

GROWING.

LONDON, May 81. Rumours of impending revolt are steadily growing in Berlin and there are indications that the headquarters of the new revolutionary movement are at Potsdam where Prince August William, son of the former Emperor William, is staying. He is regarded as the leader of the mi'itary party, says a despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Co. Advices from Doorn, where the former Emperor is now living, declare William Hohenzollern is in high hopes of a successful coup and believes he will once more become ruler of the German Empire, the despatch says.

WILL SUPPORT GOVERNMENT.

BERLIN. May 31. Commanders of the garrison of reater Berlin visited the Minister of Defense to-day and took the oath that they and their corps were ready to against any attempted coup whether rom the right or left.

THE TURKISH TREATY.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 31. The full text of the Turkish treaty is expected to reach Constantinople within two or three days. In the meanime Turkish papers are making clear their view that no Government dare sign the treaty without modification. It is generally believed here that failure of the Turks to sign would result in a movement of Greek forces from Smyrna toward the interior of

LONDON, May 31. Gregory Krassin, Russian Soviet Minister for Trade and Commerce, and his fellow commissioners now in London have remained men of mystery thus far during their visit here. They are secluded in a quiet-hotel grequented chiefly by business men from the Provinces, and in accordance with conditions arranged previous to their coming, they are refusing to see newspaper men or even representatives of the business world who wish information protect the constitution by force or desire to present plans for trade with Russia. The London newspapers which are against any negotiations with the Soviet movement are continuing to protest against the admission of Krassin and his collaborators and against the proposal for a meeting between them and Lloyd George and Lord Curzon, the foreign secretary.

BUDOPEST, May 31. (Associated Press).—A warrant for the arrest of Count Michael Karolyi, former Provisional President of Hungary, has been issued by the commandant of the military tribunal. Count Karolyi is charged with having instigated murder and with acting against the National defense.





The Virtue of a Comma.

Small and insignificant though the comma looks, its absence in ancient times made it possible for the pagan oracles to reap a golden harvest on predictions which "never failed." because they could be interpreted any way the event happened to fall out.

For example: "Pyrrhus I tell you the Romans will conquer." If the comma is placed after "you." the meaning is that the Romans will conquer. Poor Pyrrhus, however, put a meaning upon the sentence as if the comma had been after "tell." and this gave him the idea that the oracle meant that he would conquer. He didn't.

Even after the introduction of commas and other modern punctuction marks—the memorial—English lawyers in the Middle Ages, down as far as the time of the famous Blackstone less than two centuries ago, made it a point never to punctuate pleadings or other important documents. They knew that a comma, one way or another would change the meaning and fearing they might place the comma in the wrong part of the sentence, they

eschewed its use altogether. True, it was not always a matter of punctuation that gave the ancient oracles their dual meaning. This frequently depended upon the grammatical construction of the sentence, which no possible kind of punctuation could

How the Oracle was Verified.

Those who are familiar with the story of the chaste Lucrece know in what manner the cracle was verified, when Brutus, chasing the Tarquins out of the city, ended once for all the kingship of Rome and established republican form of Government.

Another famous oracular saving which was misunderstood until the moment when it was verified was that given to the great Theban general, Epaminondas. He was the man of whom history speaks, as one who would never tell a lie. In the case of Epaminondas this love of truth was carried to so sublime a height that he would not even tell a lie in jest.

But to return to the oracle. He had peen told never to trust himself to Pelagos. Now Pelagos in Greek means sea, and, believing that the oracle meant to warn him against ever trying the fortunes of war at sea, took great pains to avoid any sea conflict. with his country's hereditary foe Sparta.

During the most famous of the bat tles against the Spartans, the battle of Mantinea, the fighting led into a troyed was his own. But in justice to forest, where Epaminondas fell morta!ly wounded while performing prodigies of valor. He lived just long enough to discover that the name of the forest was Pelagos.

The Ex-President of Mexico.

Since February 23, 1913, when President Madero was murdered, Mexico, for the most part, has been in a chronic state of revolution. The populace has been given over to factions that have carried on a guerrilla warfare, destroving one another and ruining the industries and the commerce of the

After a brief lull, the storm again rages, and the control of the Government of the country is again being fought for. The constitution provides that this is to be decided by the ballot box. That is the theory; the practice is to decide it by the rifle.

After the murder of Madero, power was seized by General Huerta. Two months later civil war broke out, and a little more than a year later Huerta resigned. Then General Carranza came to the front and formed a government. In May, 1917, an election was held and Carranza was declared elected. His government has never known peace and now it is the storm-centre of another revolution that threatens to upset everything, so far as there is anything established in Mexico.

General Venustiano Carranza was born 60 years ago in the City of Cuatro Cienegas. His father had been a coionel in the Mexican army.



New Fire Trucks Arrive.

Crowds of people visited the Red Cross pier this morning to inspect the two new trucks which arrived by the Rosalind for the fire department. The apparatus may be described as a combination chemical engine and hose truck. It is a substantial affair. 6 cylinder, 105 horse-power and giant cord, 9 inch pneumatic tires. The equipment is complete with all the latest fire fighting appliances and includes 1.000 feet of 21/4 inch water hose, 200 feet chemical hose, 2 chemical tanks of 40 gallons each capacity, 12 ft. roof ladder, 20 ft. extension ladder, a number of hand extinguishers, siren horn and a 9 inch searchlight. One of the trucks will be stationed at the Central Fire Hall. and will respond to calls from all over the city: the other will be used in the West End only. Inspector General Hutchings deserves credit for this valuable and modern addition to our fire fighting apparatus.

LOUTH, England, May 31. Twenty seven bodies of those who lost their lives. A Hint to Mr. Mullaly.

Editor Evening Telegram

Dear Sir,-I am, indeed, pleased to observe that some steps have at last been taken with regard to providing pedestrians with certain roads whereon they may enjoy themselves without being subjected to the dangers and discomforts occasioned by motor traf-

I note that in bringing the Resolu-

tions before the Council, Mr. Mullally has expressed the desire of first obtaining the opinions of the public before finalizing matters, and being one of the latter I take this opportunity of expressing a few views on the sabject. It is proposed to allot to the East End the road which encircles the lake of Quidi Vidi. I quite agree with this and think that it is a very happy selection; for, besides being by far the most popular walk in that vicinity this road is of a fine generous length, measuring some three miles in its entire extent. On seeking as to how the West End is provided for in this connection, I am amazed to observe that the selected area is that portion of the Southside Road which runs from Job's Bridge to Syme's Bridge. Now unless there has been a mistake and the word Syme's substituted for Waterford, then the idea is ridiculous in the extreme. All West Enders know that the entire length of the piece of road mentioned is in all about three hundred yards, a paltry two minutes walk, and situated more in the town than in the country. As a walk for pedestrians, unless they wish to do sentry beat from one end to the other, it is utterly and absolutely useless. The road West Enders want is that portion of the Southside Road which runs from Job's Bridge to Waterford Bridge. This is the route that some hundreds of pedestrians use every Sunday and holiday and is only a proper equivalent to the road around Quidi Vidi. The scarcity of motorists on the Southside Road shows that they could easily dispense with it, and this can be easily understood when it is seen that there are at least three other parallel roads in the

In penning the above, not only do I wishes of all the West End pedestrians, and if Mr. Mullally and the other City Fathers wish to please the people and do the proper thing in this matter: a little investigation will convince them that only by doing as I have suggested will they accomplish this end.

Cup Challenger Takes the Water

CITY ISLAND, N.Y., May 26.—Si Thomas Lipton's challenger for the America's Cup was launched here at high tide to-night, at the yards of Robert Jacob, where she has been since last November. The green racer, with Sir Thomas Lipton's private signal and the burgee of the Royal Ulster Club proudly flying in the evening breeze, slid down the ways and hit the water at 7.15 p.m. As she took her first plunge since she has been altered from an extreme scow to a more conventional racing machine, her crew and the representatives of Sir Thomas sent up a cheer. They all were of the opinion that Shamrock IV. is the most dangerous yacht that ever has come after the America's Cup.

At the launching were Colonel Duncan F. D. Neill, the yachting representative of the Irish challenger: Charles H. Nicholson, who designed the craft; William P. Burton, the amateur skipper, who will race Shamrock IV.; Mrs. Burton, his wife, who is able to stand a trick at the wheel as well as any man; Claude Hickman, who will navigate Shamrock IV.; Amelius Jarvis of Toronto. Canada, one of the best known yachtsmen in the Dominion; and a half doezn others, all deeply interested in the success of the Irish

craft.

As she slipped down the ways to-night, Shamrock IV. looked an entirely different yacht from the one that arrived from England in August, 1919. The yacht's bow and under-body have been changed so much that she never would be recognized by vachtsmen who saw the craft six vears ago. Six tons of lead have been cut off the foreward part of her fin and "lagged" to the bottom of the keel. The bow has been changed from a scow to lines re sembling an extreme racing cutter All agree that she has been wonde fully improved.

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According to Colonel Neill, the mast of Shamrock IV. will be stepped to-morrow. Regardless of the accident to the built-up hollow wooden mast on Resolute, off New Haven, on Saturday, those in charge of Shamrock IV. are going ahead with their original plans and will step a somewhat similarly built-up wooden spar. Designer Nicholson stated that the Shamrock spar was a much heavier and stronger one than the mast Resolute lost. It was not a "pole mast, he said, but a conventiona one with a top-mast added. He does not expect to have any trouble with the stick. Although work will be rushed on the craft, it is doubtful if Shamrock IV. will be under sail much before next Tuesday.

LONDON GOSSIP.

LONDON, April 26, 1920. The first was secured when the late Queen had not been long upon her Throne; the second when she was closely approaching her jubilee; and each was hailed in turn as a tangible proof of prosperous progress along the paths of peace. It is true that, during the war, when all of us shrugged our shoulders over additional imposts, and vowed we would cheerfully bear them all as the price of victory, no one much troubled that the charges for both letters and telegrams went up fifty per cent. There is a difference, however, when the fifty per cent. becomes cent for cent twelve months after the Peace Treaty was signed. Lord Rosebery, in his younger and more brilliant days, discoursed to the Royal Academy in annual banquet assembled on the penny as a humble but heavy coin, and yet a unit of price which brought blessings in its train, the penny post and the penny press being instanced in proof of his submission. There is no longer a penny post, and virtually no longer a penny press; and as the twopenny piece went out of existence in mid-Victorian times, there is no longer even that humble but decidedly heavy coin to inspire the dithyrambics of a later Lord Rosebery.

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
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
