CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE I.—This Organization shall be called the NEW BRUNS-WICK BAPTIST CONVENTION.

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ARTICLE II.—The object of this Convention shall be to promote Home Missions in this Province, to assist the N. B. Seminary and the Baptist Annuity Association, located in New Brunswick, and generally to foster all interests that immediately pertain to the welfare of the Baptist Denomination in New Brunswick.

ARTICLE III. - The members of this Convention shall consist of Delegates of Baptist Churches contributing to the support of the objects for which it cares. Each Baptist Church may send three Delegates, including its pastor, and an additional Delegate for every hundred members above one hundred.

ARTICLE IV.—This Convention shall meet annually, the second Saturday in September, at 10 o'clock, A. M., and at such other times as it shall direct. Special meetings may be called by the President upon written request of a majority of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE V.—The Officers of this Convention shall be a President, three Vice Presidents, a Recording Secretary, a Statistical Secretary, a Treasurer and an Auditor. There shall be a Board of Directors, composed of twenty-one persons, seven of whom shall be elected annually. The duties of this Board shall be the supervision and conduct of the work of the Convention between the times of meeting. The Officers of the Convention shall be ex officio members of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VI.—The Constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds vote of all Delegates present at an annual meeting, notice of change having been given one year previous.

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BYE-LAWS.

I. The Board of Directors shall meet monthly at such place as they may decide upon, notice of which shall be given by the Secretary to each member of the Board. Five members shall constitute a quorum at any regular meeting.

II. Notice shall be given by the President in the MESSENGER AND VISITOR, for at least two weeks, of any special meeting of the Convention or Corporation called by the requisition of the

Board of Directors.

III. The Board of Directors shall have full power to transact all business between the Annual Sessions of the Convention, such transactions to be regarded as done by the Convention or Corporation itself.

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MINUTES

OF THE

NEW BRUNSWICK BAPTIST CONVENTION.

HARVEY, ALBERT CO., SEPT. 14TH, 1895. SATURDAY MORNING.

THE SECOND ANNUAL MEETING of the New Brunswick Baptist Convention was held with the 1st Harvey Church, beginning on Saturday, Sept. 14th, at 10 A. M.

After opening with prayer and social exercises the brethren present urged the propriety of waiting until the arrival of the noon train for the larger portion of the Delegates who were expected at that time.

After the conclusion of the social "meeting adjourned until 2 P. M.

SATURDAY AFTERNOON.

In the absence of the President, G. G. King, Rev. Geo. Howard, Vice-President, took the Chair. A brief social service followed, after which the names of Delegates present were handed in. The Convention then proceeded to election of officers as follows:

The Committee of Arrangements made a partial report for evening session.

SATURDAY EVENING.

Session opened with prayer Ly Rev. W. J. Bleakney.

The Convention proceeded to election of Directors and by ballot chose the following to fill the place of the seven retired by lot: Rupert Haley, H. C. Creed, J. E. Marsters, J. J. Bostwick and Revs. G. O. Gates, I. W. Corey and W. C. Goucher.

After prayer, by Rev. W. J. Thompson, adjourned to meet for business or. Monday at 9 a. m.

SABBATH MORNING.

A Devotional service was conducted by Rev. S. D. Ervine from 7 to 8 A. M., and also another from 10 to 11 A. M., by Rev. A Rutledge.

At 11 A. M., after reading of Scripture and prayer offered by Rev. George Howard, the Convention sermon was preached by Rev. B. N. Hughes, from II. Corinthians iii : 5, "Our Sufficiency is of God."

At the close Rev. G. Howard spoke in line with the thoughts of the discourse, offering at the same time several interesting personal reminiscenses.

SABBATH AFTERNOON.

At the same hour a Sabbath School service was held in the Baptist house of worship. Addresses on Sabbath School work were delivered by Revs. M. Addison, S. D. Ervine, F. C. Wright and Bro. M. S. Hall.

At 4 P. M. Revs. W. E. McIntyre and J. H. Hughes were called upon to speak on the Convention and its object.

SABBATH EVENING.

At 7 P. M. a missionary meeting was held, and after the usual opening exercises a sermon was preached by Rev. J. W. Manning on Foreign Missions. In an earnest and forcible manner the speaker laid the claims of this work before a large and interested audience. The collection taken at this service was for Foreign Missions.

After singing by the choir the Secretary read the H. M. Report on the year's work, and also a letter from Bro. John Hardy, concerning the St. Francis Mission.

Rev. S. D. Ervine, General Missionary of the Convention, followed with a stirring address on the work of Home Missions.

At the close an interesting evangelistic service was conducted by Rev. W. J. Thompson.

MONDAY FORENOON.

Devotional service 8.30 to 9 A. M., after which the regular Session was opened by prayer, offered by Rev. J. W. Manning.

Minutes of previous Session read and approved, after which the Report on Denominational Literature was presented by T. H. Hall, as follows:

Report on Denominational Literature.

Your Committee on Denominational Literature beg leave to report that we regard the influence of the moral and religious sentiments contained in the books we read as one of the mightiest forces affecting the spread of our principles as Baptists.

Our growth and progress depend largely on the purity of the reading that is placed before our people, and especially in the hands of the young.

In the present day our homes are filled with all sorts of writings, much of which is the production of authors whose hearts are untouched by the power of divine grace, and whose wild imaginings are the outcome of the peculiar bias of their education and personal surroundings. Many of them present very erroneous ideas as regards truth and the higher aims of life. There is no factor, the ministry scarcely even excepted, that is exerting a greater influence in moulding the character and life of our people than the literature they read.

Our Sunday Schools should be supplied with the Lesson Helps published by the American Baptist Publication Society. These can be obtained by the Sabbath Schools in this Province at the same cost as at the publishing house in Philadelphia, and in large or small quantities, as may be required. The Sunday School Library should be carefully selected, and no book admitted that inculcates religious doctrines differing from sound Bible teaching.

Care should also be taken in the selection of newspapers and magazines read in our families. Your Committee would suggest that every Baptist family take the MESSENGER AND VISITOR, whose columns contain a synopsis of the secular news of the world, together with the best religious information and especially that in regard to the work of our denomination.

The recent B. Y. P. U. movement has in it many commendable features. Its course of Christian culture, which is pursued by the young people of many of our churches is one which we think is destined to be a strong factor in the furtherance of our distinctive denominational principles. We have the highest hopes that great good will result in connection with this department of Christian work, and trust that it may be richly blessed of God wherever found.

The Report was spoken to by Revs. S. McCully Black, W. E. McIntyre and J. H. Hughes, and adopted.

The Report on Sabbath Schools was presented by Rev. M. Addison.

Report on Sabbath Schools.

Your Committee believe Sabbath School work to be a work of great importance, and that it should receive the sympathy and support of the members of all our churches. We believe that none but those who are Christians should be appointed to do important work in the schools, and that all Superintendents and teachers should first know for themselves something about the saving grace of God before undertaking to teach others the way of life.

We also hold that great care should be taken in the selection of literature for the Sabbath Schools, and that non-denominational, or inter-denominational literature should not be thrust in our schools when better can be had in our own publishing houses.

Furthermore we are of the opinion that Baptist schools have nothing to gain by entering inter-denominational Conventions, and that it would be better for them to ally themselves with the Sabbath School Convention in their own Association. We also believe that in any Association where a Sabbath School department does not exist steps should be taken, whenever convenient, to effect an organization.

Finally, your Committee would earnestly recommend that all Sabbath Schools, wherever possible, be kept running throughout the year. The work of God is not to be held in check while every worldly interest is promoted steadily and successfully. Let every school be ever green and ever active in the good work the Master has committed to its charge.

The Report was spoken to by Bros. A. W. Fownes, M. S. Hall, and Revs. S. D. Ervine, F. C. Wright, M. Addison and W. J-Thompson, and adopted.

Resolved, That a Committee be appointed to correspond with the Superintendents of the Sabbath Schools in New Brunswick, with a view of effecting the formation of a Baptist Sabbath School Convention, to meet annually with this body.

The Committee appointed were Rev. S. D. Ervine, Bro. S. L. T. Wiggins and Rev. F. C. Wright.

Capt. G. A. Coonan having expressed a desire to resign as a Director of the Convention, in order to give place for the appointment of Rev. W. W. 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Report on Home Missions of the N. B. Convention.

BY SECRETARY REV. W. E. MACINTYRE.

In looking over the first year's work done by this Board, we think we have much reason for encouragement. Quite a number of interesting fields have been cared for, while many others, which as yet we have been unable to assist directly, present an inviting prospect for the still unexpended energies and benevolence of our people. At the beginning of the convention year, in September last, Bro. J. W. S. Young, undertook service with the Board as general missionary for the province. He has visited many destitute sections, besides rendering timely assistance to some of the pastors in special work. Several extensive revivals have been enjoyed, resulting in considerable additions to the membership of the churches. At Jemseg, Salisbury, Ledge Dufferin, Upper Kingsclear, Andover and Aberdeen, gracious manifestations of saving power were witnessed, and the churches greatly strengthened. Even yet in other localities, as we write, there is "the sound of a going in the tops of the mulberry trees," indicative of the continued progress and success of the work. Bro. Young also visited the Canterbury churches, Rockland, Hartland, Havelock and various other places. He reports 146 baptized by himself, besides upwards of 50 others bay tized by the pastors whom he has assisted. In June of the present year, the Board appointed Bro. S. D. Ervine also as a general missionary, and he began July 1st, by visiting the Lower Miramichi churches, chiefly assisting Bro. W. J. Bleakney, at Newcastle, Derby, Northesk and Southesk. Bro. Bleakney had been holding special services a few weeks when Bro. Ervine came to his help, and soon the blessing of God crowned their labors with much success. For several weeks the interest continued good ; the churches were greatly revived, and some valuable additions made to their numbers, twelve of these being by baptism. This has been hard ground for many years, and considerable difficulties still meet our efforts, yet we hope to see the truth prevail, and many more brought into gospel liberty to praise the great Redeemer's name. The Board has also extended

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assistance to several churches which have been unable to support pastors throughout the year. A few of these are named below.

TABERNACLE MISSION, ST. JOEN.

We have assisted this church with a grant of \$150 for the year. Bro. E. K. Ganong, the pastor, since accepting the charge herehas also taken with it the Rothesay church, yet both together are scarcely able to support a pastor without outside help. The interests are at present in good working condition.

OTNABOG, QUEENS CO.

There is a small organization at this place wholly composed of colored people, and known as the Olivet church. Bro. Immanuel Neales, a native of Abysinnia, now residing in Woodstock, has preached to them for a part of the year, and they are just now attempting to get a building erected. They have secured the ground and also have some funds on hand for beginning the house of worship. We have given Bro. Neales a grant of \$20 and hope to increase it this year.

NASHWAAK.

For some time this field has been associated with Cardigan in the support of a pastor. There is, however, abundant ground nearer by in connection with the interest here to fully occupy the time of one man. Several out stations inviting our work ought to be taken with the Nashwaak church by itself, such as the section at the Nashwaak covered bridge, Parker's Ridge, Campbell Settlement, the vicinity of Boiestown, and some other localities at present unoccupied by us.

CARDIGAN.

Bro. P. R. Knight has been with this church in connection with Nashwaak up to June of the present year, doing good service. Of late, however, he has felt it his duty to withdraw, owing to the long distance he had to drive from his home at Lower French Village, on the West side of the St. John river. Many of the brethren here are inclined to think that this church could be more conveniently worked with the Keswick churches and some adjacent out-stations, which in a short time could be brought to give material help in the support of a pastor. During the past year the Board has given this group a grant of \$75, far less than the actual needs of the case, but it seemed about all we could fairly do.

QUEENSBURY, YORK CO.

Upper Queen bury, where Bro. E. C. Jenkins has been stationed since January, has also required the assistance of the Board. Here is to be found a number of scattered interests, covering a wide extent of country, yet all combined not quite able to maintain regular pastoral supply The Board has pledged this field a grant of \$50, and we have much reason to believe that ere long a .self-sustaining pastorate will be established permanently.

NEWCASTLE, MIRAMICHI.

A large and interesting section of the Home Mission fields of New Brunswick, is to be found in the valley of the Miramichi, and along its numerous tributaries. We have granted assistance to Newcastle, in connection with various out-stations on the Lower and Northwest Miramichi. Here Bro. W. J Bleakney has been stationed for some time, including in his pastorate, Newcastle, Derby, Northesk, Southesk, and a number of stations in the adjoining sections. Bro. Ervine, general missionary, after having spent some weeks on the field, assisting pastor Bleakney, writes thus in his last report:

"At Little Southwest, I spent three weeks, laboring with the Southesk church. The people were anxious for special work, although in the midst of the haying season. We held 31 services, made 79 family calls, which resulted in quite a general revival among the members, and the awakening of a goodly number. Seven happy believers were baptized, one a Romanist and one a Presbyterian. There is work enough on this field occupied by Bro. Bleakney for two men, and if another wide-awake spiritual man could be placed there, I believe good returns would be given for the work."

We hope some day the Board may be able to carry out our brother's wish.

BUCTOUCHE, KENT CO.

At this place Bro. R. M. Bynon has been stationed over what has hitherto been called the St. Mary's group. A good interest has been manifested, and several have professed religion and united with the church. There is in this locality, an increasing indication in favor of our work, and we hope to hear of good results there ere long. We are assisting them with a grant of \$80, and the mission field is endeavoring to keep Bro. Bynon E.]

throughout the year. General missionary Ervine is at present holding special services here, and the prospect is encouraging.

ST. FRANCIS AND GRAND FALLS.

This ground has been but little cultivated for the last two or three years. During the latter part of the present summer, Bro. John Hardy, licentiate, spent several weeks visiting and preaching in these localities. We subjoin a part of his interesting report as furnished to the secretary of the Board :--

"Here is a field extending from eight miles below Grand Falls to Little Black River up in Maine, a distance of about 80 miles along the St. John river. About ten preaching stations may be attended with 200d results. One of these, eight miles below Grand Falls, is a F. C. Baptist church, where good work could be done for Christ. The names of the other stations would be, at Salmon River two, at Priceville, Grand Falls, St. Leonards, Grand River, Edmundston, St. Francis meeting house, McLeans, Little Black and Allagash settlement. The field viewed from all sides presents a mixture of the encouraging and discouraging, but I regard the encouraging features to be the greater, leaving out, if we will, the overwhelming encouragement of God's promises. The people are not, as a whole, very wealthy, but they are very kind. Then, too, they are eager to hear the pure gospel of the finished work of Christ.

I came away only sorry that I had not gone before. When I was up at Little Black River, I called at a Roman Catholic house, where the woman was very poorly and was suffering great agony. When she heard that I was in the house, she asked if I would not come in where she was, and read a prayer for her. I told her that I would not read any prayers, but that I should be pleased to read some of God's Word and pray with her. To this she consented, and I read and commented on John 3, 14-18, and Romans, 5-8, and offered prayer. I then talked to her about Jesus and Jesus only, until finally a commented to her about Jesus

and Jesus only, until finally she said she would trust Him alone. Now, brethren, we should not think of going to Heaven ourselves and leave people such as these behind to starve. They are asking us for the bread of life, let us not give them the stone of denial; they are asking us for the meat which endureth forever, do not give them the serpent of indifference; they are asking for the fulness that is in Christ, oh, in Jesus' name send them not empty away. Besides the work among the settlements, there are

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in the winter months, camps in the woods, within an accessible distance from Little Black and other points, which would furnish a grand opportunity for good work. Bros. March, Knight, Estabrooks and Henderson, have been honored instruments in this field, as also, others, who have done work here for shorter seasons. And now will the younger men stand back, an i see the cross lie on the ground? Surely not. Rather let some brother, Simonlike, shoulder and carry it until Christ is glorified in this place. Though the way may not appear practical to some, yet let us remember that the promises of God are practical things, and all that we want is a practical faith to handle the pr cious promises to the honor of the great Promiser.

Now by the great commission, by the wounds in the souls of men, by the gaping wounds of Jesus Christ, by an open hell and an open heaven, I exhort you, brethren, in behalf of these people to heed the mandate: 'Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature.'"

OTHER INTERESTS.

Besides the sections already referred to, several important communities have been brought to the attention of the Board, as worthy of a favorable consideration. Some have even forwarded urgent applications for help, which we regret to say we have thusfar been unable to give. Among these may be mentioned the Tobique valley, parts of Restigouche and Gloucester, the upper sections of the Miramichi, as also other considerable portions of Northumberland, Harcourt and Richibucto in Kent, Shediac and Calhoun's Mills, with other points in Westmorland, Loch Lomond, Kingston, in Kings county, Oromocto, including New Maryland, Canterbury, York Co., and a number of weak and scattered missions in the county of Charlotte.

FRENCH WORK.

Your Board has not yet seen its way clear to open work among the French Acadians, although our responsibility in this direction has been partially realized. With the large numbers of these people, especially in the northern and eastern sections of the province, and with an opportunity at our door, more favorable than even in Quebec, we certainly owe it to these people to givethem the gospel of life and salvation, as Goa has given it to us. We trust that in the near future, we shall be able to employ regularly some of the men trained at Grand Ligne, who would doubtless be able to do more effective work among their French compatriots than laborers of purely English parentage.

ESTIMATES.

In view of the work done this year, as also that requiring to be done in the coming year, we feel it to be our duty to urge the churches to increased benevolence in the matter of Home missions. At least \$3,000 should be raised annually to carry the many fields now press above th all other enough, pastors b that they stewards.

now pressing upon us for our help. Nor do we think this amount above the standard of our people's ability, even considering fairly all other interests to be maintained. We could do this easily enough, if there was but first the willing mind. Let all the pastors bring this claim closely home upon the hearts of the peoplethat they may feel constrained to do the will of the Lord as Hisstewards.

With 165 churches, containing about 16,000 members, the Baptists of New Brunswick ought never to let it be said of them that they thought of giving less than twenty cents per member. to so important a work as hat of home evangelization. Give us this much, at least, brethren, and we can then hope, with God's blessing, to keep nearly all our ordained ministers comfortably settled and our churches open the year round. AN ACT to Incorporate the New Brunswick Baptist Convention.

PASSED 21ST APRIL, 1894.

WHEREAS, It is represented that at the Forty-eighth Annual Meeting of the Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces, convened in the Assembly Hall of the Union Baptist Seminary, at St. Martins, in the Province of New Brunswick, on the nine teenth day of August, A. D. 1893, a Report of a Committee appointed by said Convention in joint session with a Committee appointed at a meeting held in Brussels Street Church. in the City of St. John, in the said Province, in the month of May, A. D. 1893, was submitted and adopted, which Report is as follows:— "In order to preserve the unity and harmony of the Denomination, and also to meet the desires of many in the several Provinces to manage independently their own Provincial concerns, we submit the following Basis of Organization :

"1. That the Maritime Convention continue to manage Acadia University and Foreign Missions;

"2. That each Province shall by separate Convention, or in any other way it may elect, care for Home Missions, Academic Education, and the other local interests, as may be most acceptable to the churches;" and

WHEREAS, It has been deemed advisable in pursuance of the terms of said Report, to organize a separate Convention for the Province of New Brunswick, for the purpose set out in the last paragraph of the said Report, and it is advisable that such Convention should be a duly incorporated body;

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Lieutenant Governor and Legislative Assembly, as follows :

1. That George G. King, Calvin Currie, John H. Hughes, Alexander B. McDonald, George Howard, John E. Hopper, D. D., Thomas H. Hall, Samuel E. Frost, Jacob S. Titus, Nathaniel B. Cottle, Moses S. Hall, David Weston, Malcolm C. McDonald, William J. Bridges, David W. Estabrooks, Charles Titus, William C King. Thomas Hetherington, Thomas Todd, Joseph A. Cahill, Willard E. McIntyre, James S. May, and all the Delegates of the Baptist Churches in the Province which contribute to the support of the objects for which this Convention cares, their associates, successors and assigns, be and they are hereby declared to be a body politic and corporate, by the name of "The New Brunswick Baptist C a common name, and and privil poses here the said corporatio legacies, d chattels, e enjoy land property, part there other prop they may

Baptist Convention," and by that name shall have succession and a common corporate seal, may sue and be sued in its corporate name, and have, exercise and enjoy all and singular the powers and privileges incident to a corporation incorporated for the purposes herein stated, and may accept, receive and take over from the said Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces, or any corporation or corporations, person or persons, any moneys, funds, legacies, donations, trusts, lands, tenements, hereditaments, goods, chattels, estste, and property, and purchase, hold, possess, and enjoy lands, tenements. hereditaments, goods, chattels, estate and property, and may seli, mortgage and convey the same, or any part thereof, at pleasure, and with power to invest any moneys or other property which may come into their hands in such ways as they may deem most advantageous.

2. The principal objects of the said Corporation shall be to promote and care for Home Mission work and Academic Education in the Province of New Brunswick in connection with the Baptist Denomination, to assist the Union Baptist Education Society, and the Baptist Annuity Association, and to assume control and conduct any and all other local interests of the Baptist Denomination in New Brunswick which may be properly delegated to the said Corporation, and generally to foster all interests that immediately pertain to the welfare of the Baptist Denomination in the said Province.

3. The members of the said Corporation shall consist of the persons named in the first section of this Act, with delegates from Baptist Churches in the Province contributing to the support of any or all of the objects for which it cares. Each of such Baptist Churches may send three delegates, including its Pastor. Any church having a membership of over one hundred may send one additional delegate for each additional hundred members it may have.

4. The officers of the said Corporation shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary. Statistical Secretary, Treasurer, and Auditor, and such officers shall be elected annually, at the annual meeting, by ballot of members of the Corporation. In case of the death, removal from the Province, or resignation of any of such officers, others may be elected in their stead at any general or special meeting of the Corporation.

5. There shall be a Board of Directors composed of twenty-one persons, to be elected in manner specified in the preceding section for the election of officers. Seven members of the Board of Directors, to be determined on by lot, shall retire each year at the annual meeting, and seven persons shall be elected in their stead, and such persons so elected shall serve for three years; any retiring member shall be eligible for re-election. In case of the

death, removal from the Province, or resignation of any Director or Directors, another or others may be elected at any general or special meeting of the Corporation to fill such vacancies for the remainder of the term of the person in whose stead they are elected. The officers of the Convention shall be *ex officio* members of the Board of Directors; such *ex officio* members shall be in addition to the twenty one members of the Board above referred to.

6. The said Corporation shall meet annually, on the second Saturday in September, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, or on sufother day or time as the Corporation may, by bye law, appoint for the election of officers, seven Directors, and the transaction of such other business as may come before the meeting. Special meetings may be called by the President upon request, in writing, of a majority of the Board of Directors. Notice of the time and place of meetings shall be given as, and when, the said Corporation by bye-law, rule or regulation may determine.

7. If from any cause the election of officers or Directors should not take place, as provided in the fourth and fifth sections of this Act, the Officers and Directors then in office shall continue until others are elected in their stead.

8. The said Corporation shall have power to make. ordain. establish, alter and amend, all necessary bye-laws, rules and regulations consistent with the laws of this Province, for its own government and the due and orderly conducting of its affairs, the management of its property, defining duties of t fficers and Directors, and the accomplishment of the objects of the said Corporation.

9. The said Thomas Todd and Willard E. McIntyre, or either of them, are and is hereby authorized to call the first meeting of the said corporation hereby created for organization under this Act by notice published in the "Messenger and Visitor" for at least two weeks before the time of holding such meeting, which notice shall specify the time and place at which such meeting shall be held, and the purpose for which the same shall be called.
