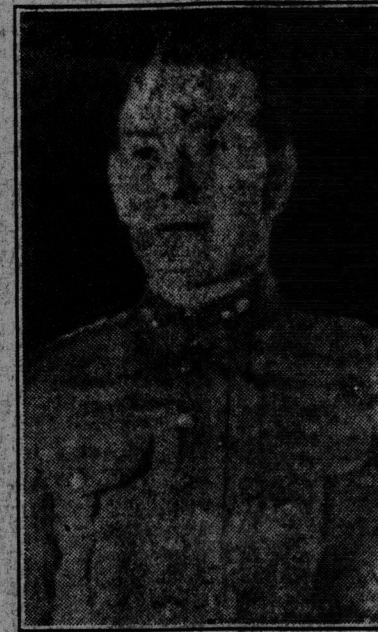

QUEBEC CHRONICLE PROPRIETOR AMONG LABASSEE WOUNDED

Ottawa, Ont., June 19.—Col. David Watson, of the second battalion, proprietor of the Quebec Chronicle, Captain Willis O'Connor, of Ottawa, and Lieut. F. W. Campbell of Mount Forest, each of them reported wounded, are all that the overnight casualty lists contain about the latest fight at Labassee. The casualties given among the men are undoubtedly from earlier engagements and the lists from the battles of this week have not yet come through. The losses, it is understood, are comparatively small. Fourteen were reported killed, nineteen wounded, and eighteen missing in yesterday's fight.

NEWS OF LOCAL SOLDIERS AT THE FRONT

Mr. and Mrs. Fidele Sawyer, of Moncton, have received a letter from their son, Pte. Gale Sawyer, of the 10th Battalion, who was reported missing, but the letter is dated May 28, which was before he disappeared. In his brief communication Pte. Sawyer tells of heavy fighting, through which he had come unscathed. Patrick Gallagher of Moncton, has not yet received any information as to the whereabouts of his son, Walter, who was reported missing some time ago. A letter to his brother says that Gordon C. Emmerson, son of the late Judge Emmerson, was shot in the shoulder and in the hands, but that his wounds are not of a very serious nature.

P. E. I. SOLDIER DIES FROM EFFECTS OF GERMAN POISON GAS

Charlottetown, P. E. I., June 19.—James McIsaac of Souris has received word of the death of his son, Gunner Neil McIsaac, in hospital in France from gas poisoning.

SEVERAL GET TERMS IN THE PENITENTIARY

Criminal Docket in Court at Summerside Was Lengthy

Charlottetown, P. E. I., June 19.—In the supreme court in Summerside yesterday the jury disagreed in a case against Calvin and Irving Lewis charged with shooting with intent to kill Barbour, prohibition prosecutor and Constable Brown when engaged in setting liquor from the defendants. The latter, on another charge of falsifying checks, were sentenced to five years in the penitentiary. Joseph Campbell for shop breaking, was given five years; Joseph Desroches, larceny, two years; John Conaghan, shooting and wounding a policeman, seven years. The criminal docket this year was unusually large.

CANADIAN OFFICER, KILLED IN ACTION, LEFT \$162,879

Toronto, June 19.—Captain Trumbull Warren, who was killed in action on April 20, left an estate valued at \$162,879. He was president of the Gutta Percha Rubber Company, and the largest single item of his property is shares in it, valued at \$78,000. He had stock with a total value of \$188,127 and eight life insurance policies amounting to \$200,821. His will was made on January 9, 1911, before his marriage to Miss Marjory Laura Braithwaite. It directs that all his property go to her.

RAISULI AGAIN IN LIMELIGHT, NARROW ESCAPE FROM DEATH

Madrid, June 19.—Raisuli, a brigand and pretender to Morocco's throne, had another narrow escape from death, according to the Herald, when ten members of his suite were killed by the fire of Spanish troops near Arzila, a Moroccan seaport.

Winnipeg, June 19.—Representatives of Conservative organizations in eighteen provincial constituencies, at a meeting here, decided that a provincial Conservative convention should be called, and urged that if a provincial election were held every seat should be contested.

DEATH AND PROPERTY LOSS IN GREAT STORM

Detroit, Mich., June 19.—One person was killed, and two others fatally injured, many were slightly hurt, and thousands of dollars worth of property was destroyed late yesterday by a severe wind and electrical storm in the southern and central sections of lower Michigan.

AFTER BRIEF ILLNESS

The death of Mrs. Catherine Christina, widow of James Marshall, occurred this morning at her home, 145 Millidge avenue, and came as a shock to her family after only a brief illness. She was forty-five years of age, and before her marriage was Miss Marshall of Moss Glen. Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. Walter Vincent of this city, and Miss Winona, at home; four sons, Oakley, William, Walter and George, and two brothers, George and James Marshall of this city. The funeral service will take place tomorrow evening at her late residence, probably at the conclusion of the evening church services; the body will be taken on Monday morning to the steamer at Indiantown and the interment will be made at Williams' wharf.

ITALIANS HIT AUSTRIANS HARD

Damage in Raid by Naval Sea Plane and Dirigibles

POPE'S NEPHEWS AT FRONT

Three in Army and Another is Going — Italians Now Occupy More Austrian Territory Than Was Offered Them to Keep Out of War

Rome, June 19.—A combined raid by an Italian naval seaplane and dirigibles upon Austrian positions on the Isonzo front is described in an official statement. Serious damage is said to have been done to railroad stations and to Austrian engine-train sheds. The machines returned safely.

GERMAN ARMORED AUTOS BEHIND BRITISH LINES

Have Been Shelling Hospital and the Trenches

Sensation at Boulogne in Capture of Party of Enemy Left Hidden When British Drove Germans Back — Had Stores for Fifteen Months

Boulogne, June 19.—A sensation has been caused here by the report of the discovery of a party of Germans with two armored automobiles, hidden behind the British lines. The mysterious shelling of the British hospital, which was moved several times without escaping the bombardment, and shells falling into the British trenches from behind, led to a search by an expedition, which finally located the party of eight Germans and two automobiles, each of the latter armed with aero guns. They were ensconced in a cave with stores and provisions for fifteen months. The cars and the stores had been left behind, carefully hidden, when the German line was pushed back by the British, while the small party remained behind, hoping to put the material to some use. After a time the Germans ventured out and shelled the British positions as described. They are now prisoners.

AGAIN, THE KAISER

Paris, June 19.—Extracts from a letter said to have been sent by Emperor William to a personage connected with the Bavarian court, and published in Spain, are reproduced by the Matin. He is quoted as saying in part— "Our only object is a peace profitable for the German states.

DOCTOR KILLED IN NO MAN'S LAND

Paris, June 19.—Dr. Auguste Chailion, a young physician connected with the Pasteur Institute, was killed while carrying out the dangerous task of disinfecting bodies lying between the French and German lines. A glittering cyanide disinfectant which he carried, caught the eye of a German sentry and he was opened with a machine gun. One of the shells struck Dr. Chailion killing him instantly.

POPE'S NEPHEWS IN ARMY

Rome, June 19.—Three nephews of Pope Benedict, sons of his sister, are now at the front with the Italian army. Another nephew the son of Admiral Della Chiesa, who is preparing to rejoin the military regiment in which he is an officer, was received by the Pope.

Instruction in swimming is given, free of charge, by Martin Burns of Windsor street, West St. John. He will have bathing suits and towels for hire.

THE DUKE AT SUSSEX

A royal guard was sworn in at Sussex last night to meet the train on which it was thought H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught was to arrive. They went on duty and paraded to the depot, but evidently the plans had been changed, and at midnight they were ordered back. This morning's orders were for parade for inspection at 10 o'clock. The battalion inspection will occupy practically all morning, and at 1 o'clock His Royal Highness will have luncheon with the officers, for which a special menu has been prepared.

MAYOR'S COUSIN DEAD

John Fowler Frink of St. Mary's died last night, aged seventy-three. He was a bachelor and resided until a short time ago on a farm at Nashwaak village with James, an unmarried brother. They did their own cooking and housework, in addition to operating a large farm, and were noted for their hospitality. The late Colonel Marsh of this city was a brother-in-law and Mayor Frink of St. John is a cousin of the deceased.

SERVICE AS BEFORE

The street railway service has been restored to normal conditions by the resumption of traffic on the Union street line which was torn up during the dispute with the city. The cars are now traveling around this route in both directions as formerly.

RIVER CLEAR OF LOGS FROM GRAND FALLS DOWN

Fredericton, N. B., June 19.—James S. Newell and C. T. Duffy left this morning for Southwest Miramichi on their annual fishing trip. There is reported to be a good run of salmon and trout. The corporation drive reached the boom limits yesterday and the river is now clear of logs from Grand Falls down. The latest report from the drive is that it has reached the mouth of Black River. Killburn's logs for Murray & Gregory are in this drive.

Russia Admits Being Driven to Last Line of Defence at Lemberg

Petrograd, June 19.—In an official statement, issued last night at the War Office, it is admitted that the Russians have retired beyond the line of lakes at Grodek, less than sixteen miles west of Lemberg, their last line of defense in front of the Galician capital. Near Comoline the enemy spread a cloud of asphyxiating gas on a front of four miles. "On the right bank of the San our troops retired fighting beyond the River Tanell, and the line of lakes at Grodek. "Between the Fourth and the Dniester, where the enemy crossed the frontier on the previous days, he has been driven back to Austrian territory."

THE WAR NEWS

The end of another week finds little change in the active fighting, although British, French and Italians all report some ground gained, and Russia reports a successful counter move against the Austrians in one quarter while being pressed back in others.

There is reason to anticipate long casual lists as a result of the heavy fighting for some days past along the British and French fronts, although it is certain that the German losses, both along the British and French fronts, continue to be large.

The British government has decided there will be no general elections for at least a year, and no municipal elections will be held this year.

With regard to munitions of war, the Russian government is reported to have taken over all the factories capable of turning out munitions, and will speed up the production of that for which they have the greatest need.

A delegation of British workmen has returned from the war zone convinced that the greatest need is munitions of war.

When evidence of graft is produced as in the Kent county case before Commissioner Chandler, and when a government newspaper talks to give a fair report of the evidence, and tries to deceive the public as to its nature; and it is evident that the course of the newspaper is directed by the government, it is quite useless to expect an end of grafting operations as long as that government remains in power.

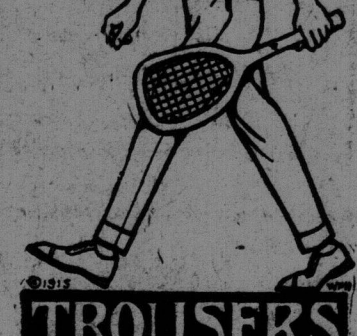

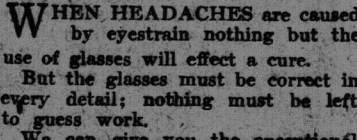

**A LESSON FROM THE FRENCH HOUSEWIFE**

Live Under Your Income and be Happy and Wealthy

Mabel Potter Daggett tells many interesting and important facts about the French housewife. The following extract is from her article in Pictorial Review for July 1913.

Is it not simple, so even as Asalle Vinet says? If you wish to accumulate a fortune, it is only to spend less than your income. She is doing it even now as the mistress of her beautiful villa. Twice a week she drives into Cannes along the Boulevard Dimitri that skirts the flashing blue Mediterranean waters of the Bay of La Napoule. At the Market Pavillon that is beneath some oleander trees in front of the old church of the Misericorde she makes her purchases while Nanon, her maid, carries the basket. Madame Vinet will take with her all of the trimmings from that piece of meat. The butcher will not with a stroke of his hand sweep the bone and the fat into a box beneath the counter, to be sold back to the beef trust after Madame in France has paid for it. Madame Manhattan quite willingly enough permits this to her butcher, because she does not care. What would one do with the bones and the fat anyway? In New York, they are but a bother. But in France, I assure you, the bone is for the pot-au-feu, and the trimmings will be fried out and put in a little jar to save the expense of lard and butter. All of these things Madame Vinet is doing as methodically today as she ever did.

For in her household, no economy is overlooked. When she and her maid come driving back home, she will go directly into the kitchen with Nanon, herself to supervise the cooking. This is a French kitchen, anyhow, which is to say that it is not the deserted annex to the rest of the domestic establishment that it would be in America. And when Asalle Vinet has entered it, somehow the cook stove itself is dignified into an instrument of the culinary art. Her little heels click mutably across the red hexagonal tiles with which the floor is inlaid, and all the shining brass saucepans in a row on the wall reflect her approach. She goes not dumbly driven and rebellious to her task, as an American woman whose cook has suddenly departed.

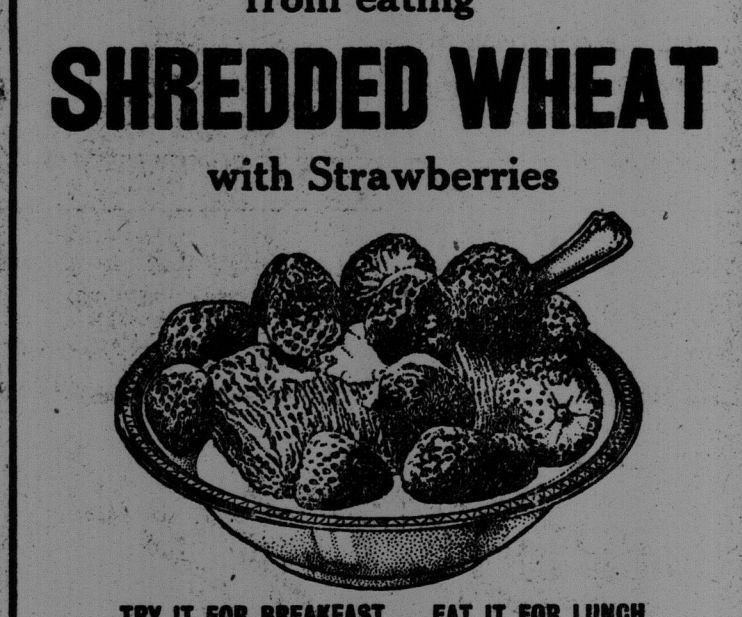

Albee is receiving editorial praise all over the country for his campaign against vulgarity in vaudeville and against the booking of criminals and notorious people. He is in deadly earnest and the bars are up hard and fast. Mr. Albee loves vaudeville with the love of a parent for a child, and he protects it might and main from the influences that might lower it. He sees in vaudeville a union of all the arts, an entertainment that draws upon every branch of human endeavor, and represents in its programme everything that is worth while in entertaining man. Fortunately, he makes his business come true.

James McElders, "Dondidier" in "The Pink Lady" when it played St. John's Opera Company, is playing in one of the companies alternating between Washington and Baltimore.

The Orphean Players, who created so favorable an impression here a fortnight or so ago with "The Lottery of Love," are returning to the city with another excellent production, "The Mills of the Gods," one of the recent New York successes. There should be a better reception for these players as they are capable and give a pleasing, standard production. It is their intention also to present "Mrs. Temple's Telegram," a well known comedy, and "The Lottery of Love," in which they have won success.

Chaplin Speaks. Rumors had been started and have spread to St. John that Charles Chaplin had been injured and was in hospital. There were other unfounded stories telling of other ailments. Mr. Chaplin has not missed a day from his work and indignantly denies that he has been sick or injured.

In One of T. McAvity & Sons' King Street Windows is a Copy of Royal Gazette Containing Announcement

With the modern methods in vogue today it is possible to learn the news of victory or defeat before the last gun has been fired, but evidence that our forefathers were not so privileged is furnished in the display of an issue of an old-time publication "The Royal Gazette Extraordinary," in the windows of T. McAvity & Sons, King street. It is the property of Harry Lugin of the cutlery department and has been cherished as a family treasure.
The document is of itself and needs no explanation, other than to draw attention to the manner in which the news of a victory which meant so much to the world, was received in this country, and the length of time it finally simmered through that Waterloo had been fought and won. More than six weeks elapsed before printed word brought the news of victory to many in these parts. It is dated at Fredericton July 27, 1815, and was sent with a Halifax date-line of July 27, 1815.
