OTTAWA, April 9.—The usual series of questions opened the day's business in the House. Amongst those answered were the following: Mr. Laurier: Is it the intention of the Government to ask Parliament for a subsidy of \$100,000 for the purpose of establishing a line of steamers to run between a Canadian port on our side and a French terminus port on the other, as it was understood in the negotiations which led to the commercial treaty with France?

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LORD ROSEBERRY RODE TO WIN.

LIBERALS KEPT THEIR WORD. So Said Mr. Healy at a Political Meeting.

DELIB, April 9.—A political meeting was held Sunday at Neagh, County of Tipperary. The speakers were Messrs. Tom J. Healy, John Dillon, Arthur O'Connor and P. J. O'Brien, all of whom are anti-Parliamentary members of the House of Commons. A large audience was present.

Mr. Healy said that with the passage of the Home Rule bill in the House of Commons the Irish had kept their word in regard to Home Rule, and he believed they would fulfill their pledges in relation to a bill for the relief of evicted tenants in Ireland.

Mr. Dillon said he did not think that a general election was near. It was to be held in the autumn, and he believed that the Government would be re-elected.

Mr. O'Connor said that the Government would not be re-elected, and that the anti-Parliamentary members would be returned to the House of Commons.

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CRUSHED.

ONE BOY KILLED—Twenty Crushed and Trampled. Chicago, April 9.—The bursting of a steam pipe in the basement of the Humboldt Park School at noon today caused a panic and the pupils, and in the rush of the children to escape from the building one boy was killed and over a score were crushed and trampled. Fourteen children were taken to the St. Elizabeth Hospital, and many others were carried to their homes by the police.
