

THE IRISH OUTLOOK IS VERY SERIOUS

Conditions in West and South Are Reported Extremely Grave

Public Feeling So Inflamed as to Become Quite Irrational, Says the Dublin Correspondent of The London Times—Monstrous Theory of Sinn Fein as to Murder of Lord Mayor

LONDON, March 24—The Dublin correspondent of the London Times describes the situation in Ireland in the darkest colors. He says the outlook is serious. Conditions in the west and south are extremely grave. The situation had last week, is now definitely worse. Public feeling is so inflamed as to become quite irrational. The most outrageous charges against the government are accepted as gospel truth. The correspondent says the Sinn Fein asks the country to accept the monstrous theory that Lord Mayor Curran was killed by actual agents of the government. He describes the overnight riot in Dublin as another danger signal, and says it is impossible to get an impartial account of the incident, the popular version being that the soldiers provoked and assaulted civilians. The correspondent learns that the soldiers were stoned by a crowd because they left the theatre singing the National Anthem as a protest against the failure of the theatre orchestra to play it. He adds that public opinion throughout the country is exasperated by a wild charge against the police and soldiers who hardly would be human if they did not resent the campaign of murder and calumny.

NO MORE DIRECT LOANS WILL BE MADE TO MUNICIPALITIES FOR HOUSES

New Arrangement in Regard to the Housing Plan Whereby the Different Towns and Cities Will Be Allowed to Issue Their Own Bonds For Loans For Houses.

Municipalities will get no more direct loans from the Ontario government for house-building. In future they may issue their own bonds for that purpose, and the government will guarantee them. New legislation covering these two points was introduced in the Legislature yesterday afternoon by Hon. H. C. Nixon, Provincial Secretary. Mr. Nixon informed the House that ten days ago word was received from the Dominion Government that there would be no further loans to the provincial authorities for housing purposes. In view of this his amendment was to wind up the work under the present act at the end of this year. The amendment to the municipal act allows municipalities to issue their own bonds which will be guaranteed by the government. The money raised in such a way will then be expended for housing. During the year seventy municipalities in Ontario were carrying on active work under the act. For the completion of the work now under way there is a revised list of amounts which may be loaned. Following are the loans available under the old act and under "The Municipal Housing Act of 1920."

Amounts loaned under Ontario Housing Act, 1919—House of frame construction, \$3,000; brick veneer, \$3,000; solid construction, \$4,000. In the case of brick veneer construction if the cost of the land is included \$3,600 may be loaned. In the case of solid construction \$4,500 is obtainable. Amendments to Ontario Housing Act—House of frame construction, \$3,200; house of brick veneer construction, \$3,800; house of solid construction \$4,000. If the cost of the land is included in the case of frame construction \$3,800 may be loaned. If the cost of land is included in the brick veneer type \$4,200 is obtainable. If the cost of land is included in the type of solid construction \$4,600 may be had. Amounts of loans under limitations of "The Municipal Housing Act, 1920"—House of frame construction \$3,500; house of brick veneer construction \$4,000; house of solid construction \$4,500. If the cost of the land is to be included then \$4,100 is obtainable for frame, \$4,600 for brick veneer, and \$5,100 for solid construction.

Marshall Says U. F. O. Ideas Are Liberal

MEMBER FOR WEST LINCOLN OUTLINES PLATFORM AND SAYS DRURY POLICY IS IN THAT OF LIBERALS.

TORONTO, March 24—New ideas are being difficult to find and the debate on the reply to the speech from the Throne in the Legislature begins to lag. Yesterday afternoon and at the first night session last evening or the present house it was carried on. The outstanding speech made by Sgt. Major MacNamara, the independent soldier candidate for Riverdale. Sgt. Major MacNamara lives up to his title of "independent soldier." He sits on the Government side of the house, but he spoke against Premier Drury in the Halton by-election and yesterday much of his criticism was again levelled at the Premier. He quoted exhaustively from statistics of various countries and left no doubt that he was for protection by a substantial tariff. It was on this ground that he criticised the Premier. His remarks were applauded by the conservative members. J. W. Curry, Liberal member for Southeast Toronto, reached a high level in his contribution to the debate. He had sincere praise for the new Government and appealed for a higher form of political endeavor. Thomas Marshall (Lincoln) Dr. Forbes Godfrey, (West York) and Col. W. H. Price (Parkdale) three veteran members of the House who survived the general disaster of the last election also spoke in the debate.

Liberal Platform Adopted Thomas Marshall Liberal member for Lincoln, outlined the platform of the Liberal party and ended by declaring that practically every item in the Government platform had been advocated by the Liberal party for years. Why the U.F.O. clubs could not have contented themselves with backing up the Liberal candidates he could not understand. "It was not necessary to form a 'farmers' party to get farmer sin the House," he stated. "The farmers are in the majority in the rural ridings. Had they turned out in force at the party conventions they could easily have nominated one of their own class."

Coal Control is Abandoned; Edict Issued By Wilson

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 24—With a warning against profiteering, President Wilson yesterday ordered abandonment of government control over bituminous coal and asked miners and operators to negotiate a new working agreement on the basis of the majority report of the coal strike settlement commission. The President ordered termination of price control on April 1st, when the new working agreement becomes effective. This will permit at least partial absorption in coal prices of the increase in miner's wages, established at 27 per cent, by the commission's majority report. The increase in wages the commission estimated, will entail an added annual cost of \$200,000,000 and includes the 14 per cent increase awarded the miners in settling the recent strike. The operators, however, were reminded by the President that unreasonable prices must not result from the relinquishment of price control and the addition of increased wages to their expenses.

Two Handsome New Steel Cars For Local Line

A welcome sight to people who use the street cars, can be seen in the railway yards of the N. S. & T. R. where two handsome car bodies are being got ready to put on the local line. These bodies are of steel construction throughout, the first of the class to be brought here. They are pay-as-you-enter cars and very handsomely appointed. Manager Cummings stated today that the new cars will be put on the line just as quickly as they can be put on trucks and otherwise fitted. These cars were ordered last autumn and have just been delivered which shows how hard it is to get supplies and equipment.

SOLDIER AND HIS YOUTHFUL ENGLISH BRIDE FAIL TO AGREE AND HUBBY GETS TO COURT

Magistrate Advises Joseph Madson to Get a Proper Home For the Girl Who Trusted Him in England—Girl Followed Madson to Canada With Her Child.

In police court today Margaret Madson, an attractive young English girl, charged her husband, Joseph, a returned soldier with failing to support her. She had been in Canada six months she said. Their little two-year old baby was with the young mother. "His father had to pay for the license and I had to buy the ring when we were at last married," said Mrs. Madson. "I have nothing against him and there would be no trouble if it were not for his people." Madson is an electrician, and had been getting 70 cents an hour, his wife said, but lately he has not been getting wages, he doing the work and his father collecting the money. "Last Thursday night his father put me out of the house," said the girl. "I wouldn't go, so he took me by the back of the neck and put me out. When I told my husband he just laughed in my face." To the magistrate she said she wanted her husband to leave his people and come and live with her. Further questioning brought out that the girl had lived with Madson when he was in England as a soldier

but they had been married when they came to Canada. "I had to go to a workhouse when my child was born," she said. T. J. McCarron, counsel for Madson questioned the young wife as to her friendship with another man but she said she had never had anything to do with him. The child is certainly Madson's she said and Madson has always acknowledged it. Mr. McCarron said he thought the husband should get a separate home. Madson said he was quite willing as long as his wife agreed to do as he said. She had left the house and he didn't know where she had gone. She must look after the child properly. Questioned by the magistrate, Madson said he didn't marry the girl in England because he had not sufficient means. He had married her in Canada just as soon as he was able. He admitted however, that he had an interest in a business which pay well. The magistrate told Madson he must deal fairly with his wife and get her a separate home away from his father. The case would be adjourned for a week to give him a chance to get a home.

Strike in Berlin Has Ended And Work is to Be Resumed To-day; Kapp is Missing

BERLIN, March 24—The strike committee has unanimously proclaimed the strike ended. Work will be resumed today. Major General von Luettwitz, the military commander in the Kapp revolt has been placed under arrest, it is officially announced. Admiral von Trotha, chief of the admiralty, has also been arrested. There is no definite news of Kapps whereabouts. It is supposed he is on his estate in East Prussia. Insurgents have captured the palace in the town of Schleswig-Holstein according to a dispatch received here. A number of cavalry officers were taken prisoner. A so-called committee of action is in control of Schleswig, the dispatch says. A detachment of the Lowenfeld

naval brigade on the way to Eckernforde, ten miles south-east of Schleswig, was held up by the citizens guard of Eckernforde, but a truce was established as a result of negotiations with the Schleswig committee of action. The detachment will be allowed to proceed to Dugensstadt, near Rendsburg. President Ebert today decreed the abolition of drumhead court-martial in Greater Berlin, expressing confidence that order would not be further disturbed. Order has not yet been re-established at Nordhausen, Saxony, and the situation at Sonderhausen and Koburg is worse. The demand for disarmament of volunteers in those places having been rejected, the extremists have armed themselves.

Supposed Lieut Niemer, U. S. Marshall, is Now Being Held at Rochester, N. Y.

The police have been notified that the young man, known as Lieutenant Arthur Niemer and who posed as a United States marshal and showed a big 45-calibre revolver and a pair of handcuffs when he tried to victimize a Niagara Falls merchant and who passed several bad cheques on Niagara Falls, N. Y. chauffeurs and hotel men in payment for joyrides and chicken suppers with a Niagara Falls, N. Y. woman known as Geraldine, had been arrested in Rochester under the name of Arthur Hudson. He is being held there on a charge of passing bad cheques and having a gun without a permit. When arrested Niemer wished to send a telegram to Geraldine at Niagara Falls, N. Y., and the Rochester police immediately looked up his record there. Niemer stopped at the Imperial hotel over the river for six days about two weeks ago. He still owes the hotel bill and also a bill of \$8.50 for

pressing his clothes. The hotel attendant said he never wore a suit more than a half a day without pressing. He was always well groomed. He presented cards giving his occupation as a U. S. marshal. To back up his claim he showed the handcuffs and the big 45. During his Falls stay he was particularly attentive to Geraldine and took her and her girl friend to Buffalo on numerous occasions. Many Falls chauffeurs still carry Niemer's checks with them and would like to see him if only for a minute. An Incubator Caught Fire and Firemen Called The firemen were called at 11:30 last night to 26 Pleasant Avenue, where an incubator belonging to Mr. Grant had caught fire while he was away. The firemen put the blaze out with a chemical engine.

The Welland deputation that visited Ottawa in an endeavor to secure orders for the British American Shipbuilding Company returned yesterday morning without having secured a great deal of encouragement.

Leola Will Go Back Home to St. Thomas, Ont.

Mrs. Leola Greenwood will be handed over to the St. Thomas police and they are sending a man here to take her back to that city. When the Tillsonburg chief of police said his town didn't want her Chief Greene called up the St. Thomas chief. The latter said they wanted the girl there. St. Thomas is her home and it is possible she will be given to her parents on good behavior. The girl is absolutely penniless and if the authorities here had let her go she would have been in bad shape because she would have been unable to get out of town. In commemoration of the silver jubilee of their Archbishop, Roman Catholics of the diocese are to erect at the head of Wellesley place a residence for students entering upon courses in philosophy.

ABOUT THE SEED DRILL

What is Considered to be the Most Efficient Type.

The Feeding Device is the Heart of the Drill—Seed Should Be Dropped Directly Under the Axle of the Disc—Give the Bearings Careful Inspection.

As the drill sows, so shall the farmer reap, is so fallacy. It is as true in its content as the maxim "As a man sows, so shall he reap." Given the right kind of a grain drill, the seed is all planted at a uniform depth, evenly covered; the earth compacted enough to retain the moisture around it. These conditions mean that the young plants will all come up at the same time, that the roots will be well protected, and that the grain will ripen uniformly. As the grain is planted, so will it grow and ripen. If some of the seed is planted too shallow, and some too deep, the seed that comes up first, ripens first. Thus it is that some of the grain is ready to harvest while other patches are still in the milk stage.

The feeding device is the heart of the grain drill. Upon its reliability depends the accuracy of sowing the seed. The drill sealer is computed for the average sized seeds, and therefore cannot always be depended upon when the size of the seeds varies from the normal. If the grain is oversized or undersized the required amount per acre may be sown by setting the feed lever at a point slightly greater or slightly less than shown on the indicator. There are, in common use, two different forms of feeding devices. The fluted-cylinder-force feed, and the double-run-force feed. The amount of seed sown by the fluted-cylinder-force feed may be regulated by a lever which changes the size of the outlet, but it does not always handle all classes of seeds without breaking them, as can be done with the double-run-force feed, which necessarily requires for driving it a disc wheel, or a cog wheel with from nine to fifteen sets of teeth that make as many speeds or feeds.

In the most efficient type of grain drills the seed should be deposited as nearly directly under the axle of the disc as possible, and the only place where the seed can be dropped directly on to the bottom of the trench without hindrance. By this method the disc is not run deeper than the seed is deposited, and the draft is reduced to a minimum. If the seed is deposited in the rear of the centre of the axle, the rotation of the disc tends to carry earth and seed up with it, causing the seed to be unevenly deposited. In operation, a properly angled disc opens a trench about two inches wide. The falling seed strikes the convex side of the shield and the convex side of the disc, and is thus scattered evenly over the entire width of the trench.

Grain seed drills are divided into four kinds, according to the type of furrow-opener—the open delivery single disc and the closed delivery single disc, the double disc, the shoe, and the hoe drills. The open delivery single disc furrow opener deposits the seed between the shield and the convex side of the disc. The space is open from the end of the boot between the disc and shield to the bottom or lower end of the shield. The shield prevents the falling seed from becoming mixed with the loose earth and surface trash and insures its free passage to the bottom of the trench made by the disc. It will also do excellent work in highly cultivated soil that is free from trash.

The closed delivery single disc furrow opener has a closed boot, similar to a hoe furrow opener, which comes down at the rear edge of the disc and deposits the seed about two inches back of the disc. It does not plant the seed at as even a depth either the open delivery single disc or the double disc, but deposits it at least eight inches in rear of the disc hub, and wherever it meets with an obstruction, rock or hard frozen soil the disc rises up and carries the boot with it, broadcasting the seed on the surface.

There are many styles of double discs, but the one that plants the seed under or slightly back of the disc axle, or hub, is the one to use, for that point is the deepest part of the furrow. The hoe furrow opener that shoots the grain forward of this centre is to be avoided, for the reason that the seed reaches the ground before the furrow is made, and it is, therefore, mixed with the soil as the seed trench is being made, causing what is termed "wavy" sowing. The double disc type of opener tends to spread out the seed more than other kinds, so that each seed has a somewhat greater area from which to draw moisture.

PERSONS SHOT DEAD AS RESULT OF RIOTS

DUBLIN, March 23—Three hundred soldiers, on the way to their barracks after a visit to a Dublin theatre clashed with a crowd of civilians about midnight. Many shots were fired. One man and one woman were killed and many wounded. The entire city was thrown into consternation bordering on panic.

The riot is said to have been precipitated by the disorderly conduct of the soldiers, who paraded the streets about nine o'clock, singing, jostling, jassering, by hammering doors at smashing windows.

After parading through Harcourt Street, the soldiers returned toward their barracks, followed by a large crowd of civilians.

At the Portobello Bridge, near the barracks, a clash seemed inevitable and a volley was fired over the heads of the crowd, but by whose orders is unknown.

The shooting which resulted in the killing of two and the wounding of other persons, took place in Richmond Street. The circumstances surrounding it are not yet known.

The soldiers who started the disorders eventually returned to their barracks.

Other soldiers not concerned in the rioting were roughly handled by the populace while returning to the barracks.

It is announced that the Provincial Government would make no further direct grants to municipalities for housing purposes, although it will guarantee the bonds of the municipalities themselves.

PARIS, March 24—Germans are preparing a formidable world propaganda in favor of a revision of the Versailles treaty and the holding of a new international conference, at which vanquished nations might be represented, for the object of changing or eliminating many clauses of the present treaty between the allied nations and Germany, according to a Geneva despatch. A book entitled, "The Greatest Crime of Humanity," has been prepared, and 10,000,000 copies printed for free distribution, especially in England, France and the U. S., and it is said that millions of other pamphlets along the same line will follow.

Soviet newspapers state that Russia needs thirty-two billion roubles in gold to restore herself.

ANOTHER WORKMAN KILLED

NIAGARA FALLS, ONT., March 24—Another fatality occurred in the Hydro forebay at Queenston Monday night when H. S. Bowen, a young carpenter employed there, was almost instantly killed when falling lumber struck him on the head. Bowen was working in the forebay, into which a locomotive crane was lowering some lumber in a sling causing the lumber to slip out and strike Bowen on the head. An inquest was held at St. Catharines today. The deceased man came here from Cordova Mines, Ont.

COMMISSIONER HIGGINS HERE TO CONFER ON SALVATION ARMY MATTERS

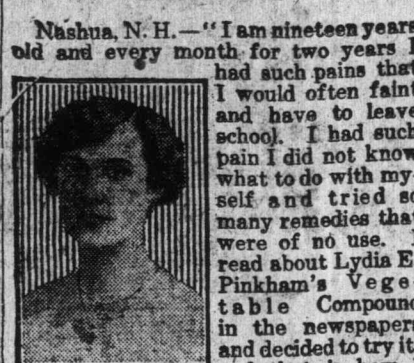

HOUSECLEANING TIME

In the Spring a Woman's Fancy Turns That Way.

She Finds the Work Fascinating—Some Very Practical Hints as to Doing the Job—Recipes for Cleaning and Polishing.

(Contributed by Ontario Department of Agriculture, Toronto.)

HOUSECLEANING for the most part is fascinating work, that is, after we pass the cellar. After all, this is really the most important part of the house and should receive first consideration in the spring. Probably it will never be known how much of the low state of vitality found in some families is to be charge to ill-ventilated, badly-lighted, poorly-drained cellars, where decaying vegetables are kept, sending its foul germs laden air to every part of the house. If vegetables are stored in the cellar they should be carefully picked over and all growth and decayed ones removed. In addition to thoroughly cleaning, the walls should be whitewashed, and if the cellar is at all damp, it is well to keep a metal or earthen receptacle containing unslaked lime constantly present. Not a day should pass without the cellar being properly aired. In the very hot summer days, the windows should be opened every night and closed during the day. The reason for this is, that the outdoor air in the daytime is much warmer than in the cellar. This warm, moist-laden air enters the cooler atmosphere of the cellar, and the moisture condenses and rests on all surfaces making the cellar damp and warm. By opening the windows at night and closing them in the daytime the cellar is kept dry, pure and clean. It is well, too, before leaving the cellar to see that the screens are placed properly in the windows—screens of fine wire netting to prevent flies, or insects entering. We cannot emphasize too emphatically the need for proper protection against flies. More diseases are caused by flies than we are wont to believe, and while doing the spring cleaning it is well to see that each room is screened properly to prevent the entrance of flies.

If we attend to the little things before we start the actual cleaning, such as sorting and cleaning drawers, putting away furs, winter curtains, extra blankets, etc., and laying in a supply of cleaning materials, this will save a lot of time. It has been customary to envy the home with new furniture. We think it would be easy to make the house look well if we just had some new chairs, dressers, tables, etc., but, as a matter of fact, it does not make the housecleaning half as interesting if we have some old furniture (which we have longed to discard for years) to transform into something new. What could be more fascinating than the painting of chairs, tables and other furniture in order to have it harmonize with the walls, the drapery, the woodwork, and the floor.

It is not only that a floor looks much better if it is painted or polished, but it saves time and energy in cleaning. The rough surface collects greasy moisture, dust settles in to it and soon grimy discolored and unhealthy conditions exist. Fine floors are hard to keep clean. The following methods of treating them may be of value:

1st. Spread over the floor strips of old sheeting; to this add two coats of paint. This will secure a very satisfactory border for the floor and the centre may be covered with a rug.

2nd. Apply a coat of linseed oil. Then fill cracks with "Crack and Crevice Filler," and apply an oak stain and two coats of floor finish.

It is difficult to say which rooms in the house should receive the most careful consideration. The bedroom is important because it is in the bedroom the person should receive that perfect sleep which will insure physical and mental strength. The kitchen, too, is important, because here the woman spends a great deal of her time. It will be found most satisfactory to have linoleum placed on the kitchen floor. This is easily kept clean, and is soft, warm, elastic and wears well. There should be no mopping in the kitchen which cannot be washed. The furniture, walls, etc., should be washable. While cleaning this spring it is especially important that we should see that all the utensils which are being used constantly should be in a convenient place, and if possible, closed cupboards should be placed in the kitchen. The following recipes and information may be found of value in doing the spring cleaning:

Washing Windows.—Always dust first and clean the woodwork before the glass. The glass may be washed with warm water and soap, ammonia, or kerosene, or whitening and ammonia. In washing wring the cloth almost dry, rinse off the window, and dry with a soft cloth and polish with a soft paper or cloth.

Painted Woodwork.—Wash in warm soapy water with a soft cloth, doing a little at a time and drying as you go along. For light painted wood use whitening paste.

Vanished Woodwork.—If very soiled use soap and water. Dry very thoroughly and then rub with ammonia or kerosene. To use kerosene just dampen the cloth and after rubbing on the vanished woodwork rub again with a dry cloth. If not, you will find a white glow will result.

Dustless Dusters.—Dip the cheese cloth in a mixture made from ½ cup melted parowax.

Note.—These dusters may be washed several times before they require to be dipped again. There are many helpful suggestions for cleaning, and labor-saving devices appearing in weekly papers and magazines from time to time. It is a good plan to cut these out, place them in a labelled envelope or box for future use.—Miss D. M. Sutherland, Women's Institutes Branch.

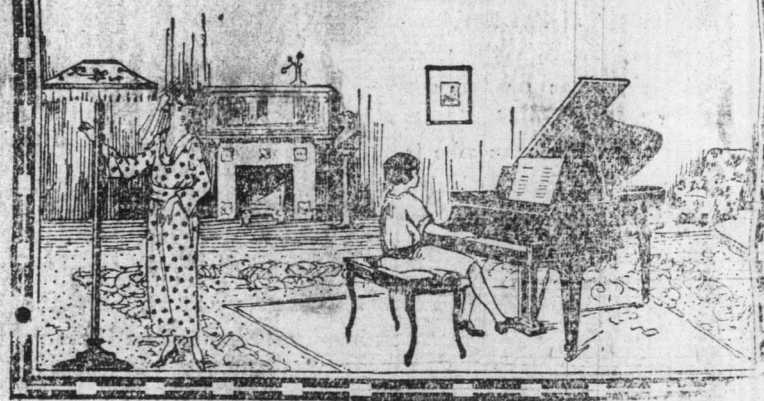

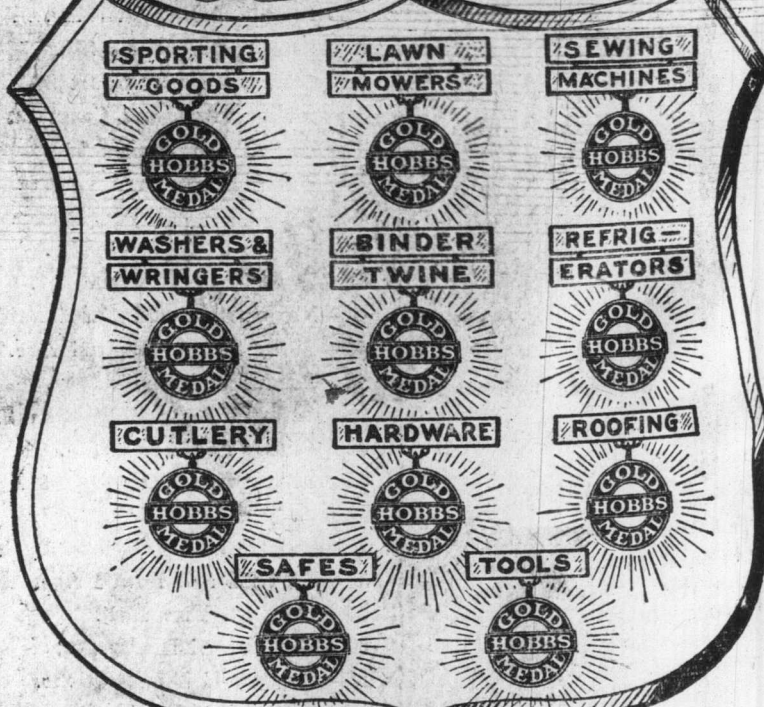

DRAINAGE IS IMPORTANT

Some Benefits of a Well Devised Drainage Plan.

WHEN a man is about to erect a building, be it ever so small, the first thing he does is to make a plan. That plan may be on paper or it may exist only in the mind of the builder, yet it is a plan. Without a plan to follow, a builder cannot do good work. The same is true of the drainage. The man who places a "string" or "line" of tile in a watercourse, which traverses his fields, should not do so without asking himself such questions as: "Am I putting this tile in the lowest part?" "Will I be able to get a satisfactory outlet? How many acres will this tile drain, and is it large enough to drain it satisfactorily? Have I sufficient grade to drain it for the whole area?" If he does not ask himself these questions he is like a builder without a plan; he is working in the dark; his work cannot be of any value. All these questions the drainage plan answers, and more.

No matter how small the means for immediate construction of drains, or how few the drains which one is about to install, he should not do so without having first laid out a plan of which these drains will be a part. On rolling land such a plan is not hard to decide upon, because the differences in elevation are very pronounced, and any one who is familiar with such lands is able to intelligently plan a system of drains for them. But where the area is large and the topography irregular, or very flat, guesswork is out of the question. It is then that the well planned drainage plan is of the greatest value. A drainage plan shows first of all the differences in height or elevation between all parts of the farm over which the survey extended. This allows the owner of the land to plan his own system of drainage. The possession of the levels for all parts of the farm lays bare the most advantageous routes for the drains, from a study of the levels and contours of a plan it is possible to calculate the acreage which each main tile must drain. This information together with the fall or grade procurable is the only true guide to help us decide upon the size of tile needed in any given drain. It is only when the plan has a picture of the whole project before him that he can draw an efficient yet economical plan of drains for any piece of land.

Future Benefits.—The benefits of a plan do not end with the completion of the drains. It is only those of us who have tried long and hard to find a drain, the location of which was nowhere recognized, know the value of guidance such as is offered by a plan. When a tile-draining farm is offered for sale the existence of a plan of drains adds greatly to the value of the farm. The plan is of equal value to both the seller and the buyer. With proper care well-constructed tile drains will give good service for several generations; therefore for the convenience of our grandchildren, the drainage plan is necessary to have a plan of our underground drainage work.

There is another way in which a drainage plan is very helpful to a land owner. It is a splendid guide toward ascertaining the acreage of any field or part of the farm. Fences are located on the plan, and the whole plan drawn to scale, so that with the aid of a ruler it is possible to measure the area of any part of the land surveyed. This is of great assistance in planning a season's crops as well as in calculating yields per acre.

The drainage pays; but, before you start even a small system by all means secure a plan—G. Heimpel, O. A. College, Guelph.

Protecting Drainage Outlets.
Tile, particularly clay tile, should not run out to the mouth of the drain. If a piece of old gas pipe, eight or ten feet long, can be secured, this should be placed in the drain in place of the last few feet. Failing this a piece of corrugated steel, or even a plank trough is much better than running the tile right to the end, where they will be broken, washed in to the outlet, or otherwise destroyed, allowing the earth to roll in and stop the flow of water.

Under any condition the bank is liable to wear away. Animals pasturing in the field may tramp it down, and block the tile, so in the second place, an abutment should be built through which the outlet discharges its water and the bank will be kept in a state of preservation. This may be made of concrete, stone or plank, and should be a permanent structure. In some cases where the flow is heavy and the water would have a tendency to undermine the wall, it is well to build an apron on which the force of the falling water is broken.

There is still another precaution which should be given due consideration. Frequently small animals, muskrats, coons, ground hogs and others, seek refuge in the tile. Here they are entrapped, and form a dam to the flowing water. To overcome such, the outlet should have bars across the end. These may be quite small, and close together so that nothing can get through. A screen may be fitted over the end, but unless the mesh is quite large the water is retarded in its flow. Sometimes the first tile is threaded with wire. This forms a good protection.

When all these devices are given attention, the outlet should remain in a state of efficiency for years, and the system, if properly installed, should give satisfaction.—F. L. Ferguson, O. A. College, Guelph.

All persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:

Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year, 1919, received or earned \$1,000 or more.

All other individuals, who during the calendar year 1919, received or earned \$2,000 or more.

Every corporation and joint stock company, whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.
