An entrance was found, however, by way of an adjacent shaft, and, on descending in this maner, the rescuing bracties came across some scores of men huddled together in portions of the mine, where the ventilation was still good. Soon 327 living miners were rathered together and taken up the shaft, with the bodies of six of their companions, who had been killed by being dashed by the explosion against the aprights supporting the galleries.

The officials of the mine found it necessary to call a detachment of police to keep back the women and children, who had crowded round in the vain hope of obtaining some news of their relatives while the mine managers with the tears streaming from their eyes, replied to all enquiries: "There is little hope."

Most of the rescued men presented a pitiable appearance. Some of them were not expected to live, and nearly all of them were suffering from burns and shock or the effects of afterdamp.





AWFUL BUNGLING IN HUDSON BAY

Charter Steamer on Wild Goose Chase, Paying First Cost of Craft, and Then Sending Host of Officials to North Sydney

(From the North Sydney Herald.) After being buffeted all over the Atlantic, carrying thousands of dollars worth of valuable merchandise and material, all the property of the ratepayers of Canada, and with not a dollar of inor canada, and with not a dollar of in-surance on it, the chartered steamer Al-cazar arrived in port Monday morning, and docked at the terminus wharf. In-cluded in the steamer's cargo is some 1,-500,000 feet of pine lumber, which was taken on board at Port Arthur, Texas,

taken on board at Port Arthur, Texas, to be used in railway and wharf construction at the proposed terminal in the Hudson Bay.

Through stupid bungling and characteristic carelessness, the government officials did not take the trouble to find out whether there was any facilities for out whether there was any facilities for landing the cargo, and so, after exposing

landing the cargo, and so, after exposing the ship and cargo, as well as the lives of the crew to the violent weather of the North, the Alcazar was forced to return to North Sydney (via Halifax) to land her cargo on the terminus wharf, where it will be stored until next year. On the Alcazar's arrival she was towed into the terminus wharf by the tug Hilford, with the gasoline boat of James Kelly & Co., running the lines The latter firm have the contract from the government to discharge the cargo, and when the steamer docked, a gang of men were in readiness for the work.

An idea of the extravagance the country is subjected to may be gathered from the fact that the first item of expenditure in connection with the Alcazar was an outlay of thirty-five thousand dollars, the amount guaranteed for the re-

lars, the amount guaranteed for the re-turn trip to the Bay. Besides this the owners of the ship are to receive \$250 a day since September 21st, which will amount pretty well up to the cost of the Alcazar, whose owners paid \$60,000 for

her.

Then there is the army of "bosses" at the terminus wharf. No less than sixteen higher-ups arrived here, some before the steamer reached port, and took up quarters at the hotel. All are here in connection with the discharging of the Alcazar's cargo. Some are from Ottawa, others from Halifax, and others from everywhere. The last arrival was James E. Lawlor, who is acting under orders from the department.






