Government's Failure

CONFERS PREFERENTIAL MATTER OF GOOD ROADS IN TRAIL

OWN HANDS

HALIFAX, August 27th, 1913.

In the Good Roads agitation which has been taking place during the past few weeks in the Herald and other papers throughout the province...

It is a pity that the Government has not taken more effective measures to improve the public highways of the province.

The Middlesex Board of Trade has issued a circular containing the following:

'The economic progress of Nova Scotia is abundantly retarded by the condition of our roads...

'At the present moment the chief need seems to be such a focusing of public opinion as will compel the Government to take definite action for the improvement and maintenance of our highways.'

'In so much as it is in the opinion of this board that the present highway act is inadequate, wasteful and deficient:

'Therefore it is resolved: That a movement be inaugurated to approach the local government with a view to the obtaining of our present inadequate methods of road construction and maintenance...

'That it is necessary to focus public opinion in such a way as to compel the Government to take definite action for the improvement and maintenance of our highways.'

'That the present highway act is inadequate, wasteful and deficient.'

'That the Government's present methods are antiquated, and'

'That it should pass an act in line with the policies of other and more progressive countries.'

'The Mayor of the different towns of the province were asked to express their views concerning a proposition to fix a definite tax on automobiles for road purposes...

'The opinions were unanimous that there is an urgent need of a more progressive and modern road policy in Nova Scotia, and more expressed the opinion, even the Morning Chronicle included, that our road system should be removed from political influence.'

'Now the only political influence which the administration of our road system has been submitted in the last 15 years has been the present local government handed down from Blenkinsop to Murray, and to this and this alone is due the present deplorable state of the road system throughout Nova Scotia. There can therefore be no doubt that the Morning Chronicle is a lucid moment when it gave expression to this sentiment which is in accord with the views of so many people in the province of Nova Scotia.'

'With the record of the Murray Government in handling the road matters of this province both from a revenue point of view and from a public utility point of view, it is not surprising that the people of Nova Scotia are largely ignorant of the resources in regard to the highway Government at the cost money which they have been expending for the improvement of their roads.'

ANNUAL CONVENTION OF WORKERS HELD AT PORT WILLIAMS ON MONDAY

Mr. R. M. A. Brewster, acting pastor, presided at the first session with a most interesting address. The program was held at the Port Williams Baptist Church.

Taking as his subject, 'Relation of the Sunday school to the community,' he emphasized the need of training our youth in their relation to the community. The christening ceremony was presided over by Mr. A. L. Scott, daughter of Mr. A. L. Scott of the steamship department of Messrs. W. R. Grace & Co. The first steamer built for the Panama Canal, the steamers above described, the greatest credit in the American Register Book, and their performance will be watched with interest.

The 'Santa Catalina' will be commanded by Capt. Ross of this town, who leaves shortly to take charge. She is certainly a very fine ship and the ACADIAN congratulates the genial captain.

The Passing of the Sailing Vessel

The passing of the sailing vessel from the sea is evidenced in the comparison of the tonnage of the American vessels lost during the government's fiscal year ending June 30, with the tonnage of the vessels constructed during the same period.

There were a total of 77 vessels of 45,355 tons lost. They were either burned, abandoned at sea, wrecked or converted to other purposes. Eighty six sailing vessels were constructed of 21,337 tons, a net loss of 24,018 tons.

To counterbalance the passing of the sailing vessels continues with leaps and bounds. Eighteen steamships were lost during the fiscal year, with a tonnage of 26,621, while a total of 1,196 were constructed, of 254,596 tons, a gain of 1,000 vessels of 231,975 tons.

If you can put limits on a racehorse, if you can put speed limits on an automobile, why can't you attach speed limits to a rapid young man occasionally? "Personal liberty!" What does a man mean by it? Does he mean that he has a right to drink anywhere at any time in any quantity, without asking anybody, and regard less of the effect on everybody. Is that what he means by personal liberty? If so, I can't agree with him.

### How to Get Rid of Rats.

A gentleman who has experimented and insists that he knows what he talks about, says that it is possible entirely to clear premises of rats by a simple device.
