Conservative Scaremongers Draw | WETMORE'S, the Fire of Their Own Guns

In the west the feeling of hostility to those raising the annexation cry is general and emphatic. Nor is its expression confined to the friends of reciprocity. The Victoria Colonist, the principal Conservative paper on the Pacific coast, recently attacked the scaremongers with the utmost vigor. Using as its text the statement of The London Morning Post, that the dominions must adopt free trade or must adopt Imperial preference because there cannot be unity in foreign relations without unity in trade. The Colonist says there is no must about it, and adds:—
"The empire managed to exist before most of the new advocates of Imperialism learned off by heart the expressions that are being shouted from the housetops as the last word in British statesmanship. This talk about unity of trade being essential to unity of policy and hence to unity of nationhood is simply the language of sixty years ago modernized to meet present political conditions.

"We do not suppose there is much that a newspaper in this part of the world can say to influence the London dailies; but if we could get the attention of those who control them, we should say to them:—
'Labor as earnestly as you can for unity of trade, but cease this senseless dogmatizing about what must and what must not happen.' We would tell them that they can no more forecast the future of the empire than their grandfathers could, who used to deplore the then alleged im-

DISMANTLING CORONATION DECORATIONS

Appearance After **Great Event**

MANY VIEW ABBEY

Sightseers Pay Fee to See Place Where Coronation Took Place -Great Gathering of Children -The Resumption of Nation's Business by Parliament

(Times Special Correspondence) London. June 28-Now that the coronaion testivities are ended, the decorations in the streets are being quickly dismantled. It is a melancholy sight to witness more rejoicing among the poor at the capture of the refuse than was displayed by the rich occupants of the seats who spent their guineas to view the royal processions but a few days ago.
