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



Had Saved 200 Lives at Manila Bay.

Princesses Who Never

Louis Bonaparte-For Reasons of State Victoria Remained Single.

Princess Clementine of Belgium, who is now at Moncarliere palace, near Turin, preparing for her marriage with Prince Louis Bonaparte, has waited long for this day. Just what reasons her father, the late King Leopold of Belgium, may have had for refusing his consent to a marriage that was in every way appropriate and even desirable, were never known to the world.

Wanted High Life.

There was so little reasonableness in his obstinacy that many take refuge in the explanation so frequently heard in his lifetime that he enjoyed in hot water will do much to relieve too much his freedom in Paris, which was the result of his good understanding with the republican authorities. to jeopardize that by any union with the Innapartes.

Princess Victoria, sister of the present King of England, is another roy al princess who has never married Prince Napoleon, son of the Emperor of France and the unfortunate Empress Eugenie, lived in his youth near the princess. They fell in love. Both mothers were in favor of the match, and even Queen Victoria's sympathy was won for the scheme. But there were reasons of state why the marriage should not take place. The Prince Napoleon was a refugee from France. He was, like his parents, in banishment. In spite of the strong support of his suit it was decided that the marriage could not take place: Germany could not be made distrustful of England's loy-

alty by such a union. In the disappointment of the refusal, Prince Napoleon demanded that he be allowed to go at once into the world. He went to South Africa and fell before the assegais of the Zulus. Rosebery Next.

The Princess Victoria put on nourning just as if she were a widow and spent much of her time with the Empress Eugenie. Then, after a while, she came to be friendly with Rosebery, who attracted her intellect rather than her heart.

It appeared, after a time, that this match might be suitable and the Panic at a Bull Fight. princess was not averse to it. Her father, then Prince of Wales, favored the union and Queen Victoria was not averse to it: but here the present usen mother intervened.

She refused to allow such a mesallance with a commoner. Her will prevailed and a second time the Princess Victoria saw her marriage set cside for reasons of state.

Cricketers Meet.





It may be remembered that we opened our columns last fall to a discussion of this question of trawling on the Labrador, and we again do so. Last spring the Fishery Board prohibited trawling within three miles of the Labrador until September 10th, The Board of Trade protested against the prohibiting extending so far to sea, and suggested half a mile as

ample protection for traps. When the extent of the trap failure became apparent, the Fishery Board Lastily rescinded its prohibition with a view to permit trawling. Except for the few who had gone provided with trawls and boats sufficiently seaworthy to get to trawling grounds, the

action of the Board was too late. A catastrophe of the nature of this year's failure must be provided against. It is up to the fishermen suppliers and merchants acquainted with the fishery to canvas the sitution thoroughly and evolve an intelligent policy, as the policy of the Fishcry Board has absolutely failed.





Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,-In the streets of St. John's, and doubtless throughout the Island, the principal topic of conversation is the failure of the Labrador Fishery. But is this a correct statement of the problem? Have the fisheries failed? I doubt it. Is it not rather a failure of method? The codfish are still there in countless myriads beyond doubt; it is only we that have failed to find them. For some reason or other the fish failed to come in on the shore and be caught. They persisted in staying in the deep water, and our fishermen, who were fitted out with traps only, were powerless to catch them. Too much dependence has hitherto been placed in traps, and there has been too much sitting round on the rocks waiting for the cod to walk ashore, so to speak. Of the merits and demerits of traps I do not intend to speak, beyond stating the obvious fact that traps are useless in deep water. The incursion of the western bankers on the Labrador has taught the regular Labradorman a lesson. For the past few years when the bankers were going down to fish and getting splendid catches, the Labrador vessels were returning home, many of them with little or nothing. Trawls and fresh bait were abundantly suc cessful where traps failed entirely.

One would suppose that the next season all the Labrador vessels would have taken a fit-out of trawls. On the contrary, a peti tion was got up to prevent the use of trawls on the Labrador coast; the Fishery Board supported that petition, and the Government is sued a Proclamation to that effect. The Board of Trade protested at such mischievous legislation, but all in vain. The successful trawls were prohibited and the unsuccessful traps were continued. But this season had no sooner begun and the traps again seen to be unsuccessful than a cry for trawls and bait went up all along the shore, and the Fishery Board was forced hastily and ignominously to rescind their recent regulation. But those who were able to avail themselves of this tardy permission were few, and the fishery has

We are told that trawling can never be a successful method on the Labrador because there is very little bait to be had there. There were very few caplin on the coast in 1909, and this year, I am told they have failed entirely to appear. So far as I have been able to find out, this has happened several times before. For periods of greater or lesser duration caplin appear to have deserted the coast Why they come to the shore some seasons and not others has never been satisfactorily explained. And, by the by, what numbers of unsolved problems connected with our fisheries confront us on every side! More shame to us! It is hardly probable that we could do anything in the matter even if we did know, but if bait is a necessity and there are no caplin, we must get something else. About this time last year I discussed the matter with a western banking skipper and he told me that he already had his bait provided for this year liaving secured a supply of salted squid. Others tell me that salted squid is no good for bait. I should not have supposed that a hungry codfish nosed round sampling the tempting morsels offered him, and I should like to see a trawl baited with fresh and salt squid alternately and to find out the result in codfish.

Is it the salt that codfish object to? Or is the appearance of the squid so altered that they do not recognize their favourite dish? But if fresh squid are the best bait, perhaps a solution of the matter can be found. The Fish Food Export Co., of which the Hon. John Harris is President and Mr. Sellars, Secretary, have in troduced the drying of squid for export to China and Japan, where it is esteemed as an article of food. I think this will prove a valuable adjunct to our fishery and add a tidy sum to the income of our fishermen. It occurred to me that this dried squid might be utilized for bait, and I obtained from Mr. Sellars a few squid and put them to soak in a bucket of salt water. In a few hours they had become soft and to all appearances newly caught squid. I got some practical fishermen to examine them, and their verdict is that it is as good looking bait as any codfish could desire. Is it not possible, therefore, that this dried squid may prove a solution of the bait problem on the

Labrador and elsewhere? Mr. Sellars tells me that they are very easily prepared, requir ing only a day or two drying in the sun and making principally in bulk. I hear that there is an abundance of squid in Conception Bay, and I would suggest that all hands set to work and jig squid. Mr. Sellars, I am sure, will be glad to tell how best to preserve them. If the fishermen will do this for their own sakes, I suggest that the Government should authorize the Board of Trade to obtain a supply sufficient to test thoroughly next season whether or no dried squid will make good bait. With bait I believe codfish can always be procured on the Labrador. With its immense archipelago of islands, and range of banks outside the islands, there are about 16,000 square miles of potential fishing grounds on the Labrador coast. A square mile for every fisherman going to the Labrador, and yet they

have been quarrelling about trap berths! For the past four or five years I have urged all the Labradormen with whom I have anything to do, not to depend so entirely up-on traps but to fit themselves out with trawls. When they have done so they have succeeded in getting good fares. And if the bait problem can be solved by dried squid, at least another means—and the best means—of taking codfish will be available for our Labrador Tramway, the roads being in such Yours truly,

was enunciated by Christ centuries ago, and known as the Sermon on the Mount. In his work on "What believe" he writes:-"I believe that true happiness will only be possible when men begin to follow Christ's doctrine. "I believe that the fulfilment of this doctrine is easy, possible, and conducive to happiness. "I believe that, even if it be left unfulfilled by all around me, if I have to stand alone among men, I cannot do otherwise than follow it, in order to save my own life from inevitable destruction." Tolstoy's interpretation of the doctrine of Christ may not meet the approval of all; but in the main he has built on a sure foundation, at least as far as life on earth is concerned. The key to his teaching seems to be that men must adopt the Sermon on the Mount as a workable moral code; they must believe in it absolutely; they must live consistently with that belief. If society is pursuing evil principles, you know the right principles must renounce society, and live what you believe to be right for your own life. He insists upon individuality rather than collectivity, believing that a little leaven is ultimately capable of leavening the whole lump. The cardinal points of individual conduct are (1) Avoidance of anger; (2) Purity of sex relationship; (3) Avoidance of oaths and pledges; (4) Evil is not to be resisted by violence; (5) Equal love to all men, even to foreigners and enemies.

If any fault is to be found with Tolstoy's teaching it is that he insists too much on the "glory to be revealed in us," and ignores the glory that now is. But it is so easy to find fault with the noblest of characters. When criticism has spent its force upon the teaching of the great reformer all men must admit that he is a sublime and lofty spirit working for the intellectual, spiritual and social advancement of the great human race that still carries in its blood so much that bears the stamp of our weak and struggling humanity.
