 grain and straw is assured. Corn has
 benefited by warm weather, but will
 not measure up to the average. The
 potato prospects are good but rot is
 reported in low sections. Tobacco is
 fast ripening. Cutting has commenced
 and the quality is reported as excel-
 lent. In the northern districts, hail
 and rain have caused some damage.

Province of Ontario
 Farmers are busy with threshing
 and fall plowing. Fall wheat, barley
 and oats are yielding well above the
 average. Weather conditions ideal for
 corn, which has made splendid
 growth. Root crops are good. Winter
 apples and pears reported exception-
 ally good. Pastures and fall wheat
 lands require rain.

Maritime Provinces
 New Brunswick—Weather con-
 ditions somewhat improved, but lay-
 ing not yet completed. Potato pros-
 pects good. Early cabbages are being
 dug yielding about 70 barrels per
 acre. Nova Scotia—Recent fire weath-
 er beneficial and prospects good ex-
 cept for apples, which are only fair,
 due to excessive rain during the early
 summer, but fruit is coloring well.

WATFORD PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH WILL CELEBRATE ITS GOLDEN JUBILEE

Members of Congregation are Expected to Attend Important Occasion, Marking the Close of Fifty Years Since Church Has Left Its Imprint on the Life of the Community Which It Serves.

The Presbyterian golden jubilee of Watford and Monroville will be celebrated on Sunday, Sept. 6th, at 10 o'clock, by the Rev. Wm. Mackenzie, the Rev. Mr. Hume, the Rev. Mr. Hays, the Rev. Mr. Ratcliffe, and the Rev. Mr. Gale. Of these men, only four are now living. In the same year in which the church was built, a manse was also



Edifice of the West Adelaide (Continuing) Presbyterian Church, (erected 1875), where Golden Jubilee Anniversary Services will be held on Sept. 6.

In connection with this event, the following short history of the church has been prepared and will be found interesting:

1875 1925 The present edifice of the West Adelaide Presbyterian Church was erected in the year 1875. Previous to this time, services were held in the little red brick church, situated at what was then known as Wiley's Corner. This church, which was in the same field or charge as East Adelaide, was built in the year 1853. Owing to an increasing number of members from the north side of the township, it was decided to build a new church one mile north, as being more central for the congregation, and the site on which it now stands was chosen. The building was erected by Cooper and Haldane, contractors, in 1875. The building committee in charge of

The steel structure pictured above is so large that the whole caravan of folks who attend this church can drive right in to comfortable shelter and find ample parking space for either horse-drawn vehicle or car.
