CONFESSION OF THE MULDERESS.

"I Killed Him for Love. I Couldn't Part With Him."

New York, July 11.—The murderess of Charles Goodrich was arrested to-day. She goes by the name of Kate Stoddard, but it is believed her real name is Lizzie King. It is stated that she has confessed to the police authorities, and that she will make a full statement to the Corone o's jury.

The Goodrich mystery is solved. The Brooklyn police have found in a trunk belonging to Kate Stoddard and the former boarding place in Brocklyn, the watch and chain, ring and lockt of the murdered man, as well as his pocket book, containing \$56, the precise amount known to have been there at time of assassimation. Also was found a four-barrelled pistol, of which three barrels had been discharged. No doubt exists that Kate is the murderess.

Elora's share is something over \$8,000, and it becomes a grave question for the Telopayers what course they should pursue. Orangeville's contribution is small, although its population is something more than that of Elora, and the very inadequate accommendation the T.G. & B. Railway affords that place has induced the people to cry out for railway competition. Erin is further from a railway than any of the municipalities interested, and we commend her desire for greater facilities for transport, but decidedly object to being taxed therefor. East Garafraxa adjons Orangeville station, and has a railway running along her northern border: West Garafraxa has Arthurstation at ompoint, Fergus at another, and the lower part of the township generally goes to Guelph.
