Money Loosens a Little. Montreal, March 12—The Gazette says: Locally, the stock market yesterday was somewhat disappointing in view of C. P. R. sharp advance in London, but again the feeling has become decidedly cautious, and the Berlin uncertainties in particular continue to exert a depressing influence. Money is apparently lossening up a little, although improvement is slight, and a fair demand by investors who look favorably on the present price level is also noted. Such disappointment as may have been felt at the failure of the general market to respond to C. P. R's London rally is probably largely on the surface. The market has given up tem-porarily the habit it developed in the early autumn of jumping at any favorable turn in the news as indicating prospects of immediate improvement. The C. P.
