When in London recently the Minister of Militia discussed his plans with Lord Stratheona, and that gentleman has now formally offered to contribute \$10,000 a year to a fund for the physical training and drill, including practice, of school pupils. His letter rifle was dated March 13, and the offer was promptly accepted, Parliament yesterday recognizing the gift with thanks by a resolution seconded by the leader of the Opposition. Lord Stratheona promises to immedi ately forward a cheque for \$250,000.

Lord Strathcona's beneficence is proof that he finds that in Great Britain Sir Frederick Borden's scheme of cadet training for young Canadians is looked with favor. If it tends to cultivate national sentiment-pride in their country among the pupils of the public schools-and render them, no matter in what station in life they may be placed, more readily available and useful as a defence force, should such unfortunately ever become necessary, it will accomplish great good. Here may be found a mean of providing for national defence with out many of the evils, attaching to old world militarism. And even if the train ing thus imparted should never be quired in war, the pupils will be physically and morally the butter for it.

"GRAFT" FEELERS OUT.

Mr. J. B. Lucas, M. P. P., has give notice of a motion for the purchase of all the Ontario telephone systems. The scheme is a big one and of course will require Dominion legislation to permi it to be put in practice. Besides the Bell system there are a considerable numbe of other companies more or less well established, prosperous and otherwise Perhaps Mr. Lucas' move may mean hope for some of these concerns to escape, at the Province's expense, without loss. It is very far from probable, how ever, that, should such a scheme be can ried out, the people would obtain better service, or that the public treasury would benefit. According to the Globe Mr. Lucas excuses his action by saying "such a project would mean the encour agement of rural telephone systems. At the present time the Bell Company works to retard the development of nes." This statement is very far from the truth. The Bell Company is, in many parts of the Province, giving the greatest encouragement to the extension of the rural telephone syste Of course the Bell Company cannot be expected to give the use of its property such systems for nothing; but, from various exchanges, we from time to time get reports which go to indicate that the company is cultivating the rural exchanges and furnishing them connections on the most liberal terms. Mr. Lucas will have to seek some other excuse for his course. Not only is his statement to the Bell Company's attitude toward rural telephones contrary to the facts, but the control and regulation of the telephone systems by the Dominion Railway Commission is a sufficient guarantee that no such attitude will be sumed at any time in the future. 'Telephone systems cost money, and those who make use of them must pay it. whether to a rural system, the Bell We have the experience of for no gain in economy or efficiency from political management as compared with that of a private company under proper Government regulation. It seems hardly probable that the Dominion Government, after having so recently placed the control and regulation of telephones turning over this important utility in Ontario to political party management at the cost of the public, and to the deterioration of the service.



London, March 24 .- In the House of Commons to-day, Sir Edward Grey, Foreign Secretary, made a noteworthy statement regarding the King's visits abroad in relation to the British foreign policy. Mr. MacNeill had raised the

Verdict Against Dr. S. B. Pollard and Mrs. Tinsley.

Judge Declines Application of the Defence.

Prisoner's Application For Bail is Aiso Refused.

Toronto, May 25 .- Dr. Stephen B. Pollard, of Jarvis street, and Mrs. Mary Tinsley, who keeps a boarding house in King street west, were found guilty last night in the General Session hav-ing jointly committed a criminal operation upon Elizabeth O'Brien, of Hailey bury, the jury being out only fifteen minutes. "As Dr. Pollard had, under cross-examination, denied all knowledge of a former operation in which he was alleged to have been im-plicated," proceeded his Honor, "the Crown was perfectly justified in contra-dicting him." An application for bail was re-

dicting him." An application for bail was re-fused, and subsequently the two pris-oners, who received the verdict with emotion, were taken to the Court street station for the night. Mrs. Tinsley, who is the mother of eleven children, left the court on the arm of her eldest daughter, while members of Dr. Pollard's family greeted him with the salutation, "Keep up your spirits, father." "My Dear Sir Frederick Borden,---You will recollect that when we met in London during your recent visit.1-was greatly interested in the account you gave me of your efforts to-get a system of physical training and mil-tary drill, including rifle practice, in-troduced into the public schools of the Dominion. I have long entertained the opinion that such training as that you are striving for is of the highest value in developing the moral, physical and in-tellectual qualities of the children, as well as that valuable quality known as part in the good work which is being done in this direction. I write, there-fore, to inform you that I am propared to place at your disposal or that of any competent body which you may be in a position to constitute, with the object of encouraging such training, the sum of \$10,000 per anum. I would sug-gest that the fund which this sem will form might be designated as for "the encouragement of physical and military training in public schools," and that it should be administered by a body of trustces appointed for the purpose. I should be glad to know what your own proposals as to the constitution of this body would be, but I think that the central commit-te might perhaps be composed some-what as follows: Yourself or the Minister of Militia for the time being as President: the Ministers who deal with education in the various Pro-vinces of the Dominion as Vice-Presi-dents, but subject to the condition that the Province which each one represents has declared its adhesion to the princi-ples agreed upon between the Depart-ment of Militia and the Provinces of Nova Scotia, which was sanctioned and made applicable to the other Provinces of the Dominion by the Orders in Council of Ang. 30, 1908.
