

The plates are then heated in a closed compartment for six or seven hours, to not more than 260 degrees centigrade, until the copper is changed into the black cupric oxide.

Finally divided copper wire is obtained by the reduction of fine carbonate with hydrogen. The finely divided copper thus obtained is poured under slight pressure into thin blocks which extend the "pockets" accurate.

Grant is Rescinded—Noisy Aftermath of Dunn Appointment—Pupils Who Take Scholarships.

At the meeting of the High School Board last night L. V. McBrady occupied the chair in the absence of Dr. Elliott, who had an inkling to attend. It was sought to amend the minutes of last meeting by placing on record the names of the seven members that left on account of the appointment of Miss Teresa Dunn to the teaching staff of the Jarvis-street Collegiate. Trustee Roche made a motion to this effect, but it was lost. J. K. Leslie said that so long as a motion had been left he was satisfied with what had been done. The members who left the meeting were: Messrs. Leslie, Lytle, Maguire, McConnell, Ogden, Roche and G. S. Wilson.

The chairman said they were quitters and had shirked their duties, and that they were forced to do so, as every respectable man would have done. The chairman stepped into the matter by instructing the secretary to make a note of the protest.

The action of the board at the last meeting in appropriating \$300 for the annual inter-collegiate games was warmly discussed by Trustee Charles Wilson, who supported it, and Trustee Wilson, who opposed such a grant on the ground of no funds and a large deficit. The motion was carried by the following vote: Yeas—Maguire, Roche, G. W. Wilson, Leslie, Charles, Lytle, J. K. Leslie, and J. A. Richardson; Nays—McBrady, Slatery, Hearp—3.

EXHIBITION DIRECTORS MEET.

Accounts Passed and Preparations Ordered for Next Year.

The Exhibition Board resumed its monthly meetings yesterday afternoon. A number of accounts were passed in connection with the large exhibition, but it was pointed out that many were yet to be received, making it impossible to strike a balance on the recommendation of the Executive Committee, the board decided that the various committees be instructed to revise their sections of the price list, and to bring in such recommendations as they think necessary to the improvement of their departments, with the object of having the present board prepare next year's price list.

That the date of next year's Exhibition be fixed by the present board, as early as possible, in order to permit of advertising material being prepared during the winter and facilitating the work of management.

That the Executive Committee be instructed to report upon the permanent improvement and buildings necessary to be provided for next year's Exhibition, and that such directors as have any suggestions they may deem necessary, and that the Executive Committee prepare a report to be submitted to the next meeting of the board, with a view to submitting a money bill at the next municipal election.

That the report of the Purchase Committee in connection with the exhibition, recommending the purchase of the following pictures, be adopted, and that the purchase price be paid the parties named: Grey Day, J. W. Beatty, \$150; Workers of the Field, F. W. Chalmers, \$150; Moonrise, Mrs. Rice, \$150; August Evening, F. M. Knowles, \$150; Ditching Day, W. D. Blatchley, \$150; Evening Glow, Robert F. Gagny, \$150; The Glory of Year, C. M. Manly, \$100; Old Bridge Devon, W. E. Atkinson, \$50; Street in Light, Joseph E. Roph, \$50; Total, \$1800, and that the pictures purchased under arrangement with the Ontario Society be placed in the Exhibition, to be presented to the City Council by this association, the same to be hung in the City Hall or in such other place as the said Council may direct.

The Executive Committee also reported that, after a close of the Exhibition, considerable difficulty was met with in shipping the pictures to St. Louis. The Canadian Pacific Railway and the Grand Trunk Railway both refused to take them, and the pictures were purchased under arrangement with the Ontario Society. The pictures were to be shipped by express, the C.P.R. refusing to take them by express unless a fixed valuation was set upon them by the proper authorities in England, which was thought impracticable. In order to place the cases in the Grand Trunk cars, it was found necessary to unpack a number of the packages. They were shipped to St. Louis on Thursday last, under special guards, consisting of Mr. Christie, Mr. Swift, sent by the association, and two special messengers, sent by the Canadian Express authorities. A telegram was received on Sunday morning, stating that the pictures had arrived at St. Louis safely, and were at that time being placed in bonded warehouses.

RAWHIDE WHIPPING.

Whips With 12 Tongues and 20 Lashes Each Used.

New Westminster, B.C., Oct. 6.—The old law allowing twenty lashes on the bare back as a penalty for robbery and kindred felonious acts was brought into effect here a few days ago, in an effort to minimize the outcry that has approached the magnitude of an epidemic.

Last week, two hold-up men named Leonard and Lorenzo, who had been found guilty by a jury and sentenced, the first to six and the second to seven years in prison, with twenty lashes as a forfeit of the time penalty, were brought here from Vancouver, and given the twenty lashes in the prison yard.

In administering the lashes the criminals were tied to a post with white high above the head, bringing out every muscle prominent in the back, so that the effect of every blow from the whip would be more telling. The punishment was inflicted with a well dried rawhide with a dozen tongues, and applied with all the strength the wielder could bring into play. It was done under the watchful eye of the prison physician. In former instances from six to eight blows are all that a man can stand without danger to his life.

Leonard and Lorenzo took the full thirty without a groan after the first two or four, which brought them streaming with blood before the full score had been administered.

The men had to be carried into the prison and their wounds dressed before their "time" began.

London, Oct. 6.—(C. A. P.)—Alfred Emmott, M.P., addressing his constituents at Olfham, said: "The Canadians have told us they do not wish to pay more for food in order to buy it from the colonies if it is against the interests of Britain. The Western farmers of Canada are free traders. As it is obviously to the interest of the manufacturers of Canada not to give up the protection they have, and there is not a sufficient increase of trade to be got from the colonies to pay for the sacrifices we should have to make, the only way to arrive at closer connection with the colonies is thru an Imperial council to advise the governments of the various colonies what is best to be done to promote closer Imperial union."
