

Consists in Deposits of Minerals, Says Dr. McHargue.

When one eats a lobster, an oyster or a crab, one is consuming a mine, or, at least, part of a mine, which contains least, part of a mine, which contains deposits of copper, iron, manganese and zinc. The oyster, notwithstanding that it is much smaller than the lobster, contains more copper than the lobster. These interesting discoveries have been made by Dr. J. S. McHargue, director of the Kentucky Agricultural Experiment Station at Lexington, and have been submitted to the Americar-Chemical Society. The report recently published in the Atco News, says:

What effect the discovery that these favorite shellfish are laden with valuable metals may have upon the consumption of them is not discussed in the report, and its absence is accepted as meaning that the demand for them will not be affected. Other parts of Dr. McHargue's report read:

"The stomach and thorax of the lobster is richer in copper than any other of its organs. The edible portion or tail

"The soft-shelled crab contains perhaps as much copper in its edible tissues as the lobster and considerably more zinc. Since the shell was included in the analysis of the crab it is quite probable that the edible meat would give a larger figure for copper than in the analysis."

The vitaminic factor, in which Randoin, the French scientist, has shown the oyster to be rich, may, Dr. Mc-Hargue prophesies, ultimately prove to be zinc. Then he says:

"As investigations tend to show that copper, manganese and zinc are essential in the metabolism of higher animals, including man, it is evident that the consumption of oysters, clams, lobsters and crabs and other sea foods will supply the minerals which have been eliminated in the highly milled and demineralized cereal products which form a very important part of our diet."

standing features of today's conference of Provincial Treasurers with the Minister of Finance and the taxation officials of the Finance Department was the address by Dr. Tory, of Edmonton, who last year investigated and reported upon the question of rural credits and who was asked by the banking and commerce committee last session to suggest coordinating measures in the light of further inquiry. The representatives from the Maritime Provinces, it is understood, have put forward the request that the Canadian Government grant to them the privilege of taxation of the Canadian National Ry. It was pointed out in support of this contention that the provinces of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island were in a unique position due to the fact that they were virtually title holders. Ontario and the western provinces, on the other hand, as stockholders, enjoyed the right to levy taxes on the Canadian National Railways.

On behalf of the Province of Alberta, Hon. R. G. Reid, Provincial Treasurer, submitted the attitude of his Government to the conference, making a survey of the entire situation. Owing to the initiation of certain policies by the Dominion, problems have been left to the province for solution which have strained the financial resources of the province and have placed upon them a burder which is not properly them, according to Mr. Reid's case.


"The Dominion income tax," continued Mr. Reid's statement, "invades the field of direct taxation to such an extent that it makes it extremely difficult for the provinces to relieve their financial burden by the imposition of a provincial income tax, as such a tax would be regarded as overlapping and for that reason very objectionable. The municipalities of Alberta have been agitating for some years for a share of certain taxes collected by the Province but it is impossible for the Provincial Government to relinquish certain of its taxing powers to its municipalities until the present arrangement of taxation between the Fed-

"Zapfenstreich was the name given it by the soldiers and exactly describes the purposes of the call. It was the signal for the end of the night's beer-drinking bouts and other revels of the troopers. To insure this the Provost Marshal would proceed to every sutter's booth—the equivalent to our canteens—to see to it that the bung (zapfen) was in every barrel. To make sure that

"We retain the French infantry Reveille, and First Sergeants' Call is taken from German army signals. Retreat is of very ancient origin and is one of the few calls known to have been used by the Crusaders. The oldest bugic calls preserved in notes are to be found in a composition published in Antwerp in 1545, La Bataille,' by Jannequin, describing the Battle of Mariganno in 1515. Not a few of those ancient battle signals can be found at least reminiscently in our calls of today.

tapers from the bell to the mouthpiece, the latter is of the same diameter for its whole length until it reaches the flare at its extremity. The trumpet is more of a music producing device than its smaller contemporary and its chief use is for so-called bugle bands. The bugle is much shriller and more penetrating in its tone—a quality which made its strident notes distinguishable even above the din of battle. Both instruments are limited in their range to about an octave. The various notes on the bugle are obtained by lip pressure and use of the tongue, the lips compressing as the notes rise in pitch, with a corresponding increase in 'wind' necessary on the part of the musician to accomplish them. The more expert players are given to what is known popularly as 'triple-tonguing,' which adds considerably to the beauty of the calls, giving, as it does, staccato effect.
