LEONARD, Jan. 23rd evening.—Charles Kean, the tragedian, died today, aged 57. Money market easy at 64 and 74 on prime paper.

By PERRYMAN, Jan. 24.—The "Baron Zetung," published here, calls attention especially to the fact that the new French Army Bill materially increases the power of Louis Napoleon, and is sure to prompt him to assume a higher stand and a bolder tone in regard to European politics.

PARIS, Jan. 24.—The semi-official La Patrie, in an editorial to-day, observes that Prussia is the only power now in harmony with the rest of Europe. Efforts of this character to tranquillize the public mind, and give assurance of prolonged peace are singularly antagonized by the fact that every power in Europe is entirely engaged in arming itself, as if for anticipated war.

NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—The steamship Moroccan Castle was seized this afternoon for violation of the Passenger Act. The penalties incurred amount to \$20,000. Gold 140.

PORTLAND, Jan. 24th.—Steamship Belgium arrived today, brought Capt. Ambrose and ship E. M. Moore, of Windy N. S. from Liverpool for Boston, and the crew of 18 men including Halifax Pilot, who were taken off the Moker in a sinking condition.

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—Gold opened at 140. Montreal, Jan. 23rd.—E. Spelman, distiller, recently tried for Excise frauds, was arrested today for threatening to shoot an Excise officer. Our business men propose as a means of abating the silver nuisance to buy up and export three or four hundred thousand dollars worth, hoping thereby to reduce the rate of discount to 3 per cent. The imports at Montreal last year amount to \$28,718,117 against \$28,793,221 in 1866.

BRAXTON, CANADA, Jan. 23rd.—A fresh outrage was perpetrated at a tavern near this place last night. A man recovering from an attack of delirium tremens was lying on the floor in front of the fire place, when some young men entered, laid skatings around his body, and burnt him to death.

QUEBEC, Jan. 22.—In the Legislative Assembly this afternoon, a notice of motion was given, that a Committee of Immigration be instructed to enquire into the primary cause of the immigration of citizens from the Province of Quebec to the United States, and the necessary means to be taken to prevent the same.

TORONTO, C. W., Jan. 22.—The Ontario Legislature have voted \$5,000 for the relief of the distressed fishermen of Nova Scotia. A public meeting was held tonight to raise funds for the same object.

LONDON, Sunday, 26th.—The excitement occasioned by the Fenians still continues, and the anti-irish are vigilant and watchful, and arrests are made every day. Thursday, a man named McGoogh, was caught in the act of posting a seditious handbill in the Mansion House. Information having reached the Government that Thomas Silton, the Sheriff of Alderney Island, was identified with Fenianism, he was promptly apprehended, and sent to prison to await trial. Considerable excitement is created by the recent resolution of the United States House of Representatives, declaring the sympathy of the nation with the Fenians. The journals of London have editorialized on this subject, and severely criticized the expression of an unfriendly feeling towards England.

The French Government has issued an official note, addressed to the heads of the several departments of France, on the new Army law, and arguing that, instead of being a war measure, it is a pledge of continued peace. A Republican paper was put in circulation in Paris on Friday, but the copies were immediately seized by the police. At the termination of the discussion on the Danish East, on the transfer of the Danish West India Islands to the United States, the President said he could not leave the subject without a tribute to the loyalty and consideration shown by the American people, and the cordiality of the British people. His Imperial Highness the Archduke of Austria, in command of the Austrian Army, has been ordered to prepare and make ready to take the field.

NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—Gold 140. LONDON, Jan. 25.—The latest despatches received from Ansonby Bay and Sealie show that the British force have advanced to the point of the British camp, and that the British captives have been received at the camp in Senafe. They were at Magdalen alive and well, and were carefully watched to prevent the possibility of escape. It was feared by many that they would be massacred as soon as King Theodore heard of the approach of the expeditionary force, but no threatening demonstrations against their lives had been made, and their treatment as prisoners remained unchanged. It is officially denied in the most positive manner that any orders or despatches authorizing the arrest of Mr. Train were sent to the British force here. The responsibility of the act is thrown entirely on the local authorities of Cork.

COPENHAGEN, Jan. 26.—The treaty of transfer of the Danish West India Islands to the United States, which was signed by the Danish Parliament, and has been sent to the Upper House for ratification, without a dissenting voice.

NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—Gold 141. LONDON, Jan. 27.—It is now asserted that the new French loan of 750,000,000 francs will be placed in the market to-morrow. The papers this morning publish a letter from the Fenian prisoner Blake, who was confined in the House of Detention at Clerkenwell at the time of the explosion. Blake denies in the most positive terms that he had any previous knowledge of conspiring and declares that if an attempt was made to afford him an opportunity of making his escape, no intimation of such purpose was conveyed to him. Letters from Paris say that the reports of profects in the departments in regard to the state of public feeling on the army bill are quite unfavorable. They generally concur in stating that the announcement of the adoption of the bill was received with manifestations of displeasure, and that the measure is decidedly unpopular in the departments. The trial of Sir Culling Erye, for the crime of bigamy, which has excited great interest here, was concluded to-day. The testimony given showed that he married Miss Florence Emily McGee, in the city of New York, in the year 1850, that he subsequently, in 1867, married Miss Elizabeth Allen, in St. George's Church, Hanover Square, London, and that the second marriage took place while the first wife was living. The Court was called upon to decide the legitimacy of the marriage in New York and declared it a legal and valid contract. The case was finally given to the jury, who brought in a verdict of guilty. To-day the prisoner was brought into Court, and the judge pronounced his sentence, which is imprisonment for 18 months at hard labor. Counsel 393 & 20's 723. Breadstuffs and provisions quiet. SHIP NEWS. The schr. Lizzie Chase from Antigua for Bear River, was totally wrecked at Chequamegon Point, near Yamacraw, on the 24th inst., and the hands perished. The schooner was built at Bear River, and cost \$8,000. She was insured in St. John for \$8,000. The hull, &c., has been sold for \$160.

The schr. Mayflower, recently ashore at Meagher's Head, and subsequently taken off and towed into Prospect Harbor, where she sank, has been raised by Mr. George Keefe, submarine diver. It is said that the Mayflower can be sent to sea at little expense, as the hull has been very slightly damaged. See paper.
