# Canada's National Railway.

Length of the Intercolonial Railway, 1355 miles.  
Cost to the people of Canada, \$60,000,000.  
It connects the Maritime Provinces with old Canada—in other words, connects Montreal, Quebec, St. John, Moncton, Halifax, Sydney, Charlottetown.

The Intercolonial gives Canada all-the-year-round seaports at St. John, Halifax, Sydney, independent of all the other railways in Canada or out of Canada.

The Intercolonial is an essential factor in a Canadian fast Atlantic steamship express, making the shortest and safest line between Canada and Europe and the Western States and Europe. As long as Canada controls the Intercolonial she can make any one of her maritime cities the Atlantic port of this fast steamship express. Give up the Intercolonial and Canada will have to submit to the terms of the railways and the ocean lines. She will be no longer free to pick the best port or to change her port as circumstances require. Her hands will be tied.

It is essential to Canada's national existence that she have Atlantic seaports reached by her own railway and not by the mercy of the Grand Trunk or the Canadian Pacific, both of which roads, she enormously subsidized by Canada, have deliberately declared that they are strictly commercial, not national, and that they intend to cultivate Portland and Boston at the expense of Canadian ports.

The Intercolonial is the highway to the great coal fields, iron beds and iron smelting works now being established in Cape Breton. The iron industry of Cape Breton could be frozen to death by private railways.

The Intercolonial will be an essential factor in bringing Newfoundland into the Confederation.

As it is to-day the Intercolonial is a check in the east on the two big corporations winter and summer; much more so in summer, as now that the Intercolonial comes to Montreal it will be able to handle freight by alliances with boats clear up to the head of Port Arthur.

But once the Intercolonial is put at the Georgian Bay via Ottawa and at the Niagara and Detroit Rivers via Toronto it will be an efficient and everlasting check on the Grand Trunk and on the C. P. R. It will be an effective regulator of these and other roads. But it must be absolutely free of all or any entanglements with the other companies. The effect of this regulating power would be felt clear up to Port Arthur.

The Intercolonial at Georgian Bay will be in touch with the Canadian Northern, the promised rival of the C. P. R. in the Northwest and British Columbia.

The great present object is to keep the Intercolonial free and independent, and next to put it in touch with the rich freight-giving Province of Ontario. Ontario paid largely for it, but has no direct benefit from it.

Fearsome of what the Intercolonial is, still more frightened as to what it may become, a movement has been started to destroy it, to tangle it up in deals, to create distrust in it, to lead people to believe that a state-owned railway is, if not impossible, a source of political corruption, and that it ought to be got rid of by giving it over to the Canadian Pacific.

The Intercolonial is Canada's greatest present asset, and its immediate possibilities are still more enormous.

Any man, journal or party that proposes to cripple, alienate or destroy the usefulness of the national railway is an enemy of the nation, a traitor to the people and the friend of the great railway corporations. There is no political crime in sight equal in enormity to this one. And yet it is now in contemplation—has been the object of a conspiracy for years. It has been revived with much fervor within the present year. There are politicians and newspapers actively engaged in this conspiracy to-day!

Give the C. P. R. the Intercolonial and they can bond it for forty million of dollars, and with forty millions what could they not do in the way of buying up politicians, newspapers, parliaments.

Give the C. P. R. the Intercolonial and you increase its power by one hundred million dollars; you put the east under the same freight bondage of which the west complains, and you put back the hands of the clock fifty years. We are in a ten times better position than the people of the United States in effecting emancipation from the thralldom of railways by keeping the splendid beginning that we have of a national railway system.

Hustle the banditti now at work trying to cripple and then alienate Canada's greatest piece of national property.

## ALLIES AT PEKING AS TROOPS MOVED SATS EXPRESS CONFIDENT

### Chinese Official News Received in London Confirms the Report, But No Details Are Given and There Are Doubts.

#### Mr. Brodrick Spoke at a Primrose League Fete and Expressed Himself Hopelessly—Thinks the Situation Better Than for Some Days—Britain Will Not Allow Her Interests to Go Down in Any Part of the World—Unsatisfactory Reports.

London, Aug. 15, 1:50 a.m.—The allies are reported to have reached Peking Monday, says the Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Express, writing yesterday. He adds: "Chinese official news confirms this statement, but without details."

A Paris message repeats this, but the statement, especially as it emanates from Shanghai, must be accepted with considerable reserve.

Other London morning papers, basing their remarks upon Washington despatches, which, with the exception of the Express from Shanghai, form the latest news regarding the advance, are divided in opinion, some believing that the allies must have reached Peking, and others preferring to believe the relief will not be accomplished until the end of the week.

from the Minister of France at Peking, M. Eichen, dated Aug. 9:

"We have been advised that Li Hung Chang is charged to negotiate telegraphically with the powers. We are ignorant of the events occurring outside the legation. It is surrounded by hostile detachments. How could we negotiate without the diplomatic corps regarding its rights and the legation grounds being evacuated? If the negotiations prevent the march of the allied troops, which are our only salvation, we risk raising in our Chinese hands. The section wherein lies the French legation is occupied by imperial troops who have not entirely ceased to fire. We are reduced to siege rations. We have provisions, horses, rice and bread, for 15 days."

**HOPE TO END ENEMY RUNNING.**  
Telegraphing from Yungtun, Aug. 9, a Daily News correspondent says: "Sir Alfred Gesselle hopes to keep the enemy running, and to follow him right into Peking." Ngan Ping was occupied without firing a shot, according to a despatch to the Daily Express from that place, dated Aug. 11.

"It is believed," the message adds, "that General Tsung Fu Shiang, Ma and Chung are assembling 40,000 strong at Tungenchi." The allies may avoid Tungenchi, pursuing the route northwest from Changkia Wan. Tungenchi appears to be about 12 miles from Peking.

**DESPATCH FROM CHAFFEE.**  
No Opposition of Consequence Encountered, But the Heat Has Prostrated Many Men.

Washington, Aug. 15.—The Bureau of Navigation has made public the following despatch:

"Taku, Aug. 12.—Just received an undated despatch from Chaffee, Matow, yesterday. Opposition of no consequence, yet terrible heat. Many men prostrated. Please inform Secretary of War. (Signed), Klemey."

**WILLING TO HAND OVER FOREIGNERS.**  
A despatch to the same paper from Shanghai, dated yesterday, says that the official press is willing to hand over the foreign Ministers, their families and servants, but will not permit the departure of native Christians.

**SUSPICIOUS OF THE PRIESTS.**  
Shanghai Residents Alarmed Because the Place Is Overrun With the Buddhists.

New York, Aug. 15.—The American Bible Society has received a letter from its agent in China, the Rev. John R. Hyatt, D.D., dated Shanghai, July 2. He says:

**DID THEY TALK TOO MUCH?**  
Nothing New in the Goldstein Case to Be Made Public—The Prisoners Convinced.

There are no new developments in the case which was originated by the death of Morris Goldstein at his home at 29 West Queen-street, on Friday last. Crown-Attorney Curry, having returned from his holidays, has taken notice of the case and is pursuing it vigorously. The Crown's case has been strengthened, it is claimed, by additional evidence, but the contents of the St. Simpson Company poison register, traced through the label found in Goldstein's pocket, are being denied. It is asserted in police circles that the prisoners, Annie Hepler and Meyer Shapiro, talked consistently before the court at the Court-street station, and the woman said to have volunteered the statement that she detected Goldstein.

**MR. BRODRICK IS HOPEFUL.**  
Situation More Favorable—British Interests Will Be Upheld in All Parts of the World.

London, Aug. 15.—Mr. William St. John Brodrick, Under Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, speaking this evening at a Primrose League fete, said the Government was not without hope that the legation in Peking would shortly be relieved. He added that the Government considered the situation more satisfactory than it was a few days ago.

**MR BERGERON IS PRESIDENT.**  
Additional Honor Thrust Upon the Eloquent and Popular Member for Beauharnois.

Montreal, Aug. 15.—(Special)—Mr. J. G. Bergeron, the popular member for Beauharnois, received another proof to-day of his growing popularity in this district. Ex-Ald. Bresse having retired from the presidency of the Liberal Association, Mr. Bergeron, M.P., was unanimously elected in his stead.

**BRITISH TROOPS MAY LAND.**  
Victory of Shanghai Has Withdrew British Opposition, But British Hostilities Continue.

London, Aug. 15.—The Times has the following despatch from Shanghai:

"The victory has withdrawn its opposition to the landing of British troops on condition that this does not entail the presence of other forces, but instructions have been received from the British Government that disembarkation is to await further orders. The fact is generally known that Great Britain is hesitating. The public official and unofficial, is unanimously of the opinion that withdrawal at this stage would be deplorable and would produce the worst results."

**BICYCLE FACTORY WANTED.**  
St. Catharines Hat-makers Voted Bonus and Loan to the E. Z. Company.

St. Catharines, Ont., Aug. 15.—The by-law granting the Ham & Not Company a bonus and loan to the E. Z. Company, was passed by the council of St. Catharines, Ont., on Tuesday night, and carried by a majority of 1015 votes. The by-law to loan the St. Catharines Hat Company \$100 was defeated.

**GERMANY ADMITS IT.**  
The Advance on Peking Is Well Under Way—Dates Fixed for Despatch of 75,000 Men.

Berlin, Aug. 15.—The German Government admits that the advance upon Peking is well under way, having received official contradictory despatches to-day. The Foreign Office is greatly astonished at the rapid advance of the international troops, but surmises that the Chinese will make one more desperate stand before the allies reach the capital.

## THE BOERS WILL SETTLE DOWN AS GOOD BRITISH SUBJECTS

### That is the Opinion of Robert Hugh Henderson, Mayor of Kimberley, South Africa, Who is Now in Montreal—Colonials Think Lord Roberts' Policy is Too Lenient.

Montreal, Aug. 15.—(Special)—"In my opinion the Boers will be very glad to settle down as good British subjects with absolute justice meted out to all."

This was the summing up given the South African affair by Robert Hugh Henderson, Mayor of Kimberley, and who is at the present time in the city. Mr. Henderson was the executive head of the Kimberley city government before and during the famous siege, and an active residence of upwards of 6 years in the Diamond City has given him exceptional opportunities of judging South African matters.

Mr. Henderson, who is a native of Ireland, left Kimberley on May 20, and since that time he has visited both England and Ireland, and only arrived in New York City a few days ago.

In speaking of South African matters, Mr. Henderson said that the colonials were not at all satisfied with the extremely lenient treatment which the Boers were receiving. To their minds, the present policy was too moderate, and gave the Boers an opportunity of playing a double game, much to the disadvantage of the British army.

Mr. Henderson's opinion of the Boer was that he was more of a liar than a fighter, and his own particular line of fighting behind entrenchments he was hard to beat.

The Garrison Hard Pressed, Cape Town, Aug. 15.—A messenger from Col. Hoare, commanding the British garrison at Blands River, who reached Mafeking Tuesday, reports that the garrison was still holding out when he left, although Col. Hoare had sustained 60 casualties.

**BOERS ARE SICK OF WAR.**  
Commandant Prinsloo Welcomes Disagreed With Kruger.

Cape Town, Aug. 15.—Commandant Prinsloo, who surrendered to Gen. Hunter July 30, has arrived here. He says he is heartily tired of the war, and welcomes the prospect of peace. The commandant adds that a majority of the Boers are "disagreed" with President Kruger.

**COL. HOARE IS HOLDING OUT.**  
And Hamilton is Hectating to His Relief, But the Garrison is Hard Pressed.

London, Aug. 15.—The War Office has received a despatch from Lord Roberts announcing that Col. Hoare was holding out at Blands River last Friday. Lord Roberts considers that Gen. Hamilton's cavalry must now be within forty miles of Blands River.

**HARVESTING IN MANITOBA.**  
In the Southern Part of the Province the Saving of Crops Is Now Well Advanced.

**GRAIN IN FIRST-CLASS CONDITION.**  
Laborers Not So Much in Demand As in Former Years—Winnipeg Waterworks Trouble.

Winnipeg, Aug. 15.—(Special)—Reports received at the Provincial Department of Agriculture, and from travelers returning from the country, indicate that the harvest in Southern Manitoba is now well advanced, and is progressing favorably. In other parts the harvest is a little later, but the grain is all in excellent condition for cutting and harvest is generally well over the province. The barley and oat crops will be later than wheat, but fully a fortnight earlier than corn. The farmers will thus be given plenty of time to stook in their wheat before the coarse grains are ready. The demand for laborers this year has been small, in comparison with last year, when over 8000 were asked for. The Agricultural Department is leaving the matter almost alone, in the opinion that the supply and demand for laborers will be made several feet below the footings of this wall, causing it to subside. Both the construction of the pump pit itself and also for connections should have been made before the wall was built at all.

**WILLIAM MURPHY BADLY HURT.**  
William Parks Has Been Arrested, and the Injured Man Is in Bad Shape.

Shortly after 2 o'clock this morning William Murphy was thrown from the balcony of his residence at 380 West Adelaide-street, and sustained a severe concussion of the brain. Murphy, at the time, had gone to a room of his home occupied by William Parks and his wife, who, it is said, were quarrelling. Murphy remained with Parks for all-nighting the woman, and the two men quarrelled. They grappled with each other, and Parks, getting the better of Murphy, threw the latter, it is said, from the balcony to the ground, a distance of 35 feet. Murphy was rendered unconscious by the fall, and was found in that condition by Police Constable Mearns. The constable carried him into his home, and Drs. Pepler, Smith and Percy were called. After working with Murphy for about half an hour, he regained his senses and told how he had come by the injuries. P. C. Mearns was called, and looked him up at the St. Andrew's Market Station. Parks is a porter at the Grand Union Hotel.
