability, be equal to the annual product of the Casual and Territorial Revenue for many years; as the nett amount derived from that fund and paid into the Provincial Treasury in the year 1842, under the Civil List Act, was only £4,500.

“The Assembly are of opinion, that the sum of £600 per annum, is an adequate maximum Salary for the principal subordinate Ministerial Officers of the Government, —a sum that will at all times secure for the service of the Government, men of the greatest talent and active business habits in the Province, and which far exceeds the average income of the principal men engaged in Professional, Mercantile or Agricultural pursuits.

“The necessity and importance in a new country of infusing into the Administration of the Government principles of economy, not inconsistent with a due regard to the public service, is too clear a proposition to require argument, and was fully admitted and insisted upon by the Right Honorable Lord Glenelg, in His Lordship’s Despatch dated 21st September, 1837.

“Having that object in view, the Assembly annex a Scale of Salaries which they humbly submit will most liberally provide for the various Officers and services charged upon the Civil List, and to which they pray Your Majesty’s gracious and favorable consideration.

“The

“ The Assembly do therefore most humbly implore Your Majesty to take this their dutiful Petition into Your Majesty’s Royal consideration ; and, in view of all the circumstances of the case, assent to the reduction of the amount now charged upon the Province for the Civil List to the sum of £12,500, which will more than adequately provide for the efficient Administration of the Government.

“ And as in duty bound will ever pray.”

The Address to Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen, upon the subject of the composition of the Legislative Council, was read as engrossed, and is as follows :—

“ To the Queen’s Most Excellent Majesty.

“ The Humble and Dutiful Address of the Assembly of New Brunswick.

“ MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,

“ We, the Representatives of Your Majesty’s faithful and loyal Subjects, the People of New Brunswick, beg leave to approach Your Majesty with every assurance of our abiding attachment to Your Majesty’s Person and Government.

“ Our devotion to the British Throne has been strengthened by the repeated instances, wherein Your Majesty’s illustrious and revered Predecessors, as well as Your Gracious Majesty, have given a favorable consideration to the Representations of the Assembly of New Brunswick.

“ Gratefully impressed with the assurance that the happiness and prosperity of Your Majesty’s Subjects, throughout Your widely extended Empire, constitutes the first principle of Your Majesty’s wise and enlightened Administration, we the more confidently approach Your Majesty with this our humble and dutiful Address.

“ Venerating as we do those Constitutional principles which secure to us the blessings and advantages of our mixed form of Government, and which preserve to each Branch its relative position and privileges; we feel it our duty to adopt all Constitutional

means

means to secure the proper composition and independence of the second Branch of our Provincial Legislature, concurring in the language of Lord Ripon's Despatch on this subject, that that Body should be selected from the principal inhabitants of the Province, and from those having the greatest stake in its welfare.

"We humbly and respectfully suggest that the Legislative Council should be composed of persons, not only representing all the leading interests of the Province, and connected with the principal Denominations of Christians, but so independent in property, and so free from Official influence, as to form a Constitutional check, as well upon the Executive, as the Representative Branch, of the Legislature.

"By the present Law, the Members of the Assembly are required to be possessed of Real Estate to the value of Three hundred pounds, over and above all incumbrances; while no property qualification whatever is required for Members of the Legislative Council.

"Anxious to remedy this evil, and to remove an anomaly so apparent in our Colonial Legislature, we would most respectfully propose for Your Majesty's Royal consideration, that each Member of the Council should be seised of a certain amount of unincumbered Real Estate; and that the Seats of Members should be vacated on their ceasing to be possessed of a substantial qualification, or on their becoming Bankrupt, executing a composition Deed, becoming a Public defaulter, or neglecting to give their attendance for a given time, without leave of the Lieutenant Governor.

"We most humbly and earnestly submit to Your Majesty, that the establishment of those principles is absolutely necessary to secure the independence and sustain the proper dignity and character of that House, as an independent Branch of the Legislature.

"The composition of the Legislative Council is very defective and objectionable in other respects, and necessarily excites the Constitutional jealousy of the Assembly; of the eighteen Members who now compose it, a great proportion hold Offices at pleasure under the Crown, and the principal Officers of the Government generally form a majority of the Members present. It is not possible that a Body so constituted can be supposed to legislate with the independence necessary to secure public confidence in their acts.

"In the first settlement of the Province, it was necessary, from the paucity of qualified men, to appoint the principal Officers of the Provincial Government to seats in the Legislative Council; but as such necessity has ceased, we most humbly conceive that a more Constitutional system should be established, and that, so far as regards Public Officers, they should never exceed the number necessary to conduct the business of the Government in that House.

"We therefore most humbly implore Your Majesty to re-organize the Legislative Council, and, in its re-construction, to regard the leading interests of this Province, as well as the principal Denominations of Christians; and, either by the exercise of Your Majesty's Royal Prerogative, or otherwise, to establish such salutary provisions for the future, as may effectually secure the independence of that Body.

"And as in duty bound will ever pray."

On motion of Mr. Fisher,

Resolved, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to transmit this Address relating to the composition of the Legislative Council, to the Right Honorable Lord Stanley, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Colonies, to be laid at the Foot of the Throne.

Ordered, That Mr. Fisher, Mr. Payne and Mr. Scoullar be a Committee to wait upon His Excellency with the Address.

Mr. Wark, from the Committee appointed to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with an Address of the House of the 7th day of April instant, praying that His Excellency would be pleased to direct the Province Treasurer to prepare a return of all Goods imported into the Province, during the current year, for the information of the House at the next meeting of the Legislature, reported, that they had attended thereto, and that His Excellency was pleased to say, the wishes of the House should be complied with.

Mr. Fisher, from the Committee appointed to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with the Address of the House of the 8th day of April instant, relating to the Grant of Land to Captain H. H. Carmichael, for his Military services, reported, that they had attended thereto, and that His Excellency was pleased to say, he should give effect to the wishes of the House.

A Message from the Legislative Council.

Mr. Dibblee, Master in Chancery, informed the House that the Council had agreed to The Bill to provide for opening and repairing Roads and erecting Bridges throughout the Province.

On motion of Mr. Fisher,

Resolved, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that His Excellency will be pleased to appoint one or more Commissioner or Commissioners to inquire into the present practice of, and expense attendant upon, Prosecutions in the Court of Vice Admiralty in this Province, with a view to an improvement in the Practice and an alteration in the Table of Fees, and to report the result of their inquiry to His Excellency, for the purpose of being laid before the Legislature at the next Session of the General Assembly.

Ordered, That Mr. Fisher, Mr. End and Mr. Barker be a Committee to wait upon His Excellency with the Address.

On motion of Mr. End,

Ordered, That the Committee appointed on the 3rd day of February last, when in Committee of the whole on the Speech of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor at the opening of the Session, to take into consideration the subject of Parochial Schools and Education of the Country generally, be discharged.

On motion of Mr. Wilmot,

Ordered, That the Committee appointed on the 25th day of February last, to take into consideration a Petition from Elisha A. Cunliffe, for relief in consequence of loss sustained as a Commissioner of Highways for the Parish of Woodstock, be discharged.

Read as engrossed,

The Resolutions of Appropriation made and passed in Supply on Tuesday the 4th day of April instant, severally granting—

To the Postmaster at Fredericton the sum of £252 0 4 for Postages of the Legislature during the present Session.

To the Clerk of the House of Assembly the sum of £2,032 10 9 for the Contingent Expenses of the present Session.

Ordered, That Mr. Hazen do take the said Resolutions to the Council and desire their concurrence thereto.

The House adjourned until to-morrow morning at 9 o'clock.

“The Select Committee to whom were referred the Contingent Expenses of the two Branches of the Legislature of the present Session, Report:

“That they have attended to the making up of the Contingent Account, and after the most careful investigation, they have closed, and now submit the same, amounting to £2,032 10 9.

“The item of Stationery, amounting to £391 18 7, we think larger than is necessary; and although it was not in our power to make any reduction at present, in consequence of the Stationery having been provided before the Session commenced, yet we feel satisfied a reduction may be effected in future.

“We have been obliged to allow several sums, amounting in the whole to £136 2s. 1d., which should have been provided for at the last Session.

“We would further state, that an amount of £225 which in former Sessions was provided for in Supply, is now included in the Contingencies.

“The charges for copying and engrossing have been much reduced, and the Committee recommend that in future a detailed Account be kept by the Clerk, of this service, and that the same be paid for per folio, at a rate to be fixed by the Committee.

“Deducting the sum chargeable against the last Session, and the amount usually granted in Supply, the proper Contingencies of this Session may be put at £463 8s. less than those of the last year.

“Under the operation of the Rule adopted by the Committee at the opening of the Session, the Postage has been greatly reduced; the Members' Letters, amounting to £80 15 11, shewing a reduction of £250 10 11; the amount paid last year for the same

same service being £331 6s.; and the Committee are gratified to find that the Scale proposed by them in their former Report is more than sufficient, the amount recommended by them to be distributed among the different Counties being £89. The Postage of the other Branch has been reduced to less than half the amount last Session.

“The Postage of the Journals during the present Session amounts to £54 1 11. The Committee entertain a hope, that from the Address to Her Majesty adopted by the House, this amount may undergo a reduction.

“The same remark will apply to the further sum of £19 3 4 which is included in the grant to the Postmaster for Postage on Laws during the last Session.

“In his Account is charged the sum of £12 11 3, being balance due for Postage of Members last Session after the Account was made up; and also the sum of £12 8 9 for discount on the Warrant issued for his Account of Postage last Session; these two last items should have been paid last year.

Mr. Partelow, from the Committee appointed to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with the Address of the House of this day, upon the subject of staying proceedings against John Kerr, at the suit of the Crown, until the next Session, reported, that they had attended thereto, and that His Excellency was pleased to say, he would give effect to the wishes of the House.

Mr. Wilmot, from the Committee appointed on the 16th day of March last to take into consideration a Petition from George Woods, which was presented to the House on the 23rd day of February last, on the subject of a difference with the Agent for the New Brunswick Land Company, submitted their Report; and he having read the same, handed it in at the Clerk's Table, where it was again read, and is as follows:—

“The Select Committee to whom was referred the Petition of George Woods, relative to certain transactions with the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick Land Company, and referring to the Report of a Select Committee made thereon at the last Session, beg leave to Report:

"That the hope expressed by the Select Committee at the last Session, that the Company's Agent would, before another Session, come to an amicable arrangement with the claimant, has not been realised, as the claim has not yet been satisfied.

"The Committee are much surprised that the Company's Agent has not fulfilled his promise made in 1838, by paying the sum then agreed upon, or such proportion as the claimant was entitled to, on account of the party whose interests he now seeks to secure.

"So long as the Agent of the Company refuses thus to settle, we do not see how the claimant can expect the Legislature to make provision for the full amount agreed upon; but as the Province has received 2s. 6d. per acre for the Lot, which contains 200 acres, we recommend that the sum of £25 be granted by the House to the Petitioner, being the amount received for such Lot by the Province; and the Committee cannot but indulge the hope that the Company's Agent will now pay the balance without further difficulty. Ordered, That the Report be accepted.

A Message from the Legislative Council.

Mr. Dibblee, Master in Chancery, informed the House that the Council had agreed to The Bill to appropriate a part of the Public Revenue for the Services therein mentioned.

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor by the Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, requiring the immediate attendance of the House in the Council Chamber.

The House attended, and being returned—

The Honorable Mr. Speaker reported, that he had addressed His Excellency to the following effect:—

"May it please Your Excellency,

"The Assembly, with unabated feelings of loyalty and attachment to Her Majesty's Person and Government, attend Your Excellency with the several Bills of Supply passed during the present Session.

"Subjects of great importance to the Country have engaged the attention of the Assembly during a Session of more than ordinary length, occasioned, in some degree, by matters incident to the first Session of a new Assembly. Among the various measures which have passed the Assembly, are the amendments in the Laws relating to the Election of Members to serve in General Assembly, and the Act relating to Bankruptcy, which the Assembly trust, will, in their operation, prove advantageous to the Country.

"The Assembly have adopted such measures, in regard to the Financial Affairs of the Country, as they hope will restore the Provincial Credit.

"With a due regard to economy, they have provided for the Ordinary Services of the Province, and also made such necessary appropriations for the Roads and Bridges and other Public Improvements in the Province, as the state of the Public Treasury would permit. These sums, so placed at the disposal of Your Excellency, the Assembly have the fullest confidence will be as faithfully expended as they have been freely granted.

"The Bills I now have the honor, in the name and on behalf of Her Majesty's faithful and loyal Subjects the Commons of New Brunswick, to present to Your Excellency, are intituled—

"A Bill to appropriate a part of the Public Revenue to the payment of the Ordinary Services of the Province:

"A Bill to appropriate a part of the Public Revenue for the Services therein mentioned:

"A Bill to provide for opening and repairing Roads and erecting Bridges throughout the Province: and

"A Bill relating to the collection of Duty on Timber and other Lumber:

To which, with all humility, I pray Your Excellency's assent."

"Mr. President and Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,

"Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

"The business of the Session having been brought to a termination, I am enabled to release you from your further attendance.

"Although several important matters which have engaged your attention have necessarily been postponed, some measures of considerable interest to the Province, have, by your joint exertions, been accomplished.

"At the opening of the Session I recommended to your especial attention the state of the Public Credit; and it will afford me much satisfaction if the measures which you have taken to facilitate its revival, should prove effectual to that end.

"The alterations you have made in the Laws relating to Insolvency, will facilitate the administration of them, and operate favorably upon Commercial Credit.

"You have been judiciously guided by the principles of the English Statutes in amending the Criminal Law; and also in the amendments made in the Election Laws, which will have a material effect in protecting the rights of the freeholders, and in promoting the public peace at Elections.

"The revival, for a short period, of the Act for supporting Parish Schools, will afford time for devising a comprehensive plan for improving these important institutions,—in the efficiency of which, the interests of the rising generation are so deeply concerned.

"Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

"I thank you for the Supplies you have granted for the Public Service, and for the means you have provided in aid of the ordinary Revenues to meet the liabilities of the Province,—in the due application of which, I feel every assurance that the Government will be entitled to confidence.

"Mr.

“ Mr. President and Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,

“ Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

“ The situation of the Province, after the severe trials to which it has been exposed, during the last two years, and which I regret to think are not yet surmounted, will continue to require the fostering care and attention of the Government. Looking to the calamities which have fallen on other countries, we have abundant cause for thankfulness ; and I rely on receiving that support from you, in your several relations, which will enable me to give effect to the exertions of a loyal people, in regaining their prosperity.”

That His Honor the President of the Legislative Council then said—

“ Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,

“ Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,

“ It is His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor’s will and pleasure, that this General Assembly be prorogued until the last Tuesday in June next; and this General Assembly is accordingly prorogued until the last Tuesday in June next, then here to be holden.”

ROAD FROM FREDERICTON TO GRAND FALLS.

Report on Road from Fredericton to Grand Falls, by James Ketchum, Supervisor.

To His Excellency Sir WILLIAM MACBEAN GEORGE COLEBROOKE, K. H., Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief, &c. &c. &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

In obedience to instructions received from Your Excellency by a Circular dated the 20th instant, calling upon me as Supervisor for a Report of the state of the Roads under my charge, and of the sums which in my opinion will be required to provide for the ordinary repairs in the current year, I beg leave to submit the following Report:—

In the appropriations made by the Legislature last year for the Great Roads leading from Fredericton to the Grand Falls, four hundred pounds was granted for that part between Fredericton and Woodstock, and which was laid out exclusively in repairs on the new line of Road, and in paying up old Contracts, and the repairs having been done in so faithful a manner, I am of opinion, that the sum of one hundred pounds will be sufficient to keep all the new made Road in good repair; but there is a part of the said Road lying between Captain Cheyne's Brook or the Little Pôquiock (so called) and John Davidson's, a distance of about three miles, which as yet has not had any public money expended upon it, and is in a very bad state, and would require to be made anew, the whole distance being rocky and a bad soil for a Road, and some small Bridges being required, the smallest sum requisite for this piece would be six hundred pounds.

Respecting that part of the Great Road leading from Woodstock to the Restock, in making my Report to Your Excellency upon the state of the "Sullivan Creek Bridge," I remarked was in a very bad state, there being a number of Bridges in a very dangerous situation, and will be breaking down during the current year unless they are repaired; one place in particular over the lower Guisiguitt, I consider it to be

be indispensably necessary that a new Bridge should be built in order to insure the safe transmission of Her Majesty's Mail in its route to Quebec.

In regard to that part of the Great Road leading from Restook to the Grand Falls, I wish to state for the further information of Your Excellency, that in the year 1841 there was seven hundred and fifty pounds laid out in opening and grubbing a new line of Road; since then, there has been no further grant made towards it, consequently no use is made of the said new line of Road, it not being as yet fit for travelling upon, and as there is a great deal of swampy land through which the Road runs, and a number of Creeks and some low land to Bridge over, no sum less than seven hundred and fifty pounds would be sufficient to make it passable for Teams; but if this new line of Road is abandoned for the present year, I would recommend that the small sum of twenty pounds be laid out in repairs on the old line.

I further beg leave to state that I consider the completion of the new alteration past Flannagan's Hills (so called) below the Big Presqu' Isle, to be very important, in order to avoid some of the worst Hills on the old Road.

In order to make my Report as clear as possible, I beg to exhibit the following Schedule of the sums which in my opinion will be required for the ordinary repairs and improvements on the Great Road from Fredericton to the Grand Falls:—

BRIDGE OVER SULLIVAN'S CREEK.

Report on Bridge over Sullivan's Creek, by James Ketchum, Supervisor.

To His Excellency Lieutenant Colonel Sir WILLIAM MACBEAN GEORGE COLEBROOKE,
K. H., Lieutenant Governor, &c. &c. &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

I beg leave to lay before Your Excellency a brief Report of the Sullivan Creek Bridge, on the Great Road leading from Fredericton to the Canada Line.

The Sullivan Creek Bridge (so called) was built under the superintendence of the Supervisors Hayward and Ketchum, at an expense of nearly two thousand pounds, and constructed entirely of perishable materials, though the best that could be found of the kind in the country; the Bridge being 94 feet in height and 60 feet in width on the foundation and 24 feet on the top, and about 250 feet in length, it must be evident to Your Excellency that such a body of timber exposed to the weather, cannot be of long duration, but if enclosed in a proper manner, as was first intended, it would be a good and safe Bridge, with some repairs, for forty or fifty years to come, and which may be done as nearly as I can estimate, at an expense of two hundred and seventy to three hundred pounds.

I wish further to state that there is already a roof constructed on the Bridge on a new plan, and which answers the purpose intended as a covering, but the Bridge being so much wider at the bottom than the top, it will require to be double boarded on the sides and done in the best manner, in order to secure it perfectly from the weather.

Before closing this Report, I must again be permitted to bring before Your Excellency's notice the state of the Line of Road between Woodstock and the Grand Falls, a distance of seventy five miles, as I am fearful unless an appropriation is made by the Legislature this Session for the necessary repairs of the Road and Bridges, as well as for finishing the new alteration past the Flannagan Hills, Her Majesty's Mails may be seriously delayed on the route to Quebec.

SIR,—In answer to your Circular of the 20th instant, calling upon me to report for the information of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor the state of the Road under my charge, and also the sum which in my opinion will be required to provide for the ordinary repairs during the current year, I have the honor to state, that on the line of Road between the Grand and Little Falls, on the left bank of the River Saint John, a distance of thirty seven miles, there is as yet only nine miles turnpiked; another ten miles has been grubbed and made fit for Winter travelling, and the remaining eighteen miles between the Quisibis and Grand Falls is still unopened, so that to complete the whole line, exclusive of the Bridge over the Grand Falls, an expenditure of at least four thousand pounds will be required; but from the number of persons without employment in the Province, and the great scarcity of money, I am of opinion that the sum of two thousand pounds will put the Road in a passable state for the conveyance of Her Majesty's Mails during the ensuing year.

You will please to inform the Lieutenant Governor that in consequence of my not having any more money than would discharge the balance due on the Contract for the Floating Bridge at the Jemseg, as may be seen in my account rendered first of this winter, therefore not being on my Road, having no money to expend, cannot say what state the Road under my charge may be in, but the Postman wrote to me in September last, saying that he hoped I would make some repairs, as the Road wanted it much—but for want of the means there was nothing done.

Should

Should the present winter and spring prove favorable, perhaps £150 to £200 might make it passable for the Post to get on without much inconvenience. At the same time it must be remembered, as there was no money expended the last summer, the Road may be more out of repair than usual.

This Road being the great line of communication between the City of Saint John and the Seat of Government, and during the Spring and Fall when the Steamers cannot ply on the River, the wet weather and frost causes a very great injury upon the Road. There is a great number of Bridges upon this line which for the safety of travellers must be kept secure; I do not think that a less sum than £300 would keep it in repair. The Gagetown Road, £50 would keep it for the present year in a passable state; and £25 on the Road from Gagetown to the Oromocto.

ROAD FROM SAINT JOHN TO SAINT ANDREWS.

Report on Road from Saint John to Saint Andrews, by George Anderson, Supervisor.

Saint John, 27th February, 1843.

SIR,—In answer to the Circular under date of the 20th instant, I have the honor to inform you for the information of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, that I forwarded a Report accompanying my Accounts to the Auditor General, at the close of the last season, recommending a new Bridge over the Bocabec River, to be built on piles of pine timber, which, to be properly built, in my opinion, would cost the sum of three hundred pounds; the site of the Bridge should also be changed farther down the stream: also the Bridge over the western branch of the Musquash River will require new stringers and hand railings of pine timber, which to be completed in a proper manner, would cost, in my opinion, the sum of one hundred pounds. There are also some trifling repairs to be done on other small Bridges on the line, which probably would cost the sum of thirty or forty pounds to make them safe. I considered the Road at the close of the last season to be generally in a good and passable state, but like most other Roads in the Province, the frost of the winter will make it necessary to have repairs done upon it in the current year.

ROAD FROM PETITCODIAC TO SHEDIAC.

Report on Road from Petitcodiac to Shediac, by James Wallace, Supervisor.

SIR,—Your Circular did not come to hand till last evening, which I beg to offer as an apology for my not attending to His Excellency's orders sooner.

The Road leading from Petitcodiac to Shediac, likewise the Road from Dorchester to Shediac, is in a tolerably good state, so that I think £50 on each Road may be sufficient for the necessary repairs for the current year.

The Road leading from Salisbury to Hopewell has been but four years on the Great Road list, and the greater part of the money granted for its improvement has been laid out in building Bridges; consequently the Road (with exception of that part leading through the old settlements) is in a very backward state, and hardly passable for carriages. There is an important alteration now in the way of being made for the distance of three miles—it is grubbed out and ready for turnpiking. By this alteration bad hills are avoided, and the crossing the Coverdale River twice. The Shepody River Bridge is like to fall with old age, and will require a thorough repair this season. The Petitcodiac River Bridge will also require repairs, it being damaged this Winter by the ice and an uncommonly high freshet. I think that £400 will be required this year for the repairs of the Road and the Bridges alluded to.

ROAD FROM FREDERICTON TO SAINT ANDREWS, AND OAK BAY TO EEL RIVER.

Report on Road from Fredericton to Saint Andrews, and Oak Bay to Eel River, by L. B. Rainsford, Supervisor.

Fredericton, February 23, 1843.

SIR,—In answer to a Circular of the 20th instant, calling upon me to Report for the information of the Lieutenant Governor, the state of the Roads under my charge, and the sums which may be required to keep them in repair for the current year, I have to state that the Road from Fredericton to Saint Andrews via the Hanwell, a distance of seventy three miles, was in a good state of repair during the last season, but as it is a new Road, it will require £10 per mile to keep it in the same state for the ensuing year; twenty miles of the said Road has not as yet been skirted, which will cost five pounds per mile in addition to the above sum, making in all for this Road the sum of £830.

The Road from Waweig to Saint Stephens, a distance of ten miles, was in a passable state the past year, and will require the sum of ten pounds per mile, to put it in good repair, making in all for this Road, £100.

In reference to the Road from Oak Bay to Eel River, I have to Report that the distance is 66 miles, twenty miles of which is passable for wheels, and will require at least ten pounds per mile to keep it in a good state of repair; another twenty miles has been merely opened twelve feet wide; and as to the remaining twenty six miles, the trees have been taken out and the Road partially levelled, so that 46 miles of the Road are in a very rough state, and only fit for winter travelling, and will require £20 per mile to make it even passable for horses in summer, making in the whole for this Road the sum of £1120.

ROAD FROM SHEDIAC TO RICHIBUCTO.

Report on Road from Shediac to Richibucto, by Wm. Chandler, Supervisor.

Richibucto, 27th February, 1843.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Circular of the 24th instant, requesting a Report of the state of the Road under my charge as Supervisor, and of the amount, in my opinion, required to provide for the ordinary repairs in the current year.

In compliance therewith I have to state, that the line of Road under my charge extends from Shediac to the Richibucto River: That on this line there is a great number of large and small Bridges which require more or less repairs almost every year: That there will be required this year seven new Bridges, cost of which I have estimated from £10 to £15, or an average of £20 each. That part of the line between Buctouche and Cocagne wants considerable repairs in being made wide, turnpiked, and some new cross Drains and Ditches; very little (except temporary repairs) has been expended on this part of the Road for several years past, so that to make any improvement to advantage it has become indispensably necessary that a considerable portion of this should be new turnpiked and gravelled. The other part of the line from Buctouche to Richibucto, a considerable portion during the last few years has been new turnpiked and now in fair condition; the other part of it, however, wants considerable repairs. The Cocagne Bridge remains much in the same state as reported on the 8th December last. As to the extent of injury to this Bridge cannot well be ascertained until the Channel abutment is taken down; but for the repairs of this I estimate from £100 to £150. If the repairs of this Bridge could be let in the early part of next month it might be done for considerable less than if let in the Spring, as being in a more convenient season for getting out Logs, and people more at leisure. The sum, however, required for the line of Road from Shediac to Richibucto, to put the same in good repair in the current year, cannot be less in my opinion than four hundred and seventy pounds, as follows:—

BRIDGE OVER COCAGNE RIVER.

Report respecting repair required to Bridge over Cocagne River, by William Chandler, Supervisor.

Richibucto, December 8, 1842.

SIR,—As Supervisor of the Great Road between Shediac and Richibucto, and agreeably to His Excellency's directions contained in your Circular of the 9th April last, I beg leave to Report, that on some day during the last week, a part of the Cocagne Bridge broke down, one of the abutments or piers in the channel of the River moved up stream, and two others, one on each side of the channel, have considerably settled, and some of the logs of the same have been forced out, so that the stringers have broken and fallen down, consequently about one hundred and seventy five feet of the Bridge has fallen over on its side and become impassable. The cause of this injury I have not as yet been enabled satisfactorily to ascertain. Two persons have examined

examined it, one of whom is of opinion that the channel pier has fallen, in consequence of its bottom being undermined at its side; the other person is of opinion that the pier has been raised by the ice, and separated about the middle at one of the ballast floors; but to ascertain correctly cannot well be done without removing or taking down a great part of the same, which appears impracticable at this season of the year. Some temporary repairs have been made with a few planks, to allow passing without much weight, but in such a way as leaves it very dangerous. No temporary repairs can be made without much expense, so as to make it at all safe passing. About 200 feet of the Bridge will require to be removed and three of the abutments taken down; one of them being in the channel and having two floors ballasted, it will be attended with much difficulty and expense to remove it. The amount required to put it in good repair, I estimate at between one and two hundred pounds, which cannot well be done before the spring opens. The weather however has just set in cold, and should it continue for a few days, it will I think make the ice safe for crossing, and in that case the Bridge may be dispensed with for the present.

ROAD FROM PETITCODIAC TO FREDERICTON.

Report on Road from Petitcodiac to Fredericton, by William Goodfellow, Supervisor.

To His Excellency Lieutenant Colonel Sir WILLIAM MACBEAN GEORGE COLEBROOKE, K. H., Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

Having in my journey from the Nova Scotia Line to Saint John examined that part of the above Road which lies between the Petitcodiac River and a point about ten miles distant towards Fredericton, and having since my arrival at Fredericton made inspection of a like space at this extremity of the said Road, I beg to Report—

That I found five miles of the former distance turnpiked, commencing at the Petitcodiac, part of the residue has a ditch upon the upper side; but as no water courses have been carried across the Road, this ditch has, by the continued action of the water, been deepened into extensive cavities and gullies, and will present a very serious impediment to the completion of the Road. The remainder of the distance inspected from Petitcodiac is stumped in the centre about 24 feet, and skirted a further width of 21 feet on each side, in all, 4 rods; I believe a similar space has been stumped and skirted all the way to Salmon River.

The alignment of that part I examined is quite sinuous, although the country through which it passes is remarkably level, and I am unable at present to account for this seemingly capricious deviation from a straight line.

The portion at this end of the Road which I examined is yet more objectionable: not only is the alignment particularly bad, but the formation of the Road (a kind of turnpike) is such as to render it utterly useless. This turnpiking extends about 9 miles, and is composed of all the roots, rotten wood, moss, &c. that could be concealed by a superficial layer of earth and gravel, and so injurious are such substances to the formation of a Road, that the money expended on the whole 9 miles may be considered as entirely lost: because as the whole surface must be again uncovered and the vegetable substances fully removed, I consider that the making of a new Road through the wilderness would be less costly than the re-construction of the existing line.

The Road from the end of this turnpike, as far as I have examined it, and probably to Salmon River, appears to be chopped down and about 24 feet in the centre prepared for stumping; but on more particular examination I found that many of the trees had been

been cut down close to the surface, rendering it much more difficult to remove the roots than if the trees had been left untouched.

On the whole, I consider that few Roads in the Province can well be more objectionable in every point of view than that upon which I am now reporting. The alignment seems unnecessarily bad; the construction of the turnpike exhibits an entire absence of knowledge in the elements of Road making; and as the line strikes Salmon River on the opposite sides at points nearly half a mile distant, it becomes almost impossible to carry a Bridge over that Stream without the expenditure of a large sum for angular approaches.

It is therefore my opinion, which I respectfully offer to Your Excellency, that no future expenditure is advisable in forming this Road until the line be properly and thoroughly examined, and such alterations made as would carry it through the best localities. The Road can be made in such manner as will insure its durability and usefulness.

ROAD FROM FREDERICTON TO NEWCASTLE.

Report on Road from Fredericton to Newcastle, by Alexander Goodfellow, Supervisor.

Miramichi, February 9, 1843.

SIR,—The Road from Fredericton to Newcastle, in consequence of the absence of James Gilmour, Esquire, the Supervisor, having remained under my charge, I now beg leave to Report for the information of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, that I have attended to the duty of Supervisor, and to the expenditure of the Grant of last Session.

I examined the whole of the line as early as the first of May last, and found that damage had been done to the said Road at various places by the Spring freshets. Early in June I employed an Overseer with a small party of men and a horse and cart to commence opposite Fredericton and proceed towards Miramichi, and subsequently another party under an Overseer with horse and cart, to commence at Indian Town on the Miramichi River, and proceed toward the other party, each making such repairs as the state of the Road required, and the means at my disposal would warrant. With a view of more fully carrying out the intentions of the Legislature, I advertised to take Contracts by Public Auction for the repairs of part of the Road commencing at Indian Town and extending downwards; the manner in which the work was to be performed was carefully described previous to the time of sale, and intimation given that bonds with sureties would be required, and the Contract strictly enforced; but such was the anxiety to get labour, that the jobs were bid off much lower than what they could really be performed for, and the consequence was, that after a commencement had been made and the Road rendered worse than before, two of the Contractors abandoned their work, although repeatedly urged to go on. I declined taking proceedings against the parties as they were very poor men, and after the time limited in the Contract had expired, employed the same Overseers as before, and formed new parties to complete the work, which cost much more than the rates at which it was originally contracted for. This will partly account for the over expenditure of the past season, measures which, with the view of strictly adhering to His Excellency's instructions, I had no intention of.

I beg to direct His Excellency's attention to my Report of 19th August last, wherein I fully explained the nature of the additional work required to be done on Renous River Bridge, to render it safe, and as nothing has yet been done in the matter, I would suggest that the latter end of March, while the ice is good in the stream, would

be the best time to go on with it, and that arrangements should immediately be made for the necessary materials and workmanship, either by Contract or otherwise.

I have repeatedly adverted to the state of the Road from four miles below Indian Town to Miramich Point at the mouth of the South West Branch, and would again beg to direct attention to it. In this distance (about eleven miles) there are upwards of twenty Bridges of various sizes, and several bad hills. The cause of so many Bridges is its too great proximity to the River, the Road in many places running along the edge of the bank; while by running out a new line a short distance back, many of the Bridges would be entirely avoided, and the steep hill relieved. Should an alteration be approved of it should be commenced without delay, as the Road is now in a very bad state, and many of the Bridges are nigh tumbling down. This measure, if carried into effect, besides causing additional safety and ease in travelling, would insure a saving to the Province in a few years.

ROAD FROM NOVA SCOTIA LINE TO SAINT JOHN.

Report on Road from Nova Scotia Line to Saint John, by Alex. Goodfellow, Supervisor.

Miramichi, 10th February, 1843.

SIR,—Having in my Report of the 16th July last given a brief account of the state of the Road from the Nova Scotia Line to Saint John, and shewn the manner the grant of the last Session was expending, it now remains for me to state that every exertion was used on my part to apply the small amount at my disposal in the most beneficial way. To effect this, the attention of the Overseers was directed to the removal of all obstructions to wheel travelling, such as roots, stones, &c. and to the carefully filling up of the places thus opened, and all wheel ruts, &c. with the best materials to be had in the vicinity, for which purpose a horse and cart were constantly employed; by these means preventing the action of the water on the centre of the Road, particularly on the hills, travelling having often become almost impracticable by the lodging of water. Although the two parties I had employed and alluded to in said Report passed along the line of Road in as economical and hasty a manner as its state would permit, an over expenditure to the amount of £32 3 7, besides commission, has taken place, the principal part of which was occasioned by the Hammond River Bridge. When I last visited that Road it was in a very passable state, but from the softness of soil of which part of it is made, the imperfect workmanship, and heavy travelling during the late extensive thaws, I fear it must now be in a bad state, and will doubtless require considerable outlay next season to enable travelling to be maintained, although if the Statute Labour was applied under the superintendence of practical Road makers much less might be necessary. I may remark that the water is allowed to pass along the higher side of the Road for much too great a distance without being taken to the lower side, thereby often doing much injury. To prevent this, I recommend an increase of cross Drains, but as the wood materials for such purposes are difficult to be had in Summer, it would be necessary to prepare and have on the spot in Winter every thing that was required, likewise materials for repairing several small Bridges which are in a decayed state. This, however, could not be done on the responsibility of the Supervisor, whose appointment is annual. I may also remark, that the Great Tantamar Marsh is composed of a heavy loam on a clay bed, and is very unfavorable for Road making, being always soft and miry in the Spring and Fall. This can only be improved by resorting to the use of suitable gravel, of which there is abundance a few miles from Dorchester within a few rods of water conveyance, whence it might be taken round to the Marsh in crafts similar to the Wood Boats used at Saint John.

The

The Road therefore, instead of being flat as at present, should have a sufficient crowning to pass the water freely to the sides, and then top dressed with a thin coating of the gravel; a cement would thus be formed on the top which would resist the action of the frost and water, and the Road would be kept in good travelling condition at small expense after its first formation. All the Roads in the County of Westmorland would be much improved by a general application of the gravel, and in my opinion would be even less expensive than, and far preferable to the present system of putting brush wood into the Road, which is acted on by the frost and has to be re-covered every few years. In many instances large ditches have been dug at the side of the Road to get materials to cover the brush, rendering Winter travelling dangerous, and being contrary to every principle of Road making. The other Counties through which this line of Road passes, until near the Great Saint John Marsh, abound with the best materials for Road making, and if the Road were well formed and properly located, so as to avoid the hills, &c. it would not be expensive to keep in repair.

In my Report of 16th July, I took no notice of that part of the Road lying between Bellisle and Saint John, on which I was appointed to expend £40. On examining that part of my district, I found said Road to leave the Great Road from the Finger-board or Baxter's, to Fredericton on a right angle, and proceed down the side of the Bay for several miles. For the first few miles the Road was newly made, and in general well located, the remainder of the Road to Kingston is badly run out and very imperfectly made, crossing many steep hills and deep valleys that could have been avoided. Before any extensive expenditure on this Road takes place a thorough examination of the country should be made, as the present route will never answer. I understand that a line of Road known as the Maybie Line, was looked out some years ago and subsequently surveyed by a Commission, of which Philip Palmer, Esquire, M. P. P. was one; this line, from what I saw, I am sure would be much preferable to the present one, but whether it is the best that could be adopted I am not prepared to say. From Kingston to the Kennebecasis, a distance of about three miles, the line is less objectionable, and on this part I expended the principal portion of the grant by Contract at Public Auction. The Contracts were taken low and the work tolerably well performed, although with much delay and trouble to the Supervisor. From the Kennebecasis to the Nine Mile House, a distance of seven miles, the line is generally imperfect and part of the Road bad. At the last named place the Road joins the Post Road from Nova Scotia to Saint John.

This line of Road is of great importance to the Agricultural interests of the Country along the route, a large quantity of produce from King's County being conveyed by it to Saint John, and were the Road so improved that heavy laden teams could pass along without difficulty, which is not the case at present, an increased stimulus would be given to that all important branch of industry.

All which is submitted for His Excellency's information and approval.

HAMMOND RIVER BRIDGE.

Report on Hammond River Bridge, by Alexander Goodfellow, Supervisor.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

In obedience to Your Excellency's instructions, I proceeded to Hammond River Bridge, in King's County, on Friday last, and now beg leave to Report, that I found the fastening of one of the chains carried away, and the Bridge settled down about two feet in the centre, and in other respects much injured. Immediate

Immediate steps have been taken to replace the chain and otherwise to support the Bridge, until something can be done for its permanent security, to effect which, I would recommend the erection of a substantial pier in the centre of the stream, sufficiently strong to resist the pressure of the ice when breaking up, on which pier the centre of the Bridge would rest, and from which it can be raised up to a straight line; any support from the top being evidently insufficient to support so heavy a structure.

RENOUS RIVER BRIDGE.

Report on Renous River Bridge, by Alexander Goodfellow, Supervisor.

Miramichi, August 19, 1842.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your communication of 5th instant, with enclosure to James Gilmour, Esquire, and in obedience to the request therein contained, in the absence of Mr. Gilmour, I have to Report for His Excellency's information, that I have repeatedly examined the Bridge across the Renous River during the last six months, and for the last time on the 16th instant.

On the removal of the scaffolding last Fall, the centre of the span settled down about nine inches; and while a heavy quantity of snow lay on it during winter, and since, a further settling sideways has taken place of twelve or thirteen inches, which if not brought to the plumb and secured, may ultimately endanger its safety; no change however has taken place for the last two or three months, nor is it at all dangerous at present nor likely to become so for some time.

The Contract for its erection not having been fulfilled, I have been in communication with the Contractor for some time past, with a view to an arrangement, but being unable to effect one that I could be safe in entering into, I had determined on bringing the circumstances under His Excellency's notice, and for his information I now enclose the Contract and papers therewith connected, on which the Contractor has received £796.

I might here remark, that it is the opinion of persons practically acquainted with Bridges, that the span of the Bridge can be brought back to its original position, and there secured by horizontal braces. I would also suggest the addition of a light king post and brace on both sides, with a view to additional strength, which might cost (including what has yet to be done to the rail, &c., part of the original Contract,) from £70 to £80.

GENERAL REPORT OF MR. GOODFELLOW ON ROADS UNDER HIS SUPERVISION.

Miramichi, 18th July, 1842.

SIR,—Having observed in the Royal Gazette, my appointment as Supervisor of the Great Road from Saint John to the Nova Scotia Line, I availed myself of the earliest opportunity which the Spring presented, and accordingly in the latter end of April proceeded to examine the whole line of Road above referred to. Commencing at the Nova Scotia Line and proceeding towards Sackville, I noticed with regard to the line, a peculiarity which I could not account for, viz: a great many departures from a straight

straight line across the Great Marsh, where the line might as well have been perfectly straight. From the new Bridge at Sackville to Dorchester, the whole line will require to be altered or a new line made, which at no very great expense could be found, and would furnish very great facilities, both as it respects a reduction in hills and substituting a straight for a very crooked line, and consequently a great reduction in distance. From Dorchester to Hayward's Mills, being near the line dividing Westmorland and King's Counties, without abandoning the present general line, there are several places where very material alterations are required, particularly in the way of easing the ascent over hills, and in some instances avoiding the hills altogether. Close by Nixon's Tavern or Wright's Shipyard, I was particularly struck with the necessity of making one, which alteration is in fact almost indispensably necessary, and in the accomplishment of which a Bridge to cost about two hundred pounds would be required. From the circumstance of my never having seen the locality at present under consideration at the season of the year when danger would exist, I cannot judge for myself; but various reports concur in representing the travelling at this place after a thaw as being exceedingly dangerous, and appearances are favorable to these reports. From Hayward's Mills to M'Leod's, on the Kennebecasis, the line generally is as good as in my opinion the locality would admit of. From M'Leod's to within ten miles of the City of Saint John, the remarks above made, with regard to the line from Dorchester to Hayward's Mills, will fully apply. Thence to Saint John the line is pretty good.

While engaged on this examination, I employed two men, appointing each to a particular section, with instructions to fill up any ruts and remove any obstructions which might have been thrown up by the frost or otherwise, and so far to place the whole line in such a situation as that it may be travelled upon without danger until the general repairs should be performed. This was accomplished at an expense of about ten pounds.

Considering the state of the Road generally and the comparatively small amount of the grant to be expended, viz: two hundred and fifty pounds gross, upon a distance of about 140 miles, I felt satisfied that I could not describe the work to be done, if set up at Auction, in such a way as would insure its being performed according to any specification that I could prepare, and consequently determined upon employing about ten men, together with two horses and carts, by the month, which I divided into two parties, appointing one of each party as Overseer, and set them to work at opposite ends of the line, with directions to work towards each other. To the party generally, but more particularly to the Overseers, I described the nature of the repairs to be performed. These parties have been at work since the middle of June, and I visit them at intervals, giving to each party such particular instructions with regard to the work to be performed upon the line ahead of them as I think necessary; should the whole amount of the grant be expended, as originally intended, it will be absorbed by these parties about the middle of next month.

I should have observed that on first visiting the line, I was applied to by the Commissioners of Highways at Dorchester for assistance to enable them to re-erect a Bridge on the line close by the Village, which Bridge had become in every respect worn out and dangerous. They satisfied me that they had a promise of assistance from my predecessor, and their proposition was that I should pay for the materials, and that they would furnish all the labor; this I considered so reasonable, as that upon the condition of their placing the erection of the Bridge under my supervision, and erecting it according to my plan and to my satisfaction, I consented to pay for the materials, which cost thirty pounds. The Bridge by this time is finished. Near the Bend of Petitcodiac an application was also made to me by a Commissioner respecting a small Bridge upon the line, the covering of which had become worn out; in this case, I consented to pay for the materials, being about three pounds, upon the condition of his getting the labor performed, which was accordingly done.

Another special job I let at Public Auction, being the repairs of the abutment of a Bridge on the Petitcodiac, which cost ten pounds, and is nearly completed.

These special matters, together with the labor of the first two men employed, amounting in the whole to £53, reduced the amount to be expended upon the other general repairs of the line to a very small amount.

I have further to report, that on the 17th of May, I received a communication from Saint John, stating that the Bridge over Hammond River, which had cost over £1,600, was in a dangerous state, and requiring to be immediately attended to, else that it must break down. I accordingly, in the latter end of May, made Fredericton my route, with the view of communicating with His Excellency upon the subject, and more particularly to ascertain where means were to come from to pay for what it may be necessary to do in repairing the Bridge; and upon my stating to His Excellency that the grant for that line of Road was barely sufficient to keep it in a travelling state, in which His Excellency appeared to concur, His Excellency left me under the impression that means would be provided for the repairs of the Bridge by the time they may be required.

With these impressions I proceeded, and learned in Saint John that Mr. Clarke, the original builder of the Bridge, had, under the directions of the Mayor, gone with some workmen to examine and do what may be necessary. On his return I met him in Saint John, and he accompanied me to the Bridge, where we joined in giving such instructions for temporary repairs as we thought advisable, and which cost £15 or thereabouts. I then returned via Fredericton, and made my Report on the 6th of June, and in conformity with your Honor's reply thereto, there being no time to be lost, I closed with an offer which I had from Mr. Clarke, above named, and which offer I thought reasonable, viz: £150 for the erection of a Pier and "Heater," ballasting both, raising the Bridge where it had sunk, and other repairs connected therewith, payable when the work should be completed, except £55 advanced to enable him to pay for Timber,—the work must be completed by this time.

With regard to the Hampton Ferry Bridge, for which there was a grant of £100, I took a Contract for such repairs as I deemed necessary upon it, which amounted to £68 10s. and expended the residue also under Contract, and both jobs at Public Auction, upon a hill within about a mile of the Bridge upon the Westmorland side.

As a part of the repairs contracted for upon this Bridge was the removal and re-erection of a Pier which could not be done during the Summer without depriving the public of the use of the Bridge, I gave the Contractor until March next for its completion, by which time it can be done without much inconvenience to the public, as they can cross on the ice while these repairs are being done, the Contractor, in the mean time, being bound to keep the Bridge in a safe travelling state.

I now beg leave to request that means be furnished as soon as possible to enable me to pay the Contractor for the repairs of the Hammond River Bridge, as the Contractor's great inducement to take the job at so low a rate was the full expectation of being paid when his Contract should be completed, and a disappointment to him he declares would be attended with disastrous consequences, as he is totally unprepared for it.

Estimate of sums required for repairs to Roads under Mr. Goodfellow's supervision.

Fredericton, 16th March, 1843.

SIR,—In compliance with the Lieutenant Governor's request, contained in your Circular of the 20th ultimo, calling upon me for a Report of the state of the Roads under my charge, as Supervisor, and of the sums, which in my opinion, will be required to provide for the ordinary repairs in the current year,—

I beg leave to report, that having already reported on the state of the Roads under my charge, it only remains for me to state, that although the Road from Saint John to the Nova Scotia Line was in a passable state when I last examined it, yet from the unfavorable nature of the soil for Road making, and the imperfect manner in which the

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the Road formerly has been made, particularly from the residence of the Honorable Wm. Crane across the Great Marsh, and from the circumstance of many of the Bridges being in a decayed state, I am of opinion that at least £500 will be required for the current year, to keep the Road in a passable state of travelling. I however would remark, that from the imperfect manner in which the said Road has been laid out, as may be seen on reference to my Report of the 16th July last, it would not be advisable to expend a larger sum than would be sufficient to keep the Road in a passable state for travelling, until the Legislature might think proper to order such alterations as may be found necessary, and which in fact are indispensable.

The Road from Bellisle to Saint John I think may be kept in a passable state by the Statute Labour, and a Grant of from £60 to £100.

The Road from Fredericton to Newcastle having been put in a good state of repair at the close of last season, with the exception of that part of the said Road from below Indian Town to the point of Miramichi, a similar grant to that of last year might be sufficient; but having repeatedly stated that an alteration was necessary before any farther sum should be expended thereon, and as there are a number of Bridges which are on the eve of falling, and which will have to be rebuilt unless such alteration takes place, it will therefore appear vident that such alteration should be gone into in place of re-building the Bridges on the present line. It may be necessary to state that in addition to the above, the sum of £60 was over expended last year, and that the Bridge across the Renous River has not been entirely finished by the Contractor; and that although no immediate injury to the Bridge is dreaded, in my opinion it should be finished, and some additional strength added to the whole, which would probably cost from £90 to £100, say in the whole £460 for the Road from Fredericton to Newcastle.

As relates to the Road from Fredericton to the Petitcodiac, to which I was appointed last year, I would state, that I have not expended any money nor have I examined it generally since my Report of about the 1st May last, to which Report I beg leave to refer.

ROAD FROM MIRAMICHI TO RESTIGOUCHE.

Report on Road from Miramichi to Restigouche, by D. Crocker, Supervisor.

Miramichi, December, 1842.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

My operations as Supervisor of the Road from Miramichi to Restigouche being now suspended for the present year, it becomes my duty to Report to Your Excellency, and I beg permission to submit the following:—

The sums appropriated at the last Session for this line were £80 from Newcastle, Miramichi, to Bathurst, and £400 from Bathurst to Campbelltown, (Restigouche.)

As there was a balance of £145 due to me from 1841, in consequence of an alteration made in the line of Road between Martin Lyon's Cove and James Russell's in the Parish of Newcastle, (Miramichi,) which was not charged in account rendered that year, and although this improvement in the line has given general satisfaction, it unexpectedly called upon me for part of the £80 which I had intended to expend on other parts of the Road. The balance as it now stands due me will be £115, to be provided for at the next sitting of the Legislature. The remainder of the Grant was expended repairing the Road and Bridges through to Bathurst generally, which, with few exceptions, has placed the Road in a fair state for travelling, but from the limited sum expended this season, it will require to be attended to early in the ensuing year.

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The Grant of £400 from Bathurst to Campbelltown, Restigouche, was expended in paying off all claims due on former Contracts, as stated in my Report of June last, for which a part of this Grant was intended. The remainder was paid for repairs generally in the County of Restigouche. The materials intended for the Bridges across Jaquet River, have all been rafted and put in a place of safety.

The Bridge across Belledune River, which divides the County of Gloucester and Restigouche, is in quite a dangerous state, and if possible should be built anew the ensuing season; probable cost, with the approaches, about £100.

As I have for the last two years' reported fully on the state of the line of Roads from Bathurst to Dalhousie, I have little to add at present, and shall close this Report by remarking that the Road made and Bridges built on this line for the last four years stand well, and from what I can learn, gives very general satisfaction.

ROAD FROM RICHIBUCTO TO CHATHAM.

Report on Road from Richibucto to Chatham, by David Crocker, Supervisor.

Miramichi, December, 1842.

I beg leave to Report for the information of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, the following, my Report as Supervisor of the Road from Richibucto to Chatham.

As early as the opening of the Spring would permit, I went over the whole line of Road intrusted to my superintendence, to enable me to form the best estimate my judgment would allow me to do, as to the expenditure of the fifty pounds granted for the Road. After having as fully as practicable at that time, ascertained the state of the Road, I found, from the limited sum put at my disposal, that I would be compelled, in keeping the Road in repair, to put on one or two parties upon it by the day, for the purpose of making temporary repairs, and by adopting this method, the Road has been kept in a passable state through the summer, with few exceptions.

In consequence of an important Bridge having become quite dangerous, at what is called Davidson's Creek, near Richibucto, it was thought advisable to arrange for repairing it before the ice left in the Spring, as it would quite obstruct the travelling if done in the Summer season. Consequently a Contract was entered into in Fall of 1841, at a cost of £70, and although the Bridge was absolutely requisite for the safety of travelling, it unexpectedly called for ten pounds of the present grant, which was much wanted on other parts of the Road. The balance, £60, is now due the Contractor, which I trust the Legislature will anticipate, by ordering a grant to meet the balance.

There are also a number of Bridges on this line, and some that will want immediate repairs; the one across Kouchibouguacis River, near 800 feet in length, will require repairs before the ice leaves in the Spring, as some of the Blocks are quite removed out of their places, owing to the high tide late in the Fall, and the Bridge otherwise injured.

GENERAL REPORT OF MR. CROCKER ON ROADS UNDER HIS SUPERVISION.

Miramichi, 30th June, 1842.

SIR,—I beg leave to Report for the information of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, and in conformity with his wishes, as conveyed in your Circular of 9th April last, that as early as the season permitted, I proceeded to examine the whole line

line of Road intrusted to my superintendence, and having as far as was practicable at that time, ascertained its state, found, that after selling some particular sections, and repairing the Bridge across Ferguson's Mill Stream, near Campbelltown, (Restigouche,) by Public Auction, from the limited sum placed at my disposal on the line thence to Newcastle, a distance of one hundred and fifty miles, the best plan that I could adopt, in order to put and keep the Road in a safe passable state, would be to hire two or three parties upon it by the month, in some places to make permanent, and in others temporary repairs, such as filling up ruts made by carriage wheels, repairing water-courses, and such like.

The Road from Newcastle to Bathurst will in a short time be placed in a fair state for travelling; on this line a Contract was taken last season for building a Bridge at a cost of £115, forty pounds of which was paid to the Contractor last Fall, as well as £15 10s. for damages connected with the line on which the Bridge was built, neither of which sums were charged by me in account rendered at the last sitting of the Legislature. The balance on this Contract is now due, as the Bridge and approaches are made passable.

Parties are also at work on the Road from Richibucto to Chatham, and in a short time the whole of that line will be in a fair state for travelling. As the Bridge across Davidson's Creek, near the turn of Richibucto, had become quite impassable, it was deemed advisable last Fall to take a Contract for repairing it, which was accordingly done at a cost of £70, and will be completed in a short time.

Upwards of £240 of the amount granted at the last Session of the Legislature to be expended in the County of Restigouche, was intended to discharge Contracts entered into last Fall, viz: £170 for materials to build a Bridge across Jacquet River; £17 10s. to A. Ritchie; and £30 to Henry Hughes for building Bridges, and the balance for exploring, staking, &c. These Contracts, as well as some others, are now completed, and I shall require means to discharge them as soon as convenient. The remaining Contracts and monthly labor will also be completed and finished about the first of August, which I trust His Excellency will anticipate by ordering all Warrants in my favor to issue, as a large amount will have to be discharged from my own private means, for the reimbursement of which I shall have to await a grant from the Legislature at its next sitting.

There were two grants in my favor at the last Session of the House—one for £153 and upwards, and the other for £30 and upwards, being over expenditures advanced by me, and which it would be a relief to me if His Excellency would order Warrants to issue for.

ROAD FROM NOVA SCOTIA TO CANADA.

Estimate of the probable expense of carrying on the Survey of the Road from Nova Scotia to Canada for one season, under the direction of Captain Crawley, Royal Engineers.

REPORT.

In framing this estimate I have calculated on working from 1st June to 15th November.

1.—The pay of the Assistant Surveyor and 2 Chainmen is reckoned for the whole time.

2.—Two Laborers are calculated for the whole time, and two additional for half the time, (Sundays excluded from both.) It may occasionally be requisite to employ two men as Axemen.

3.—This is provided to carry Camp equipage, &c. along the Road, and is exclusive of Sundays.

- 4.—Provisions necessary when camped out.
 5.—The actual expense only of the Board of Assistant Surveyor and 2 Chainmen will be paid. A saving will probably be effected on this item.
 6.—This is to cover travelling expenses of the party.
 7.—This provides the annual pay of the Engineer Officer.
 8.—Inn expenses are here estimated for as sanctioned by the Board of Ordnance under similar circumstances.
 Item 5, does not include Board for the Engineer Officer, it will be paid by himself.

NOTE.—If the Assistant Surveyor is in the receipt of a salary from the Government half the sum charged for him may probably be deducted.

PROVINCIAL PENITENTIARY.

Annual Report of Board of Commissioners for the Provincial Penitentiary.

The present Commissioners having been appointed to office late in the month of August, entered upon the duties thereof on 1st September last.

That the Commissioners have subsequently received Monies from the Provincial Treasurer at various dates, the last on 1st February, 1843, amounting in the whole to £1021 9 10; and although £250 of this amount was received in January and February, the whole is at credit in the Account ending 31st December, it having been expended in paying Accounts contracted prior to 1st January, 1843,—and that there are remaining unpaid Accounts for expenditure prior to 1st January, 1843, amounting to £198 8 5½.

The annexed Abstract of the Keeper's Monthly Returns, since the period of the Commissioners' appointment, exhibits the manner of employment, and the Prisoners admitted and discharged during each month, number of Diets, &c.

Cutting and preparing the stone, and recently building thirty new Cells, has furnished the means of employing usefully many of the Prisoners; and although there are now sixty Cells which can be used for Male Prisoners—as a Provincial Institution, it is apprehended that a third tier of Cells will be required by the period at which the material could be procured and the work completed.

The only, at present, prospective profitable occupation for the Prisoners, is that of making Brick, and although considerable fuel for that purpose has been procured—if allowance be made for no inconsiderable consumption in the Prison during the Winter—it would be desirable to increase or double the present quantity of Wood, so as to ensure an ample supply when the season for making Brick arrives.

The Commissioners cannot omit in this Report noticing the very insecure description of Fence or Paling with which the Prison is enclosed,—affording little or no protection against escape; and are of opinion, that it is an object of the first importance to get the grounds securely enclosed by Brick and Stone Walls, and that the labor of the Prisoners should be rather directed to that object than any other; and that the providing Brick and quarrying Stone the ensuing season would be ultimately more advantageous than making Brick for sale; and with the erection of exterior Walls, Sick Wards and Work Buildings can be made to become a part of the intended Wall.

The Commissioners esteem it their duty to notice the embarrassment under which they have frequently been placed by the delay in procuring the necessary funds to pay the charges of the Prison; and had it not been for advances occasionally made by themselves, the means of feeding and clothing the Prisoners would on more than one occasion have ceased to exist. To obviate a continuance of this difficulty, they respectfully suggest that the Province Treasurer may be authorized to furnish funds as required, on requisition of the Board, to the extent of £100 monthly.

The Monthly Report of the Visiting Commissioners, which have been regularly transmitted; will supply much detail, and prevent repetition of like matter by the Board.

The expenditure of the month will be found large in consequence of the stock of materials required to be laid in for Winter Clothing, &c., but we are glad to say, it will not we think exceed the amount estimated by the Report of Chairman of the Board to the Executive Government.

The kiln of Brick commenced last month has been finished. The labour of a part of the male Prisoners, under the direction of Mr. Ray, with the assistance of two hired Masons, has been devoted to the erection of a second tier of cells, which are progressing well—the hired Masons commenced on Monday the 22nd instant, at 6s. 6d. per day. The other male Prisoners have been principally occupied on the grounds, digging and housing the Potatoes, (about 500 bushels of which have been secured,) ditching and otherwise preparing the soil for cultivation next Spring; also at Carpenter and Blacksmith work, Tailors, Shoe and Harness making, with the exception of three Soldiers in solitary confinement, which will expire on the 1st proximo.

The female Prisoners employed in washing and cooking, &c. for the establishment, spinning, knitting, and making up clothing.

The conduct of the Prisoners generally has been good, the male Prisoners doing all the labour required of them orderly, industriously and apparently willingly, as if working for hire; no sickness.—Some of the Prisoners have required the attention of the Doctor, who has been constant in visits. The Chaplain, the Rev. William Harrison, has also visited and performed Service every Sunday. A supply of Bibles and Testaments have been furnished during the month, and a number of Tracts bought from the Rev. Mr. Coster, at Carleton, which will be sent out.

The Committee finding the Contract price for supplying the Beef high, (27s. per cwt.) as compared with the market rates, applied to the Contractor to reduce the price, which he refused. We then stopped the receipt from him at the Prison, and have since furnished from the market at a much less rate, about 1½ per pound, or 14s. per cwt. We did not think the Baker's rate for Bread so objectionable, and have allowed it to continue, but expect to have a reduction next month, in consequence of the price of Flour having declined. Your Committee would suggest the propriety of advertising for Tenders for all supplies requisite for Prison subsistence, under the scale of diet for a given period, say three or six months.

The Committee are of opinion, that a Keeper's or Porter's Lodge is required at the outer Gate, and that it would be desirable to have one erected, if the Board should approve; the expenses is estimated at about £15, exclusive of Prisoners' labour and part of the materials for Frame, which are on hand.

The Committee would further report, that from the low price of horses at present, and the large amount necessarily paid for horse hire by the Establishment, it would be

be advisable to buy the horses now hired of Smith, if the pair could be purchased from him for a sum not exceeding £27 10s. They would further suggest the propriety of having a Brick Tank built in the Prison for the collecting Rainwater for the use of the Prisoners, as the Wells dug on the premises do not furnish good water, and at present the water for use is brought from a Well near the shore. They estimate the expense, exclusive of Brick, at about £10.

We refer to the Keeper's Report for the month for further particulars, and have much pleasure in reporting our approval of the attention to their duty of the different Officers of the Institution.

The Prisoners have been employed during the month nearly in the same manner as in the month of October, say, in progressing with the Cells, Farm Work, &c. ; conduct generally good throughout the month ; no fault found by the Keeper.

Your Committee think the Cells will be completed by the end of the month, and they are happy to report at no greater cost than was anticipated—the expense of two Masons and the Cement.

There are some articles of Clothing and Bedding required, which your Committee have not felt themselves justified in purchasing, in consequence of the state of the funds—the Chairman being in advance ; but they hope provision will be made by the Executive that the establishment may be put in order without subjecting the Chairman or any of the Commissioners to the inconvenience of making advances of money in such times of scarcity as the present.

Wood is an article of some expense, as the consumption for the purpose of Cooking and warming the Prison is about six cords per week at present, and for the month we have agreed to pay 8s. per Cord ; but persons are willing to furnish Spruce Wood during the Winter when the hauling is good, at 6s. 3d. per Cord, and your Committee recommend that agreements should be made with them for such quantity as may be

required for the burning of Bricks next season, as that is one of the employments to which they think the labour of the Prisoners may be advantageously devoted at that time.

The conduct of the Keepers have given satisfaction, and your Committee think affairs are in such a train as may be conducted with but little trouble. The Keeper appears to have managed well with the Prisoners, uniting a proper degree of firmness with a regard to their comfort—such as are allowed, that makes his rule borne willingly. They have provided a Book for the Keeper's Journal, in which he enters daily all transactions and occurrences as they arise; this, they think, will be satisfactory as a reference.

They annex the Keeper's Return and Report, to which they refer the Board for further particulars with regard to the wants. A Cooking Apparatus is particularly required, and the Visitors would recommend procuring one—an attention to the prospective wants of the Prison.

The Visiting Commissioners of the Provincial Penitentiary for the month of December, Report—That they have attended to the duty, and visited the Prison frequently; that the Officers and those connected with the establishment have conducted themselves well, and used their exertions to carry on the duties devolving on them.

The conduct of the Prisoners for the same period has been generally good, no complaints having been made to us.

The second tier of Cells are nearly completed, on which, and in the sinking of a Well in front of the Prison, the Male Prisoners have been principally employed during the month.

A large quantity of Spruce and Fir Wood has been brought in for the purpose of burning Brick next Summer,—Manure carried from Town for the purpose of Agriculture the ensuing season,—and other expenses prospectively incurred, which will necessarily increase the expenditure of the month; but your Committee anticipate that part of such outlay will be again returned with a profit.

Annexed is a Report of I. Quinton, Keeper, to which we refer the Board for further particulars. It appears by the said Return that there was in Prison on the 1st December, 1842—

There are also several Accounts unpaid for Wood, Wages and sundries, which could not be liquidated; as also the Chaplain, Surgeon, &c. for want of funds.

Your Committee would recommend that some one gentleman should be appointed as Superintendent, in whom the Board should have confidence, to manage the out door business of the Establishment, responsible to the Board, and relieve the Visiting Commissioners of that duty; as it is impossible the Visiting Commissioners, changing as they must necessarily do monthly, can so well manage as one person continuously in office, who will thus have the run of the business, whose duty it would be to attend to it, and for which he should be remunerated; as should the Commissioners' own private affairs require their attention, they could not give the time to the Institution that its good management would require, and which they are now enabled to afford in consequence of the leisure which business at present permits.

Report from Commissioners appointed by His Excellency to investigate the Accounts connected with the Provincial Penitentiary.

We, the Commissioners appointed by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in Council to investigate and report upon all Accounts connected with the Provincial Penitentiary, beg leave to submit the following Report:—

That

That after long delay, occasioned by waiting for additional vouchers, which, though repeatedly promised, have not been hitherto forthcoming, and after careful and patient investigation of the papers which have been submitted to us, we beg leave to report as follows :—

The paper marked A, is an Account Current made up by the Justices of Sessions in Saint John, wherein is debited the gross sum of various Bills, which are numbered from 1 to 132 inclusive, (and which are particularly specified in paper marked B,) amounting to eleven thousand four hundred and twenty pounds two shillings and one penny. To this is added, the charges made by County Treasurer, for Commissioners, &c. as specified in paper marked C, amounting to £682 4 3: also Interest paid on County Debentures, as specified in paper marked D, amounting to £737 18 6, together with a sum claimed by Commissioners of House of Correction, as specified in paper marked E, amounting to £1,091 1 11. The principal credit given, is for sundry Legislative Grants, amount £8,068 5 4; and a balance is struck, shewing a sum due the Justices of £5,438 13 11.

The total amount of Accounts from 1 to 132, in paper marked B, after deducting £152 from John Fisher's claim, is £11,268 or thereabout, which with other particulars now to be named, will more fully appear on reference to an abstract of those Accounts in connexion with that of the County Treasurer, (see paper marked G,) which we have prepared in order that the several matters relating to these Accounts may be more clearly understood. The amount charged against these Bills by the County Treasurer is £10,676 18 9. The whole amount of Vouchers that have come into our hands is £5,277 9 4, leaving the difference between the two last named amounts to be made out from charges in the Account of the County Treasurer, which has been handed in as a substitute for Vouchers of a more business like description; the reason assigned for which is, that since the last great fire in Saint John, many papers have been missing, and it is thought that on that occasion some of the Vouchers were lost.

Nearly five thousand pounds of the amount not authenticated by Vouchers, is connected with one Account—that of John Fisher the Contractor. With regard to the items of Debit in Account Current, we commence with Bills in Schedule B, and have to request attention to the following, viz :—

Nos. 19 and 21.—The receipts for payment in these instances are not given by the party to whom the money was due, *but by another person.*

Nos. 2-26 and 88.—The first is an Account of M'Avity & Company, in which credit is given for £50, which is not charged in the County Treasurer's Account; the other is an Account of Kerr & Company, for £26, which is receipted in full, and which is not charged by the County Treasurer.

No. 28.—This is an Account of Mr. Hillyer, amounting to four hundred and thirty four pounds, fifteen shillings and eight pence—a large proportion of which, (*viz.* £225) was allowed to him for superintending the Brickyard about seven months; we think this exorbitant.

No. 31.—L. H. DeVeber's Account. This amount as stated in Schedule B, amounts to £72 4 1. His Account, as handed into us, is only £22 15 8. It is probable there may be an additional Account, but we have not seen it.

Nos. 32, 54 and 59.—These are for Medical attendance, Cartage, and carrying Prisoners to House of Correction, all which we think should have been charges against the County, not against the Province.

Nos. 61 and 128.—These relate to sums amounting in all to £200 allowed to Robert Payne for superintending, which allowance we consider objectionable.

Nos. 63 to 68, also 2-19, 92, 103, 107 and 113.—These are referred to in order to shew the careless manner in which the Accounts have been prepared, and also the unsatisfactory nature of the Vouchers. With regard to commissions, &c. charged by County Treasurer, (paper C,) we consider those of 5 per cent. for paying out money, 5 per cent. for negotiating a Treasury Warrant, and 2½ per cent. for negotiating County Debentures, to be very objectionable.

The interest on County Debentures, (paper D,) amount £737 18 6, we think should be paid by the County, not the Province.

With regard to paper E, the heading of which goes to state that the Commissioners
“ expect

“expect to be reimbursed” in the sum named in that Account, viz. £1091 1 11, we certainly do not understand it, if it be intended to convey the meaning that they (the Commissioners) have expended that sum and have not been reimbursed. In the County Treasurer’s Account, those sums to which a number in *black ink*, is prefixed in the margin of said Account, are pointed out as charges against the Commissioners, and the total of these items amount to a much larger sum than £1091. If, on the other hand, the meaning of the Commissioners was, that they had incurred the expenses, amounting to £1091 1 11, which had been met by the County Treasurer, and that *he* expected to be re-imbursed in this amount—then the heading of paper E is inaccurately worded, nor can we on this supposition understand, how the items against Commissioners in the Account of County Treasurer, should amount to about fourteen hundred, instead of one thousand and ninety one pounds. The sum credited in Account Current, as the gross amount of Legislative Grants, (viz. £8068 5 4) is correct, but no credit is given for the sum of £150 received from Corporation of Saint John, as interest for 2½ years at three per cent. on the first Legislative Grant of £2000. The Treasurer credits this sum in his Account in three distinct items, (viz. in December 1837, £60; in December 1838, £60, and in the Summer of 1839, £30;) but though the County Treasurer gives credit for this, as well as for the different Legislative Grants, yet the Justices in making up their Account, give credit for one and not the other. At the same time, they debit the Institution with interest paid to County Treasurer, and also with upwards of seven hundred pounds paid as interest on County Debentures.

We beg to state in the way of general remark, that many of the Vouchers furnished to us, are very imperfect; that the County Treasurer’s Account which has been handed in to stand in the stead of those Vouchers that are lacking, is much wanting in method and clearness, and is therefore a very unsatisfactory substitute; that in all the doings connected with the Institution, there appears to have been a great want of economy, and that although the Accounts were audited in Saint John by the Sessions, in the month of July last and “approved of,” yet, as no notice was taken of the absence of credit of £150 above referred to, (as well as for other reasons) we feel satisfied that the examination of the Accounts must have been very superficial, and we beg to state in conclusion, that we do not think the Province should be debited with any part of the Account, except the cost of erecting the buildings.

Report of Committee of Sessions, Saint John, upon the Report of the Commissioners appointed by the Government to Report upon the Accounts of the Expenditure incurred in the Erection, &c. of the House of Correction.

The Committee appointed to Report upon the remarks of the Commissioners on the House of Correction Accounts, beg to state,—

That the present Report of the Commissioners contains the first demand for additional Vouchers that has been laid before the Sessions, and that if Vouchers had been called for and been furnished, they have been so done without the knowledge or authority of the Sessions; and it is to be regretted that a regular demand had not sooner been made, as great difficulty must arise in procuring at this distance of time Vouchers from persons, many of whom have long since left the country; your Committee have however been successful with respect to the most of those specific demands for Vouchers, and as to the first objections, as the Commissioners have not stated what is the exact amount deficient in those connected with Mr. Fisher’s account, your Committee herewith submit a certificate from Mr. Fisher, of the amount of the Contract, to whom the payments were made, and a receipt from Messrs. Crookshank and

and Walker, as agents of Messrs. S. C. Inard and Co., for the balance due on the Contract; your Committee also submit Vouchers to No. 31, and have to state with respect to No. 19, that they think D. Smith lives at the Oromocto, and that Mr. Payne may probably be able to get his signature to the account; with respect to No. 21, they have to state that Richard Riordan went to the United States about six months since.

The next objection is to 2-26 and 88, as not credited in County Treasurer's Account. This account appears to have been sent as a substitute for Vouchers, which were, as stated by Mr. Payne, in the County Treasurer's hands, and has nothing to do, as an Account, with those sent by the Sessions. It is to be regretted that there was a necessity for sending the County Treasurer's Account, as it appears to have bewildered the Commissioners, they at one time speaking of it as a Voucher, and at another as an Account furnished by the Sessions. The facts with respect to 2-26 and 88 are, that one of the parties received an order for fifty pounds on account, and the other an order for the amount of their account, neither of which had been paid by the County Treasurer at the time of making up his Accounts.

The next objection is to Mr. Hillyer's salary in No. 28. Mr. H. is an Englishman largely engaged in brick making in Bangor, and was the only person who could be got fit for laying out a large establishment property. He would not have received his engagement for another season; but allowing his salary to be high, from it is to be deducted a large part of the claim from the Contractors, (£152) credited in account, which claim was for actual damage, and Mr. H's services formed a large part of that claim.

The next objection is to No. 32, 54 and 59. The principal part of these accounts is for cartage of lumber and other materials used in forming the establishment. No. 59 was included because the prisoners were employed at the time in forming the establishment, it being previous to the occupation of the stone building.

The next objection is to No. 61 and 128. Mr. Payne was actually employed as a Superintendent in the formation and arrangement of the establishment, and devoted the whole of his time, during a long period, to that service; the charge was approved of by the Sessions, but if the Commissioners are of opinion that services of this nature are to be performed gratuitously, then their objection is proper.

The next objection is to paper C, which was the only Account of the County Treasurer furnished by the Session, and by whom the amounts therein contained were considered correct; but as the Treasurer is at Fredericton, he had better be referred to, for the necessary explanations.

To the next objection, paper D, your Committee have to remark, that by 4th Victoria, cap. 44, sec. 4, it is provided that the County Treasurers shall be paid with the interest that has accrued or may accrue thereon; the charge is therefore not only correct, but the Commissioners ought to report the claim on interest from the time the account was made up.

The next objection is to Account E, and here we cannot but state our surprise that the Commissioners have again brought forward the County Treasurer's Account, and have tried to connect paper E with it, but not succeeding, have attempted to shew that because it will not, it must be wrong; to make it agree with the County Treasurer's Account, or with certain items in it, would be impossible, as the greater part of the charges are for the labour of the prisoners in the House of Correction, in the preparation of a second tier of cells; another part, 30 iron doors for the cells, not then paid for by the Commissioners of the House of Correction; and the remainder a quantity of Granite and some tools furnished by them after taking charge, for the cost of all which the Commissioners are accountable to the Sessions. They look to this Account also as an offset to the expense incurred by them in conducting the establishment while they had charge. It was added to the Account, as there could be no doubt the Province would take the articles, and the Commissioners not being in existence after the 1st April 1842, the Sessions were considered as the proper party to make the claim.

With respect to the £150 for interest received from the Corporation, we have only to say that it was not forgotten, but was left out because it was not deemed to be an item which ought to go to the credit of the Province.

As to the remarks upon Nos. 63 to 68 inclusive, they are not specific, and appear to be put in the Report only to give the Commissioners an opportunity of making an unsupported assertion of the careless manner in which the Accounts have been prepared, and to impress upon others the idea that they have given the Accounts a careful and patient investigation.

In conclusion, your Committee have to state their surprise that the Commissioners should have considered that the Province is to be debited only for the cost of the building, and they cannot have looked at the Act 4th Vic. referred to with respect to County Debentures, for by it, the buildings, but also the land and all other costs and charges are to be paid for, as is evident by the 1st Section of the said Act, which expressly provides that the Accounts shall contain "the whole cost of the building, and a complete statement of all costs and charges incidental to the erection and establishment of the said House of Correction."

MARINE HOSPITAL.

REPORT FROM COMMISSIONERS OF MARINE HOSPITAL, SAINT JOHN.

To His Excellency Sir WILLIAM COLEBROOKE, K. H., Lieutenant Governor of the Province of New Brunswick.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

The subscribers, Commissioners of the Marine Hospital in this City, beg leave to hand copies of a Report of the Medical Officer of the Institution, shewing the number of Patients received into, and discharged from the Hospital, during 1842.

The whole of the Buildings are in good repair, and Insurance to the extent of £800 is held upon them, in event of accidents from fire. By a statement received from the Province Treasurer, there is a balance of £882 6 9 now remaining in his hands, while there are no unsatisfied claims existing against the establishment.

Copy of the General Account which accompanies this Report, as well as Vouchers to support the various charges, will be forwarded to the Legislature, sworn to, in the usual manner.

As so large a surplus is now on hand, (and this, notwithstanding a reduction lately made of 25 per cent. on the tax,) and as the whole of the required lands are now purchased and paid for, while the Buildings, Fences, &c. are in good repair, and a new supply of Bed furniture just laid in, your Commissioners would respectfully suggest that 33½ per cent. of the existing tax should be taken off, thus reducing the whole charge to 1d. per ton on shipping.

The income at 1½d. per ton, even this year, has yielded £679 9 9, and such an amount (which will now be sufficient to pay the yearly expenditure) may fairly be considered the probable income at 1d. per ton from this period on, while the £882 balance on hand, forms an ample rent to fall back upon.

Depressed as the shipping of the Province has been for the last three years, the subscribers respectfully state, that any possible reduction in the charges upon that species of property, would be gratefully received by this mercantile community.

LIGHT HOUSES.

REPORT FROM COMMISSIONERS OF BAY OF FUNDY LIGHT HOUSES.

To His Excellency Sir W. M. G. COLEBROOKE, K. H., Lieutenant Governor of the Province of New Brunswick, &c. &c. &c.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

The Subscribers, Commissioners of the Bay of Fundy Light Houses, beg leave to furnish an Account, shewing the expenditure on those Establishments during the year ending on the 31st December, 1842.

The various Stations are in a complete state of repair, nor do your Commissioners apprehend that any unusual expenditure will be required during 1843. The Balance of Bay of Fundy Light House Funds, in the hands of the Province Treasurer last year, was stated to be £543 17 3;—this year, notwithstanding the severe depression in trade, and decrease in shipping, it is £540 1 7;—shewing, we may presume to state, that a diminished income has been met by a careful expenditure.

As no other Light Houses on the New Brunswick shores of the Bay of Fundy are required, your Commissioners would respectfully suggest that a reduction of 25 per cent., or 1d. per ton, of this Tax on Shipping, take place. The Salaries awarded to the Keepers were on a most liberal scale, when the Lights were erected, in order that parties might be induced to devote themselves to that mode of life. Privations at first endured, have now given place to permanent comforts; and it would seem but proper, under such circumstances, that the Navigation of the Country should be relieved from all unnecessary pressure.

Your Commissioners have led the Light House Keepers to expect that some reduction in Salaries would be recommended, especially as the expenses of living are at present greatly reduced, as contrasted with those extant when the Lights were established, so that more numerous comforts can be secured on a reduced income.

Should Your Excellency and the Legislature see fit to reduce the Tax on Shipping above spoken of, the subscribers feel convinced the income, at 3d. per ton, will, from this period on, (unless some unforeseen accidents shall arise) be equal to support the Lights, while any reduction in charges would now be particularly pleasing to the Shipping interests of the Province. In Nova Scotia the Light Houses were erected, and are supported, entirely from the Province Treasury, without any limit as to the proceeds of the Light House Tax, (which would, there, be altogether unequal to meet such a charge) and not, as in this Province, restricted to that Fund alone, and which is all paid by the ship owner, not only to support, but also to erect the various establishments. The sum paid by Nova Scotia for Light Houses in 1840, was £4520 5s. 11d., and in 1841, £4580 11 9, "exclusive of the cost of building new Light Houses,"—a sum very widely differing from the expenditure in New Brunswick, even when we include the amounts paid yearly by this Province, towards their Lights.

Your Commissioners, in May last, received a letter from Captain Bayfield, the Surveying Officer in the Gulph of Saint Lawrence, requesting us to furnish him with a list and description of the New Brunswick Lights, to be by him forwarded, by desire, to the Hydrographical Office, in London, and which was of course immediately complied with. We hope attention will be paid by Her Majesty's Government to the concluding part of our answer (copy herewith) to Captain Bayfield's letter, as we do not feel justified, in times like the present, to run into any expenses in attempts to effect even so desirable an object as efficient Fog Bells at the various stations, especially as so many failures in similar attempts have been experienced in the United States and elsewhere.

Many very ingenious schemes have been suggested, and patterns made, but we do not think it prudent to run into expenses on any uncertainty, however gratified we may have been by the confidence reposed in us on this head by the Legislature.

An Address from the House of Assembly to Your Excellency of 28th March last, prayed you to "re-organize the present Board of Commissioners, and appoint such a number of properly qualified Gentlemen for the service, to form one Board, to be holden at Saint John, for the management of all matters connected with the Light Houses belonging to this Province in the Bay of Fundy,"—and the subscribers duly invited the attention of the Commissioners residing in Charlotte County to this object, and requested their presence at this City, as heretofore stated in detail to Your Excellency. Should it still be the wish of the Legislature to have this plan carried out, we would respectfully suggest, that the issuing of the appropriations for Keepers' Salaries, and for all contingencies, to one Board, in place of the system heretofore pursued,—with also an order that the Oil, &c. should be paid at and forwarded from Saint John, (unless it could be procured on better terms elsewhere) would necessarily at once lead to the keeping only one set of Accounts.

Vessels departing from this Province are frequently under the necessity of taking shelter in the Harbors of Nova Scotia, during gales of wind, and have then been called upon to pay Light charges, though they had no intention of either loading or discharging cargo. Your Commissioners, on application from parties of this Province so charged, wrote to the Nova Scotia Commissioners, stating that the yearly aid supplied from the Light funds of New Brunswick, towards supporting the Nova Scotia stations, was in part made to secure our Vessels so taking shelter from any such charge, and that its continuance would by us be represented. A letter has been received, stating that the practice would be discontinued.

The gales of last winter caused some damage at Gannet Rock, and again forced our attention to the necessity of some erection of stone being placed around that Light House, as fully communicated to Your Excellency,—and three of the subscribers, Messieurs Crookshank, Ward, Junior, and Donaldson, repaired to the spot and examined with care the whole premises. The Plan and Estimate for such erection were forwarded for your approval, and the subscribers made the necessary temporary repairs, in accordance with your orders.

There are supplies of Glass, Wick, Sheet Copper, &c. on hand, and ninety gallons of Oil, together with spare burners, &c. and which will be fitted with necessary hoods for concentrating the flame, as is done in the newly invented Solar Lamps.

Report from Commissioners of Light Houses at Saint Andrews.

To His Excellency Lieutenant Colonel Sir WILLIAM MACBEAN GEORGE COLEBROOKE,
K. H., Lieutenant Governor, &c. &c. &c.

The undersigned Light House Commissioners resident in this County beg leave to Report—That the most important and distant Establishment under their care at Machias Seal Island, has had their particular attention, in replacing and repairing the losses and injuries sustained by the severity of the gale in February last, such was the violence of the waves that the surf beat over every part of the Island at high water, putting the Keeper's residence in danger, and washing out a part of the underpinning of the Light Houses. The inclined plain or ways at the landing place was nearly all destroyed at the same time, which has been replaced in a more permanent form.

The prominent position of this Establishment in the Bay of Fundy, in the vicinity of which shipwrecks frequently occur, induces the Commissioners to keep supplies of Provisions on the Island, to be used in case of need, but no fresh water being found thereon, they have been under the necessity of putting up a Tank for the reception of rain water, that will contain eight hundred gallons, as a reserve for the use of the unfortunate.

An alarm or Fog Bell would be of great importance to shipping at this Establishment, situated as the Great Machias Seal Island is, nearly in the centre of the Channel, between Grand Manan and the American shore, the difficulties to those navigating the Bay of Fundy in thick weather is in great measure overcome when that point is ascertained, the shores upward being bold and clear, which may be approached with freedom, and where strangers are sure to find Pilots to conduct them to either of the Ports of Saint Andrews or Saint John.

Head Harbour.—The Glass in the Lantern having been injured by the gale last winter, has been replaced by a stouter description, that will better resist the violence of the weather. The severe East storm in December entirely washed away a small Wharf and Store House, and did other injury, these will be replaced in the spring in a more secure and substantial manner. The Landing place has also undergone a partial repair, but until a solid Wharf is erected, and securely ballasted, the Commissioners despair of seeing anything remain permanent.

Indian Point Light House, at the entrance of this Harbour, has undergone considerable repairs during the past Season about the Burners and Lantern, the Commissioners have replaced those worn out by others of a more durable and efficient form, stronger Glass has also replaced what was injured, and the Buildings and Wharf on which they stand has had their defects made good.

As previously reported to Your Excellency, the repeated acts of misconduct of the Keeper, James Smith, led to his removal, his confirmed habits of intoxication left us no other course to pursue, and we are assured that Your Excellency will unite with us in opinion, that the principal qualification of a Keeper ought to be sobriety, for without it there can be no dependance or security, especially in the night when he is concealed from the public eye.

In conclusion, they would further remark, that the present Keepers are diligent and attentive to their duties, using all the means in their power to show good lights with the burners and apparatus at present used, which they believe, from the information they possess, are open to much improvement. But in the present state of Commercial depression, they abstain from change as much as possible that would increase the outlay, having in view only the repairs of casualties and the ordinary expenditure.

To His Excellency Sir WILLIAM M. G. COLEBROOKE, K. H., Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

We, the undersigned Commissioners of Escuminac Light House, respectfully beg leave to submit to Your Excellency an account of the expenditure for the past year, including a supply of Oil for next Spring, with proper Vouchers.

The Glass imported was to supply deficiencies in the Lanthorn, and now that it is completed, we are of opinion that the annual expenditure will henceforth be considerably reduced.

An Iron Tank to contain the Oil has not yet been procured, but as such an article is absolutely necessary, we have ordered it from Britain.

We have much satisfaction in reporting, that during the past year few or no complaints have been made against the Keeper; Captain Owen, in passing last Fall, examined the whole establishment, and expressed himself highly pleased with its arrangement and management; he likewise imparted much useful information to the Keeper.

We have only further to express our hope, that the number of Vessels arriving at this Port may yield revenue sufficient from the tax imposed by Law, to keep in repair and support the establishment without the aid of the Province.

Letter from the Commissioners of Light Houses to A. Beade, Esquire, on subject of a Wall around Light House on Gannet Rock.

Saint John, 18th May, 1842.

SIR,—The subscribers, Commissioners of Light Houses, beg leave to transmit for the information of His Excellency, a Plan, Estimate and Tender, for erecting a Granite Wall around the Gannet Rock Light House. If you will have the goodness to draw the attention of the Lieutenant Governor to the Reports (see the Journals) made by the Surveyor of Light Houses, dated 1st January, 1840, and 1st January, 1841, he will there find under the heads of "Gannet Rock," and "General Observations,"

the condition of that establishment,—and the storm of last Winter has more than ever impressed on the minds of the subscribers the necessity of having some permanent work erected.

It is true, that a Committee of the Assembly on Light Houses, at page 150 of the Journals, 26th February, 1841, stated—“the several suggestions made in the Superintendent’s Report, and the communications on the subject of Fog Bells, we think should be left to the direction of the Commissioners, as the subject must be more familiar to them than to the Committee, and in whose care and prudence we have perfect confidence;” but the subscribers would not consider they had performed their duty, if they undertook an expensive work of this sort without the advice and sanction of the Executive.

The balance of Light House funds in the Treasury for the year ending 31st December, 1841, was only £543 17 3, and from that amount there has since been paid £252 5 2 as the New Brunswick proportion of the Nova Scotia Lights for same period, so that the actual balance at 1st January, 1842, was only £291 12 1, which owing to the great reduction in our Provincial Tonnage, may be further reduced, leaving the receipts for this year below the expenditures.

If any steps are to be taken in this matter, it would be the duty of the subscribers, under the Act, to advertise for Tenders, but it was considered proper, in drawing the attention of His Excellency to the subject, to procure and forward the documents herewith, as no time is to be lost if the work is determined upon for 1842. In all probability £850 would be adequate to the service.

Report from Assembly of Prince Edward Island relative to Postages on Newspapers, &c.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND,
House of Assembly, 6th March, 1843. }

REPORT OF POST OFFICE COMMITTEE.

Your Committee who were directed to report on the increased Rates of Postage between this Colony and the neighboring Provinces, and also to report on the Post Office Department generally, beg leave to submit,—That the attention of your Committee having been particularly drawn to the subject of the very general complaints of the increased rates of Postage between this Colony and the neighboring Provinces, they have endeavored to make themselves acquainted with the instructions to the Officers in the Post Office Department under which these increased rates have been exacted; but your Committee regret to state, that they have met with difficulty in obtaining such information, owing to the refusal of the present Postmaster to communicate as fully on the subject as was desirable, in consequence of its being his instructions (as stated to your Committee) not to communicate any information without having first obtained permission so to do from the Deputy Postmaster General in Halifax, thus clearly shewing to your Committee a degree of secrecy in the management of that Department, which your Committee believe to be totally unauthorized by the wishes or practice of the Postmaster General or Her Majesty's Imperial Government, and calls loudly for a representation from the Legislature of this Colony, by whom the Post Office Department has been maintained at a very considerable expense, as will hereafter be shewn.

The amount paid for the transmission of the Mails to and from this Colony for the last five years amounts to £4622 15s., while the receipts arising from Postage paid into the Public Treasury, is only £2301 12 5; thus shewing a balance due to this Colony of £1321 3 7;—which surplus, your Committee consider ought to be defrayed out of the General Post Office Revenue, but which now remains a charge against the Post Office Establishment—a department over which the Local Government have not been hitherto permitted to exercise any control.

Previous to 1842 the Postage charged on single Letters between Halifax and Charlotte Town was eight pence at all seasons of the year, and was received in the currency of the Island; but under the present regulations, the Postage on such Letters is increased to eleven pence half-penny by the Winter, and by the Summer route to nine pence, and which two last sums are exacted in Halifax currency, which at the present rate or difference of exchange, shews an increase of from 25 to 70 per cent.; and the Postage to all the neighboring Provinces is increased in a rateable proportion.

By way of illustrating the grievance the Colony labors under, owing to these additional rates of Postage, we would observe, that according to the present regulations, the charge on a single letter from this Island to Kingston, Upper Canada, is 2s. 5d., and if weighing one ounce, is charged at *four rates of Postage*, while the Postage on a letter from this Island to any part of the United Kingdom is only 1s. 4d. *Halifax currency*, and if not exceeding one ounce, is only charged at two rates of Postage.

The rates of Postage to Great Britain, and indeed to all parts of the world, on Packet or Ship Letters passing through the United Kingdom, are chargeable by weight, while those posted between any of the Towns in British North America or the United States, are chargeable according to the number of enclosures, without reference to weight, and therefore double and sometimes treble Postage is exacted on letters below half an ounce in weight—a difference which your Committee consider bears with great hardship on the inhabitants of these Colonies, particularly at a period when the liberal and enlightened policy of the Imperial Government has reduced the Postages throughout the United Kingdom to almost a nominal rate.

Your Committee would further remark, that it appears to have been the practice heretofore to allow the transmission of the printed Votes and other Parliamentary Documents of the Provincial Legislatures to be forwarded or interchanged free of Postage; but by the present regulations the charges made on such Documents amount to a prohibition, as the sum charged on the Journals of the Legislature of this Colony, forwarded

forwarded to the Government of Nova Scotia last year, has been rated at upwards of £14; and they now remain in consequence in the Post Office there, unclaimed: and the Postmaster of this Island is instructed not to forward the Public Documents of this Island of any nature or description, even by the Inland Mails, (the expense of which is exclusively borne by this Colony) without charging the full rates of Postage thereon; which regulations your Committee cannot for a moment suppose to be in accordance with the wishes of the Imperial Government, and only requires a proper representation to induce Her Majesty's Government to interfere and remove the grievance complained of.

And also the Postmaster has received late instructions from the Deputy Postmaster General in Halifax to exact Postage on all Newspapers forwarded from this Island to the neighbouring Provinces, which your Committee look upon as a tax imposed, not for the purposes of Revenue, or to defray the charges of transmission, (which could alone justify such a demand) but for the private emolument of a subordinate individual in that Department, and which your Committee consider to be an application totally unauthorized by law.

Your Committee observe by the Imperial Act of 3d and 4th Victoria, cap. 96, that the Postmaster General, under the direction of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, is authorized to charge such rates of Postage as they may from time to time direct; and is also authorized to pass by Post, between any places within Her Majesty's Colonies, Colonial Newspapers free of Postage, or subject to such rates, regulations and restrictions as the Postmaster General, with such consent as aforesaid, may think fit; but your Committee have no means of ascertaining whether the regulations now in force have been so authorized.

Your Committee, under all the foregoing circumstances, deem it of importance for the Legislature of the Colony to address Her Majesty's Government on the subject, and that a copy of this Report be forwarded to the Legislatures of the adjoining Provinces, with a view of drawing their attention to the existence of the grievances arising from the present increased rates of Postage, and also to what your Committee consider the improper use and irresponsible power delegated to the Deputy Postmaster General of Halifax, and which is in its character highly vexatious and oppressive, and of inducing those Legislatures to make a combined effort to remove them.

Official Letters have been written to all the parties named in Accounts Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 4, requiring them to account for the sums appearing to be in their hands, or pay over the several amounts due, and that otherwise legal proceedings would be instituted against them. In some cases the parties have promised to account, but have not as yet done so; but the greater portion have paid no attention to the communications, and some have refused to take the Letters from the Post Office, and they have consequently been returned to the Audit Office as Dead Letters. In a number of cases, I believe, the parties have expended the monies, but if they have accounted, their Accounts are not to be found in the Appendix to the Journals of the House of Assembly, or amongst the Accounts placed in my hands by the Clerk of the House, and it therefore becomes my duty to include them in the list of defaulters.

As respects the arrearages for Accounts not attested to, and for defective vouchers, I believe the omission of the Commissioners in those respects arose from ignorance, and that in all or nearly all those cases the monies have been bona fide expended, and as the attempt to enforce their collection, or even to have a thorough investigation of each case, will be attended with much difficulty and expense to the parties, I should suggest the expediency and propriety of an Act or Resolution of the Legislature being passed to authorize the Auditing of those Accounts in their present state.

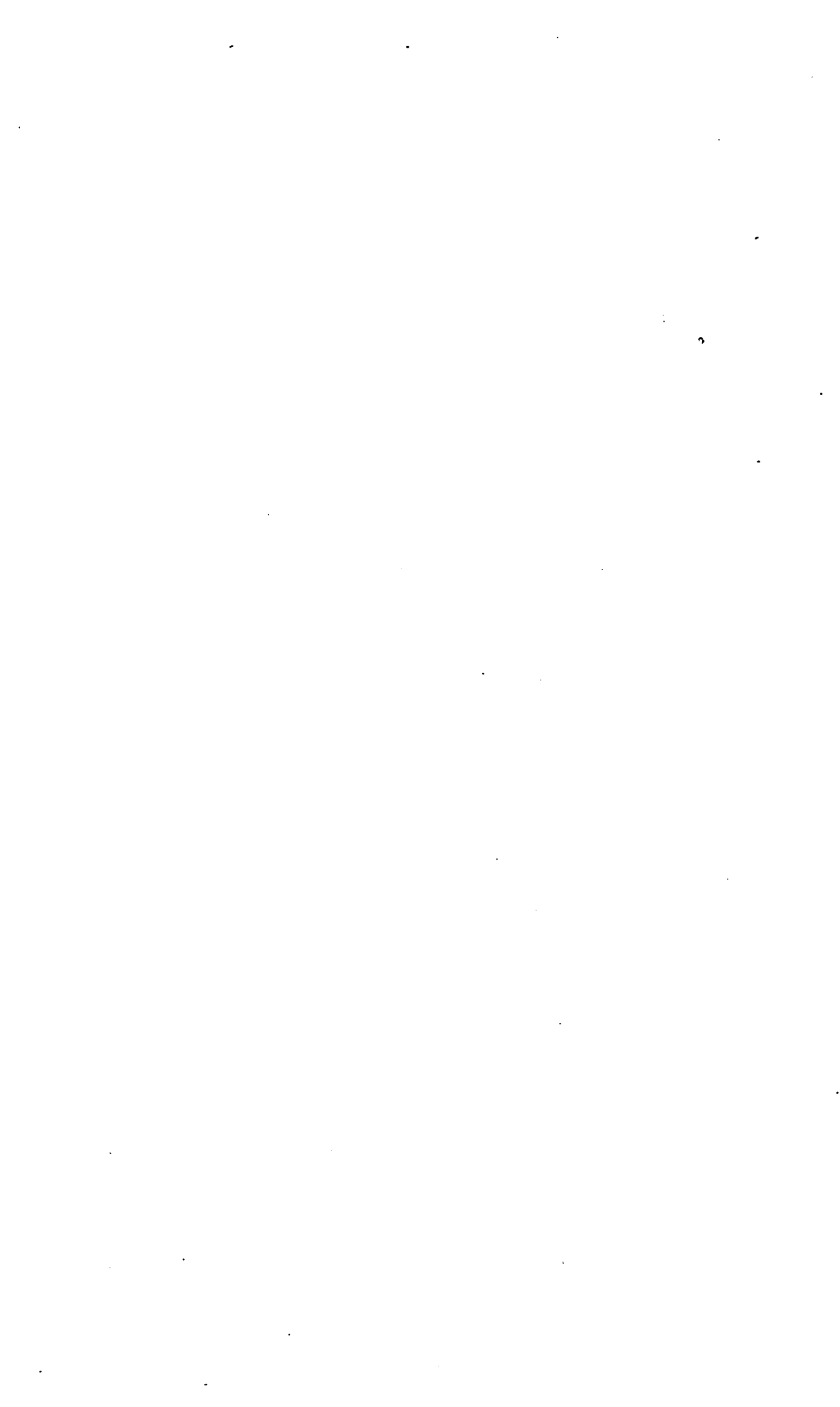

Since the year 1839, Applicants for Land were required to pay for all detached Surveys before the Executive would entertain their Petitions; in the year 1840 no latter year the stagnation of business which pervaded the Province induced many the outlays for Surveys of Land in that year was very small. In March, 1841, the House of Assembly addressed His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying "That His Excellency would be pleased to cause to be surveyed in each County one or more Blocks of Land fit for immediate settlement, not exceeding two thousand acres in each Block, and laid off in Lots of one hundred acres each, with a reserved Road through the centre, and that the Lots on one side only of such Roads be sold in the first instance, on the most favorable terms that the Law will admit of, reserving the Lots on the opposite side for future sale." In consequence of this Resolution a number of Surveys were ordered in 1841, some of which were completed and paid for in that year, and some were not completed and paid for until in 1842. In the latter year the stagnation of business which pervaded the Province induced many Tradesmen and others to apply for Land with the intention of becoming Agricultural Settlers, and to meet their views and carry into effect the spirit of the Resolution of March, 1841, the Executive ordered Surveys to be made at such places as bodies of associated Applicants pointed out, to the extent of one hundred acres to each Applicant, fifty acres of which were disposed of by Public Auction at an advance of three pence per acre on the usual upset price, to meet the expense of Surveying; the remainder of the Surveyed Tracts was retained for future disposal. Orders to Survey Crown Lands in 1842 have been principally confined to such Association Surveys, the expense of Surveying being to be reimbursed on sale of the Land.
