The Leopard left Cupids on the 7th June, bound to Manuox Island and Leading Tickle, Labrador; with fish and all orders either for large or small crews. She fell in with ice near Belle quantities attended to with punctuality Isle, and steamed through heavy ice to and despatch. Sloop Cove, there she anchored on the 12th June, seeing no prospect of pro-(ceeding futher until June 21st, when we again started and reached Long Tickle on the same day, where she landed crews and proceeded to Mannox I-land, arriving there on the 22d having lauded crews salt and provisions, she started on her return on the 28th. The Susan, Capt. Smith, ar rived at Mannox Island on the 26th June, and the steamship Panther at Turnavic Island; on the 23.d.

The Leopard came up in shore from Mannox Island through loose ice as far as Wolf Islands. Met no ice till abrest of C. Charles, where there was a belt of heavy ice. Saw a number craft on Tuesday last between Wolf Island and Cape Charles, and spoke some of them, who informed Capt. Field they had been harbored in Scrammy and Square Islands, and had got Vessels repaired on the Marine Railno sign of fish. Those were the first craft seen on their way to the fishing grounds. Met another fleet of craf passing Size's Harbor on the follow ing day, which had harbored in Quirpoon for some time, waiting for the ice to go off,
