## To Double C.N.R Track In N.B.

Halifax, July 28—Contracts for the double tracking of portions of the government railway between Halifax and Moncton have been awarded, and also for a section in New Brunswick, and one in Quebec. The total is about forty miles and is on portions of the line where the traffic needs it most at present. In Nova Scotia the track will be doubled from Truro to Belmont and for longed stretches from Maccan and from Springhill Junction. A section is to be doubled from Moncton towards St. John, and in Quebec at St. Rosalie. Work will begin almost immediately. The contractors who have the work are the Cook Construction Company, Bate McMahon and Company, and M. J. O'Brien.

## Liberals Sweep Prince Edward Island

Charlottetown, P. E. I., July 24—Liberals swept the province in the general elections today, capturing 28 seats out of 30.

The only Conservative survivors of the debacle were Hon. A. E. Aramant, premier; Hon. James A. McNeill, commissioner public works, and Hon. Murdoch Kennedy and J. D. Stewart.

This was the most one-sided election since Confederation with the exception of 1911, when Liberals won only two seats. When the House dissolved the parties stood Conservatives 18, Liberals 11, and one seat vacant.

Such a sweeping victory was unexpected by both sides, although the result of the federal elections when four Liberals got a majority of home votes, afterwards changed by the solders vote, foreshadowed a Conservative defeat today. Returned soldiers did not take an active part in the contest, but it is evident that a majority voted Liberal.

Fine weather brought out a very large vote. There was a big turnout in Charlottetown, the Liberals capturing both seats by large majorities, labor going with the opposition.

Dissatisfaction with the administration of the public works department, especially the neglect of roads, with the administration of the agriculture department and with the proposal of the government to levy additional taxation, told against the Conservatives. People also looked with disfavor upon the highway bill, fearing that pay of sixty per cent asked for by the Federal government would be too heavy a burden.

In Federal politics the Island is strongly Liberal by large majorities, exclusive of the soldiers' vote overseas. Personalities have been a great feature of the contest just closed, and the issues have been of a parochial character.

## War Vets. Oppose Sir James Lougheed

Winnipeg, Man., July 25.—On the ground that it was a civilian organization, the Re-establishment department at a special general meeting of the Imperial Veterans of Canada here last evening. A resolution was passed demanding that Sir James Lougheed be removed from the head of the Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment Department, and a returned soldier, of equal capabilities, be substituted. It was resolved further that the government should be asked to make a similar change in all departments where men without military service are being employed.

The feeling of the meeting was one of general discontent with the work of the Soldiers' Re-establishment, and President Captain Wheeler described it as a swindle, lock, stock, and barrel.

In one resolution the meeting went on record as representing some 40,000 veterans in Canada.

## Austrians Ask for Longer Time

St. Germain, July 27—Dr. Karlo Renner, the Austrian chancellor and head of the Austrian peace delegation accompanied by Dr. Richard Schuller, another member of the delegation, arrived here today from Feldkirch, near the Swiss border, where they had been in consultation with Austrian governmental representatives from Vienna. Dr. Renner at once, upon his arrival, formulated a request to the peace conference for an extension of the time accorded Austria to reply to the second part of the peace terms, which were communicated to the Austrian delegation on July twentieth. The Austrians were originally given fifteen days within which to make reply.

### Sheep Activities in New Brunswick

Sheep Activities in New Brunswick. Mr. Norman Stanfield, Acting Chief of the Sheep and Goat Division Ottawa, with Mr. J. K. King, Maritime Representative of the Livestock Branch have been in Fredericton this week conferring with the Hon. J. F. Tweeddale relative to the co-operation of the two departments for the future advancement of the sheep in the province. Mr. Stanfield is very favorably impressed with the possibilities for sheep production and likewise with the progressive legislation that has been enacted for the protection and purchase of sheep by the department. While in Fredericton Mr. Stanfield visited the wool warehouse and expressed himself as being well pleased with the quantity and quality of the wool accumulated. Some very important decisions affecting both the farmer and the breeder were arrived at. The Federal department of Agriculture is offering a bonus of \$5.00 a year for two years in succession to a farmer who will use a pure bred ram. This bonus applies to farmers who have never used one before. The Hon. J. F. Tweeddale has given his assent to a provincial bonus of \$15.00. It is anticipated that this bonus will be an incentive to the farmer for the

purchase of more and better rams as it will make up the difference between the purchase price of a pure bred and a scrub. The motive is simply to demonstrate for two years the value of the pure bred sire versus the scrub, and if at the end of two years the farmer is convinced by concrete evidence, that is better lambs, then it is assumed that he will continue to use pure-bred rams, but will receive no further bonus.

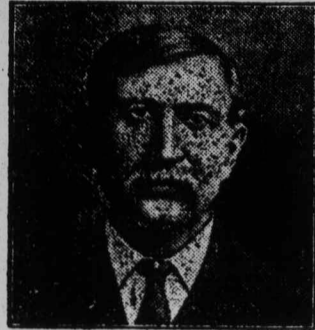
Another decision affecting the owners of grade flocks was arrived at, viz. that if a group of twenty-five farmers in any district or parish will get together and appoint a representative to purchase stock, the Department of Agriculture will pay his travelling expenses to any place east of Fort William, Ontario and will, if possible, have a representative go along and help make the selection. This idea should appeal to farmers' organizations throughout the country. The representative will have to purchase twenty-five rams in order to have his expenses paid by the government.

A scheme for the grading of pure bred rams bred by the breeders of New Brunswick was also decided upon. New Brunswick is the first country in the world to adopt this method which is probably the most advanced measure yet taken by any Department of Agriculture for the protection of the farmer who buys his hand sheep by mail. Briefly the scheme is as follows: Rams will be classed as Superior, Average and Common and will be marked 3 star, 2 star and 1 star respectively. The rams will be graded by an expert sheep man and if a farmer writes to a breeder for a 3 star ram then he will be assured that he will get a first class article. Each ram will be marked. Further, the Federal Government will bonus only 3 star and the Provincial and Dominion Department of Agriculture should bear this in mind. The Provincial Department of Agriculture will bear a bonus of \$2.00 and 2 star ram produced by the breeders of the Province. 1 star or common rams will not be bonused in any way, and it is hoped that these 1 star rams will be finally eliminated from the trade.

### Charged with Murder of Nun 11 Years Ago

Traverse City, Mich., July 23—Attorneys for Mrs. Stanislan Lypshinski, who is charged with the murder eleven years ago of Sister Mary John, of the Immaculate Conception, announced today that their Habeas Corpus petition would be carried before the State Supreme Court following the decision last night of Circuit Judge Frederick W. Mayne, at Leland, that the woman must stand trial there July 29. The court held that sufficient evidence had been produced upon which to warrant holding her to circuit court. He also stated that there was sufficient evidence that the body dug from beneath the Immaculate Church had transferred to a cemetery at Traverse City for the pending case.

### Another Big Timber Sale Next September

It was announced that it is the intention of those in authority to have Government land been warmly commended by various authorities including Dr. C. T. Hewitt, Dominion Entomologist. It is the intention of the Department of Lands and Mines to cut a strip six feet in width along the entire boundary of the Game Refuge in order that no person may have the excuse that he entered the area without knowing it. Game Refuge Commended. The establishment of a game refuge in New Brunswick by the Provincial Government has been warmly commended by various authorities including Dr. C. T. It is the intention of the Department of Lands and Mines to cut a strip six feet in width along the entire boundary of the Game Refuge in order that no person may have the excuse that he entered the area without knowing it. A chain of guardians which will be more or less permanent also is to be established around the area which comprises four hundred square miles in Northumberland County.

Extending Telephone Lines. The Department is working steadily at the extension of telephone lines. A lookout tower is being established at Bald Mountain, Nictau Lake, with rangers' cabin near it. A telephone line starting at the Gloucester Iron Mines on the Nepisiquit River is being built now by the Bathurst Lumber Co. The Department to bear half the expense. This line will extend to Nictau Lake lookout and thence to the Tobique Forks where connection will be made with existing telephone lines. Another phone line is being built from Summit Station on the N. T. R. down the valley of the Southwest Miramichi toward Newcastle. On Bedell Mountain near Summit a lookout is to be erected which will give a full view of the valley of that river as far as Botswood and also a view of a portion of the Tobique country. It is contemplated also to have a branch line from one of the other of these two main telephone lines to Bald Mountain on the Serologic, the highest point in New Brunswick with an elevation of 2750 feet. Another lookout for the Miramichi country will be located there.

MAKING A GOOD TOWN.

A town must be a good place to live in and a good place to make a living in. The following four points are the essentials of a good town.

- Production or Manufacture—
- Transportation—
- Trade—
- Civic Welfare—

People congregate in a town for trade, and if the prosperity growing out of that trade is not directed along the lines of civic welfare, the town is not much good. Water supply, sanitation, streets, sidewalks, schools, and entertainment features are the essentials of civic welfare.

The average man does not realize what it means to bring people to his town, or what it means for people to go out of his town.

Your town is as big as the trade territory that you supply. If you reach out fifty miles, that is the size of your town. You want to protect that town front.

Some farmer's and towns people think that the merchants of the town are a nuisance, and send away for everything they want, forgetting that their property is more valuable because of its proximity to town facilities. They also ignore the fact that their children attend the town school, and their boy or girl works in the town stores.

These things enhance the value of the land located near the town, and the farmer owes the town something for increasing the value of his land.

The bigger the town is, the farther the influence on farm property extends. There are two kinds of people that are attracted to towns; one is the old man who has made his money, and the other is the young man who wants to make money.

Communities of the East are losing to the communities of the West, because the west have better towns. The spirit of the west makes it what it is. They are real boosters, and back their boosting with their money. The booster who does not back it with his money is a four flusher.

Good roads are needed to hold the people, and good roads are a factor that is developing and causing an evolution in other communities.

There are just two things a small town can do—either grow into a big town, or get off the map.

If a town has good transportation it is a good retail town. The support of the town comes from the dollars that go over the retail counter.

Retailers are the backbone of the community from an economic standpoint. It is not what a man earns—that is an individual asset, but what he spends—that is a community asset.

Money must go over the retail counter before you can have civic welfare. The trouble with the average town is smug-osity—smug meaning self-satisfied, and ossified meaning bone.

Some towns furnish everything to make it a good town, but nobody is willing to furnish the time or energy. We have to get all the interests of the community together, as well as individual responsibility.

This co-operative work should be a part of your business and not a community duty. You help to gain by helping the other fellow to gain.

If we in Newcastle, wish to make our town a REAL TOWN, we would be well advised by the following:

- Real towns are not made by men afraid
- Lest somebody else gets ahead.
- When everybody works and nobody shirks,
- You can raise a town from the dead.
- And if, when you make your personal stake
- Your neighbor can make one.
- Your town will be what you want to see.
- It isn't your town—it's YOU.

### All Canadians Home by End of August

Ottawa, July 28.—Apart from the thirty-eight hundred officers and men being brought to Canada by the Regina and the Winnifredin, the former due at Halifax today, there still remain in England, including soldiers dependent and unattached women, approximately forty-nine thousand Canadians who must be brought home before the task of demobilization is complete. Unmarried soldiers and officers still to be returned number ten thousand and married eleven thousand. Wives, children and unattached women swell the total to nearly 100,000.  
Although the home-ward movement of Canadians is not at present as heavy as formerly it will shortly be speeded up and it is anticipated that by the end of August the Canadians and their dependents will all be back in Canada.

### Cold Storage Plants Contain Large Food Stocks

Ottawa, July 23.—That stocks of food products in cold storage on July 1, compare favorably with last year is shown by the report of the cost of Living Commissioner to the Minister of Labor concerning food in storage and process of cure in Canada on that date. Attention is drawn, however, to the export demand which is likely to be considerable. Attention is drawn, also, to a serious accumulation of fish. The report follows:

Butter and Eggs  
Butter went into storage rapidly during the month of June, notwithstanding the high prices, and on July first we had 10,365,116 pounds of creamery and 1,000,634 pounds of dairy butter.  
The oleomargarine in storage is only 412,594 pounds, which is, as usual, less than two weeks market requirements.  
The cheese in storage amounts to 9,312,911 pounds.  
Eggs are also coming into storage more freely than last year in spite of the high prices, but, apparently not so freely as two years ago. The stocks include 12,265,586 dozen in cold storage, 482,701 dozen on hand, other than the cold storage, and 533,738 pounds of frozen eggs.

Meats  
The stocks of pork on hand, in process of cure and in storage, are just about equal to the average for the last two years. The total stock on July first was 39,659,877 pounds. Of this, by far the largest part was in process of cure and not in cold storage at all.  
The stocks of beef are 40.31 per cent, less than last month, but greater than normal at this time of year. The largest portion of the beef in storage is frozen, of which we have 15,737,658 to 1,768,810 pounds cured beef amounts to 604,173 pounds, and the quantity in process of cure is 397,972 pounds.  
The stock of mutton and lamb consists of 1,537,807 pounds frozen and 102,800 pounds unfrozen. Comparative figures show the total to be twenty-seven per cent less than a month ago but forty-two per cent more than last year.

Poultry  
The stock of poultry includes 45,583 pounds broilers, 397,600 pounds chickens, 582,496 pounds fowl, 12,294 pounds ducks, 16,692 pounds geese, 192,985 pounds turkeys, and 151,159 pounds unclassified, making a total of 1,507,628 pounds. Comparisons show this to be twenty-five per cent, less than last month, but 489 per cent more than last July.

Fish Accumulation  
The fish in storage are accumulating seriously. The stocks in cold storage on July first were 20,357,445 pounds, and in addition there were 3,244,400 pounds on hand other than in cold storage. The largest holdings are on the Pacific coast although there are large stocks generally accepting in large cities.

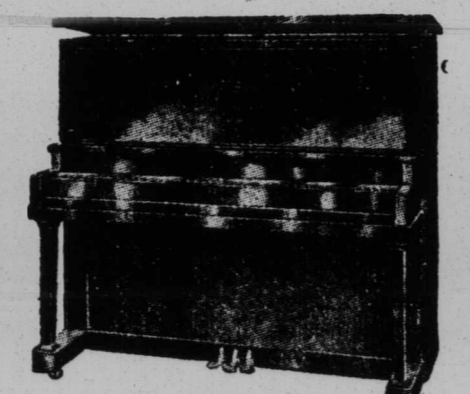
### North'd County Liberal Convention

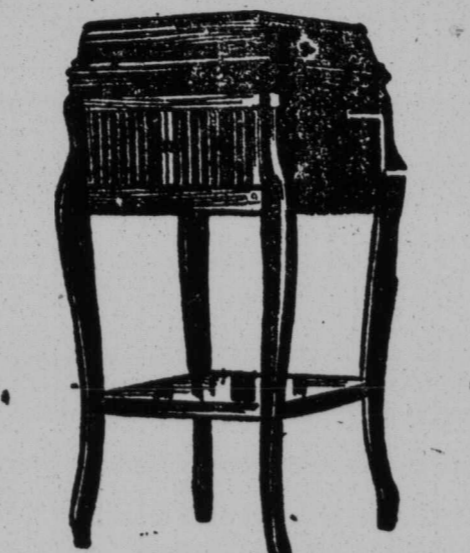

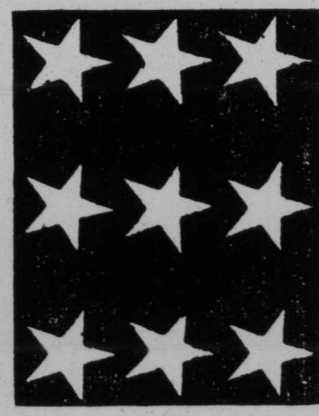

**Interned Germans Shipped from Amherst**  
Amherst, N. S. July 23.—The Internment Camp presented a busy scene this morning when five hundred and fifty of the German prisoners, who have been in detention since the early stages of the war, boarded a special train for Quebec, from which port they will eventually embark for Germany. It was not generally known about town that the detachment was leaving today, and consequently a mere handful were on hand to witness the removal of the Huns. They were under armed escort and boarded the train in a very orderly manner. The happiness was evidenced by the faces wreathed in smiles of contentment. The Germans and other alien prisoners were brought to Amherst in 1915, and represent sailors, marines and civilians. Austrians, Turks and Bulgarians are included among the number who have been detained at the camp, but those leaving this morning are Huns alone, composed of the crews of the Kaiser Wilhelm Der Grosse and other German ships captured on the high seas.  
There are now left in the Internment Camp about 250 prisoners. It has not been announced as yet when the remaining number will be deported.

**Stumpage Increase Gazetted**

The Royal Gazette of this week contains notice that the rate of stumpage has been increased for the logging season which is coming. The increase to be into effect August 1st next. The notice is contained in the regulations and Stumpage Tariff which is published in the Gazette. The increase for each class is as follows:  
 Spruce, pine and hemlock saw logs per M superficial feet, from \$2.50 to \$3.50.  
 Cedar Logs per M, including bark from \$2.00 to \$3.00.  
 Fir logs, per M, \$2.00 to \$3.00.  
 Poplar logs, per M, from \$2.00 to \$3.00.

**Game Refuge Proclaimed**  
 The Royal Gazette also contains notice that a proclamation has been issued by His Honor the Lieut. Governor to the effect that the Act to Establish the New Brunswick Game Refuge shall come into effect on, from and after December 1st, 1919.

 An area of four hundred square miles of Crown Lands has been set aside as a Game Refuge. This area is located entirely in the County of Northumberland and is roughly an oblong which includes the headwaters of Nepisquit River in the north and the Little Southwest Miramichi River

**Prohibition Carries In U.S.**

Washington, July 22—By a vote of nearly three to one, the House, weary of talk on prohibition, to-day passed a bill for its enforcement, with provisions and penalties so drastic as to bring from the men who framed it the prediction that it would forever suppress the liquor traffic on American soil.

Exactly one hundred members—52 Democrats and 48 Republicans—refused to support it. Against this even hundred the prohibitionists, putting up a solid front to the very last, polled 287 votes. The measure now goes to the Senate where many of its restrictions may be modified or stricken out. The cloakroom rumor persisted that all of this legislative work might end on the shoal of a presidential veto, although the general view was that it would be signed as passed.

The bill as it passed the House provides: After January 26, 1920 every person permitted under the law to have liquor in his possession shall report the quantity and kind to the commissioner of internal revenue.

(This applies to chemists, physicians, etc.)

After February 1, 1920: The possession of any liquor, other than as used by the law, shall be prima facie evidence that it is being kept for sale or otherwise in violation of the law.

It will not be required, however, to report, and it will not be illegal to have in one's possession, liquor in a private dwelling if the liquor is used for personal consumption by the owner, his family or his guests.

The possessor of such liquors, however, bears the burden of proof that the liquor was required and is possessed lawfully.

Intoxicating liquor is defined as a beverage containing more than one half per cent of alcohol. Any house, hut, vehicle or other place where liquor is manufactured, or sold is declared a nuisance.

No persons shall manufacture, sell, barter, give away, transport, import, export, deliver, furnish or receive any intoxicating liquors. Liquor for non-beverage purposes, and wine for sacramental use may be sold under specified regulations.

Denatured alcohol, medicinal preparations (including patent medicines), unfit for beverage purposes, toilet articles, flavoring extracts and vinegars are exempt.

Registered physicians are authorized to issue prescriptions under strict regulations for the use of liquor in cases where it may be considered necessary as a medicine.

Liquor advertisements of all kinds are prohibited.

Sale, manufacture or distribution of compounds intended for use in the unlawful manufacture of liquor is prohibited, together with sale or publication of receipts for home manufacture.

**Five Canadians Found Guilty**

London, July 23—(Reuter's)—At the Surrey assizes, Buglar Robert Pond and Private R. A. McAllen, of the Canadian Forestry Corps, were found not guilty of manslaughter, in connection with the murder of Police Sergeant Green at Epsom and discharged.

Privates F. H. Wilkie, 102nd Canadian Battalion; J. Connors, 15 Canadian Highlanders; A. McMaster, 3rd Canadian Reserve, and D. Yerex and A. Masse, of the Canadian Forestry Corps were found guilty and sentenced to twelve months' imprisonment without hard labor.

**Sir Edward Holden Dead**

London, July 23—In the death of Sir Edward Holden, British finance loses its most powerful leader. He did more than any one to lift Great Britain over the financial crisis which threatened her at the outbreak of the war. The adoption of a general moratorium and the issue of treasury notes were credited chiefly to his sagacity and the issue of treasury notes were included among the number who have been detained at the Camp, but those leaving this morning position.

Sir Edward was head of the largest bank in Great Britain, with several million pounds in gold in the vaults, which was placed at the governments disposal. He was a firm advocate of the amalgamation whereby British banks were recently consolidated in the Bank of England.

**BEAUBEAR'S ISLAND SOLD.**
