For years and years that part of Ontario east of Toronto has been behind the western the province in almost every. thing. The west is made up of flourishing tarms, busy towns and thriving cities; the eastern half is prosperous, it is true, but not to the same extent as the western. There is a chronic deadness in it compared with the other.

Why is this so ? Natural advantages account for only small amount of this greater prosperity in

the west. Want of railway competition, and still more, want of ordinary railway facilities

have been the prime cause. Toronto is the natural outlet for the whole of Ontario, but eastern Ontario has been almost shut out from Toronte, owing to the policy of the Grand Trunk. The facilities for getting east of Toronto are few and unreliable. The trains of the Grand Trunk to the east or from the east are meagre in number and their being on time is the exception, not the rule. You can leave Toronto and go west or north by twenty trains starting on time; to go east you are limited to three or four that are often late. The traveling public dread going east. As a result Toronto has lost hundreds of thousands of dollars of trade every year that with proper facilities would have cone here. And the country east of us has lost correspondingly for the want of better access to the capital. It is even said that the rates and running of the road are regulated to suit Montreal, not Toronto. Why has Ottawa been an out-of-the-way place in relation to Toronto?

For the reason that it is so hard to get at. But there was of late a prospect of all and competing line to Otrawa; of the Grand Trunk being forced to double-track its road and run trains faster, more reliable and twice or three times a day in Montreal and Toronto instead of two slow ones; and of the thousand and one advan-

tages that flow from healthy competition. But this prospect has been rudely shaken -if not entirely removed, it has been greatly dimmed by the combination of Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific. The Ontario and Quebec may be completed and the Grand Trunk double-tracked, but the one management and the lack of competi tion will leave things pretty much in the old rut. But some day the farmers of the country will insist on railway regulation by the state. In the meantime the two "leading journals" are mum for the reason that they are Grand Trunk and Syndicate organs respectively.

THE TRADES' DEPUTATION AT OTTAWA. On Tuesday Messrs. Moor, Heakes and Shepherd, a deputation from the Toronto Trades and Labor Council, had an interview with Sir John Macdonald. They asked that a stop be put to Chinese immigration, and his reply was that nothing of the kind would be done until the Canadian Pacific Railway had been completed. This is disappointing: we think the government might easily do better than this for the working people of Canada, were it to try. It is a foregone conclusion that long before the completion of the work there will, failing restrictions, be in the Pacific province five times or ten times as many Chinese as can be employed on the railway, west of the Rocky Mountains, at all events. Now, admit for a moment that it is necessary to bring in Chinamen to do the work, it is still morally certain that as many of them as can possibly be employed upon it will be there long before it is finished. Sir John would have been nearer right had he said that the immigration would be stopped as soon as the contractors had all the Chinese they wanted, or could employ. Possibly the language he actually used may bear that construction, but on this point we must await more precise information. The true way of putting the case is this : When over the number of Chinese in the country has fairly passed the limit of as many as can possibly be employed on the railway, then the bringing in of any more is n longer necessary, as far as building the railway is concerned. Let us place in contrast these two radically and fundamentally different views of railway policy. One is-let there be perfect tree trade in railways; charter every company applying provided only that no public money be asked for ; afterwards let the competitors fight it out among themselves to their hearts' content. Should the stronger swallow up the weaker, or should two strong companies amalgamate, no matter, never mind, as Punch once said, about an old standing metaphysical puzzle. Should rates go up enormously, still no matter, the state has no business to interfere in any case. The laws of supply and demand are infallible, automatic, and self operating, and will of themselves cure every evil that may

The other-the national policy view-is first place to prevent or restrict the expenditure of capital in superfluous railways, beyond the country's ability to carry, thus stopping as far as possible the enormous and needless waste of railway war, which falls both upon the companies and the public. And, in the next place, to interfere with the strong hand whenever we reach the opposite extreme swing of the pendulum-combination, monopoly and oppression of the country's trade and traffic. It still remains to compare this with the ideal of railway competition without railway war, as presented by Mr. Osler.


