





FATIGUE

How many times have you had to refuse invitations to go somewhere or do something you really wished to do, because of being dead tired or fatigued? Fatigue may be termed muscular, postular or nervous. Muscles in active continued use pour into the circulation chemical substances which strongly affect, by their stimulant action, the respiratory nerve centers. There is a direct connection between muscular action and nerve fatigue.

In addition to cell loss or waste by action of the muscles, there is also a complicated chemical waste production. By long continued or violent action this waste is thrown into the body circulation more rapidly than it is removed. In normal muscular action this so-called overloading is rarely apparent.

Loss of "pep," or fatigue through bad posture, is also of frequent occurrence. Careless, slovenly habits, or indifferent posture, bring this about. If the strain or pull is not too severe on the sacro-iliac joints (base of spine) and reflex action through the spinal cord not retarded, this cause will be greatly reduced.

Circuit Court Hears Case Over Possession of a Summer Camp.


