

Washington, Nov. 10—The Mexican delegation here is receiving advices from delegation here is receiving advices from the Carranza government that indicate a gradual restoration of a sane and settled state of society generally and a return to the normal industrial activity of all sections of the country. Among the indications of this trend of affairs are the following occurrences:—

On November 19, the first Workingmen's Congress will meet in Merida, capital of Yucatan. All questions affecting the working people will be discussed and measures taken to secure the carrying out of the reforms pledged by the resolution. This congress is under government auspices and its recommendations will be submitted to the regular state congress for approval







"The retirement of Sir Sam Hughes is in part the outcome of the establishment of the ministry of overseas forces, and in part is due to the assumption by Sir Sam of powers which, in the judgment of the prime minister, can be exercised only by the government as a whole.

"It is anticipated that the correspondence which brought about the request for the minister's resignation will be made public immediately. It must first be submitted to the governor-general."



Tobacco Leaf explains the causes on these grounds: Increased activity in other industries has made labor in the tobacco-orgrowing districts scarce, and the price of labor unprecedentedly high. The wooden cases in which domestic tobacco is packed, the cheesecloth under which shadegrown tobacco is grown, fertilizers necessary to the soil, implements used in cultivation, etc., all have advanced. And in Cuba the great boom in our sugar has diverted agriculturalists to that industry and created a shortage of good Havana leaf. The result is that all kinds of leaf tobacco used for cigar purposes in this country have gone skyward.

The upshot of it is that, while even before the war began a large proportion of manufacturers were, at the best, just about breaking even on their investment, now they find themselves actually and almost without exception playing a losing game.

JUDGE LANDIS FINES CORPORATION \$171,000 Swift & Company and a Number of Railroads, Inleuding Pennsylvania, Assessed for Violations.

Fines totalling more than \$171,000 were assessed by Federal Judge Landis in Chicago last week against Swift & Company, packers, and several railroads convicted of violating the Interstate Commerce Act. In most of the cases, the charges were rebating or in shipping less than carload shipments at carload rates.

Swift & Company were fined \$60,000. The Pennsylvania Railroad, \$20,000; the Elgin, Joliet & Eastern Railroad, \$20,000, and the Pittsburgh, Cincinnati, Chicago and St. Louis Railroad \$20,000 Chicago and St. Louis Railroad \$20,000 in one case and \$50,000 in another.

In addition, fines ranging from \$100 to \$1,000 were assessed against the Chicago & Northwestern Railroad, the Indiana Harbor Belt Railroad and the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul. These fines were in most instances for failure to comply with the twenty-eight hour cattle law permitting live stock to remain in freight cars more than twenty-eight hours at a stretch without attention.

The Pennsylvania fine and the \$20,000 fine against the P. C. & St. L. were for rebating to the W. D. H. Merritt Comrebating to the W. D. H. Merritt Company, a Chicago Board of Trade firm, while the \$50,000 fine was for rebating to E. A. Eckhart, head of the Eskhart Milling Company. Mr. Eckhart was tried for the same offense some time ago, but the case was thrown out of court by Federal Judge Anderson.




