With the receipt of St. Petersburg's plast message, the brief breathing spell will have ended. St. Petersburg leaves the final word with her representative at Portsmouth. The Associated Press is in a position to state that when the nature of these communications becomes generally known, it will be seen that in a sincere desire to effect a satisfactory settlement, the government has gone as far as its extremely vital state interests will permit. The government is firmly convinced that in case of failure of the negotiations the responsibility will not rest with Russia, which has con-ceded much already. Canadian Associated Press Cable.) London Aug. 22.-The Daily Chronicle publishes a despatch from its Toronto correspondent stating that amazement is the only word to describe Canadian feeling regarding the appointment of Lord Minto to the viceroyalty as he is not considered big enough for his job. Ontario Jockey Club Are Expending \$60,000 and Fall Meeting Patrons Will Reap the Benefits.

Visitors to the opening races of the Ontario Jockey Club at the Woodbine on Sept. 16 will meet with a pleasing surprise on passing thru the gates. The whole track may be said to have been pushed bodily back some 60 feet, and at the southern end, where last year the water was 2 feet in depth, there is now one of the finest tracks on the With the moving of the track to the

with the moving of the track to the south, the lawn in front of the grand stand has been greatly enlarged and improved. The sodding was taken off and at the north end the lawn was raised 5 feet, gradually sloping toward the track, permitting an unconstructed view of the course from any point. The ground was then resodded. Instead of the old whitewashed fence which encircled the track, a neatly painted picket fence now appears. Altogether three miles of fencing have been built. Some idea of the magnitude of the work may be gathered from the fact that 35,000 yards of sand were taken from the Woodbine-avenue banks for the purpose of raising the lawn.

About seventy five laborers and forty-five carpenters have been constantly employed, together with twenty-five or thirty teams. 





## DISASTER ON BENNINGTON DUE TO DEFECTIVE GAUGE

Court of Inquiry's Finding Upsets Previous Theories - One Man Only Alive Who is Under Blame.

Washington, D.C., Aug. 21.—Secretary of the United States Navy Bonaparte to day received and made public the proceedings and findings of the court of inquiry which investigated the explosion on the gunboat Bennington, at San Diego, Cal., on July 21.

The findings are a complete surprise, The findings are a complete surprise, for they at once set at rest stories to the effect that the Bennington's boilers, and perhaps those of other naval vessels of the same age, were defective. The court find the explosion resulted from the closing of a valve which connected the exploded boiler with its steam gauge, so that the pressure on that boiler may have been several hundred pounds to the square inch when the accident occurred. While praise is accorded to the officers and ship's company for their conduct during the harrowing scenes following the accident, rowing scenes following the accident, the officer and men who were responsible in the opinion of the court are pointed out and court-martial proceedings suggested in the case of the only one of them surviving, Ensign Charles T. Wade.

The court says: "About 9.20 on July 21, after both boilers had been filled and the furnaces started, it was oband the furnaces started, it was observed that the steam gauge on boiler B showed about five pounds of steam pressure, and at this time Oiler Frank de Courtani, acting as water tender, directed Fireman Holland to close the air cock on boiler B, that the said Holland climbed up and closed the valve, and almost immediately the steam gauge on boiler B failed to register any pressure; that this was apparently not noticed by either the water tender or the fireman, and no attention appears to have been paid to the fact that the steam gauge failed to register. appears to have been paid to the fact that the steam gauge failed to register. but they kept on working the fires and firing heavily; that when the steam gauge on boiler A showed 135 pounds there was no pressure shown on the steam gauge of boiler B."

The finding then goes on to state that about 10.30 o'clock a small leak was found in boiler B. A request had been sent to the boilermaker to come and attend to the leak, when the explosion pocurred.



Spain and California were the centres of production, California lemons sell to-day on the Toronto market for slightly higher prices than the European fruit, being more attractive in appearance, but in keeping qualities they are inferior. The consumption of lemons in Toronto, said Mr. Dawson, is greater in the winter than in the summer season, strange as it may appear.
