Local and other Items.

We omitted to mention in last week's issue, the departure for Labrador, on the 28th June, of the yacht Lizzie S., with the Rev. D. McInnes on board, on the annual visit to that coast. We wish the rev. gentleman a pleasant and speedy passage to and from his sacred mission on the rugged shores of Labrador.

By the Royal Gazette of Tuesday last we notice that his Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to appoint the Very Reverend Domestico Falconio O.S.F., to be a member of the Roman Catholic Board of Education for Harbor Grace.

The first number of the Twillingate Star, a new weekly journal, printed and published by Mr. J. P. Thomson, is before us, the receipt of which we gratefully acknowledge, and we heartily tender our best wishes for its success.

The Hon'ble John Rorke's banker Snow Bird, put into Cape Broyle on Monday last, and having secured a good supply of bait, left again for the Banks. She has on board about 800 q.s. green fish for her second trip.

By recent accounts from Red Bay, we learn that up to the 29th June, the fishery had not commenced in that locality, that some of the planters had left for up the Straits and others were preparing to follow.

Reports from Trinity Bay state that the fishery along the South side since Friday, had not been as good as during the previous week.

We are informed that the Cable Ships which were expected to be leaving Valcartier 19th inst. will not sail until about the 1st August. The cable will be brought to Heart's Content in three ships, viz: the Scotia, Scotia; the name of the third vessel, we have not yet learnt. The work of laying out cable will be commenced on this side and continued to Ireland, and not vice versa as heretofore. The new Cable has been manufactured on an entirely new and improved principle, having three cores distinctly isolated, which make it equal to three cables comprised in one.

The Atlanta, Captain Whelan, and brigantine, Captain Smith, arrived in Heart's Content, Friday last, from Sydney, with coils for the Telegraph Company, by Messrs John Mann & Co.

The steamer Hercules arrived at Harbor Grace, about half past 10 a.m. on Tuesday, with the Avalon Total Abstinence Excursion Club, and a large number of their friends. The St. John's Minstrels, which accompanied the Club above referred to, gave a Minstrel Concert in the Total Abstinence Hall, Harbor Grace, the same evening, where a large number of the excursionists and residents of Harbor Grace assembled and spent a pleasant evening, the Concert being in every particular a grand success. After which a Promenade Concert was held, and kept up until the small hours of morning.

The coastal steamer Curlew, which left St. John's, on Saturday morning at ten o'clock, arrived at Trepassay at 3 same evening.

The coastal steamer Plover left for the northward on Monday last. We are informed that a large number of the Methodist Ministers when left for Trepassay on Friday for the Cove, took passage by her.

A telegram was received on Monday by Hon. James Fox, of St. John's, to the effect that a great improvement had taken place in the fishery prospects at Trepassay and neighbourhood. Several large boats arrived during the past few days with from thirty to fifty quintals each, bringing the gratifying information that fish was plentiful all over "ground."

A small schooner, owned by M. Mourie, Esq. arrived at Placentia yesterday, from a second trip to the banks, with a full fare. She has now loaded equal to three hundred qts dry fish. This is remarkably good work, seeing that the vessel is but 24 tons and carries only seven men.

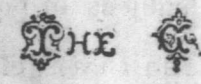
