FORM OF A BEQUEST TO THE SOCIETY.

I give and bequeath to "The Newfoundland and British North America Society for Educating the Poor," instituted in London in the year 1823, the sum of

Pounds sterling, to be raised and paid, for the purposes of the said Institution, out of such part only of my personal estate as shall not consist of chattels real, or money secured on mortgage of Lands or Tenements; or in any other manner affecting Lands or Tenements: for which Legacy the Receipt of the Treasurer for the time being of the said Institution shall be a sufficient discharge to my Executors.

* * * Bequests for charitable or benevolent purposes of lands or tenements, or of money to be laid out in the purchase thereof, or charged on, or otherwise affecting lands or tenements, or of money secured on mortgage of lands or tenements, are void; but money, stock, or other personalty not falling under any of the above descriptions, may be so bequeathed.

LAWS AND REGULATIONS.

I. This Society shall be designated **THE NEWFOUNDLAND AND BRITISH NORTH AMERICA SOCIETY FOR EDUCATING THE POOR.**

II. The Schools shall be managed by Masters and Mistresses of the United Church of England and Ireland, and conducted, as nearly as circumstances may permit, on Dr. Bell's system.

III. This Society shall consist of a Patron, Vice-Patrons, President, Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, a Secretary or Secretaries, and also of Governors and Life and Annual Members, and such other Officers as may be deemed necessary for conducting its affairs.

IV. Each Subscriber of one Guinea annually, or upwards, shall be a Member.

V. Each Subscriber of Ten Guineas, or upwards, at one time, shall be a Member for life.

VI. Each Subscriber of Five Pounds annually, or of Twenty Guineas at one time, shall be a Governor, and entitled to attend and vote at all meetings of the Committee.

VII. An Executor paying a bequest of Fifty Pounds, or upwards, shall be a Member for Life.

VIII. The business of the Society shall be conducted, and all its officers appointed, by a Committee of not less than twelve; of whom nine who shall have attended the greatest number of times during the year, shall be eligible for the ensuing year.

IX. The Patron, Vice-Patrons, President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Secretaries, shall be considered *ex officio* Members of the Committee: the ordinary Meetings of the Committee shall be held once every Month.

X. Three Members of the Committee shall constitute a quorum; and in case of equality of votes, the chairman shall have a second, or casting vote.

XI. Five Auditors, three of them not being Members of the Committee, shall be appointed by the Committee annually, for the purpose of auditing the accounts of the Society, of whom three shall be a quorum.

XII. A General Meeting of the Members of the Society shall be held in London annually on such day during the months of April or May as shall be judged most convenient, when the proceedings of the foregoing year shall be reported, the accounts presented, and a Committee chosen.

XIII. A Special General Meeting of this Society may be called at any time, at the requisition of the General Committee, or any nine Members, by letter, addressed to the Secretary.

XIV. Ten days' notice of all General Meetings shall be given in at least three Newspapers. Those Members of the Society who reside within the limits of the Threepenny Post shall be summoned by letter to attend; and when such General Meetings are Special, the object of them shall be mentioned in the summons.

XV. At all General Meetings, and at those of the Committee, the Patron; or in his absence, the Vice-Patron; or should he be absent, the President; or in his absence, the Vice-President first upon the list, who may be present; or in the absence of all the Vice-Presidents, the Treasurer; and in his absence, such Member as shall be voted for that purpose, shall preside at the Meeting.

XVI. None of the Laws of the Society shall be repealed or altered, nor any new Law established, but at the Annual General Meeting, or at a Special General Meeting called for that purpose.

RULES FOR AN AUXILIARY SOCIETY.

1. THAT the object and constitution of the Newfoundland and British North America Society for Educating the Poor, having the cordial approbation of this Meeting, a Society be now formed, to be called "The Auxiliary Newfoundland and British North America School Society of _____," for the purpose of co-operating with that Institution.

2. That all persons subscribing One Guinea per annum or upwards, or Five Guineas or upwards at one time, shall be Members of this Society.

3. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, Secretaries, and a Committee, consisting of not less than _____ Members; and that three Members of this Committee constitute a quorum. That the Committee shall meet once every quarter, or oftener, on some day to be fixed by themselves.

4. That the Committee divide this town and neighbourhood into districts, and appoint two or more of their members for each district, who may associate with themselves any Subscribers, for the purpose of soliciting subscriptions and donations from the inhabitants thereof; and that they establish proper agents and correspondents in different parts within the limits of the Auxiliary Society.

5. That this Auxiliary shall furnish the Parent Society, on or before the first week in March in each year, with an abstract of its cash account, &c.

6. That a General Meeting of the Subscribers be held on such day as shall be fixed on by the Committee in each year, when the accounts (as audited by the Committee) shall be presented, the proceedings of the past year reported, and a Committee chosen for the ensuing year.

RULES FOR AN ASSOCIATION.

1. THAT we form ourselves into an Association in connexion with the Newfoundland and British North America Society for Educating the Poor, for the purpose of contributing towards its object, and that this Association be denominated "The _____ Association."

2. That all persons subscribing the sum of Five Shillings or upwards per annum, or making a donation of One Guinea or upwards at one time, or collecting to the amount of Two Pounds or upwards, shall be Members of this Association.

3. That the business of this Association shall be conducted by a Committee, to be chosen annually, consisting of a Treasurer, Secretaries, and not less than _____ other Members, and under the patronage of such other Honorary Members as the Society and Committee shall select and obtain.

4. That the Committee meet once a quarter, or oftener, if necessary, on a day to be fixed by themselves, and that three Members be empowered to act.

5. That for the purpose of soliciting and collecting donations and subscriptions, the Committee divide this neighbourhood into districts, and appoint one or more collectors from among themselves to each district; and that these contributions be paid to the Treasurer at the Committee Meetings.

6. That this Association shall furnish the Committee of the Auxiliary Society, on or before the last day of February in each year, with an abstract of its cash account, &c.

7. That a General Meeting of the Subscribers be held on such day as shall be fixed on by the Committee in each year, when the accounts (as audited by the Committee) shall be presented, the proceedings of the year reported, and a Committee chosen for the ensuing year.

THE

TWENTY-FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

**NEWFOUNDLAND AND BRITISH NORTH AMERICA
SOCIETY FOR EDUCATING THE POOR.**

The period has arrived when it becomes once more the duty and privilege of your Committee to render an account of the trust delegated to them, in the administration of your gift, to the comfort and thanksgiving of many, to the glory of God, and to the good of His Church.

In doing this, they rejoice in being able to make such report of the continued progress of the Society's operations, and the manifest blessing resting thereupon, as not only to gladden the hearts of all who love and value the Truth, but to encourage persevering efforts in this as in every good word and work; while, as is most due, all the glory and praise be given unto God by Christ Jesus the Lord.

From the Rev. Mr. Bridge, the Society's Superintendant in Newfoundland, the Committee have continued to receive the most gratifying communications; which would have elicited but one feeling of delight, had it not been for the painful negatives which their inadequate resources have compelled them to return to applications for aid the most affecting and urgent.

In consequence of the general impression made throughout the island by the well-known and anxious solicitude of the excellent Bishop to supply the spiritual necessities of

the people, wooden school-rooms, or chapelry school-houses — buildings suited to the twofold purpose of keeping school and on the Sabbath assembling the people to worship — are springing up in every direction, even in remote parts of the island, to which hitherto little or no attention had been given.

In every new mission the Bishop is most desirous for the establishment of one of the Society's schools, and in such places as might seem desirable his Lordship would admit the master into holy orders, thus constituting him Deacon Schoolmaster; an arrangement, as the Bishop well observes, most adapted, in the peculiar circumstances of the colony, effectually to propagate the Gospel of Christ.

Your Committee have from time to time strongly urged the case of these poor destitute settlers, thousands of whom rarely or never see a Minister of Christ, and have no Christian teacher amongst them: nor have they done this altogether in vain. One kind lady enabled the Committee to establish a school at the Bay of Islands,* and through the bountiful liberality of another provision has been made for schools at Salvage and Kiels: in the two latter places, to prevent efforts which had been made being altogether

* In the last Report, an extract was given from a letter of the Rev. Mr. Meek, who had been appointed to this mission, dated from Bay St. George, about 100 miles distant, and where he was likely to be detained for a considerable time. Under date of June, 1842, Mr. Meek writes from this station as follows: —

“ And now, after a residence of ten months, we thankfully raise our Ebenezer in this solitary place, through the kindness of a Mr. Parsous, in the best temporary building the place affords, till a house can be erected for us, which is in progress, with the use of an adjoining house, out of which the family who occupied it have removed to afford the accommodation as a school-room and a place of worship; in which latter place we have been uninterruptedly carrying on the objects of our mission.

“ We found the children entirely ignorant — none of them could read; three or four knew their letters, but that was all: about fifty can now read tolerably, and thirty write. We have admitted fifty-eight, and some who have not hitherto been provided with clothes will be added when the fishing is over:

withdrawn ; and in the former, to open a new mission in a far-distant settlement, described by the Bishop as being one of the most arduous and yet one of the most useful ever attempted in the island.

Along this part of the island the Society has recently opened eight day schools, besides Sunday schools ; but truly may it be said, What are they among so many ! They are scattered along a coast at least 900 miles in extent, peopled with thousands of Protestant Episcopalians, to say nothing of those who profess the Romish faith, for whom few and far between are any means of pastoral care or religious instruction. Even settlements which, with few individual exceptions, are entirely Protestant, are without either pastor or teacher. The schools now in operation have become as so many lights amid the surrounding darkness — the centre of a new sphere of action. The result already produced is, that at this moment the Committee could more than double their agency, and yet not meet the urgent claims which are pouring in upon them.

At the last anniversary it was announced that six new agents had been added to their number of faithful and devoted missionary schoolmasters, three of whom have been appointed to Newfoundland, and have commenced schools

five or six adults have also attended in the evening, and we have a good prospect of seeing every Protestant young person, in a short time, able to read the Bible, and with a Bible to read.

“As only two visits have ever been paid to the place by ministers of any denomination, the habit of attending public worship is, in some cases, with difficulty acquired ; yet I thankfully acknowledge that, beyond my hopes, there has been a pretty general attendance, especially on the afternoon of Sunday, and a very gratifying and perceptible improvement in the order and behaviour of the congregation. The children now begin to sing pretty well, and to understand and repeat the responses audibly ; and if Prayer-books can be obtained, of which there is necessarily at present a great destitution, we have good hope of seeing a much more manifest advance. The room is during the winter, when the people are all at home, by far too small ; and, if a church can be raised to grace this spiritual desert, we hope to see more worshippers and more religion.”

in the most necessitous of those bays hitherto unoccupied by the Society.

The following extracts from two of those teachers will tell their own affecting tale, and, it is to be hoped, will not tell it in vain. The station in which Mr. Polden has been placed is Belloram, in the extensive district of Fortune Bay:—

“ I arrived here,” he writes, “ on the 14th of last August, and was most kindly received by the poor fishermen and families of this place, who, as soon as they heard of my arrival, came flocking around me, and saying how glad they were to see me come to instruct their children. My mission includes the whole of Fortune Bay—a very rocky, mountainous, and barren spot, on the western part of the island, extending upwards of 100 miles along the sea-coast, and nearly 300 miles from St. John’s, the capital.

“ My settlement is Belloram, with about 150 inhabitants, who are all poor fishermen, living in little wood houses (or rather huts), built by themselves. I am glad to find they are very anxious for the instruction of their children. They have built a very good wooden school-room, solely at their own expense; and, poor things! they say, if I will promise not to leave them again, they will build me a house as soon as they can get the timber, &c. But as they have begun building a church, I tell them to finish that first; and when the house of God is completed, then to think of a house for me. The Bishop has kindly promised 25*l.* towards building the church, and we have been and are collecting what we can in the neighbourhood, and the other they are doing amongst themselves—one family giving so much wood, another so many days’ labour, and another so much fish, which we sell and turn into money, &c.

“ I find the people, for the most part, very illiterate, and consequently ignorant and dark as to the way of salvation, &c. This they will readily admit, for, when I first met the adults, I asked them a few simple questions, and their answers were,—We are poor ignorant creatures—we do not know—we never had any one to tell us about these things. But, said they, with great simplicity, we should be very glad to try to learn any thing you may be kind enough to teach us. I assured them that it would at all times give me great pleasure to give them any instruction I could; at the same time adding, It is for this express purpose I am come amongst you, and I hope you will all attend the Sunday school regularly, and meet me every evening (Saturday and Sunday excepted) from six to nine. All promised to do so, and I am happy to say that they have kept their promise as yet, and appear most attentive and persevering.”

He then gives the following interesting account of the opening of his school, and the commencement of his labours:—

“ I opened a day school here on the 22d of August, with twenty-six children, only six of whom could read, and they but very imperfectly: I have now

upwards of forty attend daily; and last Sunday fifty were present, both morning and afternoon. I never saw children more anxious to learn, and parents more anxious for them to learn, in my life. Many of the poor things have neither shoe nor stocking, and not more than ten or twelve have either bonnet, cap, or hat. I fear many of them will be prevented from attending, when the weather sets in severe, for the want of shoes and warm clothing: however, I must hope for the best.

“I am happy to say all the inhabitants are Protestant here, with the exception of two Roman Catholic families; and I am sure you will be pleased to hear I have admitted five of their children into the school, who attend Sundays as well as week days. The Bishop has licensed me to read the Church service and a sermon in my settlement, and to bury the dead. I have from 90 to 100 attend the service regularly every Sunday, and hope to have more when the men return from fishing. I meet the children at half-past eight on Sunday mornings; keep school until eleven o'clock, when the service begins, and am obliged to read the whole myself, none being able to read well enough to respond; and when I sing a hymn no voice is to be heard save my own: however, I am trying to teach some of the children to sing the Morning and Evening Hymns, but as yet I find much difficulty in so doing. At two o'clock I have school again until three, when I commence service; after which I meet my adults. I have commenced an adult school, but I may truly say it is a day of small things with me as yet: however, I do not despair, but hope the grain of mustard-seed will grow and spread itself.”

Of the difficulties connected with missionary labour in Newfoundland, and consequently of the claim which both the missionaries and the poor settlers have on our sympathy and prayers, some idea may be formed from the following affecting statement:—

“The travelling is very difficult and trying in this country, as there are no roads, and in going from place to place I have often to pass through thick woods and bogs. I walked a few days back to a place about four miles distant, called St. Jacques, and I never had such a walk before in my life; for I had to part the wood with my hands, and get on as well as I could; and sometimes I sank in over my knees in bog, and, the fog having made the wood wet, I got quite wet through: however, after nearly three hours' walk, I got there, fatigued and tired enough; though, I am thankful to say, I found no ill effects from it afterwards. But, oh! what is this when compared to what He endured who was continually going about doing good, and who has left us an example to tread in His steps? After I got there I soon forgot the fatigue, &c., by the kindness of the poor people, who, when they heard I was a teacher, did all they could to dry and clean my things for me. They begged me to stay with them and teach their children, and read to them. I told them I could not do that, as I was stationed at Belloram. They then said, Will you come over sometimes and read to us, and teach our children to read? I told them I would, and if

there was a road or path I would (d. v.) visit them once a-week. The men said, Then we will cut a road through the woods for you next winter; and the wood we cut down will do to go over the boggy places in the summer. If they do this, I hope to divide my labours between the two places, until a branch teacher can be placed there. I mean to keep school three days in each place. They are going to build a school-room, to answer the twofold purpose of church and school.

“It is a great pity that these poor people should be thus left destitute of the word of life, who are so anxious for it. When I left them, a poor old man brought me in his boat as far across the bay as he could; and when I shook hands with him and wished him well, he said, ‘Do ye come again, sir, soon? if you will, I’ll always go part of the ways back with you.’ And another family with whom I stayed offered to give me a bed and part of their pittance at any time, if I would come. The diet in this country is but very indifferent—mostly salt fish and hard biscuits; but as these poor people had a few lambs running on the mountains, they actually killed one of them, that, to use their own expression, I might have something better than fish: so anxious are these poor people to have their children taught, that they do not mind what they do for any one who will instruct them.”

“This day a man from Point Rosey called on me, and begged me to visit their harbour, which is situated on the opposite side of the bay, nearly four leagues from this. He said, ‘If you will come sometimes, sir, and teach our children and read to us, I will always put you back again in my skiff. I hope you will come, and then you will see how we are situated: we have no one ever visit or read to us; and we have never seen a clergyman but twice. Oh, sir!’ continued this poor man, ‘how I wish we could have a teacher placed among us, to read to us on Sundays and teach our children: though we are poor we would try to build a room, if we could have the promise of a teacher, and do what we could to help to keep him.’ He said there were more than thirty people in the place, and only two of them could read, and they very badly. So anxious are these poor people to get their children taught, that they have sent four from that place to this, to have the privilege of attending school; and this very man of whom I am speaking often comes across the bay on Saturday evening, to be here on Sunday to attend the two services, and returns again on Monday morning.”

“This day a man and his wife from Garnish called on me, to ask me to pay them a visit. They said, ‘There is a school badly wanted in our place, sir; the children are all growing up in ignorance, and we ourselves have no one to read to us on Sundays, or to visit us when sick.’ They said they thought from thirty to forty children would attend if a school could be opened there. I asked if they had any school-room; they said not, but would soon get up one if they had only the promise of a teacher. I hope to be enabled to visit this place soon.”

“This afternoon four men came in a boat from Point Rosey, to ask me to go over there and bury an old man who was lying dead, and who, just before his death, requested his wife to ask me to bury him. As there is no clergyman in this bay, and as the Bishop has authorised me to bury the dead, I went with them, and arrived about half-past ten P. M. As soon as I arrived there I pro-

ceeded to the house, or rather log-hut, where the old man lay dead. I had not been there many minutes, before nearly twenty people of the place assembled in the hut where I was. When I saw so many collected together, I proposed reading a chapter and prayers: before the words had scarcely fallen from my lips, all stood up and said, 'If you please, sir; and thank ye too.' I then saw several of them leave, which in a few moments I found, to my great surprise, was to go and call those who were gone to bed to come to prayers. As soon as prayers were finished, a man came to me and said his wife had provided a bed for me: he then conducted me to a small wooden hut, and I soon saw that these poor people had done every thing they possibly could to make me comfortable. When I entered the door the wife met me, and said, with great simplicity, 'You're welcome, sir; you're welcome to our house, such as it is. We only wish we could make you more comfortable than we can; but what we have got you shall be heartily welcome to at any time you come.' I thanked them for their kindness, and said I felt sorry to give them so much trouble. 'Trouble, sir! it's no trouble at all. I assure you it's a great pleasure.' After partaking of part of their poor pittance for supper, I was conducted by the master of the house to my bed. I had not been in bed many minutes, when the poor fisherman entered my room and said, 'I'm come to see if you are all right, sir.' He then carefully placed the clothes around me, anxiously inquiring if I had sufficient on my bed. I assured him I had. He then left me, wishing me a good night's rest, and hoping I should not take cold. These poor people, I was sorry to find, had given me their own bed, and consequently sat up all night themselves.

"This morning, at seven, the fisherman brought a light into my room; it being quite dark before, with the exception of a little light which came in between the boards: the walls being nothing more than upright pieces of board, and between each of these the air and light came in. There was no window to the room, neither had they one in the house at all; the hole which served them as a window they had filled up with hay, to prevent the wind and rain coming in on me, it being very wet at the time. When I left my room, found sixteen assembled for family prayers. After prayers and breakfast, met the children (thirteen); and as they could not read, I repeated the Lord's prayer and a few others to them, which they repeated after me. At eleven, began reading the Church prayers; had all the people in the harbour present, both old and young. In the afternoon, at two, met the children again. At six, read the Church service and a printed sermon again; every person, as in the morning, being present. As soon as I had done, these poor people all said, 'We never spent such a happy Sunday before, sir, neither we nor our children: it has been so short, for Sundays always seem the longest days to us. Oh, sir! we hope you will come and see us again soon: we will always make you as comfortable as we can. How we wish some one would visit us, if only once a-month; or that a teacher could be placed here to read to us, and teach our children. We would sooner do with less food than live as we now are.' It was truly affecting to me to hear with what simplicity and earnestness these poor people expressed themselves for some one to be placed amongst them, to read to them and to teach their children."

Mr. Marshall, another of the teachers who was sent out last year, and has been appointed to open a new mission in Hermitage Bay, writes as under:—

“Grole, the place where I am now stationed, is 300 miles from St. John’s, 40 from any other teacher, and how far from a clergyman I know not. The people subsist entirely by fishing; if the fishery fails they have no other resource—nothing to which they can turn themselves to obtain bread for their families; or if the price of fish be low, they suffer severely, as I am afraid many of them will do this winter, the markets to which the fish is exported being so very bad this year.

“The children come to school half-naked; by far the greater part of them have neither shoes nor stockings; these articles being so very dear, the parents are not able to purchase them. My heart has bled to see them come into the school, their poor little feet cut and bleeding with coming over the rocks, and through the brooks—we have no roads in the place. If the Christians of England could see them, I feel persuaded they would (especially the ladies) exert themselves to clothe the little sufferers. If thus wretched as regards the body, they are infinitely more so as it regards their souls; out of more than forty scholars, two only were able to read a little; none of the rest knew the large letters of the alphabet, or could correctly repeat the Lord’s Prayer. No school,—destitute of any means of grace,—no one to shew them any good, to lead them in the way of everlasting life, or point them to the ‘Lamb of God that taketh away the sins of the world,’ and through whom alone they could obtain pardon in this life, and eternal happiness in the world to come,—it will be unnecessary to tell you that they are deplorably ignorant and wicked. Though in this state, it is encouraging to add, that they are anxious to have their children brought up to the Church (as they term it), to which, without exception, they profess to belong.

“The school that is being built (at their expense) will also serve us for a church, at least for some time to come. The whole of the inhabitants are English; they, or their forefathers, have left their native homes to seek a livelihood in this barren land, and it is but just that their father-land should supply the means of instruction in the things that belong to their precious and immortal souls. In this place I have no Roman Catholics to contend with. You know what Popery is; and where a priest resides, it is not too much to say that they are entirely under his influence.

“In this Bay there are some Indians (Canadians), all of whom are Romanists. I met with three of them one day. The youngest of them had a crucifix suspended round his neck. I asked him what it was? He said, ‘This my heart.’ I inquired, ‘Will you sell it?’ He answered, ‘No; me no sell him.’ ‘Why?’ I asked. ‘Me sell him, the Devil will come and take me away.’ I replied, ‘I have not got one, and you see the Devil does not come and take me away.’ He answered, ‘Me no sell him,—my heart, my heart.’

“I have endeavoured to give you a brief and rough sketch of my station and labours, though, I believe, I forgot to say that, in addition to my school duties, I have two full services to perform every Sabbath. About 100 attend in one of the largest houses I can find.”

Adverting to the reference which is made in the preceding communications to the pitiable condition of the poor children for want of suitable clothing, similar statements to which have been received from other of the teachers, the Committee have real pleasure in acknowledging the receipt of four large cases of clothing, &c. from a lady of Cheltenham and friends in Wakefield, to be placed at the disposal of Mr. Polden; also one large case for Mr. Marshall, from friends in Richmond, Yorkshire; and another from the ladies of Islington, for the school at Spaniard's Bay, under the charge of the Rev. J. Griffin. Some smaller presents, likewise, have been received from different friends. Such gifts of shoes, stockings, and warm clothing of any kind, are truly valuable in a climate so severe, and for a people so destitute of such comforts. The Committee will be glad to be the almoners of the bounty of any of their kind friends, which will be as gratefully received, as it will tend to ensure an attendance of the poor children at school in the severe winter months.

The Committee feel sure that the following extract from a letter from the Bishop of Newfoundland, with which they have recently been favoured, will give unqualified satisfaction, being an additional testimony to the high character and usefulness of the Society: nor can it be other than highly gratifying, as it is matter of sincere thankfulness to God to have their agents welcomed to the sphere of their missionary labour, and so kindly encouraged and assisted by the Bishop. For this, as for all other his Lordship's acts of affectionate and fatherly care over the interests of the Society, the Committee cannot too deeply, or in suitable terms, express their acknowledgment. They would, moreover, take this opportunity of thanking his Lordship for his ready appropriation of the sum of 50*l.* from the funds of the Church Diocesan Society — a grant enhanced by its seasonableness, as the Society has not yet received the sum of 300*l.*

from the Local Legislature, which it had calculated upon — no measure having been adopted on the subject of Education.

The Bishop writes : —

“ Bermuda, 4th January, 1843.

“ The three new teachers who had reached their respective destinations and commenced their labours there, upon my departure from Newfoundland, have, I believe, fully reported to your Superintendant the result of their observations, and the apparent efficiency of their labours in the hitherto untried fields which they occupy.

“ They appeared to me to have been admirably fitted to their work ; and God has indeed in this, as in most other instances, highly blessed your selection of agents, who are day by day letting in more of the light of the Gospel, and spreading the incalculable benefits of Christian Education, in the darkest corners of the land.

“ Earnestly and continually do I commend your good cause in my prayers to our great Master, and no effort that I can personally make shall be wanting to its furtherance.”

The branch schools continue a most important feature in the operations of the Society, and it is deeply to be regretted, much as their increase is called for, that the fluctuating income of the Society compels a temporary suspension of any. The following your Committee received from the Superintendant, being addressed to him by the branch teacher at Rock Harbour, Placentia Bay, who himself had been educated in the Society’s principal school at St. John’s; and it is but a specimen of other equally affecting appeals from settlements thinly populated but utterly destitute, and yet where the poor and neglected inhabitants have at least done their part by the erection, at their own cost, of school-rooms : —

“ And now, laying aside all considerations of self, I will speak a word for the people (indeed I would ill repay their many kindnesses to myself if I did not attempt to do them a service, whether I succeeded or failed). When you were speaking to myself last spring, you said that you did not know whether it would answer to keep a schoolmaster at that harbour or not : oh, sir ! do continue a teacher to them. The poor people will do their utmost to support him — they are doing so in the present case : they give me board and lodging free, and have promised upwards of a quintal of fish for each child attending school, which I have no doubt they will pay. And if you do not, the church here will

be of little use — there will be no one to congregate them together on Sundays. And, oh! to think that the little flock who are wont to meet together each Sabbath-day for prayer and praise, and to hear God's will and command read to them that they may do it, will be forsaken and left to themselves, 'tis hard; and they will feel it grievously, as they cannot read for themselves.

“If you do not continue a schoolmaster's services *to them*, I fancy it will throw a damp on the schools now erecting hereabout.

“It would have been far better I had not been sent here. Two families have decided on erecting houses in the neighbourhood of where I lived last winter, for their children's benefit.”

The Committee have also received the most pleasing communications from the other teachers of the Society. All of them, through merey, have been spared to prosecute their duties in their wonted health and strength. The old stations have continued to go on well, and new ground has been broken up. Of the principal teachers sent out from England, nine have received ordination; of whom three have been transferred to the Propagation Society, and the others, as well as some of the branch teachers, have been duly licensed by the Bishop to conduct the Church service in destitute settlements, in the lack of any other spiritual provision made for them.

This alone must surely commend the Society to the prayers and assistance of every Christian heart which can feel for immortal souls, and can enter into that alarming statement, “My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge.”

During the year the teachers have circulated Bibles, Prayer-books, and Religious Tracts; and the Loan Libraries attached to the schools are every day becoming more useful.

And your Committee have again to thank those Christian institutions through whose liberal grants their agents have been enabled to accomplish a much greater good than otherwise could have been done. In addition to those of former years, the British and Foreign Bible Society has granted 300 Bibles and 500 Testaments; and the Religious Tract Society, Tracts to the amount of 15*l*. They have also grate-

fully to acknowledge a gift of Prayer-books, of the value of 5*l.* from Miss Allix.*

The Committee will close this portion of their Report by a few extracts from the correspondence of their Superintendent, detailing the Society's operations.

The Rev. Mr. Bridge writes:—

“*August 23d, 1842.*—Another event which has transpired has been our public breakfast. I send you a paper containing a report of it,† which will, I hope, be gratifying to you and the Committee, as the thing itself was to us here. It went off uncommonly well, and I have no doubt that, with God's blessing, it is the beginning of better things for us in this town. The Governor, the Bishop, and all concerned, were highly pleased. The subscriptions were good; and I confidently anticipate, that the more our operations are known, the more zealous, as well as the more numerous, will our friends become.

“I have recently been to visit our school at Trinity. I find things in good order, and for the season of the year (all the elder children being engaged in fishing or in the gardens), the attendance, averaging about 120, is encouraging. The same is true of the branch schools in the district. Our teachers are well in health and happy in their work.

“At Portugal Cove all things are proceeding prosperously. The attendance has been regular, at about forty on the week day and between eighty and ninety on the Sabbath. I expect the daily attendance during the winter will go far to double the present. With the branch teachers of this station I have every reason to be highly satisfied.

“I have just heard from Mr. Shannon, at Carbonear, who returns fifty scholars in his recently opened school, and reports that, by virtue of the Bishop's license, he attends two settlements, eight or nine miles off, and reads the Church service and a sermon.

“At the school on Bexley Hill, between Island and Bishop's Coves, the daily attendance is improved, and in the Sunday school it is between 130 and 140: there are nine assistant teachers. This is a very gratifying circumstance, as exhibiting the fruits of the Society's labours and shewing that we are, under God, effecting what all desire who have any experience in the work of diffusing the truth as it is in Jesus—raising up native instruments for that object.”

“*Dec. 19th, 1842.*—At the close of my last I mentioned my intention of visiting all the Society's stations, from Brigus to Carbonear. It was a season at which some of our schools were closed for a few days, to enable the parents

to send in their usual contributions of fuel. I had not the opportunity, therefore, of examining every school. With the progress of the children in such as were in operation I was well satisfied, and in other instances an inspection of the attendance papers, &c. furnished me with evidence of the state of the schools. I was particularly delighted with our school at Carbonear, under Mr. Shannon (one of the three teachers sent out last year). So often has the attempt to establish a school in that town proved a failure, that its success now has not a little surprised me; and, considering that we have been at work there but a few months, I could scarcely have expected to find ninety-eight children on the admission-roll, and much less to learn from the teacher that, for want of room, he had been under the painful necessity of refusing upwards of twenty applicants; and that if he could accommodate them, he was confident he should have a school of 150 pupils. The largest place to be procured I have hired for our purposes: the people propose building a school-room in the course of the winter."

The following is Mr. Bridge's Report, read at the annual meeting of the friends of the Society in St. John's, Newfoundland, at which his Excellency the Governor presided:—

"To the interesting and satisfactory Report of the Teachers who have, during the last twelve months, been in charge of 'The Central Union School,' which he has just had the pleasure of reading to the meeting, the Superintendent of the Newfoundland and British North America School Society begs permission to state that, from the arrival of its first agents on the shores of this colony, in the month of August, 1824, to the present date, the Society has imparted a Scriptural and useful education to about 12,000 children; that it has now, between Twillingate to the northward, and Bay of St. George on the western coast of the island, thirty-seven* principal and branch schools in operation, on the books of which there are upwards of 2700 scholars, and that it has very recently enlarged the sphere of its benevolent exertions by sending teachers into quarters hitherto destitute of the means of instruction—the bays of Placentia, Fortune, and Hermitage, and the Burgeos, two settlements between Capes Ray and La Hune.

"These are facts which speak powerfully and eloquently. To this simple narration of them let it only be added, that there are at this moment before the Committee applications for teachers from upwards of thirty settlements; and it is humbly conceived, that such an appeal is made to the charity and sympathies of a Christian community as will not merely ensure the continuance of the support which our friends have afforded us, but, at the same time, call forth their aid in a yet larger measure, and raise up for the Society a reinforcement of helpers in her work and labour of love: of which the one object is the advancement of the honour of our God, in the promotion of the best and truest interests, temporal and eternal, of our fellow-colonists."

CANADA.

Passing from this rapid sketch of what the Society is doing in the colony in which it has longest laboured, the Committee are equally cheered by the very remarkable blessing which has followed its introduction into Canada.

It is but little more than four years since the establishment of its first school in Sherbrook to which, the Committee have the satisfaction to state, the Local Government has again appropriated the sum of 50*l*. The Bishop and many of the Clergy have most cheerfully forwarded the Society's views, just as they have appreciated its worth. Like a harvest only waiting the labourers, it may truly be said of the vast population of settlers and emigrants in our Canadian provinces, they were a people prepared, and there only needed the establishment of a sound and effective system of religious education to tell with the happiest results. And the short trial of the Society has convincingly established this point, as much as it has proved its own peculiar fitness and adaptation to the work.

Of the agents whom the Committee have sent out, nine have been admitted by the Bishop of Montreal into Holy Orders, and, with one exception, provided for without any cost to the Society. Large and important districts have been assigned to some of them, in which schools have been established, and, under their superintendence, conducted by pious and excellent men.

It is a pleasing fact, that several of these masters were formerly in the service of the Kildare Street Society, tried and approved men, and, if more assistance could be given than the very inadequate grant which is at present allotted to Canada, the Committee would have the gratification to report the employment of many more.

There are already, as reported by the Superintendent, fifty-one daily schools in operation, besides Sunday schools.

The benefits which have thus resulted to the provinces, the Committee must give in the Bishop's own words, as set forth in the following letter, addressed to the Clerical Secretary:—

“ Montreal, 9th June, 1842.

“ I have long proposed to write to you, in order to make my acknowledgments to the Newfoundland and British North America School Society for the valuable aid which they have afforded to the interests confided to my episcopal superintendance, and to express my most earnest hope that it will please God to enable them to extend their operations which they have commenced in this diocese.

“ *I consider the Schools which the Society has already established as blessings conferred upon the country*; and the local direction of the Society's affairs being confided to the hands of such men as Messrs. Willoughby and Bond, I feel that I have all the guarantee which I could desire that provision will be afforded in these Schools for a sound and Scriptural Education, conducted in connexion with the Church by faithful and efficient teachers.

“ I can also cheerfully render my testimony to benefits in a higher field which the Church in this diocese has derived from the same Society; for, amongst the persons who have come out to conduct its operations, I have had opportunities of selecting men for the ministry of the Gospel who are now labouring with the happiest effect as truly and devoted servants of the Lord, and who in all respects do credit to the Church. I pray God to prosper more and more the endeavours of a body from which I have derived such valuable help in the work intrusted to my feeble hands.”

It thus appears, on the highest authority, that the Society has not laboured in vain during its brief existence in Canada, while testimony so valuable as this, and such decided approval of its constitution and principles, must surely commend it as worthy of much larger support than it has hitherto received, and which, if in God's mercy granted, might strengthen it to enlarge the sphere of its operations, and to extend its benefits to others of the North American colonies.

That such a society properly and adequately supported is indispensably necessary to the well-being of the colonies, few, perhaps, in the present day will be disposed to question, while others may, in some measure, attempt to supply the want by new schemes, or novel enterprises which may require years to test their fitness and to win confidence.

But the Committee feel that the claims which your Society present are neither of novel nor questionable character.

It has been subjected to twenty years trial. It has been found in one Colony to have been the greatest bulwark of the Protestant faith, and acknowledged by the Bishop as among the greatest blessings bestowed on that dreary and desolate land. By the same competent authority, it has been pronounced worthy of taking a higher stand, and becoming to other colonies, what it has been to Newfoundland.

It has met with the same approval and commendation in the Canadas, in which, for upwards of four years, it has now been labouring to impart the blessings of a Scriptural education. In these two fields of labour it now numbers ninety-five week-day, besides evening adult schools, and Sabbath schools.

Several of the teachers have been duly licensed by the Bishop to act as Catechists or Lay Readers in destitute settlements, while eighteen of its agents sent out from England have been selected and deemed worthy to be admitted into the sacred ministry of the Church.

Surely, with facts like these, the Society, because of its limited operations, ought not to be overlooked in Christian benevolence, when it desires to benefit other colonies, which its constitution, its trial, its acceptance, pronounce it fitted to do, and only waits the means to accomplish its high purpose. The Committee can only in faith and prayer commend this statement to the candid consideration of the Christian philanthropist, and especially to such who, anxious that the "Salvation of God" should be made known to all, feel, nevertheless, the prior and stronger claims which emigrants from home, and settlers in our colonies, have upon the sympathy and efforts of British Christians to do them good.

The following extract from the report of their Superinten-

dant in Canada, will shew the great need which exists for the Society's operations, and the value set upon them by the people :—

“ I have now before me many letters from clergymen, in whose mission, and under whose care, your schools are established, bearing witness to the good done by them. One writes :—‘ This community owes a debt of everlasting gratitude to you for your Schools, which they both feel and acknowledge.’ Another :—‘ Words cannot express the obligation under which we lie for your schools, we all feel that they are inestimable.’ Another, after having set before us a case of such urgent need, that, although our funds were expended, we could not reject it, received a very small grant, in answer he writes :—‘ We feel deeply grateful for your assistance, but it is not enough to keep the school in operation ; however, a school I must have, and I shall pay the difference out of my own pocket.’ These are a few out of many such. The people, by their continued exertions to support the schools, speak to the same effect. I shall mention one or two instances. We were repeatedly solicited to extend our aid to a settlement near one of our old-established schools, but, for want of funds, were obliged to refuse it ; the poor people finding that we could not acquiesce in their demands, engaged a woman to teach, and besought us to put it into operation, and take it under our care upon our system, saying, that our schools were the only ones that seemed to prosper. In other settlements where, with what aid we thought ourselves warranted in offering, the people were too poor to maintain a schoolmaster, some influential persons have stepped forward and supplied the deficiency, simply that our superintendance might be secured, and the school placed upon a sure footing. And you are not to suppose that the schools are imparting the blessings of a Scriptural education to children only, for in most of them you may find persons from eighteen to twenty-five or thirty years of age, sitting with the younger scholars, and diligently repairing a deficiency which they bitterly lament, and which want of opportunity in their younger days occasioned. Some of the schools are on the frontier where the Provincial cavalry are stationed : this body is chiefly composed of the sons of the most respectable farmers in the neighbourhood, they are superior young men both in appearance and address ; these avail themselves of the privilege of attending the schools : in visiting at one place I saw seven of them in the midst of the smallest children, and I noticed that they made no small progress while there. Having to do this, they are obliged not only to pay largely towards the support of the school (and at the place referred to they were the chief contributors), but, also, to work hard at their duties during their leisure hours. One of these schools we were obliged to suspend for want of funds, the people were not able to make up the sum required for the schoolmaster in addition to our grant, when the troopers came forward, freely shewing a noble mind, and urged the good that was doing by it, and offered to increase their subscriptions as reasons for the continuance of the school, and the grant of a larger sum from the Society. I regret to say, and it should cause a blush to spread on the cheek of every Christian, our funds would not admit of our complying with their request. You will gather from these incidents, in addi-

sion to the testimony which they bear to the good character which the schools enjoy, the avidity with which the people receive education when they can procure it, denying themselves in every way, that they may support the school. An old man said to me, while pleading hard for a grant, 'I would be contented to live on bread and water so that my children might be taught;' and you can little imagine the expenses entailed upon them, and the privations they endure to support schools. In most cases, besides the sum which appears upon the statistics which we forward you, they provide a house for the master, keep the school in fire-wood, purchase books for the children, and in general board the teacher, but, add to all this, that in the winter particularly they are obliged to lay out a considerable sum in properly clothing the little ones, to defend them from its severities, and you see that they are called upon to the utmost of their ability. The Sunday schools are in a prosperous condition also. Each of the week-day schools has one attached to it, and, in many instances, the number in attendance greatly exceeds, indeed in some doubles, the week-day. The enthusiasm, if I may use the word, of some of the children is scarcely credible. Such, for instance, as a girl walking six miles on Saturday night, and stopping in the village to be ready in time for Sunday morning. It is truly astonishing what weather they will face, and the work they will perform, to attend. Many of the boys in the winter have to feed and water the cattle on Sunday morning, before they set out to walk three or four miles to school at half-past nine o'clock."

HOME PROCEEDINGS.

In turning to their Home Proceedings, the Committee deeply regret to have to report a falling off in their receipts, though it is satisfactory to know that the defalcation is in the item of donations, which has been much smaller than in several years past.

The contributions from Associations, however, have much increased, chiefly owing to larger remittances having been made from some of the principal Associations.

Still the receipts from this source have not reached what they had attained in 1841 after three successive years of increase. The Committee refer to this in the hope their friends may be stimulated to greater exertions, and that places in which the deputation could not be received on account of local difficulties and the pressure of commercial distress, may be opened to them in the present year.

It is highly gratifying to know, that wherever the depu-

tation have gone, not only have they found, for the most part, the Associations prospering, but they have been most kindly received and aided by many of the Clergy, who have preached for the Society, and also assisted at its Meetings.

In this manner the Lay Secretary, in the course of visiting the Associations, has been materially helped by the valuable services, amongst others, of the Rev. Messrs. Bleazby, Capel, Davies, Greaves, Lampen, Langston, Nantes, Rashdall, and Whidborne, to whom your Committee beg to take this opportunity to express their warmest thanks, as well as to the Rev. Messrs. Browne, Close, Clay, Dykes, French, Gell, Hutton, Hope, Lillingstone, Pugh, Ram, Woodward, and Dr. Wilson, who have either granted their pulpits, or preached for the Society during the year.

The contributions from Donations, Subscriptions, and Associations (including a balance of 32*l.* 18*s.* 2*d.*), amount to 231*l.* 2*s.* 4*d.*, while the payments have exceeded that amount by 177*l.* 5*s.* due to the treasurer on closing the accounts.

The amount raised in Canada and Newfoundland, all of which, with a view to stimulate local energy, is appropriated to school extension in each colony, makes the total income of the Society 3445*l.* 5*s.* 3*d.*

The Committee earnestly hope the small balance may be speedily liquidated, and that their friends, whose kindness in past years has ever shewn itself, when the Society has really needed additional help, may again bear it in their affectionate remembrance. They cannot be too thankful for the kindness of the Rev. C. Bradley, of Clapham, for granting his Church, and to the Rev. H. Stowell, for complying with the earnest wishes of the Committee to occupy the pulpit in the Society's advocacy.

They hope that other of their Clerical friends will, if possible, assist them in this way, by which means they would soon be placed in a position to meet some of the claims yet

unanswered, and to send out other labourers who have been already examined and approved.

The Committee must not omit to mention with deep and sincere gratitude their obligations to the Local Secretaries, on whom so much of the efficiency of the Associations depend, and especially, to those active Members of the Ladies' Associations, through whose exertions the remittances from those valuable auxiliaries have been so considerable.

The Committee, having now discharged this their bounden and pleasing duty, cannot close their Report without a word of mutual counsel and encouragement.

It is an Apostolic precept to consider one another, and to provoke unto love and to good works. And one of the advantages of Christians thus meeting together to record the Divine faithfulness, and to praise God for His goodness, is to be quickened to a deeper sense of our privileges and our responsibility as workers together with God, upon whom Christ has conferred the glory which He received of setting forth the Father's love; and remembering how short the time is for the work of faith and the labour of love, and how near the hour of everlasting blessedness, we may animate one another to double diligence and to increased devotedness, never forgetting the Saviour's test of love to Him,—“Inasmuch as ye did it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye did it unto me.” And surely, engaged as we have recently been in the solemn contemplation of the agony and bloody sweat, the cross and passion, the precious death, and burial, and glorious resurrection of our Saviour God, if sincerity have characterised our services they must have left, deep and abiding, the impression in all our hearts,—“hereby perceive we the love of God, because He laid down His life for us, and we ought also to lay down our lives for the brethren. Beloved, if God so loved us, we ought also to love one another.”
