Ottawa, April 25—In the comments this afternoon Sir Robert Borden, amidst applause, read a letter he has received from a Toronto boy, sixteen years of age, anxious to serve his country. The lad wrote: "My dad has been to the front now he is back again, and you have taken my brother and now I am the only one left to do something for my country. I don't call myself a hero but I might help to hold the Canadian line. So please, give me a chance; the line is more valuable than my life."

Referring to the letter Sir Robert said, "I am sure that letter does indeed express the spirit of the Canadian people and as long as that spirit endures I am confident it will always endure we need have no fear for the destiny of our country weather in this war or after the war."

At Davidson, Sask., 60 men went to the home of Henry Wilners, a German, and made him kiss the Union Jack and give \$100 to the Overseas Y. M. C. A. This man ordered his son home because the lad had enlisted in the Canadian army. These 60 loyal Canucks made old Wilners apologise to his son and kiss the flag.

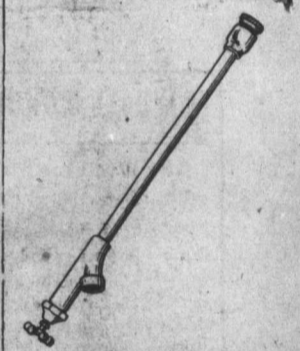

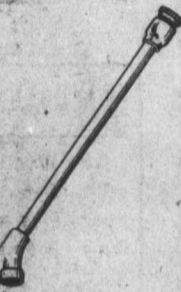
