The Canadian Government authorities have forwarded the Dominion's regrets to the United States Government and offered to compensate the wounded man and the family of the dead man. This course is not necessarily an admission of liability.

He was satisfied that but for the war breaking out when it did, the whole question would have been placed before the citizens in a shape which would have ensured its adoption. He did not go into details, but spoke with conviction, adding. however, that when the war broke out he had dropped the whole thing feeling that anything in that direction was out of the question under the new circumstances. It remains for history to justify Mayor Hocken's stand, whether by the disclosures of what might have been done, or by the unfoldments of the next seven years.

With respect to the hydro-electric situation, Mayor Hocken took credit for leaving the city commission in an absolutely sound and stable financial position.
