Paris. March 25—Two hundred and forty thousand dollars annually is the minimum on which a countess can live decently in this country, judging by the suit just brought against her two sons by the Countess de Perredon, a member of one of the oldest families of the French aristocracy.

The countess resides at the Chateau de la Roche-Zencay, and essents that her diminished revenues are insufficient to allow her to keep up the traditions of her patrician lineage, especially in view of the increased cost of living. She is, therefore, suing her sons for the allowance of \$240,000, asserting that as sole heirs of the late Lichel Pasha, director general of the Turkish lighthouses, they are well able to afford it.




