LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

SIR William Vermon Harcourt died in London on Saturday morning. He was 77 years of age.

It is stated that Hon. George E. Foster will likely run for North Toronto, Mr. Brock, the sitting Conservative member retiring.

THE returning officers, for the Federal election in this Province, are the sheriffs of the three counties.

A train jumbled the track near Middleton, N. S., on Monday, and a commercial traveller named Shea, from Hamilton broke a leg jumping off.

NEAR Harcourt, N. B. John Cain, 15 years old, son of a mill owner at that place, was drowned while crossing the river in a leaky boat, to visit his sister.

At the Cabinet meeting held in Ottawa on Friday, Sir Richard Cartwright, J. W. Ross M. P. for the Yukon and T. O. Davie M. P. for Saskatchewan were appointed to the Senate. Thus one by one the Grit stalwarts go to their reward.

BENJAMIN Russell the representative of Hants County in the last Parliament, has been appointed to the Supreme Court bench of Nova Scotia. Russell is appointed Justice and the question who will be Chief Justice will come up later. Another of the faithful rewarded.

MR Daniel McGregor of New Perth about 80 years of age, was found dead in the yard of Mr. Joseph Shaw, New Perth, on Thursday morning last. He had been in Charlottetown on the previous day and had driven home in the afternoon. He called at Mr. Cameron's on his way, and left there about 8 o'clock in the evening. That was the last seen of him until his dead body was found as above stated on Thursday morning. The horse was standing still and the dead man was lying on his back, with his feet extended between the fore and rear wheels.

A sensation has been caused among the Liberals of British Columbia by the announcement that Joe Martin, who has been one of the foremost Liberals of the west will oppose the Laurier Government candidate in Nanaimo, Mr. Ralph Smith. Mr. Martin denied that he had "flopped over" to the Conservatives but declared that in some ways his sympathies are with them and that he might be found to vote with them. He added that "west of Ontario, the Liberals will not carry more than two seats, one in the Northwest and one in British Columbia."

Accident.

An accident, which might have resulted seriously and possibly fatally, occurred on the P. E. Island Railway, Saturday night last. As the express train from Summerside was on its way it struck a broken rail about a mile west of Elliotts. This was about 8 o'clock. The engine was partially derailed and the baggage car totally derailed and thrown over at an angle of 45 degrees. It was prevented from falling over altogether, by the coupling only. Where the accident happened was an up grade and the train was running at the rate of about twelve miles an hour. By means of the air brakes, the train was stopped almost instantaneously. Conductor Tanton drove to Bradshaw, about three miles distant, and telegraphed an account of the accident to Charlottetown. A special train was at once sent out and reached the scene of the accident about 10.55. The passengers and mails and part of the baggage were transferred to the special which reached the City on return about 1 a. m. Sunday morning. Driver Craswell was in charge of the engine.

His remains were followed by a large concourse of people to St. Columba Church, where a Requiem Mass was celebrated by the Pastor Rev. James E. McDonald, and from there to the cemetery where the last sad rites were performed. He leaves a widow, one son and three daughters to mourn his loss. May his soul rest in peace.

Obituary.

Seldom are we called upon to chronicle a death so universally regretted as that of Mrs. Patrick O'Halloran, who departed this life at Greenfield, Lot 66, at the residence of her son-in-law, Gregory Kelly, on Friday the 23rd, of September, in the 70th year of her age. Deceased had been in very delicate health for over three years, but bore her long illness with the same patience which characterized her whole life. Her maiden name was Jane, daughter of the late Richard Gill of Newton, Lot 57.

Besides her husband, she leaves to lament her loss, four sons and three daughters, all of whom reside at Greenfield except Mrs. John F. Curran of St. Teresa's. She was a very amiable woman, possessed of many virtues, being hospitable to the stranger, charitable to the needy, a faithful and kind wife and mother, a true friend and neighbor. Ever a faithful and attentive Catholic, she received all the consolations of religion in her final illness. The large number who followed her remains to the cemetery at Montague, on Sunday afternoon testified to the esteem in which she was held by all. The funeral ceremony was performed by the Rev. S. T. Phelan. May she rest in peace.—Cm.
