TWENTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT.

The Twenty-second Annual Meeting was held at the Home, 21 St. Mary street, on Friday, 29th of October, 1897.

His Worship the Mayor of Toronto presided. Letters were read from His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor, Mr. W. McMurrich and others, regretting their inability to be present at the meeting.

The meeting was opened with prayer by Rev. Dr. Pearson.

The Chairman then made a few remarks respecting the well-doing of the Institution. In the absence of the Secretary the Manager's Report was read by Mr. Lawrence Baldwin, the adoption moved by Dr. Parkin in a very able address, and seconded by Mr. G. A. Mackenzie, of Deer Park.

The Treasurer, Mrs. Boulton, presented her annual statement, the adoption of which was moved by Mr. Herbert Mason who, in a few appropriate words, pointed out that though the maintenance of the Home still depended on the generosity of the public, the Board is greatly to be congratulated on being free from all debt, both on the main building and on the Cottage Hospital, and also the Home put in thorough repair and the balance paid on the Victorian

Cot endowment; these benefits being due to the liberal legacy left by Mr. Tucker. This excellent showing was seconded by Alderman Scott.

The report of the Work Room was read and moved by Mr. Baird, and seconded by Rev. Mr. Hart.

The Medical Report was read by Dr. Strathy, moved by Dr. Spencer, and seconded by Dr. Dawson.

MANAGERS' REPORT.

Last year, 1896, in celebrating our majority and reviewing the labors of the past twenty-one years we showed how by faithful, persevering work, we had overcome one by one the many difficulties and the prejudices that stood in our way, and had reaped our reward in at last being recognized as perhaps one of the most efficient of the many life-saving institutions that Toronto is so justly proud of. Yet proud as we were of our large and carefully kept Home there were many repairs needed, and improvements required for the preservation of the building and the safety and health of the inmates. But, year after year, found our Treasury too low to allow this much needed work to be undertaken. We could only wait hoping another year might find us in a better financial position. And now, in this Jubilee year of our honored Queen, we, with grateful, thankful hearts to "Him who givest all," on this the 22nd year of our incorporation can also celebrate with her our Jubilee year. Our hope has been realized and our Home to-day is, as we have long wished to see it, free from debt, thoroughly renovated and repaired, all the heating arrangements improved, the required

protection of proper fire escapes erected, \$1,000 invested to maintain a cot, known, in commemoration of this year, as the "Victoria Cot," and the surplus invested. These grand results are the outcome of the kind thought for us of one of the earliest friends of the Home, who seventeen years ago was instrumental in obtaining for us a part share in half of the estate of the late John Tucker, but to the enjoyment of which the Home did not come into until January last. Through our Solicitor and with the co-operation of the executors "The Trusts Corporation" we were enabled to realize our share which amounted to \$9,000, and our Treasurer will give a detailed report of the appropriations to the different works, all of which were carefully superintended by the ladies composing the various Committees.

Out of this number 12 were foundlings brought in between April and September, 10 sent through the agency of the Children's Aid Society, 74 the children of married parents, the remaining 98, of illegitimate parentage.

Of these 85 adult inmates 14 were married women. During the year 6 of the unmarried mothers returned to their

homes in Canada and 2 were sent to their parents in England, all taking their children with them. Four were taken home by their parents in Canada, their children having died, and one young woman was married in this Home and took her child out with her. Remaining in the Home, September 30th, 1897 :

Notwithstanding the unusually crowded state of the wards, the health of the children has been good. Few deaths among the children of mother-nurses, and although a serious epidemic of scarlet fever has been very general throughout the city our fever cases only numbered three, and all of a mild type; but a full report will be given by the Medical Staff of the Home, to whom we feel we can hardly adequately express our thanks for the continued interest shown by them for so many years in this Institution, and the time so ungrudgingly given to our little waifs—time, which in their busy lives, must often be with difficulty spared. In March, our Matron, Miss Trowbridge, being obliged to leave us, our Head Nurse, Miss Scott, was appointed to the position, which she fills with as great satisfaction to us, as she did her former one. Miss Sylvester, who was selected from several applicants, is doing admirably in the often arduous and always most responsible duties of Head Nurse. But above all, we feel that to our Lady Superintendent, Mrs. Jordan, we are indebted for the thoroughly efficient working of the Home, and are sensible of what material benefit to the adult inmates is her constant kindly interest and wise guidance.

One adoption only was there this year from the motherless children under our care, but four children sent to the Home by the Children's Aid Society, have by them been adopted into good homes.

Over thirty letters have been received from all parts of the Dominion in answer to inquiries made by our Secretary and the reports of the children adopted in the past, are in every case most satisfactory. Some are now grown to man or woman's estate and starting in life for themselves. Several have passed honorably through their different schools, whilst the younger ones, one and all, seem to make the happiness of their homes. The only regret we, as their past guardians, have, is that the anxiety of the adopted parents to keep from the children the knowledge of their adoption, prevents us showing the personal interest in them we would wish to.

Twice during the past year we have had to mourn the loss of dear friends and fellow-workers with us. In March, Miss White, full of years, was called home. From the first and even, unto the last, her loving hands were always busy working for the little ones sheltered here.

We were greatly pleased to receive from her niece, Mrs. Hamilton, the very speaking likeness which "In loving memory" of our dear old friend, hangs in this room. Later in the year, in the death of Mrs. Bendelari, we experienced another great loss. Mrs. Bendelari has been for eighteen years associated with us on the Board of Management, and until the last few years, one most actively interested in all its work. To her are we principally indebted for the very great success of the several large entertainments undertaken by this Board. The erection of the Cottage Hospital or

Annex as it is now called, was mainly due to her interesting the city and obtaining from them the necessary grant. Our last report to her, only the day before her death, and none could have been more welcome, was the good news that the mortgage being paid, the Cottage Hospital, as well as the main building, was free from debt. That the name and work of our valued colleague may not be forgotten, we have to her memory, planted a tree in the grounds of the Annex.

We are very glad after a year's absence to welcome back, restored to health, our fellow manager and directress of the sewing room; Mrs. Hodgins, and though her assistants, in that most useful department, have not allowed the work to fail, we feel sure that now they will resume their work with even greater energy.

Before closing the record of the year past, we wish to tender to our Solicitor, Mr. Miller, a very hearty vote of thanks for his ever ready response to our calls upon his time and advice, and for his attention to the interests of the Institution, which, this year most especially, has called from him much arduous work.

To the Rev. Dr. Pearson, of Holy Trinity, and the Clergy of St. Luke's, for their constant attention to the Baptismal and Sunday services of our Home, we are deeply grateful, as also to the ladies who conduct the weekly Bible lesson given to our young women. We would also tender to the members of the Advisory Board, to our Officers, and to all our many kind friends and willing workers, our sincere and grateful thanks.

MEDICAL REPORT.

MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN :—

We have pleasure in submitting to you the Medical Report for the year just ended, being the twenty-second of the existence of the Infants' Home and Infirmary.

On October 1st, 1896, there were 54 children here, and 130 were admitted since, making a total for the year of 184. Among these there have been 46 deaths, due to the diseases common to infants, such as pneumonia, inflammation of the brain, marasmus, convulsions, cholera infantum, and such like.

Only two of these had reached the age of eighteen months ; two were over a year, and under fifteen months ; eight were over six months, and under a year ; twenty-one were over three months, and under six months ; and eleven were under three months old. Many of these came here in a dying condition ; others were so delicate and ill-fed before they reached this Home that in many cases it was impossible to save their lives.

Thirteen foundlings, all very young, were sent and left here during the year, and we have received six children whose mothers, I regret to say, were under the age of sixteen years.

We have been fortunate in escaping without any outbreak or epidemic of serious nature. It is true we had three cases of scarlet fever of a mild type, two babies and one mother, all of whom were carefully isolated, and all recovered.

The Medical Staff desire to thank the Lady Managers and the Lady Superintendent for their courtesy and kindness during the past year.

I cannot close these remarks without referring to one who has been removed from our midst during the year. Although for a very long time before her death almost a constant sufferer, she was ever ready to sacrifice herself; ever energetic in her work for this Home; giving liberally of her worldly goods, the Infants' Home and Infirmary could ill afford to lose her. As long as this Institution lasts the name of Mrs. Bendelari will remain green in the memory of all who knew her.

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

TORONTO INFANTS' HOME AND INFIRMARY.

I.

The name of this Institution shall be "The Infants' Home and Infirmary of Toronto."

II.

The object of the Home shall be to receive and tenderly care for the children of wet nurses, the daily charge of infants whose parents labor away from home, the charge of destitute children under two years of age, entrusted to its care by any municipality in Ontario, and the care, medical attention, and nursing of sickly and dying infants.

III.

The parents or guardians of children admitted to the Home shall contribute to its funds such amount as shall be decided upon by the Committee in charge. In case of total inability of parents to pay any money the matter shall be dealt with at the discretion of the Committee.

IV.

The entire management of the Home shall be vested in a Board of Managers, consisting of a President, two Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Secretary, and thirty other ladies, who shall be assisted by an Advisory Board of three gentlemen.

V.

The officers and other members of the Board of Managers shall be elected at each regular Annual Meeting of the Society.

VI.

The Board of Managers shall have power to alter and amend the Constitution and By-Laws of the Society, provided one month's notice be given of any contemplated amendment. They shall have power to transact all business in the Nursery, saving the investment or sale of any property belonging to the same, for which purpose the presence of ten Managers, including three officers, shall be necessary, as well as the assent in writing of the Advisory Board.

VII.

Three gentlemen shall be elected at each regular Annual Meeting to act as an Advisory Board. They shall be consulted in all matters of finance,—especially in the investment of funds.

VIII.

In case any vacancy shall occur by the death or resignation of any officer, member of the Board, or Advisory Board, before the expiry of the term of office, the Board of Managers shall thereupon elect a person to fill such vacancy for the unexpired period of the term.

IX.

The funds necessary for supporting this Home shall be secured by annual subscriptions, donations, collections, and other means.

X.

The Annual Meeting shall be held the first Tuesday in October, or as near that date as possible.

 BY-LAWS.

I.

The Managing Committee shall meet monthly, or oftener if required; shall see to the proper treatment of the children, and secure the proper discharge of their duties by the matron and nurses.

II.

The Secretary shall keep a full record of proceedings; summon meetings, and discharge the duties generally that pertain to the office of Secretary, under the direction of the Committee. She shall prepare an annual report of the condition, progress, and prospects of the Home.

The Treasurer shall be responsible to the Institute for all monies received, and shall issue vouchers. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to provide an ever source, in which account the President shall keep another chart of the Account, in which account shall be replenished for Maintenance

The Physicians and Nurses shall be appointed by the Committee, and no child or woman shall be admitted without examination of the

The Home shall be managed as far as possible, each child shall be given the best service to be attained, and the same shall be determined.

Only a certain number of children shall be cared for at any one time, and the medical officer shall be consulted in all cases.

RULES

Regular meetings shall be held of every month, and special meetings may be held at the request of the

All meetings shall be held at the hour as a quorum, and shall include one of the following

The following shall be the order of business: minutes of previous meeting, to be read and approved; inform the members of the Home; read a general report of the

The Treasurer shall report on the monies expended during the year, and the President; or

The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all moneys belonging to the Institution, and shall keep accurate account thereof with vouchers. It shall be her duty to deposit all receipts, from whatever source, in a chartered bank to the credit of the Institution, from which account withdrawals shall only be made by cheque, signed by the President and Treasurer; she shall also keep in the same or another chartered bank an account to be called the Maintenance Account, in the name of the Treasurer of the Infants' Home, which account shall not exceed \$500 at a time, and shall be opened and replenished from the General Account. Withdrawals from the Maintenance Account shall be made by cheque of the Treasurer only.

IV.

The Physicians of the Home shall be appointed by the Managing Committee, and shall have the entire medical control of the Home. No child or wet nurse shall be received permanently without their examination or approval.

V.

The Home shall be provided with as many healthy wet nurses as possible, each nurse to be entrusted with two infants, the term of service to be at least six months, or as much longer as the Board may determine.

VI.

Only a certain number of babies shall be admitted to the Home to be cared for at the same time, the number to be determined by the medical officer.

RULES FOR THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

I.

Regular meetings of the Board shall be held on the first Tuesday of every month, at 11 a.m.

Special meetings may be called upon an order from the President, or at the request of any three members.

II.

All meetings shall be opened with prayer as soon after the appointed hour as a quorum shall be present (five to constitute a quorum), including one of the officers.

The following order shall be observed:—The Secretary shall read minutes of preceding meeting, which shall be signed by the President; inform the meeting of any correspondence that has taken place, and read a general report of the condition of the Institution.

The Treasurer shall present her account of all moneys received and expended during the past month, to be audited and signed by the President; or in her absence, by one of the Vice-Presidents.

III.

The Treasurer shall receive and take charge of all moneys belonging to the Institution, as well as the children's fees, keeping accounts of the same. All accounts shall be brought by her before the meeting of the Managers, to be signed by the President.

IV.

A Committee of five shall meet every Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock, consisting of the President (or Vice-President), Treasurer, and Secretary, the Visitor of the previous week, and the Visitor of the current week, when the said Visitor shall report her experience. The Committee shall be called the Committee of Admission and Investigation, and every application for admission, both of children and nurses, shall be referred to them. This Committee shall arrange about the adoption of children from the Home, and shall report to the General Committee once a month. On these occasions three shall form a quorum. A Visitor shall be appointed by the Secretary to visit the Home daily each week, each Manager taking his duty in turn. The Visitor shall ascertain from the Lady Superintendent all about the health of the children, and the conduct of the nurses, and shall report the same to the Weekly Committee.

V.

When the Board shall have been called to order, all conversation shall cease.

VI.

One member only of the Board shall be allowed to speak at a time, and then only on the business of the meeting. The Manager having the floor shall address herself to the chair.

RULES FOR ADMISSION OF MOTHERLESS CHILDREN.

Application for the admission of children must be made to the Weekly Committee, which meets at the Home, St. Mary street, every Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock.

No child over two years of age will be admitted, unless by special permission of the Committee.

Infants pay \$5 per month, children who can walk \$4, unless remitted by the Committee of Admission. Children from outside municipalities double fee.

Every child admitted must be examined by a physician.

RULES FOR ADMISSION OF MOTHER NURSES WITH CHILDREN.

1. Each woman admitted must nurse and feed a child in addition to her own, unless otherwise ordered by a physician.

2. Each woman admitted must give her services to the Institution for as long as the necessities of her own child, or her charge may require, in return for board, lodging, and clothing for herself and infant, and before any woman is permitted to leave the Home the particulars of her case shall be laid before the Board by the Superintendent.

3. Her good conduct during her residence in the Home will secure her the assistance and recommendation of the lady Managers in obtaining, when she leaves, a desirable situation.

4. Each applicant (whether child or woman) who shall have received a permit to enter the Institution from the Committee shall be referred to the Visiting Physician, who, if he concur in the admission, shall order the Lady Superintendent to have the name, age, condition, etc., of the applicant entered on the record, and registered as an inmate.

5. No unmarried woman admitted, except with her firstborn.

PARTIES WISHING TO ADOPT BABIES

Must send to the Home certificates stating that they have the means of bringing up a child, and that they can give the child a Christian education. Inquiries will be made at once relative to the parties applying and those recommending, and if the result of these inquiries is deemed satisfactory, the applicants will be notified that they can come and make their selection from such children as are deserted and dependent on charity, and not visited by parents or friends for six months, then the necessary papers will be filled in ready for their signatures.
