













Elshop 51 Dacea, Bengal, India, arrived there yastereday morning on a visit to the Fathers of Holy Cross at St. Jos-eps. 4. Bishop Linneborn is the third Bishop of Dacea, and his iloczee comprises about 29,000 square miles. The popula-tion is 15,000,000, chiedly Hindoo and Mussulnen. The congregation of Holy Cross was commissioned by Pope Fus the Ninch to the work of evangeliz-ing this great territory. The life of the missionary in this far-of land is very grituons. The climate is very try-ing and the missonaries are exposed to every kind of danger. The means of travel are chieldy on elephants, and by reveboat on the various tributaries of the River Ganges. In his district, of parlsa, the priest is truly "all things to all men." since he is called upon to administer 'o the spiritual wants of this peeple, preach the Gospel to the pagans, and in general act as magis-trate, indge, alderman, mayor, and not infrequently constable. Bishop Linneborn looks as if there were many years of usefulness bofor-him.
