The other day an important judg-ment was given in this case for the plaintiffs, represented by Winter & Winter, and against the defendants,

Defendant Co. pleaded that the plain-tiffs' agents, R. G. Ash & Co., had signed a form by which they agreed to the conditions endorsed on the telegram. These conditions absolved the Telegranh Co. from liability for widow who had lost her husband in the telegram. These conditions absolved the Telegraph Co. from liability for such errors, however arising. Plain-tiffs contended that the conditions were unreasonable and therefore void, amounting in effect to a refusal to send telegrams except on conditions unjust and onerous to the senders.
