Much of Newer Part of Hotel Damaged by Smoke and Water

OUEBEC, Que., Jan. 15-The Chactacle. Its southwest wing and the terior of the newer section is filled the hose lines which last evening fought a disastrous fire in the older section. 

QUEBEC AGAINST IT. Citing a recent statement by Mr. Taschereau, who quoted a decision of the English court to the effect that the fig. Lawrence cannot be deeped nor can power be developed from it without the consent of the Province of Quebec, Mr. Dempsey showed that the province has set itself against the deepening of the river and against the proposal for exporting to the United States of any power developed upon it. Even if Quebec accredited the St. Lawrence project, said Mr. Dempsey, it would still be to the best interests of the United States to adopt the all-American route because the Canadian waterway proposal places on the United States financial obligations not in proportion with the usefulness which this country could derive from it. The United States would pay \$17 to every

After being deepened, Mr. Dempsey pointed out, the St. Lawrence will remain as it is, the river of a foreign country, and Canada will have five-sixths of the power produced. In such circumstances, Mr. Dempsey said, the cost to the United States would be unreasonable. He added:

"We are satisfied that the all-American route lacks no advantages possessed by the St. Lawrence and possesses many great advantages. The St. Lawrence route will serve only our trade with Europe, while the all-American waterway will serve an infinitely more important commerce through the Panama Canal and for the entire Atlantic and Pacific coasts, as well as Central America, Mexico and the West Indies, because of all of our commerce, except with Europe, the St. Lawrence route is 2,000 miles longer and so utterly unusable. Every student of commercial relations knows that the future development of commerce in the United States depends in a manifold greater degree on the countries to the south and to the east of us than it does on Europe."





I Have Never Known of a Single Case Where a Woman Who Was a Money-Earner Did Not Give With Both Hands to Those Depending Upon Her," Says Dorothy Dix, Defending Woman's Place in Business World.

I HAVE received a letter from a man who says that he is violently opposed to women working outside of the home, and that it is a shame for a girl to work in an office or a store when there are so many men who need good jobs. Then my correspondent asks:

"Do you ever think of the children who are starving because you have got a job that some man ought to have?"

Well, no, Mr. Man, I really have not thought of myself as one who snatches the bread out of the mouths of little children, but I do think sometimes—with thankfulness that I am able to do it—of several people into whose mouths I put bread, and even occasionally a little cake.

Now, in my turn, I desire to ask a question of this man, and of all the other men who see red at the thought of a woman being able to draw down a respectable pay envelope. And this is what I want to know:

The boys will give their mother a small part of their salaries ry week, but the girls turn over the whole amount that they not o her. It is the girls who buy better furniture for the house, to get mother a new dress, and father a warm overcoat—not the rs who are spending their money on having a good time them

ALL of us know old maids who sacrificed their youth and beauty, and their opportunities of marrying and having husbands and homes and children of their own, because an old father and mother had no other support than the money they earned, so they felt they couldn't give up their jobs. Or they were putting a brilliant young brother through college, or giving a pretty sister the chances in life she needed, or saving some little nephews or nieces from the cold charity of an orphans' asylum.

Ask any working woman what she does with her money. Nine times out of ten she will tell you that she supports a sick husband, or little

children, or a feeble old father and mother, or that her sister's husband doesn't get along, and that she helps with the rent money every month, or that she pays the board somewhere for an old aunt or cousin. Virtually there is always somebody with whom she is dividing her earnings, somebody for whom she is denying and sacrificing herself, somebody for whom she is working.

If today every woman who follows a gainful occupation were ousted from her job, and the job given to a man, as my correspondent desires, there wouldn't be enough orphan asylums and old people's homes and blind and deaf and dumb institutions and hospitals in the world to hold the hordes of helpless and afflicted people, now supported by women, who would be thrown out on the public for sanctuary.

THAT is what makes so unjust and so cruel the charge that the working woman takes the place of a man and robs him of his just deserts, and that she should be ashamed of herself. The truth of the matter is that just as many working women support families as working men do, and the pay of the working woman goes into hungry mouths and clothes naked backs instead of going into finery and chiffons for herself.

Of course, in reality a woman has just as much right to work and to earn an honest living as a man has, and there is no more reason why a man should object to a woman having a position in an office or business that he covets than he should object to another man having it.

Life owes each of us just exactly what we have the brains and the industry to collect from it, and because an individual happens to be born of the female persuasion does not invalidate her claim. Nor is there any justice in the assertion that the working woman keeps men from marrying. On the contrary, it releases men for matrimony.

IN THE olden days, when women were parasites, a man who had sisters could not marry until he was lucky enough to unload them on other men, because he had to support them. Many an old bachelor has had to stifle his love dream and put away his romance because it took everything he earned to feed and clothe a pack of useless, idle women at home.

Nowadays sister rolls up her sleeves and gets herself a job, and no more thinks of hanging like a millstone around brother's neck than he thinks of depending on her, and brother is at perfect liberty to marry whenever he sees fit.

So the man who wants to do the baby act and demand that women shall be shut out of gainful occupations because they fill positions that some man would like to have will have to find some better excuse than that the working woman is depressing the matrimonial market and taking the bread out of the mouths of starving children. We all know too many working women who are the stay and support of their families to listen to that.

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



## Fire Sweeps Quebec Hotel Wing; 6 Hurt


