Daily Hints For the Cook

CREAM CAKES.

Pour one cup of boiling water over half cup of butter in a saucepan. Put on fire and when it boils stir in one cup of pastry flour (sifted). Stir continually over fire until it is smooth and cleaves from the dials. Set aside to cool a little. If you have nothing else to do make your cream filling. By that timp it will be cool. Then stir in three unbeaten eggs (one at a time). After adding the least one put in a pinch of seda about the size of a pea. Drop on a greased tin about two inches apart. Wet weur fingers in cold water and pat cakes into a good shape gently. This makes twelve large cakes or fifteen small-sized ones. Put the pan in a hot oven and don't open the door for ten or twelve ininutes, then if you find them browning too faat reduce the heat. A half hour is usually necessary for baking them.



ANOTHER SHILOH CASE

Portland, Me., May 19—On Friday, Rev. A. A. Whittaker, of Shiloh, and one of the trusted lieutenants of Rev. Frank W. Sandford, was brought before Justice George F. Haley, of the supreme court, to answer to a petition drawn by William A. Connellan, the attorney for his wife, Mrs. Florence W. Whittaker, askink that he be ordered to pay into court a reasonable sum for the support of his minor children pending the hearing in the fall of a libel for divorce brought by her. The hearing was a peculiar one. Mr. Whittaker paid no attention to the presence of his wife or of their children and on the stand said that he was without a cent in the world, and that he gives his services to the common cause at Shiloh. He said that he is a minister of the gospel, and that in his opinion no minister of Christ can receive any pay for preaching. He offered to give Mrs. Whittaker and the children a home at Shiloh, but made it clear that they would live as the rest do, and take such food as might be in the common stock, and added that his children must be educated in the religious faith taught there, because it is in his judgment the only true faith.







MORE THAN 50 HOUSES AFFECTED
