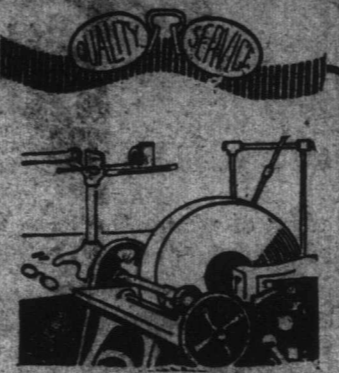

PUBLIC NOTICE. POLL TAX.

The attention of the Public is called to the following sections of the St. John's Municipal Act, 1921:

Section 249.—"Every male person of the age of twenty-one years or upwards who has resided in the city for the period of twelve months immediately preceding the first day of October in any year, and who is not liable as owner or indirectly as tenant to the payment of the City Tax on any property rated in the 'assessment book of the Council' at an annual rental value of 'forty dollars or upwards, shall 'pay to the City a Poll Tax of 'Five Dollars per annum.

Section 250.—"The said Poll Tax shall 'be due and payable without demand or notice by or from the 'Council between the fifteenth day of October and the fifteenth day of November in every year, at 'the office of the City Clerk.

Section 251.—"Any person who fails 'to comply with the provisions of 'the foregoing section shall, in 'addition to payment of the tax, 'be liable to a penalty not exceeding five dollars, or in default of payment to imprisonment not exceeding ten days."

The Danger of Open Diplomacy.

London Press Considers too Much Publicity Given--Washington Conference to Deal With Naval Matters--International Problem of Unemployment--Canadian Minister to Washington Unwise Move.

NAVAL DISARMAMENT.
GENEVA, Sept. 19. The final report of the League of Nations Committee on disarmament, given out here to-day, states that the Washington Conference, in the Committee's view, will be better able to deal with Naval Disarmament, since this may best be accomplished through common agreement among the great powers.

ANOTHER TELEGRAM.
LONDON, Sept. 19. Eamon De Valera telegraphed to Premier Lloyd George to-day in response to the Premier's last message, as follows: "We have had no thought at any time of asking you to accept any conditions precedent to Conference. We would have thought it as reasonable to expect you as a preliminary to recognize the Irish Republic, formally or informally, as that you should expect us, formally or informally, to surrender our national position. It is precisely because neither side accepts the position of the other that there is dispute at all, and that Conference is necessary to search for and discuss such adjustments as might compose it. A treaty of accommodation and association, properly concluded between the people of these two islands, and between Ireland and the group of states in the British Commonwealth would, we believe, end dispute for ever, and enable the two nations to settle down in peace, each pursuing its own individual development and contributing its own quota to civilization by working together in free and friendly co-operation in affairs of common concern. To negotiate such a treaty representative of the two

nations must meet, but if you seek to impose preliminary conditions, which we must regard as involving the surrender of our whole position, they cannot meet. Your last telegram makes it clear that misunderstandings are more likely to increase than diminish, and the cause of peace is more likely to be retarded than advanced by continuance of present correspondence. We request you, therefore, to state whether your letter of September 8th is intended to be a demand or a surrender on our part, or an invitation to a conference, free on both sides, and without prejudice, should an agreement not be reached. If the latter, we readily confirm our acceptance of the invitation, and our appointed delegates will meet your Government representative at any time in the immediate future that you designate."

OPEN DIPLOMACY.
LONDON, Sept. 19. Eamon De Valera, Irish Republican leader, after a meeting of his Cabinet to-day, sent another telegram to Mr. Lloyd George. The nature of the message from De Valera necessitated further exchange of telegrams, unless some form of ultimatum is forthcoming. Many of the London papers have commented on the danger of "open diplomacy" involved in this public exchange of messages, which they point out makes it exceedingly difficult for either side to recede from the position adopted.

CYCLONE OFF HAVRE.
HAVRE, Sept. 19. A cyclone struck the steamer La Savole during the night of September 14-15, causing considerable damage to the upper deck, wreckage of the wire-

less antennae, carrying away two lifeboats, and injuring two sailors, the vessel's officers reported to-day. The steamer, which arrived here at noon to-day, twelve hours overdue, was compelled to run before the wind for eighteen hours.

THE TRAIL OF THE CYCLONE.
NEW YORK, Sept. 19. A cyclonic storm, lasting more than six hours, with wind blowing at eighty miles an hour, was encountered by the steamship Baltic in mid-Atlantic last Wednesday, officers of the vessel said on arrival here to-day. The Baltic was compelled to slow down. Weather Bureau officials say the storm was the cyclonic disturbance which originated in the West Indies early in the month and moved Northward.

THE PROBLEM OF UNEMPLOYMENT.

LONDON, Sept. 19. A scheme presented by the Lloyd George Government for alleviating unemployment in England, has aroused criticism, not because it is wrong in principle, but on account of its inadequacy. Local boards of authority for relief are promised British Treasury assistance, mainly in reduction of interest rates on loans from the Government. These local boards, who are definitely and directly responsible for alleviation, say that this assistance will provide only enough work to touch the margin of the vast unemployment in the United Kingdom. Nevertheless it is evident that the volume of unemployment is very slowly but undoubtedly decreasing. J. H. Thomas, General Secretary of the National Union of Railwaymen, has again declared that a general strike as a panacea for unemployment, as advocated in some quarters, would be merely ludicrous, and other kinds of social upheaval would be equally fallacious. Mr. Thomas declares that the problem of unemployment is an international one and requires international solution.

WISE WORDS OF WARNING.

TORONTO, Sept. 19. In an article on British statesmanship from a Canadian point of view to the Canadian Club to-day, Sir Geo. Parkin sounded a note of warning over the proposed appointment of a Canadian Minister to Washington. Sir George said "we have only to consider whether the move is a wise one from a Canadian point of view. Of this I have grave doubts. The example of Canada would almost certainly be followed by the Australian Dominions, possibly also by South Africa. It would certainly be followed by Ireland if that country is given Dominion status as the result of negotiations now going on. To anyone who knows Washington the prospect of having a number of minor embassies there, each working for its own ends in great diplomatic negotiations, which need behind them the full force of the United Empire, is not altogether a satisfying or pleasant prospect."

RAILWAY TRAGEDY IN NORWAY.

CHRISTIANA, Sept. 19. The opening of the new Dover Railway in Christiania and Province yesterday was marked by a serious accident to a train carrying guests of the occasion, which was wrecked at midnight, while returning from Trondheim, six persons being killed and a large number of others injured.

INTERNATIONAL BALLOON RACE.

LONDON, Sept. 19. The first of the balloons to get away in the James Gordon Bennett International Race, which started yesterday afternoon from Brussels, was heard from this morning. This was the Ban-shee, an English entrant piloted by Baldwin. The message said the Ban-shee had landed at Sarmar, near Carmarthen in Wales.

DYNAMITES CAPTURED.

CHICAGO, Sept. 19. Fourteen hundred sticks of dynamite, three inches in diameter and ten inches long, and one hundred sticks of T.N.T., were seized to-day by the police, following the capture of five dynamites in the act of bombing a shoe repair shop. One of the prisoners was shot, inside, by the police, who had surrounded the shop for 10 hours, following a mysterious tip that it was to be bombed.

TWO ENTERIES FOR DEFENDER.

GLOUCESTER, Sept. 19. The United States Race Committee, which is in charge of the selection of the Defender for the International Fishermen's trophy, won at Halifax last year by the Gloucester vessel Esperanto, had received two entries to-day for the elimination race set for October 19th. The schooner Ralph Brown, which sails out of Gloucester, and the Josephine D'Costa, a Boston vessel, were the nominees. Each has a reputation for speed in trips to the Banks and back. The Committee plans to hold only one race, over the course of forty miles.

SUB IN TROUBLE.

MIAMI, Fla., Sept. 16. A wireless message from submarine R47, saying she was in distress at a point 100 miles northeast of Nassau, was received to-day by Ensign W. H. Kiepproth, commanding sub chaser 184 flying here. The message was sent broadcast it was thought.

Extortionate Rents.

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir--Please allow me space in your highly esteemed paper to offer a few observations on house rent which is enormously high. Why this is we do not know, and we are practically on the horns of a dilemma in trying to find out. In a great number of cases rents have been put up since the war, yet lumber and other building material has dropped considerably, almost to pre-war prices. Yet extortionate rents prevail. When landlords raise the rate by \$2 and \$4 per month on houses that have been built for over twenty years, and practically no repairs whatever put on them during that period, such an action is outrageous. Personally I consider it trying to squeeze the life-blood out of the workmen who occupy these houses. The landlords when asked why they are piling on tell us that it is because the Council is taxing them so high that they in turn have to tax the occupants. Now surely we are not dealing with a Council of that type. If we are it is time to root them out by every means in our power, and get rid of the men who compose it. I am here voicing the sentiments of the workmen and we shall demand a public explanation from the party or parties responsible for the all too rapid and radical increase in rental rates. Let me quote a case where a house was let for \$10 per month for June and July, when the family moved out of it into another house, and that same house was afterwards let to another tenant for \$15 per month. In another case somewhat similar the rent was advanced \$3 per month, and no repairs effected. For the sake of the suffering humanity compelled to live in rented houses, why not stop this practice before it goes beyond the patience and toleration of houseless people, who may be driven to extremes if conditions as described continue much longer. I do not intend to trespass any further on your valuable space. Mr. Editor, at present but before closing may I say that the Workers are asking for an explanation in public from the real responsible parties, and mean to get it.

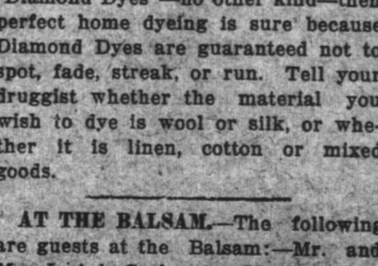

The Care of the Blind.

In his final article on the care of the Blind, Major Howley makes an appeal which cannot remain unanswered. In well reasoned sentences he shows us how not only the afflicted, themselves, but the State, benefits from the course of training which the blind will receive from the institution which will shortly be opened. Instead of remaining useless encumbrances on the community, by means of this institution the blind will become valuable members of the State. Not only will they be taught to make use of those senses which are unaffected, but they will be enabled to become self-supporting and incidentally, to contribute to the upkeep of the State. Major Howley deserves the thanks of the whole community for his able exposition of the condition of our blind, and the means whereby this condition may be bettered. In a clear and concise manner he has told us what we ought to do and surely, he does not ask too much of us. The institution for the blind has been successfully launched. It would be an eternal disgrace if we failed not only to keep it in existence, as it is, but to further the ambitious project outlined by Major Howley to the best of our ability. There is probably no physical handicap greater than blindness, and if we can in any way alleviate the distress of those afflicted, then we have done something which we need never regret. All who can, should contribute in some way towards the scheme which Major Howley outlined in his fourth article, for we must not forget that by helping to make the blind useful citizens, we are helping our country and consequently ourselves; and whilst sympathetic toward all philanthropic causes in other countries let us not forget that "charity begins at home."

A heavy N.E. gale was blowing and the sea which it threw up raked the vessel fore and aft, carrying off all movable goods, the decks and tearing the sails to shreds. Beside all this, the Gaspe sprung a bad leak and the crew had to man the pumps to keep her afloat. The gale died down considerably on Saturday night and the vessel managed to make port without assistance. The Gaspe arrived at James Baird, Ltd., with a molasses cargo and is now berthed at Tessler's premises. There, she has to be pumped every half hour to keep her free.

Reports from various places where the special fall pack is now going on say that it takes between 300 and 300 lobsters to make up a case.

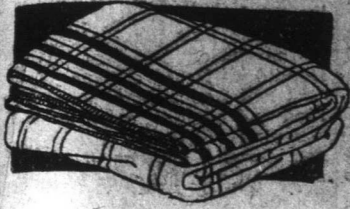

Poultry Ass'n Meets.

PREPARING FOR ANNUAL EXHIBIT. Several matters in connection with the annual exhibition were discussed at last night's meeting of the Poultry Association which was under the chairmanship of Vice President Calver.

The meeting decided upon various matters such as cups, prizes, and other details, and finalized the conditions in reference to the Florida's Exhibit, which will be on a larger scale this year. It is proposed to have several classes: (1) a table of flowering or foliage plants from each competitor, (2) a table of cut chrysanthemums, (3) bouquet of flowers, (4) vase of cut flowers, (5) flowering plant, (6) foliage plant, (7) best collection of vegetables grown by exhibitor—space on a table of 3 1/2 x 3 feet to be provided for same. A silver cup will be awarded to the exhibitor winning the highest number of points on flowers and vegetables—first prize being a Blue Ribbon counting as three points, second a red ribbon as one point. Arrangements are being made to have the flowers in the G.L.B. gymnasium and the vegetables on the main floor.

A model poultry house with a pen of pure bred fowl will be a feature of the show, feed and hoppers included and all will be sold at the show. The Newfoundland Poultry Association are working hard to have another successful exhibition on November 30th, December 1st and 2nd.

Now that the Normal School, which has been such a great necessity in the proper training of new teachers, has been inaugurated, it is to be hoped that it will meet with the support it deserves, and that before very long a building devoted solely to the school will be furnished.

Shoving the Queer.

Spurious five cent pieces have made their appearance in the city, says the Sydney Record of Sept. 15. A specimen of the counterfeit piece was handed in to The Record on Wednesday and it proved to be remarkably similar to the genuine coin. The only difference is that the counterfeit is slightly larger and much lighter than the genuine coin. The lettering and design are larger than those on the genuine piece, in proportion to its size. The coin is also thinner than the silver coin and does not give off a metallic ring when dropped, having evidently been made of some alloy. On the whole, however, it bears a remarkable resemblance to the genuine, and its bogus character cannot be detected without close scrutiny. It is hard to conceive that there are many in circulation for it would take thousands to make the passing of the coins, by counterfeiters, a paying proposition and worth the risk of detection. (Chances are that this spurious bit of coin will be making its appearance in Newfoundland soon. Dealers should therefore keep careful lookout for them.—Telegram.)

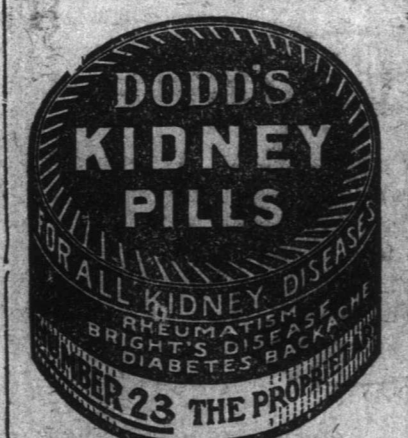
Gives Exhibition.

FOUR ST. JOHN'S RUNNERS WILL BE IN WANDEBERR'S SPORTS AND BELL WILL START IN HERALD RACE.

Fred Phelan, Tom Butler and Harvey Skirving, in charge of Manager Mrs. Goodland, left St. John's, Newfoundland, yesterday, for Halifax, to compete in the Wanderers' sports Saturday. John Bell, St. John's marathon runner, is expected in Halifax early this morning with A. E. Thomas, who is representing the Newfoundland Athletic Association. The Newfoundland athletes were given a big send off and their supporters expect them to make a good showing against the best Maritime athletes who will start in the Wanderers' sports.

Phelan and Butler will compete in the sprints and Skirving will run in the one and five mile events. Bell will start in the five mile run and will remain in Halifax for the Herald Marathon.

The St. John's athletes are all travelling the overland route, as Bell was ill from the effects of the ocean trip last year and could not do his best in the Herald race. Elaborate preparations are being made in Halifax to receive the athletes from the Old Colony, as Newfoundland sports are hard to beat when it comes to hospitality.

The Newfoundlanders will be up against the best runners in the east, as already the stars of every worth while town and city in the Maritimes have entered for next Saturday's events, and the marathons will be usual in the Herald race, the classic of the east. President George W. B. Ayre, of the Newfoundland Athletic Association, wired the Herald sports editor that the Nfld. runners would wear black and white colors.—Halifax Herald, Sept. 17.

Bell's Entry Scaring Our Canadian Cousins.

We have been privileged to quote the following account from a letter received by a former resident of Halifax but now engaged in business in St. John's:—
"I note some of the St. John's athletes purpose entering our sports on next Saturday. You can be assured we will look out for them as some of the members of the club have very pleasant memories of their hockey trip, and the many kindnesses received at the hands of Tobin, Chessman, the Herders, and Billy Higgins. We are going to have fast stuff in our entries though, as those who competed in the A.A.A. sports at St. John a few days ago will be talking part. They come from all parts of the Provinces, Charlottetown, Pictou, Sussex, Stellarton, Truro, and the Sydneys, and are full of pep and out for blood. St. John's will therefore have to produce very classy stuff. In the A.A.A. Championship the 100 yards was clipped off in 10.4-5; the 200 yards in 25.50; the half mile in 2.3-5; and the mile by Grant Holmes of Halifax in 4.54. Bell's entry is putting the wind up in some of the lads. In the 5 mile at St. John poor old Ally Rodgers (who won the Road Race last year) had to be satisfied with a good second place to Norval Lambert of the St. John Y.M.C.A. However the old Ally is still perched in the 10 mile Road Race. As requested I will look out for those whom you mention in your letter and will see that they are steered straight. I am sorry you are not sending up a walker, as from your recent letter I take it that you have some good ones down there. Cooper of our club won the A.A.A. 2 mile in 18 mins. 47.3-5 secs, which was good going over a poor track."
The National Sport Committee held a meeting on Saturday to consider way and means as regards the financing of A.A.A. runners now at Halifax. It will be remembered that the object of the formation of the Committee was primarily to procure funds wherewith to send Jack Bell to Halifax to compete in the Halifax Road Race. The Sports' Meet netted roughly about seven hundred dollars, five hundred of which will be absorbed by Bell and his trainer. Subsequently it was felt that if funds warranted it would be desirable to give our sprinters and miler a chance, and the Committee felt confident that if Skirving, Butler, and Phelan were sent that the public would be behind the project. The total expenses of the six Newfoundlanders now in Halifax will run into twelve or thirteen hundred dollars, and for the purpose of acquiring the outstanding five hundred dollars permission was secured from the Justice Department to inaugurate a sweepstake on the winning time of the Road Race, \$500 being awarded the lucky holder of the ticket, with a consolation prize of \$200 on either side. A whirlwind campaign is being instituted, and those of our citizens who love clean sport are asked to kindly cooperate in the sale. The price of the tickets is one dollar each.

The Wisconsin faction, with which the husband is in sympathy, is fighting Ward for control of the city organization.

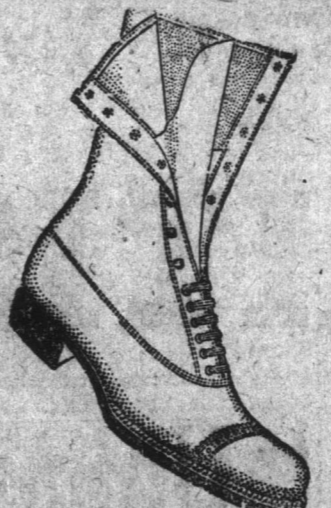

The Invisible Government

Editor Evening Telegram. Dear Sir.—President Wilson, in his book, speaks of the "invisible Government" which is the real Government that controls the so-called Government. Now, seeing that Mr. Wilson was, for a long time, head of the so-called Government, we must suppose that Mr. Wilson had good reason for calling those gentlemen behind the screen the "invisible Government." No doubt Mr. Wilson, like nearly all other Government leaders, was forced on more than one occasion to act in obedience to the orders of the "invisible Government." But it is not only in America that this "invisible Government" is to be found, and the truth of this statement is clearly seen by the following instance which proves to the hilt who is the "invisible Government" of this country.

The so-called Government made a "contract" with the railroad company, and it was stipulated in that "contract" that a manager would be brought in to manage the railroad; and that this man was to be a Government man to look after the interest of the Government, and brought in by Government request. Now the first thing the Government knew, although the Government knew, although the Government was supposed to be the "invisible Government" of this province, I think, conclusively who is the ruling power in Newfoundland politics. Mr. Morgan, we understand, is a man of exceptional ability, which alone is sufficient reason why he made such a short stay amongst us. Had he been a man who knew but little about practical railroading, he would in all probability be here now. You know, Mr. Editor, that no man feels comfortable when he has another man working under him who knows more about the job than himself; and whenever an official finds out that there is a man in his department who he suspects knows more than himself—he's got to go. This not only applies to our railroad—it applies to all fields of human activity.

It is true that Mr. Morgan wasn't here long enough to demonstrate his railroad ability fully; but he did enough to gain the confidence of all the railroad boys who are desirous of seeing the railroad put on a paying basis. It is true that Mr. Morgan got after the higher officials good and hard. He thought that there were a good many officials, drawing big money, whom the road could do without; and I understand that he proposed to let off this useless parasitical cortège, which is sapping the life's blood out of the railroad, and therefore out of the people of Newfoundland. Prior to Mr. Morgan's coming, there was a feeling amongst the public that our railroad problem would never be solved, and that things would go along in the same old rut as usual, but after his arrival, and after he began to make some badly needed changes, there was created immediately a feeling of confidence, and one could hear on all sides favourable comment.

I am of opinion that had Mr. Morgan remained here, with full power to put his ideas into practice, the Government would have regained much of its lost prestige, and in a few months there would have been little room for criticism. We are now in a more hopeless state than before, because all the time there was room for the hope that some one would be brought in here who would lift the road out of the old rut, but now we know that no one can come in here, and stay, if he is capable of doing this, because he will know too much for the man above him, and this will never do, even though the country must pay \$1,500,000 on account of it.

Newfoundland Freights Picking Up.

Kyle and Sable I. Being Tared to Capacity. Freight for Newfoundland, which has been rather scarce at this time, is beginning to pick up. The North Sydney Herald of Sept. 17, and it is expected that during the next two months the shipments to the colony will be quite large. Parvaneh & Co.'s steamer Sable I. which sails for St. John's this afternoon, will carry a capacity cargo of some 24 cars, but this amount will not take care of the available freight which is now offering for shipment by the steamer. Some 40 cars of freight which the ship has been unable to handle are left behind, and from now on it is expected that there will be considerably more offered than she can adequately handle in two weeks to come. The situation as far as shipments by the Reid Co.'s steamer Kyle shows a most decided improvement this week. The steamer on her last trip carried eight cars. Additional freight is arriving continually, and at the present time there are in the railway yards some twenty cars which will be shipped when she sails for Port au Basques this evening. More cars are expected to arrive and it is anticipated that for the first time this year the Kyle will sail leaving behind a quantity of freight which she will be unable to find space for in her hold.

Get Away With \$30,000.

TO-DAY'S MESSAGES.

OPEN TO BUSINESS.
BELFAST, Sept. 20.—The Parliament of Northern Ireland opened its autumn session here to-day with a full attendance of members. Neither Nationalists nor Sinn Feiners, who hold a total of 12 seats, were in attendance. The session was held in the building which was formerly the Belfast College of the Presbyterian Church. The main business of the day was a motion to approve the purchase of Stormont Castle, as the site of the new parliament buildings. A select committee also was named to consider the question of resumption of Cabinet ministers.

THE DOOR KEPT OPEN.
LONDON, Sept. 19.—Premier Lloyd George had before him to-day at Galrioch, Scotland, the Sinn Fein suggestion that representatives of the British cabinet meet Sinn Fein delegates in conference, untrammelled by conditions. The latest note exchanged between the Premier and Eamon De Valera, sent yesterday by the Sinn Fein leader to Lloyd George, did not, however, except possibly by implication, withdraw the offending paragraph of the Sinn Fein note of September 12, in which sovereignty of the Irish state was asserted, and which led Lloyd George to cancel his invitation to a conference. As viewed here, the latest Sinn Fein note was conciliatory in character, and it seemed to place upon the Premier a choice of holding a free conference or insisting that Southern Ireland formally express its allegiance to the British Crown.

It was generally believed that the note sent to Mr. Lloyd George yesterday marked a step which would tend to relieve the situation of some of the tensions which developed late last week and threatened to end any hope of an early settlement of the Irish controversy. The Premier is rapidly recovering from the indisposition which confined him to his rooms at Galrioch, and it seemed probable to-day that before replying to De Valera he would confer with several members of the Cabinet who are in Scotland.

A MODERATE ATTITUDE.
LONDON, Sept. 20.—A Reuters despatch from Cape Town says that although mass meetings of railwaymen continue to protest against the administration's decision to increase the eight hour day, their general attitude is very moderate.

AERONAUTIC RACE.
BRUSSELS, Sept. 20.—Tidings from five of the great balloons, which started from here last Sunday in a race for the James Gordon Bennett trophy, were being anxiously awaited here this morning. Prevailing winds on Sunday night and Monday carried fourteen balloons over Southern England and Wales, and there was some danger that some of the missing aeronauts had been carried out over the Atlantic.

Group Government a Menace.

All Political Parties Have Fought It.
Edmonton, Alta., Sept. 15.—The outstanding event of the National Progressive conference in Edmonton, attended by Premier Greenfield, Hon. T. A. Crerar, H. W. Wood, President of the United Farmers of Alberta, and other heads of the farmer movement, is the definite split between the agrarians and Dr. Michael Clark, M.P., for Red Deer. Dr. Clark declared that the idea of group government is distasteful to him and that he will not stand for dictation. Dr. Clark's letter to Mr. Crerar follows:

"After our recent conversation it will not greatly surprise you to learn that you cannot count on me as a candidate in Alberta in the forthcoming dominion election. "Mr. Wood, whose organizing ability is great and admirable, seems to think he has found something new in the idea of group government. It is as old as the hills. True Liberals fought it in Britain and Canada alike, under restricted franchise and as a people, rightly struggle to be free. "The house of lords, the family compact, the manufacturers' association and the junkers and militarists of Germany (and the F.P.U. in Newfoundland—Ed. Telegram) are path and all examples of group government, and the progress of humanity has been proportional to its ability to free itself from the domination of these groups. Class consciousness is none the less class selfishness, and therefore doomed to die, because it suddenly appears in farmer and labor parties. "After all, there seems to be only one method of working out human affairs of the political sphere. Apathetic progress must give upon common principles, sincerely held to resist reaction, which is present like a dead weight to drag down the aspirations of the race for freedom, justice and democracy.

These were the things for which sixty thousand Canadians died in the recent war, but they will not be obtained by putting one form of class in power in place of another. "I have been fighting class for forty years. It would be quite impossible for me to turn my back on my past and the right in this election."

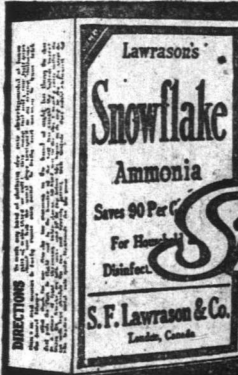

Baltic Commerce Nearly Paralyzed.

Copenhagen.—There is comparatively little commerce in the Baltic owing to the disparity in exchange rates. Danish dairy products, hams, bacon and other foodstuffs which formerly went to Germany can no longer find a market there because of the unfavorable exchange.

Germans going from Warnemunde to Copenhagen find that their crisp thousand-mark notes shrink to 73 crowns, and prices are so high in crowns that it is impossible for German merchants to buy Danish butter and cheese for the German market. Consequently, the Danes must depend for a market on countries which also have high exchange. Recently they have tried butter and cheese shipments to the United States.

The Danish market is glutted with foreign manufactured goods which have been assembled in the hope of invading the Russian market. Shop windows are filled with American goods, California tinned fruits and American shoes of all sorts are especially prominently displayed. Bananas are abundant in the market and dealers are hawking them everywhere about the streets, in striking contrast to the German cities, where bananas are seldom seen.

Shops of all sorts in Copenhagen have much larger and more varied stocks than can be found in the large German cities, where the government import regulations have kept out luxuries which could not be smuggled in through the occupied area.

Danish business men are making desperate efforts to establish satisfactory business relations with the government of Soviet Russia in the hope of relieving the depression which has followed the drop in prices, but so far the Russian business has not been satisfactory.

The Great Northern Telegraph Co., which owns the direct cables which formerly operated between Petrograd and Copenhagen, is negotiating with the Soviet government for a resumption of direct telegraphic communication between Petrograd and Danish cities and has effected a preliminary agreement which will probably be signed before winter.

As the Baltic is still alive with mines, especially in the Gulf of Finland, and the cables have been much damaged by years of disuse, it is not likely that they can be repaired before Petrograd is frozen up this winter. Efforts have been made to locate all these mines, but shipping is still very hazardous on the routes leading to Petrograd, and the vessels which recently entered that port were protected by small craft which proceeded ahead of them cautiously and removed all obstacles.

Johnson in Great Shape to Battle Dempsey.

Boston.—Jack Johnson, ex-heavy weight champion of the world, arrived in Boston this week, for his first visit in years. When last here he was the champion of the world. Looking in the best of health, Johnson predicted that he will meet Jack Dempsey for heavyweight honors before many months pass.

Accompanied by his wife, Gus Rhodes, his nephew-manager, Jack Ward, his Philadelphia sparring partner, and Pedro, his Mexican Chihuahua prize poodle, Johnson made himself at home in the apartment which he has leased for his stay on Columbus Avenue. One week is all the one-time champion will spend in Boston, and that at the Old Howard.

Jack says that though he may appear to be in first class condition he is not training. He argues that a racehorse is not kept in constant training, but trains only before a race. So, the pugilist argues, Jack need only train for an appointed bout. In this regard he said, "I can get into condition to meet the stiff competition in five weeks or less. I expect to meet Harry Greb at Pittsburgh in a very short time. And afterwards I expect to scrap with Bill Brennan."

Asked what he thought of Dempsey as a champion, the former title holder, drawing himself up to the magnificent height of the man who whaled the famous Jeffries answered, "Really I don't know much what to answer. You see I never saw him work. I have seen photos of him. But one cannot tell much from pictures, about the worth of a fighter."

Winnipeg.—That the promotion of cordial relations and good will between the United States and Great Britain and Canada was his constant desire and aim, was the effect of a letter from President Harding, read at a banquet held at the Royal Alexander Hotel here combined, under the auspices of the Combined Canadian Club of Manitoba, the Women's Canadian Club and the Associated Canadian Clubs of Canada. Cordial messages were also received from Sir Auckland Geddes, British Ambassador at Washington and Premier Meighen.

Creates Sensation Among Poultry Enthusiasts.

The following item has been copied from the Springfield Journal. The young man mentioned, who will be remembered by many of his old associates at Bishop Field College, is a son of Mr. Harry Bibbings, former proprietor of that well known barbering establishment now owned by Mr. W. C. Donnelly, opposite Marshall House, on Water Street. We understand that this reception, a very different one from quite a lot of attention around New York, and reporters with camera men representing some of the leading American Newspapers were sent to photograph and write it up. The Springfield Journal contains a photograph of Mr. Bibbings, the prize hen and the prize egg, described below.

CRATE COVER CAN'T BE NAILED DOWN OVER HEN'S EGG.

BROOKFIELD, Aug. 15.—Howard G. Bibbings, of South-Maple Street, has a thoroughbred leghorn hen, which varies a consistent laying record by occasionally producing an egg of unusual size. About every two weeks, according to records at the Bibbings poultry yard, the prize hen lays one of the unusual eggs. Her production yesterday was even larger than usual. The egg stood three inches high, measured 4 1/4 inches in circumference, and weighed 3 1/4 ounces. It was so large that when packed in a regulation egg shipping crate, the cover could not be nailed down, and as a result the egg is destined never to reach the market. Mr. Bibbings is a boy of 20 years, and has made a great study of poultry, and is successfully conducting a farm numbering now 300 fowls. It is his plan to increase the flock next year to 1,000. He has been under construction a number of hen-houses being built in accordance with his plans and erected by himself.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—I saw in last evening's Telegram a letter signed "Tenants" re the Housing Problem of St. John's. I have watched for a long time the obstructions that are in the way of getting fit or half decent houses to live in. There are I suppose about 90 per cent. of the City's population living in rented houses, a large proportion of which are not fit to put cattle in and yet there is nothing being done to prevent the landlord from claiming the most exorbitant rent from month to month. The trouble is, as the writer in last evening's paper stated, the landlord knows right well what a trying time poor people have to obtain houses, and it is only a matter of sickening on rent and let the house go up, for ought he or she cares as far as repairs go. Regarding the latter I have written on this matter two or three times and I suggested in one of my letters last year, the formation of a tenants' association. Again I beg to introduce the same scheme. I suggest that a meeting of all those paying house rent should be called and the matter discussed. It is a wonder to me that our worthy friend Mr. Geo. W. B. Ayre has not taken this matter up long ago. He is I think the poor man's friend, and would be a capable man to organize and protect the tenants of St. John's. The suggestion may be simple but I do not see for the life of me why the tenants are not organized as well as the Tailors or Longshoremen. Let us get together as a body and see this thing through. I am willing to assist in any manner possible. I trust that some able pen than mine will take this matter up and bring it to a head.

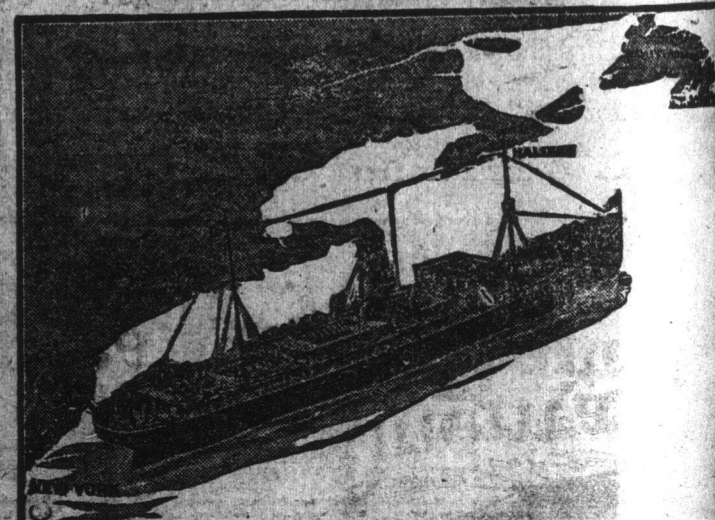
