London, Nov. 14.—The following is used by the Canadian War Records Office, London: Just before midnight, November 10-11, our troops attacked the remnant of the Regina Trench which still remained in the enemy's hands. The distance of the objective from our trenches was about 500 yards.

NEARLY SIX INCHES OF SNOW FOR FIRST STORM OF WINTER

The snow storm which is sweeping over the city today promises to establish a record for recent years. Snow began to fall about eleven o'clock last night and towards midnight the storm began to increase in violence and at nine o'clock this morning four to five and a half inches were registered and there was no indication of the storm breaking for this time of year. The temperature was down to eighteen at nine o'clock this morning and made conditions decidedly wintry.

LOCOMOTIVES WORTH MILLION IN DANGER IN FIRE IN MONCTON

Moncton, N. B., Nov. 14.—Locomotives worth \$1,000,000 were in danger last evening when fire destroyed the interior of the "Old Brick Shop" of the Intercolonial here. The fire approached the oil store, where several cars loaded with lubricants were standing. Fortunately the firemen succeeded in fighting back the flames. The interior of the brick building, formerly used as an erecting shop and a portion of the oil round house were burned. The fire did not reach the new round house in which were the locomotives. An official this morning said the damage would not exceed \$6,000.

FREDERICTON COURT AND OTHER NEWS

Fredericton, Nov. 14.—The November term of the appeal court was opened here this morning with Chief Justice McLeod and Justices White and Grimmer presiding. The following common motions were made: A. C. Jardine, T. Carleton Clinch vs. Prescott Lumber Co.—Feed, K.C., moved for time to file factum and reply appeal. Extension granted until Monday. Lucy McIntosh vs. Felix Poiret—Byrne moved to dismiss appeal with costs. The court considers. Exparte John Johnston—Hughes moved for rule absolute for certiorari and a rule nisi to quash conviction made by the police magistrate of Fredericton for unlawfully keeping liquor for sale, conviction being for third or subsequent offence. The court refused the rule. Fredericton is in the grip of its first snowstorm. It began snowing at eleven o'clock last night and continued up to noon today. About four inches had fallen on the level. HOPE FOR ANNUAL EXHIBITION HERE WHEN WAR IS OVER

Meeting of Association Shareholders—Assistance Given in the Nation's War

While there is little prospect of resuming the holding of exhibitions in St. John while the war is in progress the directors are looking forward to conditions after the war is over which will permit them to make the exhibition an annual instead of a biennial affair.

The annual meeting of the shareholders of the St. John Exhibition Association was held this afternoon in the offices of the secretary and manager, H. A. Porter, for the reception of reports and the election of officers. Previous to the general meeting the directors met, at 2:30 o'clock to prepare their annual report to the shareholders. The report related that, owing to conditions arising as a result of the war, it had seemed to the directors to be inadvisable if not entirely impracticable to hold an exhibition this year, although under ordinary circumstances an exhibition would have been held in 1916.

Mexico Heading Towards Sanity

Recent Changes Effectuated in Internal Policy Give Ground for Optimism, According to Washington Reports

Washington, Nov. 10.—The Mexican Belaguer here is receiving advices from the Carranza government that indicate a gradual restoration of a sane and settled state of society generally and a return to the normal industrial activity of all sections of the country.

On November 19, the first Workingmen's Congress will meet in Merida, capital of Yucatan. All questions affecting the working people will be discussed and measures taken to secure the carrying out of the reforms pledged by the resolution.

The export tariff on silver and copper for the month of November has been established as follows:—Silver in bars or ingots, \$3.461 per kilo; in concentrates, \$4.264 per kilo; copper in bars or ingots, \$0.914 per kilo; in concentrates, \$0.7892 per kilo.

By a recent decree issued by the first chief, all salaries and wages of any class whatever throughout the republic are made payable solely in Mexican specie or its equivalent in the legal issue of paper currency, the former being established as the standard without regard to fluctuations in exchange values.

This method has already been adopted by a number of the large employers of labor, notably certain leading oil and mining companies.

Boston, Nov. 14.—It is reported that Charles W. Morse of New York has secured control, either by purchase or charter, of the steamships Narragansett and Manhattan, and intends to inaugurate a service between New York and Boston next season, in competition with the Eastern Steamship Corporation.

EXIT SIR SAM
"Sir Sam Hughes is the best loved man in political life," declared Mr. J. B. Ferry, president of the Empire Club of Toronto, on Wednesday evening last.

"Great actions and great responsibilities produce great men. I think I am using some language when I say that when history, with its true perspective, tells of the accomplishments of Sir Sam Hughes, it will be seen that he was as great as his great responsibilities, and that he has been more than equal to the tasks that the time demanded."

The enforced resignation of Sir Sam Hughes gives point to all the criticism levelled by the Liberals against the government's conduct of the war. We recall the horse purchases, the Allison scandal, the Ross rifle, the failure of recruiting, the militia camps, the partisanship, the hospitals, and all the revelations of incompetence or worse.

The Standard this morning says that "the reason for the dismissal of the minister of militia is an accumulation of disobediences and other things" which were the "other things" of the Standard.

"General Hughes has been spending millions with a wave of the hand. He has flooded the government on all occasions. The thing could not go on any longer." Here is a remarkable confession. At a time when the government was solemnly preaching economy and thrift and gravely lecturing the country on the sin of wasting money or substance, and imploring the people to fight or pay, and to conserve every available penny.

"We now learn also the truth of the charges made at the time Sir Robert Borden and some of his colleagues rushed down to Valcartier to clear up the situation. The Standard today says that 'most of the charges were true,' but the trouble was 'patched up,' although it continued to grow thereafter. The Standard's review of the situation ends with this singular sentence: 'The general feeling in Ottawa is that the severance of relations between the administration and Sir Sam is in the interest of Canada and the Empire, although some of his political friends may feel that the premier should have overlooked certain things because of Sir Sam's past service.'"

There is evidently some fear of Sir Sam's political friends. The Empire Club of Toronto, which applauded him as "the best loved man in Canada," and those Conservatives in all parts of the country who became fighting mad whenever a Liberal ventured to criticize Sir Sam—what will they do to Sir Robert and his colleagues? But Sir Sam is out of office. Who will succeed him? Will Mr. Blondin be appointed, with a special mandate to imitate recruiting in Quebec? Such an appointment ought to commend itself to the government, and to all the Conservatives who have been denouncing Quebec.

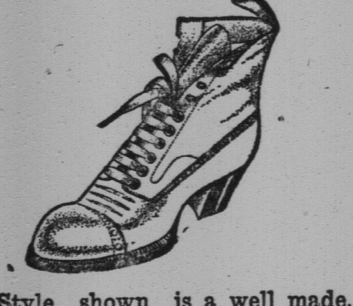

Chicago, Nov. 14.—From the vaults of the Wauworth County Court at Elkhorn, Wis., was brought to light James Herbert Moore, who died on July 17 at Lynn, Wis. The instrument disposes of an estate of more than \$100,000. It was drawn in 1905.

SIR SAM IS OUT; HIS RESIGNATION WAS ASKED FOR

Charges and Counter Charges Said to be in Correspondence With Borden—Four Names in Connection With Portfolio

Ottawa, Nov. 13.—Late tonight the following statement was given out from the prime minister's office:

It is announced that the prime minister has requested and has received, the resignation of the minister of militia and defence.

"The retirement of Sir Sam Hughes is in part the outcome of the establishment of the ministry of overseas forces, and in part is due to the assumption by Sir Sam of powers which, in the judgment of the prime minister, can be exercised only by the government as a whole.

"It is anticipated that the correspondence which brought about the request for the minister's resignation will be made public immediately. It must first be submitted to the governor-general."

Sir Sam Comes Back

After reading a brief statement issued by Sir Robert Borden tonight defining the reasons for General Hughes' resignation the latter made the following counter statement:

The correspondence will show that Sir Robert Borden asked for my resignation on account of the tone of a letter written November 1 by the minister of militia, showing that the prime minister had made mis-statements which the minister of militia promptly proved to be incorrect and had made criticisms which were shown to be unwarranted when all the facts were considered.

Sir Sam added: "Accompanying my resignation was a request to the prime minister that all the correspondence in connection with the affair might be published promptly. I feel quite happy. There is a load off my back that has been on for years. The Canadian citizen, during that time, have made a record second to none in the world. They have proved themselves gentlemen, fearless and self-sacrificing. Canada regards the force with pride.

"In leaving this department I feel I have nothing special to regret in the way of work or men. The officers, so far as I am aware have been loyal and self-sacrificing. They have been true. In Great Britain during the first year of the war, Canada had practically no control, the British system was followed. We have since reorganized the pay and medical departments, and of course, have improved the training of the men to meet the changed conditions of the war.

"Last year for nine straight months our soldiers got no rest from the trenches. I, this year planned extra divisions so that fully one-quarter of the men could be resting at a time, but perhaps the most important development of all has been the growth of perfect harmony with the war effort, with Sir William Robertson, George Wigham and all the senior officers there. British statesmen too, including Mr. Asquith, Lloyd George, Mr. Balfour, Lord Lansdowne, Lord Grey, Mr. Bonar Law, F. E. Smith, Lord Selborne, Lord Derby and all the others are ever ready and desirous of advancing the wishes and the best interests of Canada and Canadians.

Still to Work for Canada.

"To Sir Max Aitken Canada owes a deep debt of gratitude for his great work in connection with the war. I consider it my duty to give every assistance I can to help the cause. I do not know who my successor may be, but whoever he may be, he can count on my assistance in every legitimate way to help him on in the cause. I part with my colleagues with more or less regret and if in the future they follow proper lines I will give them or anyone else my cordial support."

"What are you going to do now," the general was asked.

"My intention is to go on with recruiting just as in the past, only more so," said Sir Sam and the interview came to a close.

cabinet re-organization, most prominent among which is the familiar story of the premier going to London as high commissioner. This story also places Sir Thomas White in the premier's place but an official statement was given out from the prime minister's office tonight authorizing denial of the rumor that Sir Robert Borden intends to give up the premiership and retire from public life. The somewhat unusual and suggestive course has been adopted by Sir Robert of declaring that he is going to stay on his job.

The quarrel between Sir Sam and the rest of the government has been rapidly coming to a head ever since the former returned from England two months ago. As has been public property for months past, a section of the Conservative party has been out after Sir Sam's scalp almost since the outbreak of war. He has been his own master in the militia department, and his brusque manner of turning down members of his own party, who thought they had a right to exercise political patronage, his refusal to consult his cabinet colleagues on the details of his departmental administration, his occupancy of the centre of the stage when they too wanted a place in the spotlight, and his riding rough shod over all and sundry who tried to interfere with him, made him many enemies, although at the same time it gave him a unique prestige in Canada as the man in the cabinet who did things.

No successor has yet been named for militia department portfolio. Four names are suggested:

Hon. A. E. Kemp, at present chairman of the war purchasing commission; a former acting minister of militia, and minister without portfolio in the cabinet.

Sir James Loughheed, government leader in the senate, formerly acting minister of militia, and at present chairman of the Dominion Hospitals Commission.

F. B. McCurdy, the parliamentary secretary for the militia department, who has been more or less in control of the department for the last three months.

Colonel Hugh Clark, parliamentary under secretary of state for external affairs and Sir Robert Borden's confidential handy man.

Company Must Lay Grooved Rails

But Given a Year to Make Change on New Section in Indian town—Meeting of the Common Council

The street railway and its use of the city streets was the subject of a lively discussion in the common council yesterday afternoon, the discussion arising from the report of the commissioner of public works regarding the renewing of rails and the change of location in the tracks at the foot of Indian town. The council finally agreed to permit the company to lay the T rails now being put down, with the understanding that they should be changed to an approved form of grooved rails within twelve months. Commissioner Fisher's demand that they should lay granite block pavement between the rails was not enforced.

The committee's recommendations that the commissioner of water and sewerage be permitted to purchase a two ton truck and that his purchase of 250 acres of land at Lake Latimer be approved were adopted.

The council adopted the report of the commissioner of harbors and lands recommending the issue of a renewal lease of a lot in Prince ward to the estate of George H. Oulton; that the city accept a quit claim deed of Lot 5, Block D, Dukes ward, for \$100 cash and a conveyance from the city of Lots 1 to 4 in the same block, now held by him under the statute of limitations; that the city accept \$460 from Robert Magee for a lot in the southern side of Duke street; that the council in committee on Thursday should consider the offer of the government for two lots at Reid's Point required for the elevator site, and that Harry Goucher be given permission to place a lunch wagon at the corner of Union street and Rodney wharf, W. E. for the winter months for \$60.

The request of the chairman of the board of assessors for an accurate plan of the city by wards and a card system for tax-payers, was referred to the commissioner of finance.

WANT "TEDDY" IN 1920

Oyster Bay, L. I., Nov. 14.—"Teddy, yes; Hughes, no," was the banner borne aloft near the head of a procession of Democrats celebrating the election returns here tonight. It started out to be strictly a Democratic jubilee, but there were so many "T. R. Democrats" in town that the affair took on a bi-partisan atmosphere with frequent vociferous

allusions to "Teddy in nineteen twenty." When seen during the progress of the parade and told of the "nineteen twenty" sentiment, Colonel Roosevelt literally threw up his hands. What he said was not for publication. He also refused to comment on the election.

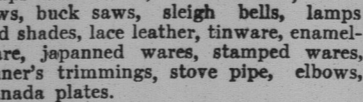

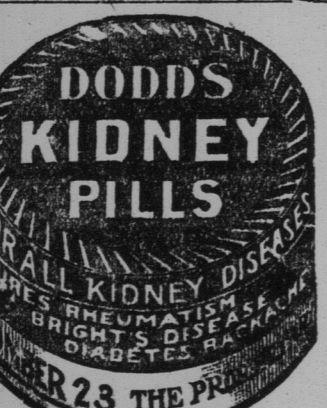

Vaudebond, Fredericton, 9th Siege Battery.

Major L. P. D. Tilley, director of National Service for New Brunswick yesterday made public an appeal for recruits. He says that the number of recruits secured does not equal the wastage. "We have promised our boys on the firing line 500,000 men from Canada, and we have not fulfilled that promise by 180,000," he explains.

In the midnight casualty list the name of Alex. Method, Dalhousie, appears as being wounded in the only New Brunswick man in the list.

Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Bell of Aponeauqui have received word from Ottawa that their youngest son, Allan W. Bell, has died of wounds. G. R. Farley, a native of Bristol, Carleton county, now of Samoa, California, has received word that his son, George Raymond Farley, of Winnipeg, has been wounded. At the time of enlistment when he joined the 43rd Cameron Highlanders, young Farley was employed on the Canadian Pacific Railway.
