

World's Fisheries—From the Equator to the Arctics—Lofoden in Norway and Gloucester in America—What a Woman

I never before realized the important part which fisheries play in the commerce of the world, never understood, as I do now, the almost infinite variety of fish products and their value as food, in the arts, and in medicine. From almost very country in the world come the boats, and appliances of fishermen, with figures of the fishermen themselves, models showing methods employed, pictures of fishing scenes and stations, and an infinite variety of fish products.

Norway makes what is probably the most interesting of these displays. The Northmen are farnous fishermen. The theater of their operations extends from Christiana in the south to the limit of the polar ice pack north of Spitzbergen. These Norwegians start early in the year for the Arctic ocean, driving their little schooners into the ice with an intrepidity which astonishes the Arctic explorers who, fitted with steam vessels and all appliances for fighting ire, are afraid to follow. Fishermen from Tromsoc and Hammerfest every

fighting ire, are a fraid to follow. Fishermen from Tromsoe and Hammerfest every year accomplish feats in the northern waters which would add to the fame of Arctic explorers, but the Norwegians are after fish, seal, walrus, eiderdown, whales, not glory. Almost every year some of these little craft go north of Spitzbergen and reach a latitude that is within 500 geographical miles of the north pole. Occasionally one is nipped in the ice up there, and the master and crew, unless rescued by other fishermen, must pass the long Arctic winter in improvised huts and subsist upon such game as they may be able to take before darkness sets in about the first of October. Sometimes they do this successfully; others, their bones are found in the spring where starvation or scurry left them. The Norwegians show here specimens of

The Norwegians show here specimens of the craft and the weapons with which they assail the walrus, theseal and the polar bear. They show also the paraphernalis of one of the most wonderful fishing scenes which the world contains, that at the Lofoden islands in February and March. During ten months of the year these islands are practically deserted. For two months the sun does not show himself. The scene is one of polar calm and white ness. But in February myriads of cod-fish come to the islands, no one knows from where, to spawn. The fishermen come, too. Thirty thousand men come, bringing from 7,000 to 8,000 boats. They create s sity on the shores. By day their boats literally cover the sea for miles and miles—all their fishing is done within sight from land—religing a spectacle such as cannot be found anywhere else in the world. Government regulates everything in these ernment regulates everything in these fisheries. Among the 80,000 men there is fisheries. Among the 80,000 men there is no disorder, no crime. No intoxicating liquors are allowed on the islands. All the beats must leave the land at a certain hour in the morning, and a magnificent sight it must be when seven thousand craft, each manned by four oarsmen, dip the water at a signal and race to the fishing grounds.




